

# Slim OK Given to Farm Bill

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—By a cliff-hanger vote of 202-197, the house passed today a compromise farm bill that included some of the provisions the administration wanted.

The compromise bill, worked out by a Senate-house conferees, still must be approved by the Senate. That approval is virtually certain.

After passing the compromise measure, the house defeated by a vote of 165 to 238 a Republican attempt to send it back to conference. That vote closely followed party lines.

The House Republican motion would have instructed the conferees to return to a bill that amounted to a straight extension of present one-year commodity wheat and feed grain programs.

Republicans argued bitterly against the compromise, while Democrats defended it as the best chance for a farm program in the coming year.

The bill contains a provision that in 1964 the secretary of agriculture can set price supports for some crops at a level designed to prevent further increases in government-owned surplus stocks.

Republicans argued that this would mean low price supports at 50 percent of parity or 60 cents a bushel for corn, which they said was a ruinous level for farmers.

On the vote, 200 Democrats and 197 Republicans voted for the bill. The 200 Democrats and 197 Republicans voted against it.

A controversial provision in the bill provides for direct payment to farmers in grain from surplus government stocks as part of the farm bill.

It aimed at reducing government stocks and saving money in the end out of storage.

## Solons Adopt Warning on Cuba Buildup

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—The Senate today adopted a resolution warning the United States will not tolerate a military buildup in Cuba capable of endangering U.S. security.

The House is expected to follow quickly in the Senate's lead, and the Senate's committee on foreign affairs committee approved this morning a resolution of identical wording.

The resolution was drafted by the Senate foreign relations and armed services committees in consultation with the state and defense departments. Hence it expresses the determination of the Kennedy administration as well as the sentiment of Congress. Republican leaders behind the resolution.

## Khrushchev, Kennedy May Hold Meeting

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—The impression is growing in Washington that President Kennedy and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev may meet somewhere in the United States in late November or December.

Within the communist build-up in Cuba and disarmament uncertainty would be the last summit session took place.

So far as is known, neither has made specific proposals to the other.

Khrushchev has been visiting American and other visitors to Russia that he thought an informal talk with Kennedy might be a good idea. He went on to say to one U.S. official that he would be busy through October but free after that.

The President has kept his own counsel. But there is no tendency in official quarters to discount the possibility of a Kennedy-Khrushchev meeting.

U.S. officials believe Khrushchev is preparing to push the Berlin issue to new crisis proportions late this year. They acknowledge a meeting between the Soviet and American leaders might be a "good" idea before things go too far.

## End Nearing For Strike, Wirtz Says

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz said today a final agreement in the Chicago and Northwestern Railway strike now depends mostly on tying up loose ends.

He was hopeful the negotiators could reach agreement by tonight on issues to be submitted to a board of arbitration. He would make no definite prediction, however.

The 22-day-old strike, which has crippled transportation in several Midwestern states, is expected to end as soon as this agreement is achieved.

Wirtz met today for the third day with the chairman of the railroad, Bep Heinemann, and G. E. Leighty, president of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers.

Wirtz said the group was working on two final papers. One covered matters previously agreed to but now under review. The other dealt with specific issues to be before an arbitration board as requested by President Kennedy.

## Missile Makers Accept Kennedy Union Proposal

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—Two major missile-space producers have bowed to President Kennedy's request and accepted compulsory union membership proposed by a special presidential board of settlement to their contract disputes with two unions.

The agreements ended the threat of a strike Saturday against North American Aviation and General Dynamics Convair divisions.

Kennedy announced the North American agreement with the United Auto Workers, AFL-CIO, Wednesday night. The Convair agreement with the AFL-CIO Machinists union had been announced earlier at San Diego.

Boeing Aircraft, another large missile-space producer, has a similar dispute with the machinists.

## Macmillan Will Speak on Market

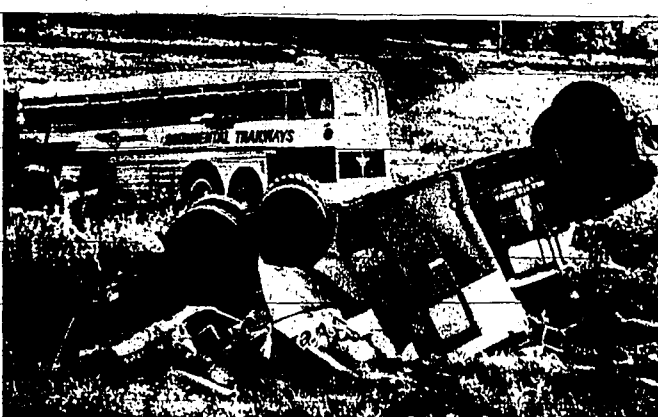

Led by freshmen who will be cheering the football team on Saturday night, the crowd sang and shouted: "Glory, Glory, Sea-millars! Two, Four, Six, Eight! We Don't Want to Integrate!"

