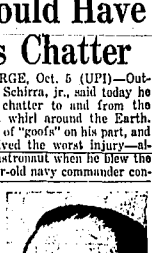

## Along Fences and Canals

Charles Ward banded some of his cattle last Sunday from the ranch to his home pasture for Malia, Harold Ward and his large stock truck and associated with the work.

Rosenkrantz, Lyle Fuhrer and Jim McArthurin have all threshed beans and report an average of better yield. Corn choppers are busy in the Hagaman area. Roy Vader, Roy Wickett, Way Cook, James Mason, Stanley Hookover, are a few who are still completing with their silage operations, or are in the process at present.

The second of a gravel crusher, the roar of loaded gravel trucks and heavy lift trucks is becoming a familiar sound to Elba farmers as the Gordon Harris Construction company, Burley, puts a new set of chips on the road from Connor, in the east end of the Elba valley, to Alma.

Gooding County Agent Ed Koester reports that bean harvest is progressing in Gooding county, with the yield down this year. Some of this can be attributed to early top disease in the red beans and some in the white. Silage harvest is about 75 percent complete, and potato harvest has begun, with Ernest Fields one of the first to start. Beet harvest has not begun yet, but beet yields are expected to be down also, because of the early top disease.

The Elba cattlemen are riding the ranges now gathering their wild and tame herds in the mountains in the fall. The ranges have been good this summer, and fall and the cattle are fat and doing well for market.

Most of the beans in the Dietrich area have been harvested and farmers are now busy cutting corn and filling silage pits.

Sped harvesting is in full swing at the Oscar Stimpson farm near Dietrich with crews working on two shifts, from 6 a.m. to 2 p.m. and from 2 p.m. to 10 p.m. Billie Hill has women assisting with the harvest of his 250 acres of potatoes.

Don Chandler, Elba, is starting to drill an irrigation well on his ranch.



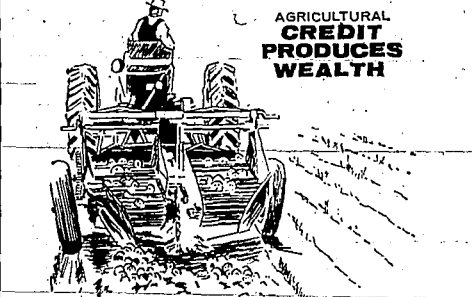

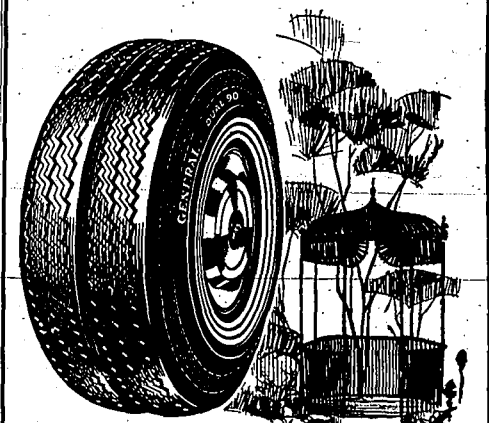

## Dry Milk Dips Are Requested

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4—Offers to supply 22 million pounds of nonfat dry milk were requested by the U.S. department of agriculture late in September. The milk is to be packed in 200 to 250-pound drums, with offers a bid price book. Offers will be received each Thursday until supply has been filled. The 22 million pounds are earmarked to make up part of 100 million pounds of nonfat which the commodity credit corporation has contracted to sell for use in the Japanese school lunch program. So far, 21 million pounds have been obtained. Price supports for nonfat dry milk in bulk at announced prices are in 100-pound bags. The Japanese organization indicated desire for part of its needs to be supplied in drums. It will pay CCC any additional cost to buy nonfat in drums over its purchase price in 100-pound bags. Delivery is scheduled to begin Oct. 22 and end Dec. 31.

The decline, however, is not expected to bring total 1962 production down to the 1961 level. # Dwarf-Sized Peach Tree Bears Fruit During Second Growing Season

ONTARIO, Calif., Oct. 5.—A completely new consumer plant product, the result of more than 25 years of scientific research, was announced here by Armstrong Nurseries, Inc. The new introduction is a genetically dwarf, top-size peach bush which produces full-size, yellow-fleshed freestone peaches, often when it is less than two feet tall.

The revolutionary new plant product, which will be marketed under the brand name of Bonanza, is so compact that a single plant of it can thrive and bear delicious tasting fruit in an area only slightly larger than that required by a single mature rose bush.

According to Armstrong it should thrive wherever peaches ordinarily grow. It can be expected to be as satisfactory as the average peach variety. It even offers the possibility of growing in areas normally too cold for peaches. Experience in the area, however, is still quite limited.

Because of its compactness, the dwarf peach tree governs the growth, bloom and maturing of fruit which is medium size in comparison with other varieties.

Its remarkable ability to produce superior tasting, full-size fruit as early as the second season after planting, plus its ability to show display of large, semi-double pink blossoms in the early spring, plus Bonanza in a larger than a year ago, is a real challenge and stimulates a vast consumer market which has been gradually losing interest in home fruit-bearing trees because of their ultimate large size. Its ripening season is before such conventional early varieties as Redhaven.

