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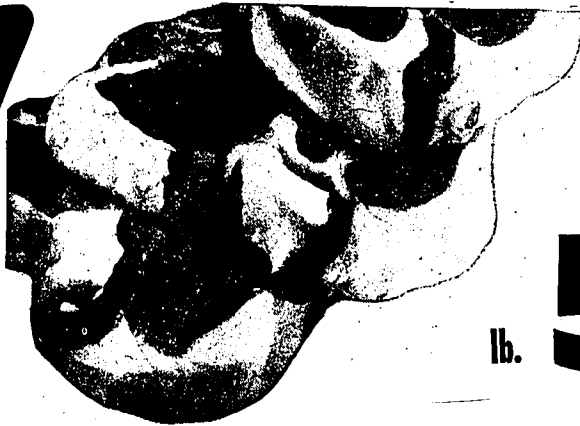

NATIONAL WHIRLWIG

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The question of whether President Kennedy is "anti-business" has now shifted to the query as to whether he is anti-labor.

Many recognized spokesmen for laborers insist that there is no foundation for alleging them against the business community.

It is true, of course, as the President humorously noted in a recent address to Congress, that industrialists, businessmen and financiers sleep more soundly during a moderate recession.

Nevertheless, the fact remains that many eminent representatives of the viewpoint of the President's upset or disaffair with the President's representation so far.

Like TRADE EXPANSION ACT—With hardly an exception, they have halted the trade expansion act as a steamship accomplishment, and they are attacking it as a failure.

In fact, it was their strong support of this proposal which won the voice of Republican inaction in Capitol Hill.

In the belief that improving conditions in the backwoods countries will also create a greater demand for American goods, they have asked the administration's request for generous foreign aid appropriations.

They are not completely satisfied with the 1962 revenue act. They praise the President's plan to ask for a thorough overhaul of the tax structure.

Other favorable actions were acceleration of the rate of depreciation and the 1962 farm bill. The agricultural reform would mean more money in exporters' pockets.

FRASE FROM THE CITADEL—JFK once referred to the Chamber of Commerce in the United States as "that citadel of privilege," and he was so infuriated at its opposition that he refused to address it in the White House.

"The White House dilemma following the steel pact was to either give a concession to the industry. In deciding to press for tax reform and reductions next year, he expressed a proper understanding of the situation.

"Since then, other administration spokesmen have voiced their determination to create a 'profit climate'... I think then that we may discuss any other subject."

CHEERS FOR FREE MARKET—A similar sentiment was expressed in a recent Dallas speech by Dr. Charles E. Walker, executive vice president of the American Chamber of Commerce.

"I am not a member of the administration's economic advisory committee," said the President's understanding of the function of a market economy and his comprehension of the role of the free market in the economy.

"I draw your attention to the following statement by the President: 'The free market is not only more efficient decision maker than even the best of us...'

Finally, businessmen feel that they have more freedom in a Democratic cabinet than ever before. They are confident that the new administration will support their interests.

SHOSHONE, Oct. 25—C. W. Glasby, who has been district engineer for the Idaho highway department for the past five years, will open an engineering consulting business in Twin Falls. He plans to reside at 925 Shoshone street north and will leave the department Nov. 19.

Glasby says that there are only a few engineers that reside in Magic Valley and offer their services primarily to the area. He has had experience in several of the phases of civil engineering. He holds a bachelor of science degree from the University of Idaho and is registered as a professional engineer in Idaho.

He has been trained in highway organization, financing, planning, maintenance, and traffic studies; also to design and prepare plans for road bridges, to supervise construction and perform the necessary surveying. His experience has included work with water works, sewage disposal and street construction, towers and chimneys.

Qualification as a land surveyor and subdivider has been reported as a part of his training as well as work with irrigation systems and dams.

For more than 25 years Glasby has been associated with the civil engineering and construction business. In 1907, after graduating from high school in Vevier, with the surveying and engineering department of the Polish forests, Inc., in northern Idaho.

From there he went into the mining field, thence to heavy highway and bridge construction with contractors.

