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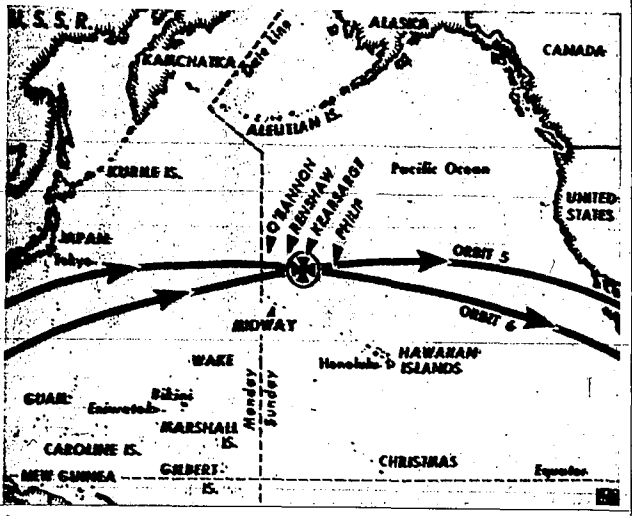

Parents Sent "Flunk" List At Shoshone

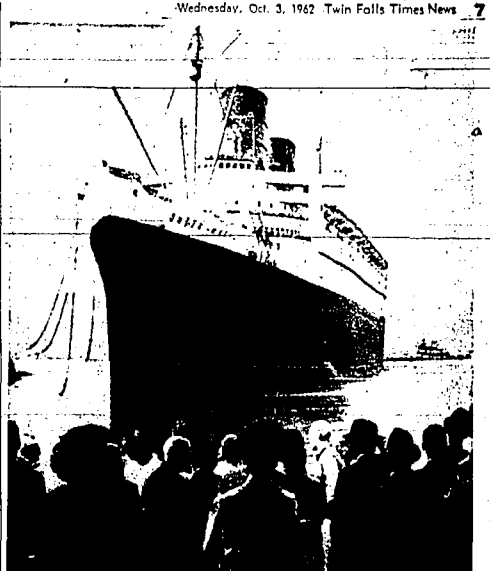

Shoe Store Owner Puts Career on Line Thursday

LEWISTON, Oct. 3 (AP)—Marvin E. Dean, a shoe store owner who has taken city hall to its foundation in three years as mayor, placed his political career on the line Thursday in a recall election believed to be the first in Lewiston's history.

Facing the same test will be Police Commissioner Martin McKay, a political ally of the mayor during most of his 18 months on the city council.

A citizens' group, "tong by the part played by Dean and McKay" is the filing of Police Chief Clyde V. Dalley six weeks ago, brought on the special election by circulating recall petitions.

Mayor Councilman G. Harry Williams, an old antagonist of the mayor, is the candidate to succeed Dean at the city's "Democrat Davidson," a former state major, is attempting to unseat McKay.

Williams and Davidson both have the backing of the group which initiated the recall movement. Under Lewiston's city charter, the issues of recalling a city official and picking his successor, if there is to be one, are decided in the same election.

The election will climax a literary career for Dean, 60, who was little known here until he succeeded to prominence in 1959 with an upset victory over Dr. Donald E. Wenden, the city's former mayor. Dean campaigned against a proposed city change plan—Ed Wenden said the City Council members favored.

The mayor's first few months were marked by weekly battles with the council majority, by suspensions of city officials and by resignations, including Dr. Harry Caldwell of the University of Idaho, whose resignation he had secured several years as the city's planning commission.

Dean claimed that too much power had fallen into the hands of the city planning commission and he was trying to restore it to the people. He threatened to abolish the commission and, although he never carried out that threat, he eventually reduced its size and appointed members to it. His opponents accused him of being dictatorial and arbitrary.

Ford Rocca, police chief when Dean took office, resigned in 1961 after following a conspiracy which began when the mayor sided with a subordinate, Sgt. Wilford J. Duclon, who claimed the chief was prejudiced against him.

Rocca was replaced by an ex-chief, Lewis Ed Deip, who had good bills in Dean's favor. But in May, 1962, the council majority ousted Deip, a retired State trooper, to take Deip's place at the helm. The mayor denied that he had bettered the new chief when Deip later died.

