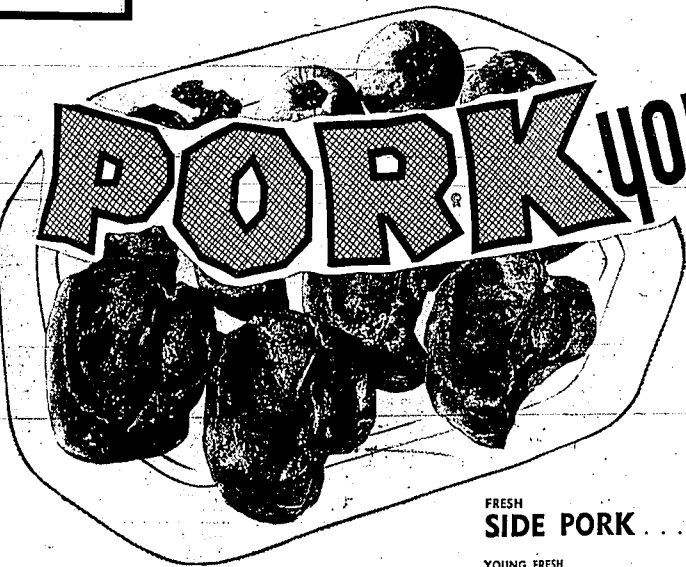

News Around Idaho

POCATELLO, Oct. 11 (AP)—Selection of a jury has started in U.S. district court for the trial of a Pocatello man facing five criminal charges. Earl Hiddell Ellis, 42, Pocatello, is charged with four counts of interstate transportation of forged money orders and faces a fifth count of conspiring to commit the crimes. The trial was held before U.S. District Judge Fred M. Taylor.

"A series of approach tests is planned," the AEC said, "with one becoming a full-scale test with a reactor core which is expected to destroy a major part of the reactor core. This stepwise increase in energy release and core damage will give scientists an opportunity to obtain useful data for controlling the final test when a large segment of the core will be destroyed."

Moisture Is Aid to Crop Prospects

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11 (AP)—The agriculture department reported Wednesday that moisture in September helped to raise 1962 crop prospects nearly one per cent over the volume indicated a month ago.

The department's October report estimated the total crop volume at 105 per cent of the 1951-59 average, compared with 104 per cent forecast in September. This compares with 106 per cent last year and a record, 108 per cent harvest in 1961.

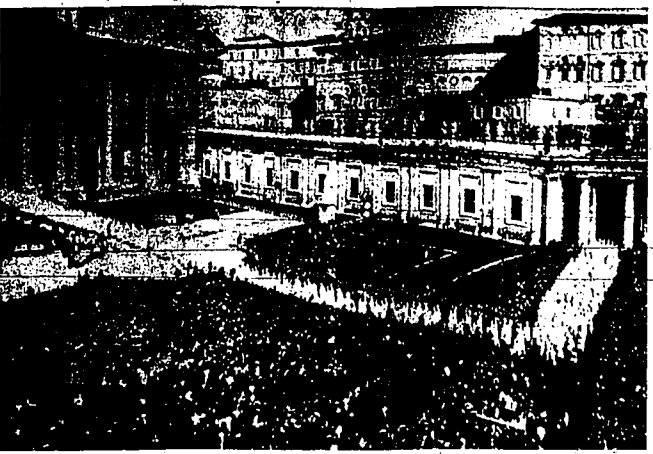

New Tax Bill May Be Peace Sign to M.D.'s

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11—President Kennedy's action in sending a bill to Congress will be widely interpreted today as a peace gesture to the doctors who opposed his program of health care for the elderly.

Kennedy has been depicted as reluctant to let the measure become law. It permits self-employed doctors, such as dentists and lawyers to set up tax-deferred plans for themselves and their families.

The fact that the President wants to pass the bill is "unmistakable" by his action in signing it. The usual White House statement and ceremonies which accompany such actions were conspicuously missing.