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## Dock Work Ends Today For Meeting

NEW YORK, Sept. 20 (AP)—Active on docks from Maine to Texas comes to a standstill today when dockworkers quit work and report to union halls to hear precinct reports on a strike threatened by CIO.

The union precincts were called for 5 p.m. by Thomas Gleason, executive vice president of the International Longshoremen's Association (ILA), whose contract with the New York Shipping Association (NYSA) expires Sept. 30.

The shipping association represents 145 major companies, which in turn employ ILA members on waterfronts from Portland, Me., to Corpus Christi, Tex.

Federal mediators have called a temporary halt to negotiations aimed at settling the dispute. Robert H. Moore, deputy director of the federal mediation and conciliation service, returned to Washington and said he had "no current ideas on how to break the logjam."

Neither ILA nor NYSA negotiators will discuss proposed dock crew cutbacks and both sides are far apart on a wage agreement.

Night shift longshoremen on the East Coast, Gulf Coast and in the Midwest, however, will not work tonight, the ILA's headquarters here reported.

The union said day shift workers would report to the plant tomorrow.

## Convicted Agent Deported Home

NEW YORK, Sept. 20 (AP)—Curt Leopold, convicted of espionage while serving as an interpreter at the Nuremberg war crimes trials, was deported Wednesday to his native Austria.

Leopold, 29, was released from the federal penitentiary at Alcatraz, Cal., after serving more than nine years for conspiring to turn over defense information to the Soviet Union.

## Mariner Report

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—Mariner II, the Venus-bound space rocket with 197,000 miles from Earth at noon, the space agency said today.

Traveling at 8,453 miles per hour, the instrument-laden spacecraft hit midday had completed 47,225,012 miles of its 100,000,000 journey to the planet's vicinity. It was expected to arrive Dec. 14 for a half-hour probe of the mysterious planet.

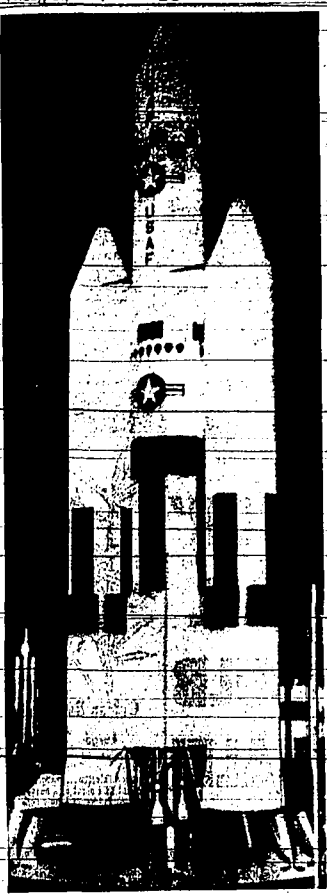

## GOP Candidates Offer Views on Farm Problems

By The Associated Press  
Republican candidates for the U.S. senate and house offered views on the agricultural problems today, one suggesting a "bushel management" plan for wheat and the other criticizing farm controls.

Senate nominee John T. Hawley said a bushel management plan would limit the bushels of wheat a farmer could produce and limit the amount for which he could receive price supports.

But he said farmers could employ their land as they wanted. The present system provides for acreage controls.

If a farmer were given 100 per cent parity on the first 10,000 bushels he raised, "he wouldn't be forced to open market for the rest at the market place."

This would enable the small farmer to continue in operation and still reduce surplus and enable the largest proportion of the wheat economy to go on the supply and demand system.

Hawley also criticized Sen. Frank Church, D. Ida., for a vote on an amendment to the Trade Expansion bill.

Hawley said the amendment, approved 40-30, would deny northern Idaho lumbering and mining interests a fair hearing in the tariff commission on tariff adjustments.

State Rep. Orval Hansen, seeking the second district congressional seat of Democratic Rep. Ralph Harding, said the election will provide a clear test of the popularity of farm controls in Idaho.

"I believe we have too many government controls now and that we should give the farmer more freedom to run his own farm," said Hansen. "Ralph Harding supports the Freeman plan which calls for more government controls."

In other developments:  
A supporter of Democratic gubernatorial nominee Vernon K. Smith filed a sharp shot at Democrats who fail to support Smith.

A few dissenting, self-styled Democrat leaders such as those who investigated former President Truman and Democratic platform should not be permitted to wear the Democratic label, said a M. Dore of Boise, area co-chairman of the Smith for Governor committee.

Truman expressed strong opposition to Smith's gambling program last week during a visit to eastern Idaho.

