Cuban Trade Under Attack By Kennedy

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (AP)—President Kennedy has ordered a major economic crackdown on shipping between the communist bloc and Cuba, and the action program is expected to be put into effect in ten days or two weeks.

One effect of the policy decisions would be to ease U.S. ports to Soviet shipping because Soviet vessels are used to deliver grain to Cuba.

This is a symbolic gesture since Soviet "trains" very seldom call at American ports but it may have considerable impact on foreign understanding of U.S. position about the blocked buildup in Cuba.

The move, which has been under study for some time, would be the first action by the United States following Wednesday night's unanimous inter-American foreign ministers' condemnation of the Soviet-supported Fidel Castro regime in Cuba.

Boiler Blast Death Toll Rises to 21

NEW YORK, Oct. 4 (AP)—A one-ton steam boiler blasted through its roof at a telephone company building basement with incredible force Wednesday and rocketed into an adjoining lunch room, killing at least 10 persons and injuring at least 100.

An investigation was launched to learn the cause of the disaster, described by one official as "unbelievable in its path."

The explosion occurred at 12:07 p.m. when about 100 employees from the New York Telephone company were working in the basement building—most of them young women—were crowded in the basement.

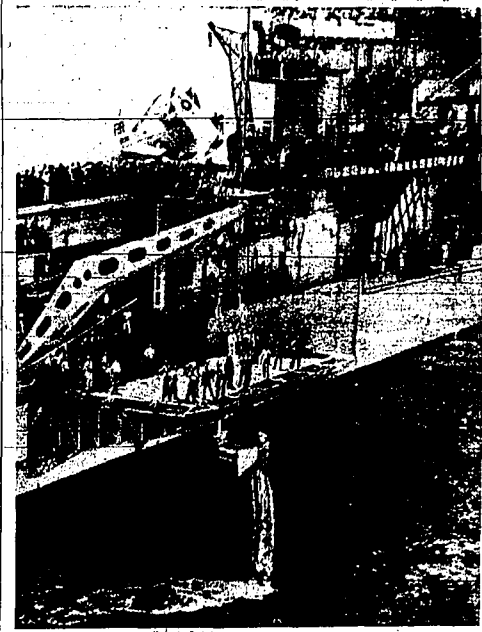
Without warning, the boiler blew and erupted into the room with the force of a jet-propelled projectile. It crashed its way up through the ceiling to the first floor, bounced back and forth through an open wall, and struck through an open wall. It destroyed or killed or maimed everything in its path.

Overturned desks, cabinets and bodies fell through the gaping hole left in the ceiling by the boiler—mad—The basement was engulfed in a deadly embrace of smoke, steam, and flames.

Schirra in Short Stop At Midway

ABOARD USS KEARSARGE, Oct. 4 (UPI)—Astronaut Walter M. Schirra, Jr., and his world-circling Sigma 7 space capsule arrived at Midway Island, where the capsule was to be loaded aboard a cargo plane for return to its Cape Canaveral starting point while Schirra continued a leisurely cruise to Honolulu. During the cruise aboard the aircraft carrier USS Kearsarge, which plucked the capsule from the ocean northeast of Midway yesterday, Schirra was to relate to space agency officials details of his six-orbit flight that went from start to finish with unprecedented perfection.

One of the most notable achievements was accuracy with which the capsule, after traveling 100,000 miles, was brought down exactly in the target area where the Kearsarge waited to pick it up.

Only real difficulty on the flight disclosed so far was with the temperature in Schirra's pressure suit.

Criticism of Cape Canaveral said today the flight came within one and one-half minutes of being ended directly as a result of the temperature trouble.

Chris Kraft, Project Mercury flight director, said the decision to continue was made by the astronaut himself just one hour after the capsule was launched. The U.S. department of agriculture said the average yield per cow was 10,400 pounds, a decrease from 11,000 in the preceding five years. There was 132 million pounds. Prices received for buttermilk in milk used in making American cheese averaged 10 cents per pound during the month. This was 7 cents below the average a year earlier.

BOISE, Oct. 4 (UP)—Weather favorable for crop growth and hastening activities as reported in most sections of Idaho in the weekly summary prepared by the U.S. department of agriculture and the weather bureau at Boise. The report said that in the north, snowed harvest work in some areas had aided soil moisture supplies in many dry land areas. Harvesting of both potatoes and sugar beets getting under way in some areas. Harvesting of the dry bean harvest was reported about 75 per cent complete. A few areas in north Idaho, the summary said, "report spoiled stands of fall grains due to inefficient moisture."

Solon Blames Power Lobby For Defeat

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (UP)—Idaho-Washington Blamed "an active private power company lobbying for defeat of the Burma Creek project in the house of representatives."

