Anti-Castro Mobs Insult Cuban Chief

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—Anti-Castro mobs insulted Cuban supporters after the street from the United Nations building Monday with rocks and signs, and mounted a barrage of potshots.

Police arrested 33 persons. An address inside the general assembly hall by Cuban Premier Osvaldo Dorticos led to the demonstration, thus making the United States the only nation in the assembly which stung such epithets as "traitor" and "assassin" at Dorticos' side.

Prime Minister Fidel Castro addressed the assembly. As each demonstrator in the hall rose and shouted he was quickly surrounded by U.N. guards and escorted from the hall after being photographed for identification.

The clashes between the pro and anti-Castro pickets on Tuesday occurred later in the afternoon, hours after Dorticos had ended speaking.

Norwegian Ship Nixes Cuban Call

OSLO, Norway, Oct. 9.—A Norwegian ship called on Cuba yesterday to unload its cargo of canned herring elsewhere, it was announced today.

A spokesman for the Wilhelm Godehusen Shipping Agency, which the herring carrier received orders yesterday not to take its cargo of herring to Cuba though it had already been ordered by Cuban buyers.

"Due to the developments (U.S. seizures against Western trade with Cuba) we have concluded that hereafter our ships will stop Cuba," said company spokesman.

New Nation Born Amid Great Pomp

KAMPALA, Uganda, Oct. 9.—The red, yellow and black flag of independent Uganda was raised before dawn today as tom-toms beat a stentorian rhythm and bonfires blazed in the hills.

More than 40,000 watched the new flag replace the Union Jack in a ceremony ending more than 60 years of British colonial rule of the East African territory.

Women in the crowds massed in and around Kopalwa stadium showed their approval with shrill cries.

While bands played predominantly military music, Negro and white musicians also had the independent crowd awning to "When the Gambia Go Marching In" and "Ebony" as Uganda became Africa's 33rd independent nation in the midnight ceremony.

The Duke and Duchess of Kent, representing Queen Elizabeth II, were presented with a hurp, the traditional Ugandan musical instrument, a walking stick and animal skins.

The stadium was hushed as the Queen's African Rifles, which has served Britain in two wars, turned its colors over to the Uganda Rifles, the new nation's army. British officers who led the solemn lighting unit will remain with the army for the present.

Description Of Weapon Told by Red

KARLSRUHE, Germany, Oct. 9.—A confessed Soviet assassin told a supreme court today he had seen a pistol before firing the poison-pellet sprays with which he killed two British diplomats.

Bydai N. Solovayev Stashinsky, 32, said he practiced firing the Russian-style sprays in a studio in his East Berlin apartment, using a hollow metal tube with a tracer-housing resembling the handle of a water faucet.

He described the murder weapon as a two-inch aluminum tube with a tracer-housing resembling the handle of a water faucet, and the device fired was sprayed through the nozzle.

Little splinters of the broken capsule were also shot through the air, Stashinsky said, but his superior told him the splinters were so small they would probably be overlooked on an examination of the victim's body.

LONDON, Oct. 9.—A 25-year-old minister's son accused of leaking secret British naval information to Russia was ordered held for trial as a spy today in Old Bailey criminal court.

William C. Vassall was ordered to trial after a hearing in which it was testified the accused man had confessed spying for Russia from 1956 until this year, in both Moscow and London.

Photographs of naval documents turned over to the Soviets by Vassall, the court was told, were of a nature whose disclosure would gravely damage the security of the state.

A confession allegedly was made by Vassall, after his arrest, Oct. 12.

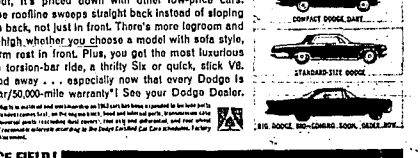

News Around Idaho

BOISE, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—U. S. District Judge Chase A. Clark has said he will be honored as "the greatest of all time" at a ceremony at Eastern college, from which his father was the first graduate. Clark said his father, the late Joseph A. Clark, received his diploma from Eastern in 1885. He came to Idaho to work on the irrigation project in the Snake River Valley. He was the first mayor of Idaho Falls, being elected in 1902, and was a candidate for governor of Idaho on the prohibition ticket in 1904.

NAMPA, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—Republican congressional candidate Edwin H. Schweitzer told Northwest Nazarene college students Monday that financial aid programs are a threat to the foundations of freedom and personal responsibility.