Dr. David L. Armstrong, director of plant research for Armstrong Nurseries, who is the originator of Bonanza, said the initial cross-breeding and selection program in the search for this miniature, fruiting flowering ornamental shrub dates back to 1881.

The industry includes crosses involving 24 parental combinations going back four to six generations to varieties originally used as breeding material. A variety of dwarf-peach brought from China in the early 1920's was used to obtain Bonanza's miniature character. The original dwarf had no value as a marketable consumer plant because of its late ripening, which is practically inedible, greenish, white-fleshed fruit. Crosses of the natural dwarf with high quality standard peach varieties and further crosses of selected seedlings ultimately produced Bonanza.

While the Bonanza is unique in that it does not require pruning, it can be kept to a height of three to four feet with light pruning once a year. If left totally unpruned, it would reach a height of six to eight feet after many years.

The department said prices late this year and early in 1953 are likely to be substantially below the 1952 level for the same period a year ago.

An agriculture department report on the poultry and egg situation noted that the cost of baby broiler chicks already has risen in recent weeks. And it said that some further increases are likely.

This forecast of lower chicken prices coupled with higher costs is apparently the result of a spring and summer of good broiler prices. From last May through mid-September, broiler prices have been relatively good, far

# Frost Curbs Idaho Spud Yield Totals

BOISE, Oct. 5.—Idaho's fall potato crop will be less than expected earlier because of frost in September, the University of Idaho extension service said today. The estimate made early in October will probably fall short of the 40,000,000 bushels anticipated a month ago. That was already nearly 10 per cent below the 1951 crop. Frost damage may cut still deeper.

Steve Robinson, marketing information specialist, said in the current issue of "Montana Potato for Idaho Agriculture" that it is too early to measure the full extent of the damage. Heavier frosts were in eastern Idaho from Pocatello north, but other sections also had cold weather.

He said preliminary reports indicate a crop of good smooth potatoes, running about 50 per cent No. 2, with few No. 3 and more culls usually because of small size. Larger potatoes may be at a premium.

The Idaho hay crop was estimated at little more than three million tons, two per cent more than last year. Washington is the only neighboring state showing a decline.

In harvest of feed grains, Idaho had 21,200,000 bushels of barley—up 11 per cent—and 7,540,000 bushels of oats, 90 per cent more than last year.

Milk production throughout the nation during the first eight months of 1953 was one per cent larger than a year ago. Idaho production at 1,118,000,000 pounds was five per cent less. Idaho cow numbers declined about 1,000 head.

# Conservation Leader Says Students Lack Education

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—A conservation leader says education is a weak link in the American conservation movement. The criticism comes from Maxine S. Monk, Jr., president, national association of soil and water conservation districts.

Monk says that only a small percentage of the children who learn to get anything like adequate instruction in the field of natural resources. And very few, he says, will get a chance to learn what a soil and water conservation district is, or what it does.

The conservation leader's comment came in his newsletter to leaders of soil and water conservation districts. Monk points out that most of the nation's children are now going to school in cities and suburbs. He says that what they learn in school will be far from adequate instruction in the field of natural resources, and what to do with them.

Monk gives no answer to this question. But he points to some discouraging facts. He says that probably not more than 25 per cent of American grade school students will get any instruction at all this year in the importance of soil and water resources. And Monk says fewer than 10 per cent of next year's high school graduates will know anything about soil conservation districts.

Eventually, the children who go to school will be voting in federal, state and local elections. "When the decisions about natural resources are in their hands, what will they do?" Monk wondered.

### New Facility at Sugar Factory Will Eliminate Stream Pollution; Drying Set

By O. A. (GUS) KELKER

Stream pollution at the source will be practically eliminated as a result of construction of a huge drier for beet pulp at the Amalgamated Sugar company facility in Twin Falls.

With beet collections getting under way last Monday and the mill starting late Wednesday, use of the drier got under way shortly afterward. At the same time, the just-completed storage facility for the dry pulp also put to use.

This great structure, constructed of steel girders and covered with galvanized steel, looms large on the farm skyline. It is more than 70 feet high, 130 feet wide and 380 feet long. A firewall separates the storage section from the drying structure which, in itself, is more than four stories tall.

Two large presses, manufactured in Norway, are in use and three more are en route. When all are installed and in operation and the storage facility is fully used, it will mark the end of wet pulp leaving the mill.

The dried pulp will be in pellets or bulk form.

Two fired furnaces will provide heat for the drying process. The rotary roller drum is more than 16 feet in diameter and over 30 feet long.

After the manufacturing process the pulp is transported from the mill to the drier through large pipes. The entire operation is automatic. After drying, the pulp is again taken automatically to the storage room and dumped into a truck.

The storage room will not be heated.

Company officials, headed by Robert Day, district manager, are confident of a good beet run this season. By the first of next week the digging and hauling to the mill will be in full operation. The sugar plant has one of the largest payrolls in this area.