Harding called defeat of the Burma Creek project "a sick in the teeth to Idaho citizens."

Mr. P. W. said he attended a White House breakfast last week and that tentative plans for an Oct. 26 visit were discussed.

However, he said, "so far as I know it isn't completely firm up."

Latin Group Studies Rap For Castro

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (UP)—Secretary of state Dean Rusk said 19 foreign ministers from Latin America after Wednesday night that further economic and security measures are necessary to cope with the threat of Soviet-backed Cuban communism.

At the wrap-up of a two-day conference, the foreign ministers unanimously denounced the Cuban-communist alliance.

The closing session which began in mid-afternoon ran for approximately six hours and 45 minutes with time used for speeches and informal discussions. There were many arguments over both wording and substance of the final statement but that in the end full accord was achieved.

Rusk had called the foreign ministers of Latin America to the informal, closed-door sessions here because of the Soviet arms buildup in Cuba.

The ministers drafted what amounted to an invitation to other nations of the non-communist world to lighten economic pressure on Cuba and to buy their national products from the Soviet goods to Cuba.

Passman to Fight for Slice in Aid

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (AP) — Sen. Dan R. Passman, D., La., will fight to get a slice out of the \$1.2 billion aid to the Congo. He will make an attempt to restore a substantial part of the house cut from the aid bill.

Passman's 47 billion foreign aid bill, which passed the Senate last week, would cut the Congo aid from \$1.2 billion to \$1 billion.

In a hearing before the Senate subcommittee on Africa, Passman said he recognized the need for adjustments, but the two bills must be reconciled.

The Senate voted to reduce the Congo aid by \$200 million from the house cut.

But when Rep. H. R. Gross, R., N.Y., offered amendments to "sit it necessary to make the aid bill before any substantial re-arranging of the house cut, Passman said he would not even vote for it.

It would mean "not only until we have more, but until it has been and melted."

U.S. Reports NFO Actions May Backfire

CHICAGO, Oct. 4 (AP) — The National Farmers organization fight for higher livestock prices may have boomeranged, the agriculture department indicated today.

The department commented for the first time on the NFO "all-out holding action" on cattle, hogs and sheep, which—16-state farm group called-off temporarily Tuesday night.

The department said in Washington the NFO campaign to keep livestock off markets could result in prices temporarily lower than if a normal seasonal pattern of sales had been followed.

In a review of the livestock and meat situation, prepared before the "recess" in the NFO drive was announced, the department said hog prices might fall if pigs withheld in September were marketed in October or November.

Head Cold Keeps Kennedy in Bed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (AP) — President Kennedy is suffering from a head cold and has canceled his appointments for the day, the White House announced.

Press Secretary Pierre Salinger said the President's condition was described technically as "a minor upper respiratory infection."

Salinger said the President remained in his quarters. He rested in bed part of the time and sat up at other times to read documents. He conducted some business by telephone, the press said.

Brezhnev visited factories and farms, attended lunches and made speeches. Yugoslav political quarters said he succeeded in putting an official end to high-level over political differences between the two nations. But they said ideological differences are as great as ever.