BOISE, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—Speakers at the Idaho conference on social welfare emphasized Monday the importance of family life in modern civilization. "The family," said William Mowbray, Portland Ore., "determines the kind of community in which a man lives. The family," said Dr. Fred Chubb, Victoria, B. C., psychiatrist, "is the training ground for membership in the human race."

BOISE, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—Atty. Gen. Frank L. Benson said Monday he had been told of charges of "condoned promiscuity" at State Hospital North by several of his associates. Benson said, however, that he was unable to do anything about the charges. "Also," Benson said, "one of the employees at hospital north used to work at hospital south in Blackfoot and made similar charges about that institution."

GRANVILLE, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—An Idaho hunter, aiming for five eagles a rugged, snow-covered area of the Nez Percé national forest, walked out to a ranger station in Montana Monday. Larry Widmar, 37 miles east, appeared in fairly good condition, despite the fact that he showed up at the Ranger station along the Idaho-Oregon border. Crowley addressed the students at the Lewiston convention at Lewiston high school, and said, "The gambling question has so clouded the political picture that the basic issues of the state government have become obscured."

LEWISTON, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—Paving of the Idaho portion of the roadway of the Lewis and Clark highway is completed. A Neil Lewiston Crowley addressed the students at the Lewiston convention of a few approaches and cleanup work along the 38.6 miles of newly paved highway remains, he said. He estimated this work will take about two weeks. After an official inspection will be made by the federal bureau of public roads and Idaho highway officials.

BOISE, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—The president of the Idaho AFL-CIO said of Vernon K. Smith Monday "this man is lying when he said that representatives of organized labor made any demands on him." The state labor organization has endorsed Smith's opponent, Gov. Robert E. Smylie. Darrell H. Norman said Smith "was asked the same question concerning his position on so-called right-to-work legislation and the labor importance to workers that all of the other candidates of both parties were asked."

BOISE, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—Appointment of Harold Whitaker of Council as a member of the Idaho hospital advisory council has been announced by Gov. Robert E. Smylie. He succeeds Mrs. Helen Hines of Boise, who resigned after leaving the state board. The advisory council makes recommendations to the state board of health on needed hospital construction.

BOISE, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—Vernon K. Smith said Monday Gov. Robert E. Smylie has spent a great deal of the last eight years "running around the nation and the world thinking he's some kind of big time politician," he said. He said he has criticized him for going out among the people to shake hands. "I simply don't believe in accepting pay to do a job for silent and then run off from representing that client to shake hands and campaign for governor."

BOISE, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie has told the Idaho conference on social welfare that his administration is "ready to examine carefully and completely any problems" in the state's welfare program. He described the program as "a militant, miserable and desperate attempt to play politics with human welfare" and the disclosure at a hearing conducted by his Democratic opponent for governor, Vernon K. Smith, of alleged incidents of misconduct at Idaho State Hospital North. State health authorities have termed the accusations untrue.

BOISE, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—Discussions with park officials of other states convinced him that Idaho should make every effort to retain potential recreational areas in state control, State Land Commissioner O. J. Boston has said. Boston returned to his desk after attending a national conference of state officials concerned with parks at Zion, Ill. "When I told them of the vast areas in Idaho controlled under state control, representatives of other states were amazed," Boston said. "Their reaction convinced me that we are on the right track in seeking to prevent any further disposal of state land which may be developed as state parks."

IDAHO FALLS, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—Bartenders have looted the register of 12,242.18 and 23 bottles of liquor, according to Idaho Falls police. Robert O. Newman and his wife, Bonnie, owners of the bar-club, entered the establishment and found the safe broken. They told police they had come to the cafe to start morning coffee.

IDAHO FALLS, Oct. 9 (U.P.)—Rep. Ralph Harding, D. Ida., has returned to Idaho and said he planned to visit all 23 counties in the second congressional district between now and election. Harding said he would be returning to a second term. He will go back to Washington "at a moment's notice should it be necessary." But he said "only conference reports still remain to be brought before the house" and he said he believed he would not be needed.

LONDON, Oct. 9 (AP)—A coroner's jury held today that Dr. Josef A. Soblen committed suicide by poisoning a sleeping woman hidden in a secret pocket of his trousers.

The fugitive collapsed Sept. 6 in a Washington hotel and was flown to a hospital in London. He died five days later without regaining consciousness.