The most recent crisis in the city government occurred last year when McKay, who was elected to the council in 1960, charged that Dalley had lost

the confidence of the business community. Dean and McKay led the assault against Dalley, which was climaxed when the council Aug. 13 voted 5-2 to dismiss him. The recall movement against Dean and McKay began the next day.

In addition to the departure of the police chief, the city since Mrs. Spurr was clerk, who was fired, and its treasurer, engineer and clerk in the engineer's office, all of whom resigned. Several other key city workers have left in recent months for one reason or another.

Williams, who tangled frequently with Dean when he was police commissioner, on the council. Acquisition of stability will be restored to city government if Dean is removed. Dean contends that Williams represents the interests of a "few" and has promised to give him both "hardball" and "softball."

Dean has received the endorsement of the Lewiston-Clarkston Central Labor council. The council has taken no position on the contest involving McKay.

The terms of the two city officials ordinarily would be up until next June.

Astronaut Has Phone For Lounging

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Oct. 3 (U.P.)—A sort of extension telephone designed for mid-ocean raft lounging is part of astronaut Walter M. Schirra, Jr.'s equipment for his scheduled six-orbit flight.

"The idea is to let people know where he is—and how he feels—at journey's end."

The telephone is essentially a highly refined version of the headsets worn by switchboard operators. It has a 30-foot cord, one end of which can be carried by the astronaut from the space capsule to the life raft.

The addition of the telephone to the spacecraft equipment was predicated upon the assumption that Schirra would much prefer a sunbath aboard the life raft to remaining inside the capsule cabin after landing.

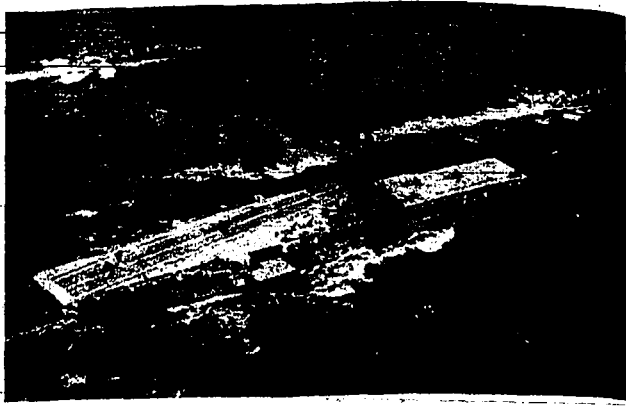
"This assumption was understandable since one capsule sank only minutes after impact on July 1961. This was the one Virgil I. Grissom rode on a 15-minute suborbital flight."

Wally Was "Rah-Rah" at Navy--Even More Today

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Oct. 3 (U.P.)—"Rah-rah" is what the boys at Annapolis called Walter M. Schirra, Jr. 17 years ago. The name is appropriate today.

Excerpts from the 1945 naval academy yearbook provide an idea of Schirra's character:

"Here is a guy who could make anyone laugh. His never-ending sense of humor, descriptions and ability to execute new pranks have kept us either amused or hoisting the bag."

"Easygoing, unperforable Wally Schirra is much the same today. He is the most carefree of the original, seven-mar astronaut team, always ready with a smile or a fast wince."

Nothing seems to disturb him. He went about the strenuous training for his orbital flight with the ease of preparing for a family picnic. He is happiest when things are fast-paced — when he's at the stick of a jet plane, the wheel of a fast sports car or in skimming the water on water skis behind a powerful boat.

"We expect one of his women to snag him soon." The Annapolis yearbook continued. "But meanwhile his big brown eyes still have that new-field-to-conquer look."

Wally succeeded to matrimony not long after graduation and has been conquering new worlds ever since, climaxed by his selection as the pilot for the longest U.S. manned orbital flight yet attempted.

The gal who snagged him was Josephine C. "Joan" of the battle. They have two children, Walter III, 12, and Susanne, 4, 10-4-56 fair.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3 (U.P.) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk says Soviet Premier Khrushchev holds the power to "completely change the life of humanity" with a simple decision to live at peace in the world.

Rusk also says that the strength of the United States is pledged to the defense of the Western Hemisphere in the great world struggle now going on.

Rusk expressed these views at a dinner he gave Tuesday for Latin-American foreign ministers and other delegates attending the 20-nation Inter-American conference here.