Kennedy has been represented as being angry at the doctors who joined in the campaign that ended in an ardent defeat of his proposal to finance health care for those over 65 through social security law.

Gem State Faces Yes-No On Mongolian Amendment

BOISE, Oct. 11.—Idahoans will have an opportunity in November to sweep from their constitution a restriction that gives the state a unique distinction. Idaho is the only state that prohibits any naturalized citizens from enjoying basic American rights guaranteed by the constitution to all citizens.

Several hundred citizens who have lived and worked in Idaho for 30 years or more are today prohibited from voting, holding civil office or serving as jurors.

The provision was written into the state constitution by its framers in 1889. Specifically it applies to "Chinese and persons of Mongolian descent."

On the general election ballot Nov. 6 will be a proposed constitutional amendment that would eliminate the restriction. It is a carryover from early territorial days when Chinese and Mongolian mining camps were subject to bad feeling and abuse.

At that time people of Mongolian descent were not permitted to become naturalized citizens of the United States, but Congress changed the law in 1952 and since then such persons could become citizens.

After 1952 Idahoans of Mongolian descent born in their native countries applied for and won citizenship under the new federal law. They also voted in state elections, unaware of the constitutional provision.

But in 1960 an Associated Press newsmen—thumbing through the Idaho constitution, noticed the provision and wrote a story about it. It was national attention because Idaho is the only state with such discrimination.

As a result the 1961 legislature unanimously voted to give voters the opportunity to remove it in this year's election.

"We thought all the discrimination laws had been revoked in Idaho until we saw this news-story in 1960," says George S. Sayles, a member of the Japanese American citizens league.

Sayles says another discriminatory law removed while they are still living.

Sayles estimates that from 600 to 700 naturalized Japanese, Chinese and others are affected by the constitutional provision. They include many Japanese and Korean war brides, Korean orphans who have found foster homes in Idaho would also be denied their rights if the amendment is not repealed.

Sayles says that to his knowledge since 1952 no one has been prohibited from voting because of the constitutional provision "for the simple reason that most of the election registrars didn't know about it."

But he says many of the electors don't plan to vote this year because they don't want to violate the law. Election registrars are instructed not to register persons barred from voting by the constitution, and judges

are instructed not to count their votes.

Secretary of State Arnold Williams, who says he urges all Idahoans to support the amendment, says he understands no legal authority to violate the state constitution.

Election officials to violate the state constitution. Legal authorities believe the constitution provision has no effect on the federal constitution, but state officials have no authority to treat it as invalid in what a court decision to that effect.

The 14th amendment to the United States constitution prohibits any state from making or enforcing a law that infringes on the rights of citizens. And all rights are guaranteed to naturalized as well as native-born citizens.

Sayles says the Japanese American citizens league fears that some people may not get the wrong impression when they read the amendment on the ballot. It does not refer to naturalized citizens.

Fruit, Meat Lead Week's "Good Buys"

The Associated Press says the usual number of good buys will prevail at most food store counters this week, but perhaps the most prominent will be three:

At fruit counters—apples. Meat counters—beef and broiler chickens. Dairy counters—a wide variety of cheeses.

Vegetable counters—depending on the region, avocados, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, celery, lettuce, arceus, onions, peppers, potatoes, squash and sweet potatoes.

A crop of 125 million bushels of apples is in prospect, some 3 per cent below 1961 but 11 per cent above average, the U. S. department of agriculture reports.

Cheese will be abundant because of the one per cent higher milk flow so far this year—the highest, on record, October also is Cheese Festival Month.

Broiler chickens may be a few cents a pound higher than a year ago because of a slightly below record-level this year. However, the supply is considerably above average.

Agriculture department reports show good supplies of beef, ranging from stew meat to steaks and roasts. Fresh pork cuts such as chops or loin roasts also will be at palatable prices this week.