ILA Leaders Ask Boycott of "Traders"

NEW YORK, Oct. 9 (AP)—International Longshoremen's association officials today called for a total boycott of vessels servicing Cuba and the Soviet Union.

The ILA leaders yesterday called on their 60,000 members in the East Coast and Gulf ports to refuse to handle cargo for all vessels of any shipping line that does business with Cuba or the Soviet Union.

The longshoremen went a step further than the government by including the Soviet Union in the boycott of ships that serve Cuba.

The real conflict of the Cuban situation is Russia, and yet we still trade with her, three ILA officials said in a statement. They were President William W. Bradley, Executive Vice President Thomas W. Gleason and Secretary-Treasurer Harry Haskins.

The officials' recommendation will be submitted for approval to the union's 25-member executive council after which a mail vote of rank-and-file members will be taken.

Officials said the rioting reportedly began after butter and meat prices were raised on June 1.

Germany Asks Good Dealing With Russia

BONN, Germany, Oct. 9 (AP)—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer said today West Germany is making efforts to improve relations with the Soviet Union.

The chancellor, 86, said these efforts can succeed only if the Soviet Union changes its policy so that mutual problems can be resolved peacefully. He said this would have to mean an improvement in conditions in communist East Germany.

Adenauer said delivering the government's annual statement of policy at the opening of the fall session of the Bundestag, the lower house of parliament.

"I affirm that our government is ready to discuss many things with the Soviet Union if our brothers in the zone (East Germany) can arrange their lives as they please," he said.

CARACAS, Venezuela, Oct. 9 (AP)—Police held 150 suspected terrorists today in a roundup of communists and fellow travelers blamed for a new wave of violence.

The interior ministry said 18 others were being hunted for an attack on the military transport center in Caracas Sunday night. Two persons were killed and eight others wounded in a gun battle between police and snipers near the center.

President Romulo Betancourt suspended constitutional guarantees Monday in an effort to crush what he believed is a leftist terrorist attempt to topple his government. Under the suspension, it is possible to make arrests without warrants, jail suspects without charge and impose censorship.

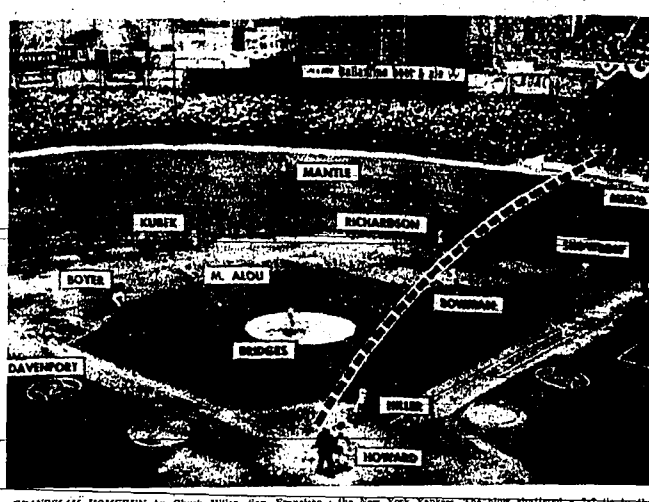

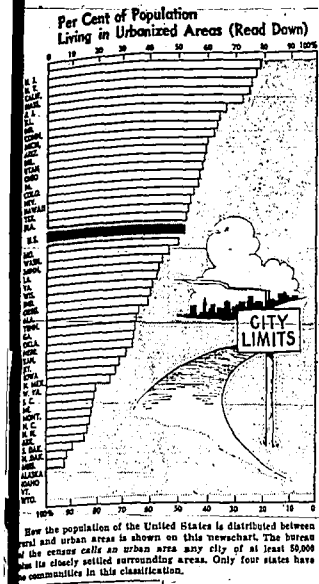

State Bar Sees Amendment Change as Boon to Courts

BOISE, Oct. 9 (U-P)—Idahoans will vote Nov. 6 on a proposed constitutional amendment that would give the legislature authority to make sweeping changes in the structure of the state's lower courts.

Under the constitution the jurisdiction and administration of probate and justice of the peace courts are rigidly spelled out.

The amendment would make it possible for the legislature to change their operation, or even eliminate them and substitute other courts.

The amendment itself would make no change, but would authorize the legislators to do so.

"We want to make it possible to improve the quality of justice in the lower courts," says Ada county Probate Judge W. E. Smith. "Many of the lower courts operate on a part-time basis for only a few months of the year."

