IDAHO FALLS, Oct. 15 (AP)—U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk has said the Kennedy administration has not been realistic in its domestic or foreign policy for political purposes, but fails to understand the "peace and security of the world are at stake."

### Yemen King's Escape Plan Is Reported

CAIRO, Oct. 15 (AP)—Deposed Imam Muhammad of Yemen escaped from the ruins of the palace—said in a month-long escape plan with a palace guard and is currently hiding with a nomadic tribe, the semi-official Middle East news agency said today.

The report government which seized the palace and overthrew the monarchy last month claimed the Imam was killed in the shooting. But rumors have circulated ever since that he was alive.

The MENA report was the first indication that the United Arab Republic, which supports the rebel regime, believes Muhammad is alive.

MENA said a report to the Cairo newspaper Al-Ahram said that Muhammad "has sought refuge with one of the tribes and he is now living in a mountain dwelling near the village of Al-Mahabadi."

Because Muhammad changed uniforms with one of his guards, it was first thought his body had been found in the debris of the palace, but actually it was the guard who was killed," MENA said.

### 32 Cars Derailed In Cajon Pass

DARTMOUTH, Calif., Oct. 14 (AP)—Thirty-two freight cars of a Southern Pacific train were derailed today in the Cajon pass of the San Bernardino mountains in California desert town.

### Experts Say Deficit Will Leap Upward

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15 (AP)—Congressional fiscal experts, in session and budget survey, have predicted the government will run up an \$11 billion dollar deficit in the present fiscal year rather than the half-billion dollar surplus forecast by President Kennedy in January.

They estimate actual expenditures, under programs authorized by congress, will total \$4 billion dollars, rather than \$2.5 billion dollars predicted by the President in his January budget message. They expect the treasury's receipts will be about \$5.5 billion dollars instead of the \$3 billion dollars anticipated by the President.

The survey, covering the fiscal year which began on July 1, was prepared by the professional staff of the Congressional Budget Office. In predicting expenditures, staff experts had help of the President's budget bureau. They estimated receipts, they consulted experts for the senate-house committee on internal revenue taxation.

The \$4 billion dollar deficit estimate is based on the Kennedy budget proposals as they have been modified by subsequent action of the adjourning congress. Rejected programs have been eliminated and cost estimates for new programs have been added on that basis. Spending is estimated at 15 billion dollars above President Kennedy's January proposal.

The drop of about 7.1 billion dollars in the President's estimate receipts stems in large part from the sluggish performance of the economy in recent months. In January, the President said his \$3 billion dollar deficit estimate was based on a continuing recovery that would push the gross national product to a record \$70 billion dollars annually.

### Rocket-Firing Helicopters Now Used in Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam, Oct. 15 (AP)—Rocket-firing U.S. army helicopters were used for the first time as an offensive weapon against communist guerrillas during the week-end, an informed source said today.

Three of the turbine-powered machines were seen carrying out a blistering strike Sunday against a Viet Cong stronghold 55 miles northwest of Saigon.

The copier carries 16 rockets and several machineguns—more firepower than any World War II fighter plane.

The role of the new craft is primarily to escort the lightly armed troop-carrying helicopters and to soften up objective areas with heavy firepower.

### Gemini Shots Will Depend Upon Pilots

HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 15 (AP)—Manual control will be used more extensively in the Gemini space flight period because Project Mercury has shown pilots can fly in space.

The manned spacecraft center here disclosed in a fact sheet that the two Gemini crewmen will be in almost full control from takeoff to landing, with only slight assistance from automatic devices.

The Gemini mission is expected to close the gap between the present Project Mercury project and the Apollo program, which is designed to put two men on the moon.

"Very few of the Gemini systems will be entirely automatic," the report said. "There will be more dependence upon man than in the Mercury flights."

The Mercury system depends heavily on ground computers.