"These Democrats" said Dore, "had every opportunity to present their choice of candidates to the voters in a perfectly legal primary election."

"Some of them have worn 'vote for Smiley' buttons at Democratic conventions. These turncoats who are now operating as a fifth column in the Democratic party should be tried out of the party—purged from its rolls if they refuse to support the party."

## Teller Suggests Atom Blasts to Divert Rivers

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 20 (AP)—Dr. Edward Teller suggested yesterday that nuclear explosives could be used by farmers to divert rivers and break up underground layers of water.

The nuclear physicist told delegates to the Farm Equipment Institute convention that such "clean" nuclear explosives have been developed and could be used in agriculture.

"Much of the agriculture in the United States today is based on water that is stored underground," he said, and nuclear explosives could "reliably and safely and cheaply break up" underground layers of water—allowing it to seep through and replenish water resources in dry areas.

Dr. Teller, a University of California member, pointed out that Australia is engaged in diverting rivers, and farming in Texas is based "almost exclusively on underground water supplies." He suggested atomic explosives might be useful in those areas.

## A-Power Seen

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—Disarmament director William Foster has told congress that communist China probably will have nuclear devices within one to three years if nuclear testing continues.

"Other countries in Asia, the Middle East and Europe could have them by the late 60's or earlier thereafter if they were to choose to do so," Foster said, in testimony made public yesterday by the senate preparedness subcommittee.

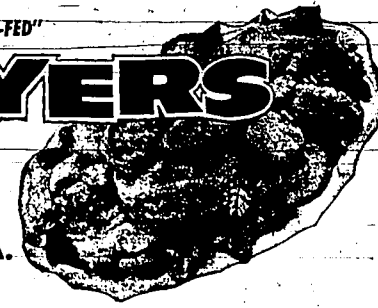

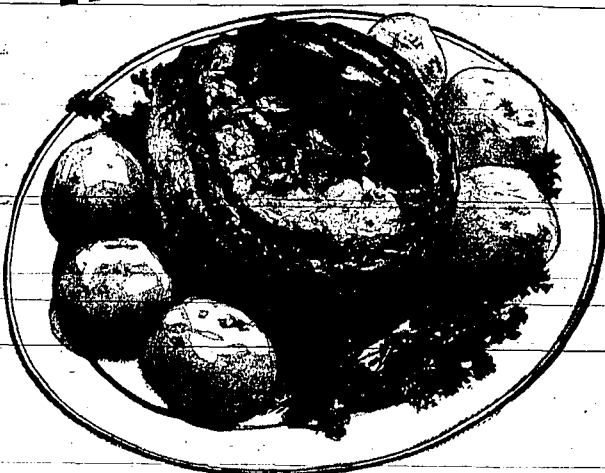

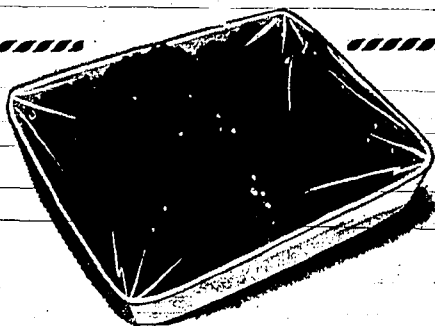

## German Says He "Spied" For Russians

KARLSRUHE, Germany, Sept. 20 (AP)—A former high-ranking German defense ministry official on trial for allegedly spying for Russia told police who arrested him they had "caught a big fish," a police official testified today.

Peter Fuhrmann, 47, is charged with spying for the Soviet Union in his capacity as civilian official in charge of defense mobilization plans. He has admitted working for the Soviets but said he did so under threat of death.

Police agent Hubert Hasselbusch, 50, testified during the trial's second day he led a group that searched Fuhrmann's Hannover apartment without success four days before Fuhrmann was arrested in November, 1951.

Then Fuhrmann's wife told police he kept a second apartment where they found "incriminating evidence."

When Fuhrmann was taken into custody, Hasselbusch said he told police:

"Permit me to congratulate you—you have just caught a big fish."

Fuhrmann admitted earlier he worked with the Soviets but insisted it was under threat of death. He said he accepted about \$1,750 for "expenses."

## Union Meeting Asks Wage Hike

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 20 (AP)—A federal mediator planned today to contact both sides in the Hercules powder company strike to ascertain whether there is any basis for resuming talks.

Federal mediator S. Lyle Johnson said he would meet both sides with Local 2-200, International Oil Chemical and Atomic Workers union, and Hercules officials.

The plant, which produces acetone, has been closed since the start of the strike, which now is seven days old.

The mediation service recommended a 9% wage increase but the company declined and continued to offer 8 cents. The union agreed to accept the 9% cents but also has asked for demands to 12 1/2 cents per hour.

