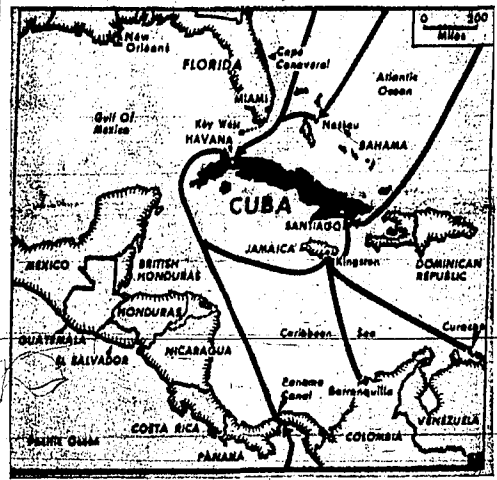

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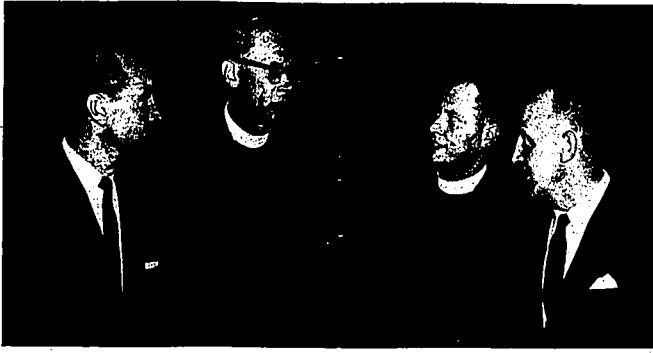

Close to Tragedy

Most Americans are likely to laud President Kennedy's shipping "quarantine" action against Cuba as long overdue. Yet the move is not designed to eliminate tensions. The Cuban crisis appears to be the closest thing to war since the police action of a decade ago in Korea.

Many Americans have clamored for some sort of move against Cuba. The insults and taunting from Fidel Castro and his cohorts have been almost unbearable at times. Then the U. S. has been charged with some sort of responsibility because of the Bay of Pigs invasion.

Perhaps caution has been the preferred course for at least two big reasons, the danger of precipitating immediate war and the ever-present possibility of alienating Latin-American nations. And still many more had been reasons for the problem.

Exactly six weeks before President Kennedy's talk on Monday, the Times-News commented on the situation in Cuba. On Monday, Sept. 10, the Times-News said: "However, one report in particular is open to question—The Cuban underground reports guided missile bases are being constructed to handle missiles with ranges up to 400 miles.

Remember, those words were written six weeks ago on the basis of news reports available to any newspaper reader. Certainly if the news could be so interpreted, then the administration with the availability of complete intelligence reports should have been well aware of the Cuban situation long before Monday of this week.

All of which serves to raise a question about the delay in another six weeks. It's possible, of course, that complete intelligence reports six weeks ago did not bear out the danger reflected in news stories. It's even possible that intelligence concerning Cuba has been right and wrong, but will be wrong. It wouldn't be the first time.

Finally, it's inescapable that the Cuban situation will have political overtones. Cuba has been mentioned repeatedly in the present U. S. election campaigns. Without suggesting any possible course of action, the Republican Party has chosen the administration for doing nothing. President Kennedy's move Monday will serve to alienate many of the voters, even if it wasn't designed to have that effect.

The political possibilities are tremendous. Coming as it did only two weeks before elections across the nation, the U. S. action has created the sort of situation that leads politicians to implore voters. "Don't change horses in the middle of the stream." Even if the thought isn't actually put to words, it's there nevertheless.

What happens in the next two weeks—militarily, economically, diplomatically, politically—leads away from the U. S. not likely to back away from its position in the hemisphere toehold in Cuba. It's hard to see how the U. S. could call off the shipping quarantine. If in the past record is anything, there's not likely to be anything much to be done by the United Nations, at least not for some time.

NATIONAL WERLIGIG

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23—Late and fairly objective canvases today indicate that the Republican ticket will be the one of the great industrial and politically influential states in the country.

Other less important states are also being canvassed. The Republican ticket is being pushed in Colorado, Michigan and Ohio. Except for the Empire state, all of the important states are already Democratic.

DEBIE FOR CHANGE—In addition to conditions generally favorable to the opposition in an off-year as well as an attractive candidate, new faces in many places, the national political trends favor them.

FEW REACTIONARIES—Most of the Republican ticket is made up of successful predecessors. Notably Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller in New York, Rep. William Scranton in Pennsylvania, and Sen. George Aiken in Maine.

FOOLHARDY—Perhaps from the beginning of time, cooks have been using recipes that specify a "pinch" of something or a "few drops" of something else. It's the same old story.

JFK'S UNUSUAL ACTIVITY—President Kennedy has campaigned more intensively and extensively than is customary with White House occupancy. He has been seen in many places on the road.

NEW YORK'S INFLUENCE—Thus, the only application flicks on the size of the governor's preference because that may make best his advice quest for the 1964 presidential nomination.

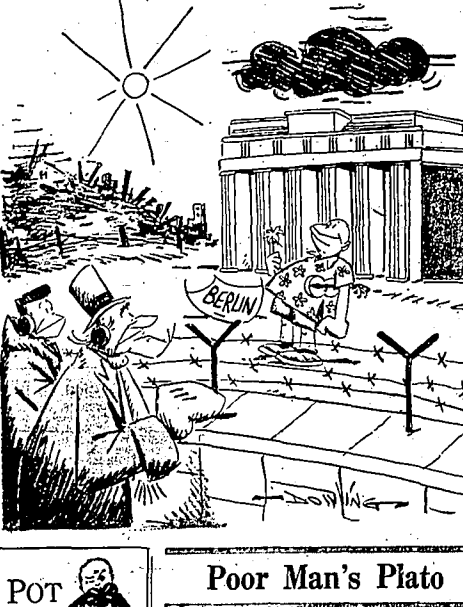

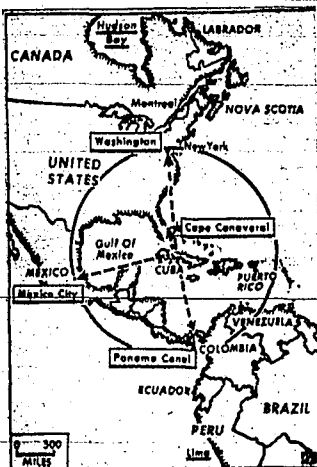

Families of Servicemen Flown Away

NORFOLK, Va., Oct. 23 (AP)—Hundreds of wives and children were swiftly uprooted amid cries as the Guantanamo naval base in Cuba and flown to Norfolk last night.

Five marine corps turbo-jet transports brought 321 evacuees into this Atlantic fleet headquar-

ters. Some were civil service employees.

The dependents, still clad in light summer clothes and carrying heavy suitcases, were taken in buses to the Little Creek amphibious base where they were housed in a three-story barracks.

Sailors were called in for such chores as rocking babies and mixing formulas. One store sent in a number of playpens which were covered into cribs.

Civilians, military personnel and Red Cross workers worked to make comfortable the evacuees, bewildered by the suddenness of their departure and shivering in

the 51-degree temperature. Altogether, the navy was to evacuate more than 2,000 dependents from Guantanamo.
