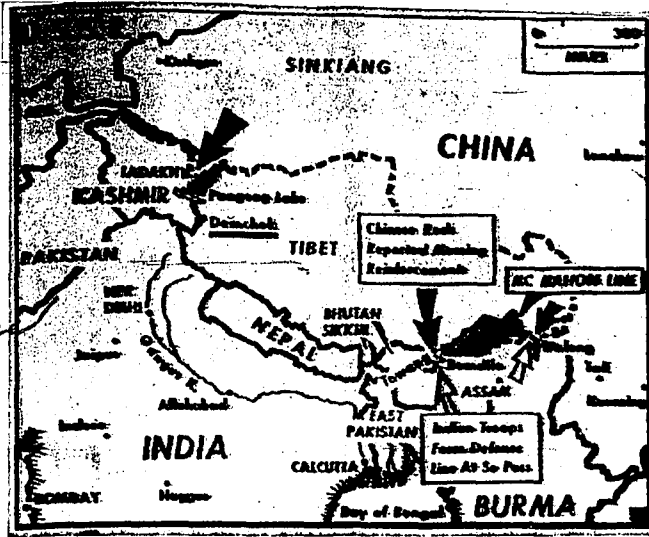

U.S. Tests Termed as Successful

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (AP)—The United States is nearing the end of what atomic experts consider one of the most successful programs of weapon tests ever held in the Pacific.

A high altitude shot scheduled for some time between 2:30 a.m. and 7:30 a.m. EST Thursday at Johnston Island may be the next to last test in this year's Pacific series. Another and smaller high

altitude test is scheduled for Nov. 4.

The Russians have not indicated when they intend to wind up their 1962 testing program which already has set a new world record for total power of a single series.

Authorities have been quoted in reports of the U. S. Pacific tests. One source, without giving details, said they had been "fantastically successful." He said a very dramatic breakthrough had been achieved in the "bomb to weight ratio."

This means the explosive power of bombs and missile warheads now may be greatly increased without increasing their size and weight. The effect will

be to pack more punch in all U. S. missiles and bombers.

Three Amendments

When Idahoans go to the polls next Tuesday, they will be handed an extra ballot to be used in voting on three proposed amendments to the state constitution. Usually, the voters are inclined to regard such proposals with suspicion, probably because of the legal language normally used in presenting the question. As a result, too many voters do not mark ballots on constitutional changes.

The three amendments offered voters next Tuesday are much more clearly worded than normal, yet there is considerable room for misunderstanding. Basically, the three amendments build down to proposals that would (a) give full citizenship status to naturalized Asians, (b) right to vote for a President of the U.S. after only 60 days residence in Idaho, and (c) authority for the state legislature to abolish probate and justice of the peace courts.

The first proposal, SJR No. 1, would eliminate an obsolete rule that should never have been written in the first place. In practice, that provision has been widely ignored. Presumably the ban on Chinese and persons of Mongolian descent from voting, serving as jurors or holding civil office dates back to the territorial days when portions of Idaho had a considerable Chinese population. Whatever the source, the provision certainly has no merit today.

SJR No. 6 would reduce from six months to 60 days the length of Idaho residence required to vote for presidential electors. The same requirement has been recommended for years by the State Bar association. Reorganization of the Idaho court system would be accomplished by building around the district courts, present backbone of the judicial system. The court of justice could be served in most instances by the proposed changes.

Basically, these are the advantages for the three suggested changes to Idaho's constitution. All three proposals were recommended unanimously by the state legislature. They might harbor objections on personal or prejudiced grounds, no one should have any reason to oppose the three changes.

It's to Idaho's advantage, collectively and individually, to vote on all three constitutional amendments next Tuesday.

ADJUSTMENT PERIOD

Some Magic Valley residents may be disappointed by the five-year time estimate for completion of the Interstate Highway. The new highway from the Burley area to Jerome. ATTORNEY GENERAL'S STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

This proposed amendment of the Idaho Constitution is designed to give naturalized Chinese citizens of the United States and other citizens of Mongolian descent, not born in the United States, the right to vote, to serve as jurors, and to hold civil office. Section 3 of Article VI of the Idaho Constitution, as now in effect, disqualifies certain persons from voting, serving as jurors or holding civil office and among those disqualified are Chinese or persons of Mongolian descent not born in the United States.

The amendment, if approved, would delete that portion of the said section which prohibits naturalized Chinese citizens, and other citizens of Mongolian descent, from voting, serving as jurors, or holding civil office. Though identifying only Chinese, the proposed amendment would also apply to citizens of Japanese ancestry, and all other naturalized citizens of Mongolian descent, which, as stated, would enable them to vote, serve as jurors, or hold civil office on the same basis as other naturalized citizens.

Idaho is the only State with such discrimination against any naturalized citizen, and the Idaho State Legislature unanimously recommended that this question should be placed before the voters.

(S. J. R. No. 6)

"Shall Section 2 of Article 2 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended so as to declare every citizen of the United States, twenty-one years old, who has actually resided in this state for sixty days next preceding the day of election, if registered as required by law, is a qualified elector for the sole purpose of voting for presidential electors?"