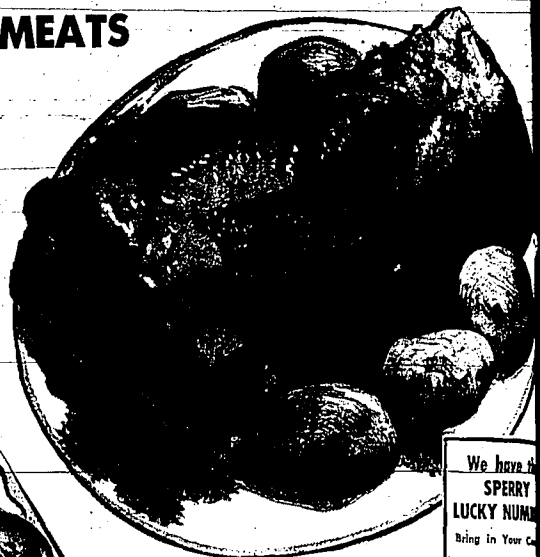

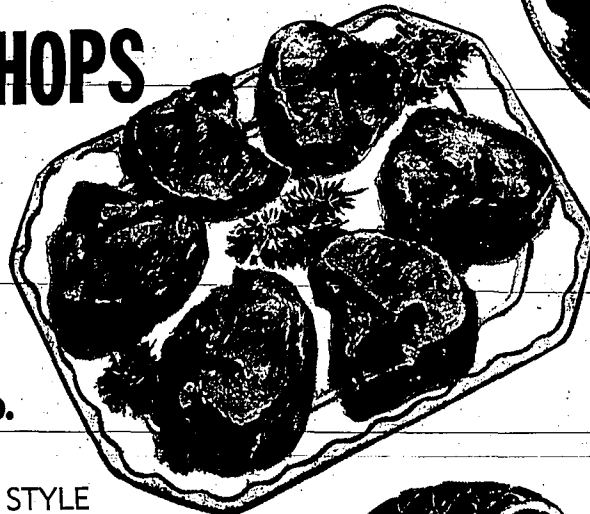

Negro Seeks Court Action At Clemson

ALEXANDRIA, Va., Oct. 4 (AP)—A Negro student asks court action today to clear the way for his admission to South Carolina's all-white Clemson college — and thus crack the state's school segregation barrier.

The 4th circuit court of appeals takes up the case of Harvey B. Oantel, 19, only four days after the integration of the University of Mississippi touched off bloody riots.

This is the first court action to force integration of South Carolina's state-supported white colleges. All public schools in the state are segregated.

Five integration cases now before the U. S. supreme court involve South Carolina public schools. One is the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People's attempt to gain admission of Negro children to elementary and secondary schools in Clarendon county.

Threats of More Rail Strike Loom

LONDON, Oct. 4 (AP)—Railway union leaders said today the one-day nationwide rail strike was only the first shot in a war to halt government cutbacks in railroad service.

"There will be no peace on the railways until there is a fundamental change in the attitude of the transport commission," said National Union of Railwaymen Leader George Brassington.

He said yesterday's strike went "wonderfully well," but the huge traffic tie-ups which had been expected failed to materialize.

U.S. Expects Big Things From Space

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Oct. 4 (AP)—Buttressed by Walter M. Schirra, Jr.'s space success, the United States expects to send at least one, maybe more one-day space missions up early next year.

To send two men into orbit in a manueverable spacecraft by late next year.

To beat the Soviet Union to the moon in this decade, by these careful, sometimes plodding steps into space.

All of this was reaffirmed on the eve of this 10th anniversary of the Soviet Union's pioneering space triumph—a 184-pound globe called Sputnik 1, hurled into space in 1957.

Reds Ask Easing Of Cuba Tension

MOSCOW, Oct. 4 (AP)—The Soviet Union and Yugoslavia called for the "normalization" of relations between the United States and Cuba.

The appeal was made in a joint communique broadcast over Moscow radio.

"Bearing in mind the tense situation in relations between the U.S. and Cuba," the communique said, "and some of the aggressive imperialist statements of extremist circles in the U.S. which cause worry in the world, both sides came out for the normalization of relations."

Donovan flew in from Miami yesterday. He was met at the airport by Sierra Barroso, a negotiator in the negotiations, but no officials were on hand.

Police said most roads in the south portion of Prince Anne county, Va., were under water today. Nearly 3 inches of rain were recorded Norfolk, Va., in a six-hour period.

Light rain sprinkled northwest Washington. But clear skies and comfortable temperatures were in store for most of the West Coast.

More thunderstorms were in sight for the south Atlantic coast. Forecasters said a thunderstorm packing 50-mile-an-hour winds soaked Fort Myers, Fla., with almost two inches of rain.

Consulates Close

LONDON, Oct. 4 (AP)—Authoritative diplomatic sources said today that China's communist government has compelled Russia to close its consulates in Shanghai and Harbin—the only official Soviet agencies in Red China except for the embassy in Peking.

The drastic reduction in Soviet representation in China was regarded in diplomatic quarters here as a token of further deterioration in relations between the two countries.

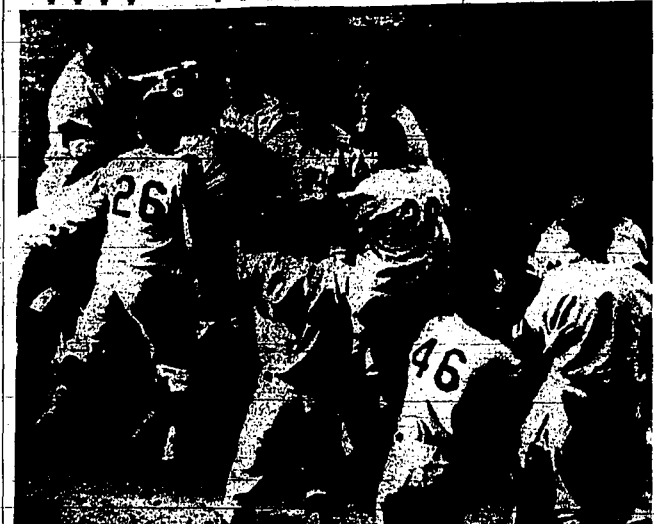