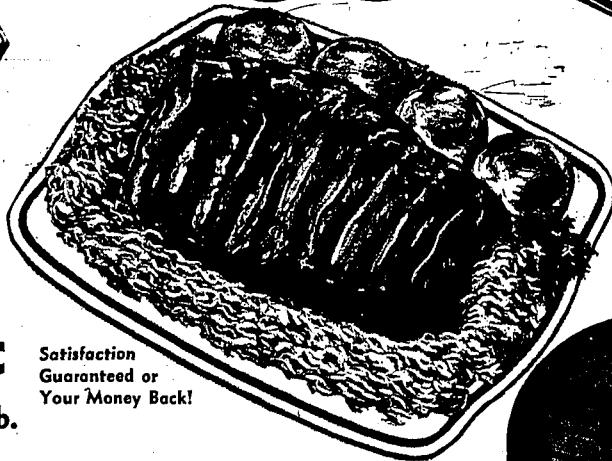

No matter how much the world changes, we all continue to relish the fragrance of breads baking in the oven. It seems to reassure us that the world is still normally mad.

For breakfast, this recipe for cinnamon sugar bread will surely start the day right.

**Cinnamon Sugar Bread (Makes 2 loaves)**

1 1/2 cup milk

1/2 cup sugar

1 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 cup (2 sticks) margarine

1/2 cup warm water

2 packages or cakes yeast, active dry or compressed

3 egg yolks, well beaten

1/2 cup unsifted flour

1/2 cup sugar

2 teaspoons cinnamon

1/2 cup margarine, melted

Social milk, \* stir in sugar, salt and margarine. Cool to lukewarm. Measure warm water into large warm bowl. Sprinkle or crumble yeast into warm water; stir until dissolved. Add lukewarm milk mixture and beaten egg yolks; stir to blend. Add flour; beat until well blended. Cover lightly with aluminum foil. Refrigerate at least four hours overnight.

\*Combine sugar and cinnamon until well blended. Divide dough in half. Divide each half into 3 pieces. Roll each piece into an 18-inch strand. Braid 3 pieces together; seal ends well. Place on greased baking sheet. Brush with melted margarine and sprinkle with cinnamon sugar mixture. Repeat with remaining three pieces of dough.

Cover; let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about one hour. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) about 25 minutes.

The season will run from Oct. 27 to Nov. 25 and the daily limit will be four roosters. From Nov. 19 to 25, the daily bag limit will be four pheasants, one of which may be a hen. Items will remain protected until those dates.

### FROM AN ANGLES

The steelhead run in the Salmon river was predicted to break records. And Magic Valley anglers are proving that prediction correct.

L. L. (Nick) Nicholson, Twin Falls, and a party of four catchers spent two days in the Salmon river and came back with 15 limit. Nicholson verified reports of a big run in every stream.

They're taking a lot of steelhead out of the river. "Most of the guides have been kept busy and they're all doing well."

Nicholson came out after two days with two 20-inch fish running 15 and 16 pounds. In the group with him were Dr. Roy Shaul, Bob Schaefer, both of Twin Falls; Dirk Buehler, Blackfoot, and Dr. Homer Clark, Salt Lake City. They were joined by guides Bob Smith, North Fork.

Generally speaking the steelhead are being taken on bright flies. The most popular one is described as a big red fly, about an inch and one-quarter long with a touch of cyan on the end.

"However, Nicholson had to use a renegade to land his first one. I have all day with the fish and everyone else was using and didn't get a bite. Before I left, he bought a new fly and I thought I'd ever seen it. It was red and looked like a girl of salmon eggs except that it was a renegade. I caught it hooked the 10-pounder."

The report on the steelhead caught the following morning, came on the upstream lure.

Chances with the steelhead fish game department prediction, that that group expects this year's spawning run to surpass last year's above-average run.

Through September the fish counting boards on three major rivers showed 100 per cent ahead of last year. The actual figures are 111, 178 and 102 against 100 for this year. That was at Bonneville dam. The count at McKinley showed a gain of 35 per cent from 109,743 to 141,100. The Joe Harbor dam figures showed 200 per cent ahead migrating into the headwaters of the Snake river—out into the Clearwater and Salmon rivers mostly.

Charles Blake, Jerome, district bird biologist for the Idaho Fish and game association, reports "the opening week-end for Magic Valley hunters will be better success for 1952 than for last year. Although the hatching season was late, remaining has been good and contributed significantly to the outlook."

"Conservation officers, after running wood count routes in all parts of the valley indicate we will have more young birds than in the past two years and this usually means more pheasants in the bag on opening week-end," he said.

Use of the successful areas of the past again should prove best for this fall. "This usually always follow the same pattern," Blake said. That means the Blunt area, North Shoshone and Gooding and western Blaine county probably will bear the brunt of the hunting pressure.