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

This proposed amendment of the Idaho Constitution is designed to give all citizens who have actually resided in the State of Idaho for sixty days next preceding the day of election, and who are otherwise qualified, the right to vote for presidential electors. Section 2 of Article VI of the Idaho Constitution, as now in effect, provides that citizens in order to vote, shall have to reside in this state for six months next preceding the day of election. The amendment, if approved, would permit those citizens who have resided in the State for only sixty days to vote for presidential electors. The requirement that a citizen shall have been an actual resident for six months next preceding the general election would continue to apply in voting for all other officials.

(H. J. R. No. 10)

"Shall the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended by amending Section 2 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Idaho to delete the designation of probate courts and courts of justices of the Peace as constitutional courts, but preserving the designation, as constitutional courts, of a court for the trial of impeachments, a supreme court and district courts, and preserving existing inferior courts until changed by law; to give the legislature the power, by law, to establish courts inferior to the supreme court and prescribe the jurisdiction of same; and to provide that the courts shall constitute a unified and integrated judicial system for administrative and supervision by the Supreme Court; by repealing Section 21 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Idaho to delete constitutional provisions relating to the jurisdiction of probate courts; by repealing Section 22 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Idaho to delete constitutional provisions relating to the jurisdiction of justices of the peace; and by amending Section 6 of Article 18 of the Constitution of the State of Idaho, as amended, to provide that the designation of a probate judge as a constitutional county officer shall continue until otherwise provided by the legislature, and to provide that a probate or other county judge may be a county officer if provided for by law?"

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

This proposed amendment of the Idaho Constitution is designed to vest in the Legislature of the State of Idaho power to eliminate the probate courts and the courts of justices of the peace as constitutional courts and further, power to establish courts inferior to the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction of such inferior courts which shall constitute a unified and integrated judicial system for administration and supervision by the Supreme Court. Section 2 of Article V of the Idaho Constitution as now in effect provides:

"The judicial power of the state shall be vested in a court for the trial of impeachments, a Supreme Court, district courts, probate courts, courts of justices of the peace, and such other courts inferior to the Supreme Court as may be established by law for any incorporated city or town."

The proposed amendment if adopted would change said Section 2 Article V to read thus: "The judicial power of the state shall be vested in a court for the trial of impeachments, a Supreme Court, district courts, and such other courts inferior to the Supreme Court as established by the legislature. The courts shall constitute a unified and integrated judicial system for administration and supervision by the Supreme Court. The jurisdiction of such inferior courts shall be as prescribed by the legislature. Until provided by law, no changes shall be made in the jurisdiction or in the manner of the selection of judges of existing inferior courts."

The proposed amendment, if adopted, would also repeal Sections 21 and 22 of Article V of the Idaho Constitution which set out the jurisdiction of the probate courts and courts of justices of the peace respectively. Further, the proposed amendment would also amend Section 6 of Article 18 of the Idaho Constitution which Section specifies the various county officers. The probate judge is listed therein as a county officer, and the proposed amendment, if adopted, would provide that the probate judge would continue to be a county officer "until otherwise provided by the legislature" and that "a probate or other county judge may be a county officer if provided for by law."

1-inch boiling water
1 teaspoon salt

Wash cauliflower, remove outside leaves, leaving young tender inside leaves attached. Place whole head of cauliflower in a saucepan with the 1-inch boiling water and salt. Bring to boiling point and cook, uncovered, 20 minutes. Cover and continue cooking 20 minutes or until cauliflower is tender, turning head once to cook uniformly. Kennedy May Ask Defense Food Program

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (AP)—The Kennedy administration is expected to ask congress early next year for 30 million dollars to shift about 22 billion pounds of food into emergency reserve storage as a civil defense measure.

The food, much of it already stockpiled in government hands under the agriculture department's farm support programs, would be stored in food deficit areas which normally rely heavily on shipments from other sections.

Priority "deficit" areas include the east coast, the Northwest, the Pacific coast, Hawaii, Alaska and Puerto Rico, officials said.

At the height of the Cuban crisis, Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman came close to setting up the food reserve

immediately. As the crisis eased, however, it was decided to wait and submit the program for congressional study.

When the program was first proposed last summer, congressional appropriations committees

frowned on the idea of financing the 30 million dollar cost and submit the program for support and surplus storage.

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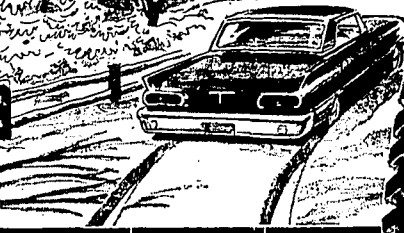

Davis Cops NL Soph Player Of Year Title

NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (AP)—Willie Davis of the Los Angeles Dodgers, a disappointment in his rookie year, had a sparkling second season that earned him 1962 National league sophomore-of-the-year honors in the annual Associated Press poll Wednesday.

