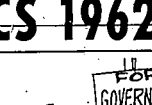

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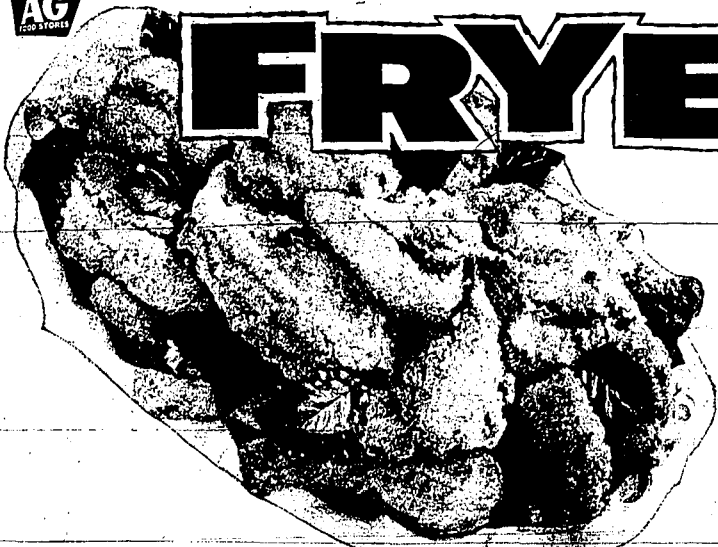

Gov. Robert Smylie devoted his speech Wednesday evening at the Twin Falls Junior Chamber of Commerce to a report on the progress being made by the two main state-supported higher education institutions in the state. "Idaho's record in higher education since 1946 has been outstanding," Smylie told the J.C. Chamber and advised that this field far outstripped other fields of Idaho's governmental endeavor.

"We have capacity now for nearly three times as many college students as we did in 1946. At the university we have built, or are building, 29.2 million dollars worth of buildings since 1949. Increased appropriations have made it possible to stabilize those excellent facilities and reward excellence in teaching ability." The governor said similar actions had been made at Idaho State college. "In 1948 this notably excellent institution was a two-year institution of the university. It now is a full four-year, degree-granting college, authorized and accredited to confer master's degrees, and the people have invested \$6 million dollars in buildings on that campus since 1947. It is the fastest growing institution of its kind in the state."

Smylie predicted that the survey of the state's higher education which he authorized by the legislature at his request would eliminate some "self-defeating aspects of the past. Which were borne of heavy, nearly unhealthy paralyzes."

The governor concluded his talk by explaining that a careful, long-range program with a minimum of duplication in some fields would result in "wide horizons of accomplishment in higher education."

Catholic Vote At Council Is Seen as Test

VATICAN CITY, Oct. 18 (UP)—Diverted forces in the Roman Catholic Ecumenical council were engaged Wednesday in an indirect struggle for ascendancy. It was a subtle affair couched in careful words and parliamentary protocol. But it was plainly an undercurrent here at this grand-scale gathering of the church's religious episcopate.

The text centered momentarily, and in part, on the outcome of an election of 10 key commissions. It also loomed as a decisive factor in the whole course of the council.

Leaders of the cautiously traditionalist view want to keep authority closely centralized in the Vatican curia. The progressives favor more local autonomy for bishops.

The differences also had other wide implications. Centrally, the progressives also seek a broader interpretation of the church's nature, extensive decentralization in its practices, a bigger role for laymen and a more open approach to other Christian bodies.

The decisive vote on the second ballot was 73 to 35—more than the required two-thirds majority. Morocco was elected to succeed the United States in the African commission.

Not difficulty was encountered in the election of Norway, Brazil, the Philippines and other non-member members of the 11-nation council. The U. N.'s highest political organ. All were by secret ballot.

Norway was chosen to succeed Ireland, and Brazil to succeed Chile for two-year terms. The Philippines was elected for a one-year term to succeed Romania under an agreement reached last year to split the normal two-year term. Nigeria was able to muster the required two-thirds majority in the balloting last December.

Permanent seats on the council are held by the United States, Brazil, France, the Soviet Union and Nationalist China. Under terms of the gentlemen's agreement reached in London last December, the Philippines and other non-member states were elected to Latin America, Western Europe, the Middle East and the British Commonwealth.

Rebel Elements Prepare to Fight Castro, Red Helpers

BY WILLIAM L. RYAN
SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico, Oct. 18—Rebel elements in the Cuban mountains are left with little time and what little they have is being used to prepare for the final assault on the island and the overthrow of the Castro regime, Cuban radio sources here declared.

But these sources add that they believe the resistance will be successful because of Cuba's ill-equipped army and the lack of support from communists, it is believed by U. S. officials, who are being helped by the Cuban government.

Mass meetings of "defense committees" are being held all over Cuba. The committees are part of a communist-style, block-by-block system.

Cuba's economic troubles under the communist have tended to increase the determination to overthrow the regime, according to available information. The militia gets little ammunition, and their arms and bullets are taken from them at the end of each day of duty.