### Weed Pest Control Best During Fall

### Heaviest Heifer Calves Are Best

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (AP) — The agriculture department has urged cattlemen to keep only their heaviest heifer calves in selecting replacement heifers for breeding herds.

The department said research indicated this practice would increase cattle profits substantially.

The research showed that heaviest heifer calves when they join the breeding herd. A heifer 100 pounds heavier than average will produce calves weighing 10 pounds more than average at weaning.

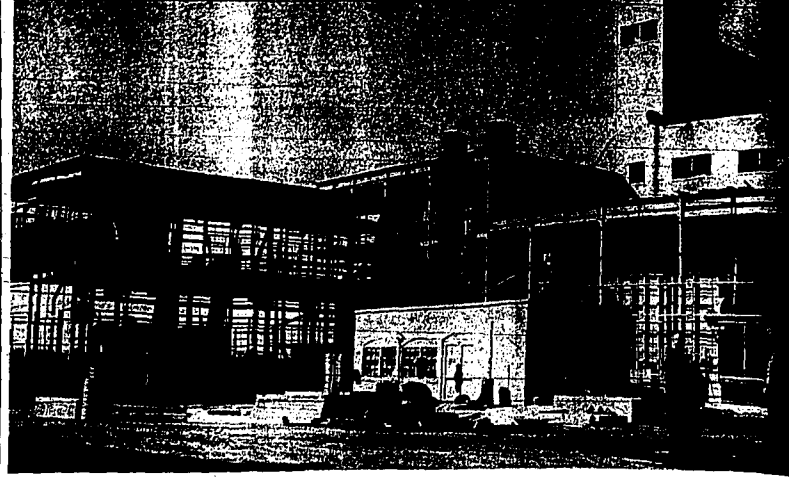

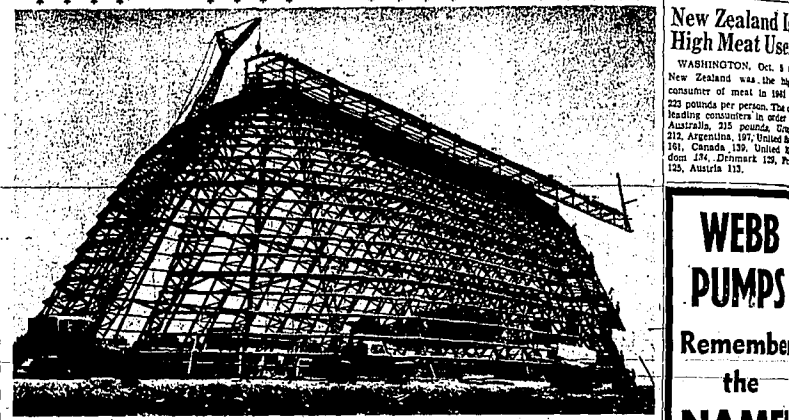

### East Coast Spokesmen Seek Increases in Sugar Quotas

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (AP) — East coast spokesmen argued that sugar beet production and processing should not be concentrated in the west and midwest.

Representatives of Aroostook county in Maine and New York's Finger lakes area contended areas allotments should be made closer to the heavily populated areas.

A spokesman for the Proco valley in Texas urgently proposed that areas to balance a one-crop economy now dependent on cotton.

They testified before agriculture department officials during hearings on the allocation of new sugar beet acreage authorized under the 1961 sugar act.

The act authorized the annual allocation of enough new acreage to produce 45,000 tons of sugar, the amount required to support a new plant.

Five of the 18 communities seeking the allocation have been heard in two days of hearings, expected to continue at least through this week.

Harold E. Bryant, executive vice president of the Maine potato council, urged the allocation of 22,000 acres of Aroostook county to support a plant at Presque Isle.

The county has been declared a depressed area and area redevelopment administration funds might provide 65 per cent of the money needed for the multi-million dollar processing plant, he said.

Alternatively, Bryant said, the money might be borrowed from banks and insurance companies.

### Idaho Is Third In Spud Totals

IDAHO FALLS, Oct. 5 (AP) — Idaho potato shipments to market still rank third in volume among the seven fall producing states.

But general harvest has just begun and Idaho shipments are expected to overtake second place Oregon soon.

The federal-state market news service said Idaho had shipped 424,000 cwt. of potatoes as of Sept. 30, only 86 cwt. behind Oregon. Washington state leads so far with 6,169 carloads shipped.

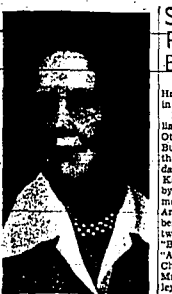

With right-hander Ralph Terry pitching the second game for the third inning, with the Giants threatening to pull ahead, Cepeda bounced into an easy double play ending the inning.

Jack Banford (24-7) will pitch for the Giants Friday after just five days rest.

In another inning to get a left-handed hitter into the lineup, "Big Red" Matty Alou was called into the field in place of Harvey Kuenn.

There was no air of discouragement in the Giants' dressing room as the losses calmly dispatched the game.