Another provision of the amendments would put supervisors in charge of criminal misdemeanor cases—those involving penalties of up to six months in the county jail, civil cases up to \$500, juvenile delinquency, adoption, guardianship and probate of estates. Justice of the peace courts have the same criminal jurisdiction and handle civil cases up to \$300.

"If we had a county court," says Smith, "we could increase jurisdiction maybe to \$1,000 or higher and at the same time raise the standards of those so-called inferior courts."

Many of the lower courts operate on a part-time basis for only a few months of the year, he says. Some of the lower courts are the most important in the whole court system, because more people come into contact with them," reports Smith. "We feel the quality of justice is not as good as it should be."

He says district bar associations are studying a proposal to substitute a single county court for the justice and probate courts.

The probate court now is responsible for criminal misdemeanor cases—those involving penalties of up to six months in the county jail, civil cases up to \$500, juvenile delinquency, adoption, guardianship and probate of estates. Justice of the peace courts have the same criminal jurisdiction and handle civil cases up to \$300.

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Smith says the amendment would make possible a law putting all family relations and juvenile delinquency cases under one court—either an improved county court or the district court.

Either would have higher stature than the present probate court.

Thomas A. Miller, Boise secretary of the Idaho state bar, says one complaint against justices of the peace courts is their informality.

A county court with a courtroom and jury box would provide a more dignified atmosphere.

Miller says changes would have to take into consideration the varying needs of Idaho counties which differ considerably in population and in area.

But he says the present grand jury system has reduced the need for wide dispersal of courts.

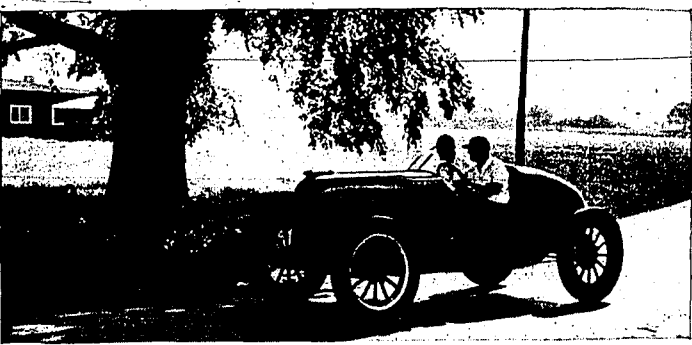

All contestants had to use the same gasoline anybody could buy at a Shell station. Beyond that, the Marathon had few rules. And ingenuity ran wild.

How the record was set

Here are some of the things that Dave Berry and Fred Schuetze, the winning team, did to set their record.

- None are recommended for informal marathons. But they do offer a few clues on how to get more miles per gallon.
- Berry and Schuetze removed their engine cooling fan to save power and muffled their radiator to retain heat.
- They used tires worn smooth and pumped up to 50 psi pressure to cut rolling friction to a minimum.
- On the road, they accelerated to 20 miles per hour, cut the ignition and rolled until speed dropped to 5 miles per hour. Then they repeated the cycle.
- They used a standard carburetor

Since "on-and-off" driving is illegal on public roads—and since most Marathon modifications are dangerous for normal use—you may wonder if Shell's Mileage Marathon had any point.

Indeed it did. In the months of preparations, every contestant learned a bit more about the care and feeding of automobiles. Knowledge of this sort gets passed along to you in the form of better Shell products for your car.

First: extra mileage.

To help boost mileage even more, follow these driving tips from Berry and Schuetze.

How you can save gasoline

- Don't race your engine when standing still. Unnecessary engine speed is pure waste and takes you nowhere.
- Avoid jackrabbit starts. Fast getaways waste gasoline and power.
- Drive at moderate speeds. Your car uses about 25 percent more gasoline at 65 mph than at 45 mph.
- Keep an even speed. Ragged driving uses extra fuel—without taking full advantage of the power it can generate.
- Pace yourself in traffic. Don't be the fastest or the slowest. You'll just be trapped into wasteful spurts and slowdowns.
- Keep tires up to their proper pressure. Soft tires can soak up power.
- Ask your Shell dealer about these checks: Spark timing should be set correctly. Fuel filters and air cleaner should be cleaned regularly. Brakes should be properly adjusted. And your cooling system thermostat must work right.
- Motorists who follow these rules, and use Super Shell, can expect good mileage. Chances are, you can improve the mileage you're now getting. Now that you know how, why not give it a try?