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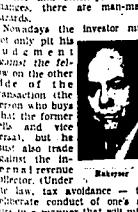

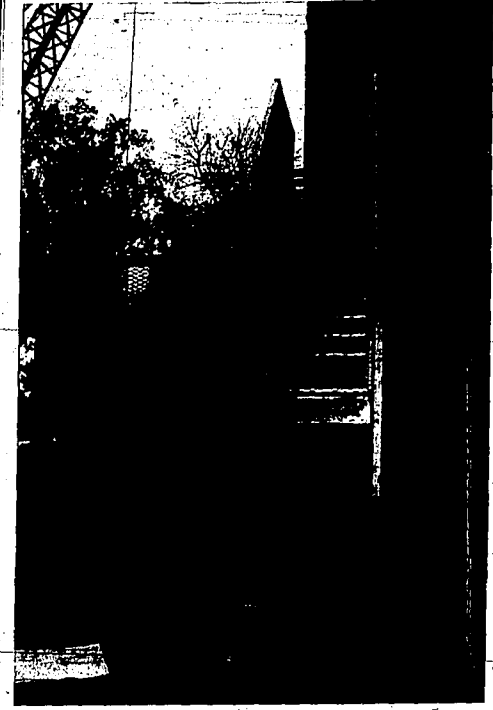

### Rupert Fire Volunteers Are Honored

RUPERT, Oct. 15—Fourteen members of Rupert's volunteer fire department were special luncheon guests of the Rupert Chamber of Commerce Thursday at Ours and Margie's cafe.

William "Bill" Cowell, fire chief, introduced the members of his department, and recounted a brief history, dating back to May 23, 1916, when the first meeting of the department was held.

Cowell outlined the growth of the department from a single hose cart to its present strength of two trucks and an emergency ambulance.

"Rupert's volunteer department ranks among the best in the state," Cowell said, "and this community can be proud of it."

He expressed appreciation for the cooperation given the department by the mayor and city council, and related several humorous occurrences that happened during the year he has served with the department.

Richard Beeson, secretary for the department, spoke briefly, stressing the need for fire prevention through such measures as regular fire inspection and thorough teaching members of the family and baby alters the proper things to do in the event of a fire.

He pointed out that more than half of the 11,700 persons killed by fire last year in the United States were children. A short time spent in checking for safety can prevent tragedy, he said.

# Glee, Tragedy Hit in California Sports Car Race

## RIVERSIDE, Calif., Oct. 15 (AP)—

Triumph and tragedy, frequent companions in auto racing, were united again yesterday in the 200-mile grand prix for sports cars. The triumph belonged to Roger Penske, a nightly Philadelphia who won the 77-lap event before a crowd of 76,400 at Riverside raceway.

The tragedy struck Paul J. Piretti, Jr., son of a millionaire and stepson of director John A. McCone of the U. S. central intelligence agency. Piretti's Lotus 23 spun out on the 6th lap and slammed into a motorist's car. He died three hours later.

Piretti, 31, was the first driver to lose his life in the 157-year history of this race. The 23-year-old Piretti drove a specially built Alfa Romeo with a Coventry Climax motor. He led in 56 of the 77 laps. The victory brought him \$250,000, plus new car.

He said he never did open up his motor all the way. "This car can go 4,000 revolutions per minute," he said, "I don't go past 6,000 because I was afraid I might tear it up. The engine and car were new."

Nevertheless, he averaged 55.5 miles per hour, faster in the middle of the race. Jim Hall, an oilman of Midland, Tex., finished second overall in a Chapparral. Masten Gregory, formerly of Kansas City and now of Paris, was third in a Lotus 19 Climax. Bruce McLaren, a New Zealand racing star of England, was fourth in a Cooper Monaco Climax.

Fifteen of the 33 starters failed to finish. Dan Gurney of Costa Mesa, Calif., driving a Lotus, was the only American to finish. He was 25th place at the start to finish on the 30th lap. But he was out after the 60th lap by broken throttle linkage.

Mechanical troubles also forced out several drivers. This year's winner, Joakim Bonnier of Switzerland, and Graham Hill of England, finished 21st and 22nd, respectively. Hill had engine trouble. Hill had engine trouble and went out after the 15th lap.