The speedy center fielder collected 32 of the 107 votes cast by members of the Baseball Writers' Association participating in the balloting, outfielder Billy Williams of the Chicago Cubs ranked second with 20 votes.

Other voting mention went to catcher Johnny Edwards of Cincinnati (8), catcher Tom Haller of San Francisco (6), outfielder Maitly Alou of San Francisco (5), second baseman Chuck Hillier of San Francisco (4), third baseman Bob Aponte of Houston (3) and pitcher Tony Cloninger of Milwaukee (2).

Davis, a 22-year-old southpaw swinger and fielder, wound up with a .283 batting average after hovering around .300 most of the season. This was a vast improvement over the 1961 campaign when Davis hit only .254.

Willie the "Whip" displaying power as well as consistency in the plate, compiled 171 hits, 112 homers, collected 85 runs batted in and scored 100 runs.

Regarding the requirements concerning post-season basketball games, Byers said the recommended revision stemmed from an NCAA rule that provided that an NCAA certification would be given only to qualified all-star games in which the practical and game periods occurred during vacation periods.

Byers said the revision would provide that if an all-Star game is scheduled on a Saturday the day before may be used for practice. This means a basketball player may miss one day of class time to prepare for an all-Star game.

Pro Baseball Announces Player Development Plan for Minors

NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (AP)—Professional baseball has drawn up a player development contract to carry out the major leagues' commitment of last May to underwrite at least 160-minor league clubs for 1963. John Galbreath of Pittsburgh, chairman of a joint major and minor league committee which has worked on the problem, released a general secretary-treasurer of organized baseball.

The minors and majors must approve the committee's unanimous recommendation at a meeting to be held Nov. 26 to Dec. 1.

"I reflect the optimism of the National Association (minor leagues) and the committee that the minors and majors both will adopt this program," said Galbreath. The majors already are committed to underwrite at least 100 minor league clubs next year.

The new contract would give financial aid to the minors and would substitute for the fixed cash payments previously made to the minors from the major leagues' player development fund which approximated \$850,000 a year.

Under the new agreement, the major league club would reimburse the player and would provide the minor league team for some or all of the salaries to the players. The major league club also would pay salaries of the manager and coaches and would pay spring training costs and certain traveling expenses.

Chandler Claims Major Leagues Ruining Minors

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., Oct. 31 (AP)—Former ball commissioner A. B. (Happy) Chandler said "the major leagues court the minors and ruin them almost run the minors out of business." Chandler twice served as Kentucky governor, twice a U. S. senator and baseball commissioner.

Chandler, who interrupted a golfing vacation here to discuss baseball with the News-Journal.

"Commissioner Ford Frick has precluded over the liquidation of the minor leagues," said Chandler. "They've laid it on television and radio but that's not the reason. It's the selfishness and greed of the majors."

Chandler said the minors reached an all-time peak when he was commissioner. In 1949 there were 418 clubs in 39 leagues and total attendance was 41,882,238. Last year minor leagues had dwindled to 147 clubs in 22 leagues and total attendance plummeted to 10,974,084.

Major league clubowners did not re-elect Chandler as commissioner in 1951, naming Frick as his successor.

"I thought baseball was a sport when I became commissioner," said Chandler. "I thought the people owned the national pastime. I found out I was mistaken. The semi-bandits own it. They thought the commissioners' job was to represent the players, umpires and the people. But I was wrong. The clubowners just want a slice for themselves."

Chandler called former big league clubowner Bill Wertz "a straight talker." Wertz, in a book this year, claimed major league owners had banded together to keep the doors of the majors to "Veck is infinitely superior to some of the fellows who are trying to keep him out," declared Happy.

The 62-year-old Kentuckian said: "I've just been a fan in recent years and it's better that way. I had no rooting privileges as a player. I wouldn't take anything for the experience of being commissioner, but I would not give a thin dime to get it back."

**Call Police
On Salesmen,
Chamber Says**

The Twin Falls police department, not the Chamber of Commerce, should be called when Twin Falls residents are contacted by door-to-door salesmen or salesmen, report William Grange, secretary-manager of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce.

"The chamber has no authority to stop these solicitors but the police department has," Grange stated. A city ordinance prohibits solicitation without invitation or appointment except in the cases of persons selling produce which they have raised or produced on farms.

"It would seem that if all city residents were aware of this no-soliciting ordinance, it should be fairly simple for the police department to enforce this, but unless the public will notify them when solicitors are working, they have no way of knowing about it," Grange said. He added that many times persons call the Chamber of Commerce after the solicitor has left and they report that they succumbed to a smooth talker. By then it is too late for either the chamber or the police to be of any help unless the victim has at least taken down the car license number.

Chief of Police Frank Barnett urged residents to call the department to report such violations when the salesmen are still in the area.

Magazine solicitation crews seem to be persistent violators, and home photographers usually are noted in Twin Falls about this time of year. Recent complaints have been received about health and accident insurance crews who are using the door-to-door system, Grange added.

"Only the police department can stop them, and all the chamber can do is to relay the complaint to the department, so it would save time if the residents would call the police department first."