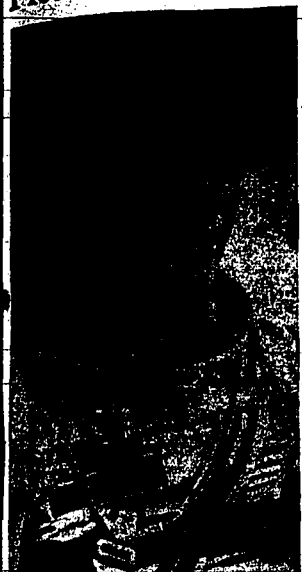

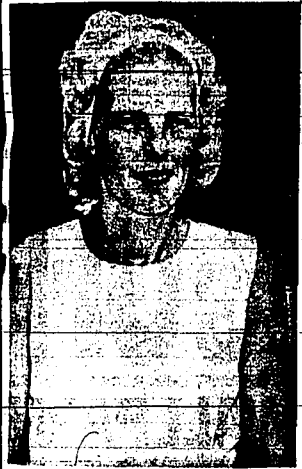

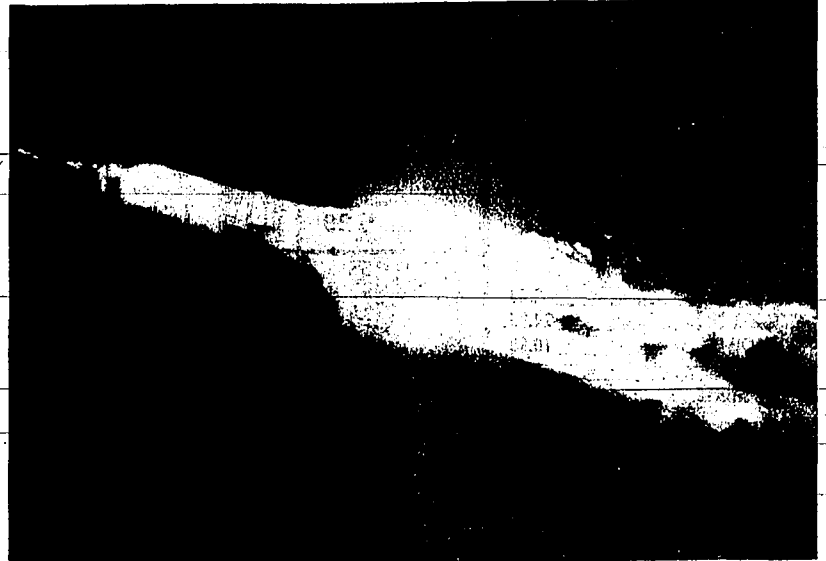

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Farm Worker In Decline, U.S. Reports

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3 (AP)—A decline in farm workers' employment is predicted in the 1950-60 period, the largest decline in the history for a 10-year period, the labor department said today.

The report says that in 1950, there were less than 4 million farm workers employed on farms, down from 4.5 million in 1940 as compared with the 4.7 million employed in 1930.

The department's report, prepared by the office of manpower, predicts that the decline in farm workers will be mainly due to the tremendous increase in productivity on the farms. From 1930 to 1940, the output of farm products was increased by two-thirds in the United States, while the number of workers employed increased only one-third.

The largest decline in rural population was in the South, where, in 1940, for the first time in the history, more of the rural population lived in urban areas than in rural areas, the report says.

A considerable proportion of the population who left the South were agricultural workers. During the decade, the migration of non-agricultural workers from the South was 1.5 million.

The report said the shift of workers to urban areas emphasizes the need for training programs for changing occupational needs. It added that the 1952 manpower training act contains provisions to help those in rural areas obtain training.

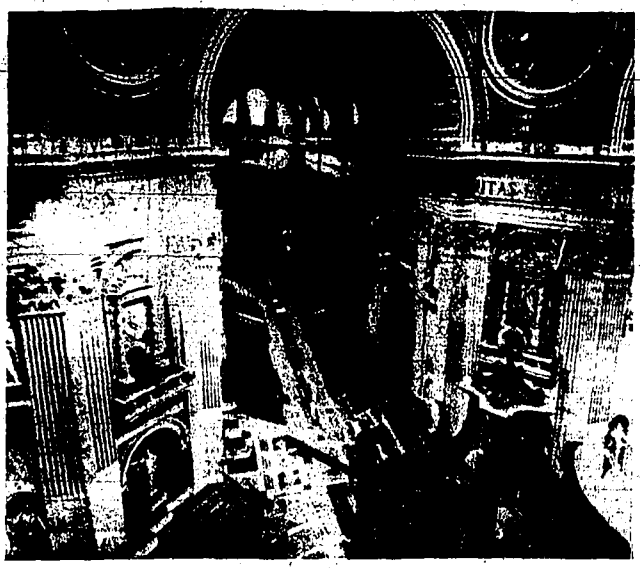

NEW YORK, Oct. 3 (AP)—Pivotal changes apparently are in the making for the Roman Catholic church.

