**WASHINGTON, Oct. 29**—The most impelling discussion of the behavior of an American statesman in these turbulent times may soon result from the resignation of former Foreign Secretary J. E. Galbraith as ambassador to Cuba.

## BE SPORTSMEN

The opening days of pheasant season are out of the way, but the season will continue another four weeks. These are difficult days in which there may be many cases of friction between farmers and hunters. Much of the trouble results from the actions of a relatively small number of hunters who lack a sense of safety in their relentless pursuit of birds. The solution to the problem is for all hunters to be sportsmen, trying at all times to follow the simple rules of courtesy.

One of the best movements ever proposed along those lines is the effort to have hunters go to a farmhouse to ask permission to hunt, leaving their cars at the house while hunting. The procedure almost always guarantees hunters will exercise due care.

A source of trouble is the hunter who drives along country roads with a gun barrel sticking out the car window. The road hunter, who becomes more content with the status quo, is probably the worst offender when it comes to trespassing and damaging fences.

The solution is so simple it's a wonder it wasn't written into law years ago. There can be no room for an auto with a loaded rifle or shotgun in it. If loaded shotguns and rifles were banned from motor vehicles, road hunting would disappear. Already road hunting is illegal, if you consider the law that forbids firing a gun from a motor vehicle from a road or across a road. Yet only the violators caught in the actual act of committing the infraction can be arrested. At present, it is no violation to carry a loaded shotgun or rifle in a car. The answer is to have a law that every year a few Magic Valley citizens are killed or wounded phoning loaded firearms in a car or removing them from the auto.

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## OPEN SECRETS

1/2 cup butter or margarine  
2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice  
1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper  
Finely parley

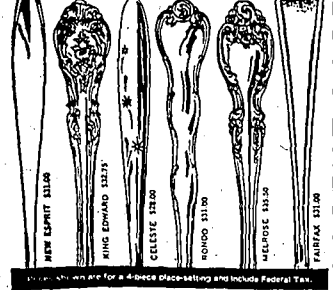

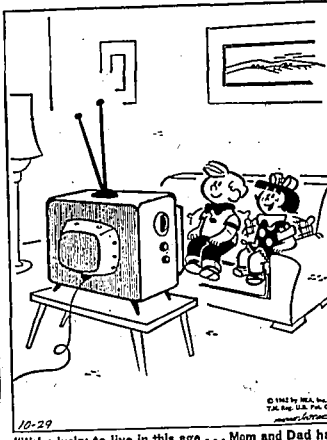

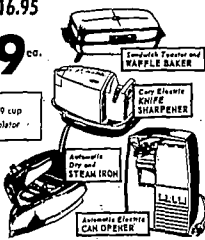