Hercules has been hiring some of its 4,800 non-union employees to fill vacancies created by the strike of the 1,000 members of the union.

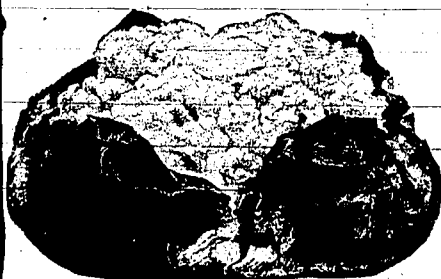

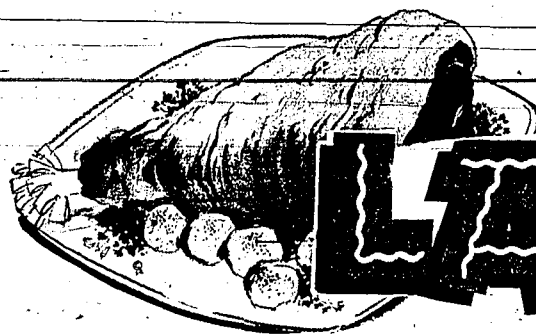

## Title Fight Offers Hope for Both Sides

NEW YORK, Sept. 20 (AP)—The contrast in size, styles and personalities is so great the pre-fight crystal ball business is reduced to hunches rather than predictions.

So the hunch here is that Floyd Patterson will retain his heavyweight championship against Sonny Liston by a means of another. That includes a 15-round decision which few, including the fighters, themselves, expect.

Liston backers are so numerous the champ already has been made an underdog in the betting. Sonny has the size, actually impressive physical dimensions, and a punch to match.

Patterson supporters virtually are Patterson's apologists. Floyd has been upended at least once by every challenger right down to amateur level. That makes it seem likely that he will be the sort of mistake no heavyweight champion should make.

What Floyd does have is speed. He has been a real contender since he was a kid. He is capable of improvising and that makes him a speedster. He has a good chin and his speed gives him an excellent chance to escape the methodical, dynamiting Liston while pouring in enough shots to count.

That's little enough to go on, since Liston is regarded as a champion of a puncher to make it "one bomb and out" and it is a man who supposedly can take a punch better than any fighter in the ring today.

However, Liston did have a 12-round decision over Eddie Machen, who hasn't Patterson's equipment.

Attitude has played an important part in Patterson's career, as a champion and here it will be a factor in the fight.

In the first fight with Jimmy Johnson, the one in which he lost his heavyweight championship, Floyd admittedly underestimated the awkward Sarge and became careless.

"The second time," Floyd said later, "I guess he underestimated me."

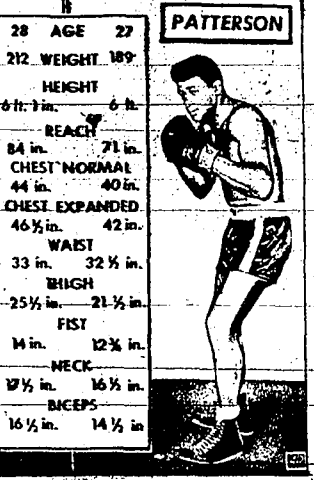
It's unlikely Patterson has anything but more respect for Sonny's punching ability. He has, in fact, done what he could to strengthen his trick and jaw muscles to withstand an attack better than he has in the past and, presumably, has worked on achieving a firmer balance to prevent embarrassing knockdowns.

So Floyd may be underestimating Liston—not with the odds against him, not with the mounting accusations, but with the threat of a knockout. Liston is threatening to remove the top of which Patterson is so proud.

The odds here is that Floyd will continue beating Sonny to the punch and will slow him even further with left hooks, tearing him apart.

Perhaps the greatest danger to Patterson is how he reacts the first time there is such a first—that Sonny clips him good. Floyd sometimes likes to achieve a firm balance to prevent embarrassing knockdowns.

That's like that and what makes this an intriguing fight.

### Snake River Tagging of Salmon Starts

BOISE, Sept. 20 (AP)—Fall Chinook salmon are back in the Snake River. The fish are being tagged and released at the Snake River hatchery, the Fish and Game Department reported Wednesday.

The big fish are being released at two places, above and below the 50-mile long Brownlee reservoir to learn how successfully the lost group comes through the slack waters. As many tags as possible will be recovered from the spawned-out fish, later this fall.

Another part of this study on fall Chinook salmon is the trapping of fingerlings hatched last spring below Swan Falls. Collection barges on the Snake River at the Western bridge are used to catch the downstream migrants.

The little fish are counted and the time it takes to provide future identification, the department said. October is the best time for fall salmon fishing and the most productive waters are between Swan Falls and Marzberg.