Just what form they will take, and how far they will go, hinge on the 21st Vatican council, opening Oct. 11 in Rome—the largest gathering of ecclesiastical authorities in the church's 2,000-year history.

Its decisions will affect, directly or indirectly, the whole of Christendom.

The aim is a general renovation in the life and operating structure of the church, Pope John XXIII's favorite word for it is "aggiornamento"—bringing the church up to date.

"The coming council will effect a real reform in the church," says the Most Rev. Lorenz Jaeger, archbishop of Paderborn, Germany.

Such a reform doesn't imply any change in basic beliefs, but council planners say it does mean clarification.

None of the others has had such thorough preparations—an intensive process that has involved about 700 churchmen in various countries serving on a hierarchy of commissions for the past three years.

The approximately 2,800 "successors of the apostles"—cardinals, archbishops and abbots, in conjunction with the Pope, constitute the church's ruling hierarchy.

About 75 or more delegate-observers will be on hand from other denominations, at Rome's invitation. Although they will not have a vote, they will sit in on the council.

Myths About Kennedy Told By Salinger

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 3 (AP)—Presidential press secretary Pierre Salinger says there are three "journalistic myths" about the Kennedy administration.

Speaking before the closing session of the national conference of United Press International editors and publishers last night, Salinger listed these "myths":

- "The President has had a terrible time with congress and none of his legislation has been passed."
- "The President and the members of his administration spend many of their waking hours trying to harass business men's businesses."
- "The President and those around him are sensitive about the press."

On the congress topic, Salinger said that "only two weeks ago one of our great weekly organs of public opinion stated flatly that about all the President had been able to get through congress had been appropriations for state and defense."

Salinger said that by the time congress adjourns it will have passed almost 70 per cent of the President's requested legislation.

Referring to the "myth of the anti-business administration," Salinger said that "even at the height of all the stories about how the administration was abusing business, a Gallup poll showed that only 16 per cent of businessmen themselves believed it."

"President Kennedy," he added, "believes that a healthy climate for business is good for the entire country. We have attempted to create that climate."

Salinger said that "perhaps the press is getting too sensitive for its own good."

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Alaska Has Growing Pains After Admission as State

JUNEAU, Alaska, Oct. 3 (AP)—Oil and gas lease bonus money, after almost four years in the old Alaska are flooding about the state within the limits of statehood are just about as lumpy as the highway leading to it.

Alaska became the 49th state Jan. 3, 1959, after a long uphill battle. Every resident knew there was a hurdle after hurdle in the state and one has been disappointed — but few would have it any other way.

The tremendous size of the state and an extremely small population magnify every problem, every plan for development or improvement.

The state has an acreage more than Texas, California and Montana combined. Its population is substantially less than that of Wichita, Kans., although it is being rapidly. The population jumped from 128,643 in 1950 to 226,167 in 1960.

In Anchorage, with 44,227 the state's largest city, one of the most pressing needs is a freeway or arterial system to handle mushrooming traffic. By contrast, complaints came to the legislature this year that the state was becoming lax in making dog team trails along the northwest coast and the Arctic slope.

After years of long-distance rule from Washington as a territory, Alaska upon admission, statehood moved quickly to take over all governmental functions. It assumed control of a huge and financially important fisheries program and took over operation of a highway program that had floundered miserably under federal direction.

It also had to establish a complete state court system.

Alaska's economy, based primarily in the past on fishing, mining and military construction, got a tremendous shot in the arm in 1957 when oil was discovered on the Kenai peninsula, south of Anchorage.

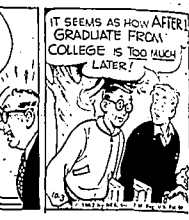
