

U.S. Briefs Nations Cuban Arms

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5 (AP)—The Kennedy administration called a meeting of Latin-American ambassadors today to give them information on Soviet arms shipments to Cuba. In a statement Tuesday night, President Kennedy described the weapons as without significant offensive capability and warned the United States would use whatever means necessary to prevent the Fidel Castro regime from taking aggressive action against any part of the Western Hemisphere.

Kennedy said Cuba has received Soviet arms and that about 100 Soviet military technicians are in Cuba.

There appeared to be greater concern in Congress than at the White House and state department over the developments. At the request of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara met with the senators and discussed the situation in a closed session.

Sen. J. William Fulbright, director of the central intelligence agency, also sat in on the meeting. The senators indicated to newsmen later that the administration had been more forthcoming than expected.

Sen. George D. Aiken, R., Vt., said that he "seemed optimistic" that the administration would be able to handle the situation. He said that he would have the "temper" to stick to it.

Sen. J. William Fulbright, D., Ark., said that he was "not discouraged about the situation in Cuba."

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Salt Lake City Is Shaken by Tremor; 2 Schools Closed

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 5 (AP)—A strong earthquake shook Salt Lake City for almost a half minute at 9:05 a.m. today, causing widespread minor damage and forcing two high schools to close for the day. At least three homes were damaged and books and merchandise were knocked from shelves throughout Utah's capital city. Dr. Kenneth Cook, head of the geophysics department at the University of Utah, said today's quake "was not as strong as the one that crashed between 450,000 and one million dollars damage in Logan and the Cache Valley area last Thursday."

But he called it "a good job."

Some 2,500 students were sent home from Granger and Cyprus high schools where shattering damage to both buildings occurred during the quake.

Dr. Berd Cook, principal at Granger, said the inner walls in about 10 second-story classrooms separated from the main wall by a half-inch. He said at least one window was broken and ceiling tiles were shaken loose.

Flut building inspectors assure the damage is only superficial, not structural. Classes will resume tomorrow, Dr. Cook said.

It was the same thing at Cyprus high where classes were scheduled to take up again Thursday.

Several Salt Lake City residents had close calls during the quake.

No injuries were reported. At least one heart attack was blamed on the earthquake. Salt Lake City police said a woman collapsed in the Tracy-Collins bank in Salt Lake City.

Several other residents had close calls.

Janet Hallet, 15, said she woke up to the sound of bricks crashing through her bedroom window, screamed and screamed. "I didn't know what was happening," she said.

Janet is the daughter of Leo O. Hallet. She said the chimney collapsed and some of the bricks smashed through her window and landed on the bed beside her.

The vacant house next door to the Hallets' residence also was damaged. Janet said a number of bricks fell off one wall.

Dr. Cook said this quake, like the one last Thursday, knocked the university's seismograph instruments off the scale, making it impossible to get an exact reading for this afternoon.

Last week's quake was centered in the Cache Valley area and most of the damage was in Logan, Richmond and Laytonville areas.

Today's quake wasn't felt in the Cache Valley area.

Both 4-H and FFA members will assemble at 7:25 p.m. today for a parade to the rodeo arena.

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Battles Rage Despite Algeria Cease-Fire

ALGIERS, Sept. 5 (UPI)—Forces opposing Vice Premier Ahmed Ben Bella fought his troops today at three places outside Algiers despite a cease-fire agreement. Ben Bella flew to two of the areas where fighting raged, Amalek and Berroughin, apparently to confer with local officials on stopping it. But the rattle of machinegun fire and exchanges of automatic rifle and mortar volleys were reported continuing at mid-afternoon. Hospital authorities at Orleansville, 140 miles west of Algiers, said an artillery exchange began this morning at Massena, a small town a few miles to the south.

Later reports said machinegun and cannon fire continued through the afternoon.

Col. J. Besson, commander of the military district four, said that fighting also was going on near Amalek and Berroughin, where Algerian army columns driving on Algiers ran into stiff resistance from willaya guerrillas.

A report from Berroughin earlier reported that fighting had ended there last night.

Hospital officials at Orleansville said ambulance drivers bringing in wounded reported that fighting started in the Massena area around 5 a.m. and that artillery fire was still going on more than six hours later. The hospital said most of its doctors and interns were in the Massena region helping the wounded.

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Closer Watch on U2 Flights Is Promised

WASHINGTON, Sept. 5 (AP)—The United States is considering imposing new safeguards on military patrol flights near the Soviet Union in an attempt to reduce the risk of violating Soviet territory. The latest in a long series of aerial border incidents flared into world headlines Tuesday when the Soviet Union charged that a U-2 reconnaissance aircraft of the type that made sensational history in 1960 had trespassed Soviet territory in the Far East.

Officials said today they hoped this speedy consideration of the possibility of a quick end to the latest U-2 incident and kill the anti-American propaganda buildup Moscow might be planning.

The note to Moscow released here by the state department only a few hours after Moscow's protest went beyond conceding the possibility of a mistake in navigation due to "nervous tension during this nighttime flight."

It made two other points: The policy of barring U-2 flights over Soviet territory which was first laid down by President Dwight D. Eisenhower after the 1960 incident and was later confirmed by President Kennedy is still in effect.

Precautionary measures include to prevent accidental trespassing of Soviet air space are being reviewed.