Breaking the year's for comparison to hunters, Blake said this season "won't approach" the banner year of 1950. He noted 1951 was a "bad" year with 60 better than 1950. He said indications were the availability of birds will be better than 1951, three years but how much more was left to guess.

Since pheasant hunting is almost exclusively done on private lands, hunters are urged to respect private property and request permission to trespass.

"It is the responsibility of every hunter to be sure his own conduct is beyond criticism—then do what he can to restrain his party," says department director John H. Woodworth.

Hunters are reminded they are required by law to stop at all checking stations. This practice is not designed to apprehend law breakers but to help the department in management of bird populations in various areas.

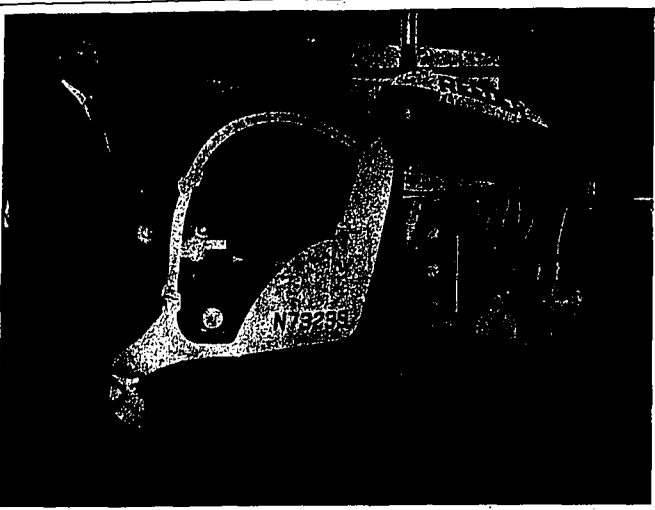

## Richardson Grab Made Difference Of \$120,859.44

NEW YORK, Oct. 25 (AP)—Bobby Richardson's grab of a sinking line drive by Willie McCovey has to rank among the most expensive catches in baseball history. It was worth \$120,859.44. That's the difference in the player pool shares split up by the winning New York Yankees and the losing San Francisco Giants from the 1962 world series. The figures were announced yesterday by Charles Segar, baseball secretary.

A full winning share for the Yankees amounted to \$9,827.44 and a full share for the losing Giants came to \$1,201.49, the latter a record. The Yankees value of 84 full shares and the Giants 23 full shares raised the total to \$120,859.44.

Richardson's grab of McCovey's liner ended the seventh game of the world series, won by the Yankees 1-0. The tying run was on third and the winning run on second.

"The Yankees' winning share is the third highest. The Los Angeles Dodgers got the most, \$11,231.18 for a full share. After their victory over Chicago in 1959, The New York Giants got \$11,147.40 each following their 1954 sweep of Cleveland."

The highest previous losing share was \$7,275.17 by the White Sox in 1959.

The players pool this year amounted to \$83,281.71. The Yankees received \$32,578.22 and the Giants \$91,718.25.

The Minnesota Twins and the Los Angeles Dodgers, runners-up in each league, got \$64,748.22 and the third place Los Angeles Angels and Cincinnati Reds \$43,164.25. The fourth place teams, Detroit and Pittsburgh, pick up \$21,582.04.

The breakdown by players on these teams vary, however, because of the differences in the number of full shares voted by the club owners. The Yankees voted by clubs goes like this: Twins \$1,894.07, Dodgers \$1,880.03, Angels \$1,161.62, Reds \$1,251.14, Tigers \$613.47, Pirates \$355.62.

And, as usual, Uncle Sam got his share. In fact, he got more than was distributed to the clubs. Segar said federal taxes from the sale of tickets was \$25,012.14.

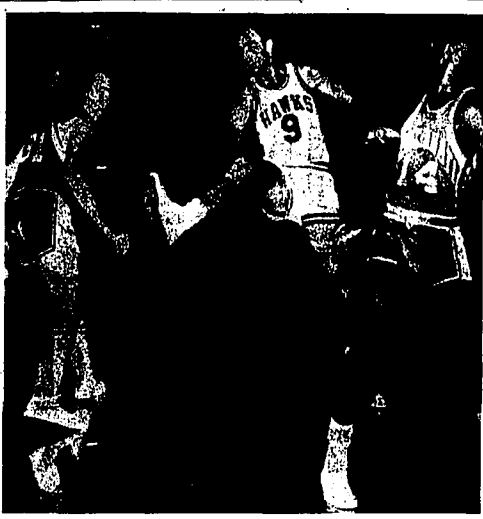
