NEW DELHI, Nov. 2 (UPI)—A fleet of U. S. air force jet transport planes today began deliveries of military equipment to India's largest armed army. More U. S. equipment, including mountain artillery, from Turkey, is to follow by sea and air.

S. officials demonstrated for the second day in front of the communist Chinese Embassy in New Delhi that India's first class fighting jet, an F-105, had been loaded with military supplies for India to take from Frankfurt, Germany, on a flight scheduled for 1:25 p.m. (11 a.m. EST) for the 11-hour, 15-minute journey to Calcutta.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy's historic address to the Cuban crisis has been slightly easier for him by the fact that the Cuban crisis is not a military one. It is a political one. The nation could not afford a local war without serious destruction of life on the home front. The Cuban crisis would have had to step up orders for certain types of weapons and lay out the necessary plans. It would have had to ask for a faster rate of production of equipment already under order.

In some places, notably along the Atlantic coast, the Cuban crisis has been suggested by the national and local civil defense officials. On this front, there is considerable need for preparation and improvement.

WARHOUSES FILLED—A contrast to the situation at the outbreak of the Korean conflict in 1950, the economy could stand and possibly benefit from whatever expansion was required by the Cuban crisis. It would be a matter of stockpiling raw materials and finished goods. Unlike 1950, when the customers were still in a position of need, today's customers are in a position of surplus. They have finished goods, electrical appliances, home furnishings, and a wide variety of other goods.

TAX CUT STILL PROBABLY—There are no shortages of foodstuffs that would justify price inflation. In fact, in preparation for the next few years, when we will be again faced with many of our overseas allies, the federal government has passed a temporary tax cut. It is not expected to exceed 10 percent.

Even after President Kennedy's revelation of the communist aggression of the Cuban crisis, there is a substantial cut in 1963.

IF PEACE FALLS—However, if we are unable to secure permanent peace and threats of global war increase, there will be tax increases instead of cuts. There will be prohibition of work stoppages during strikes. There will be rationing of every essential commodity—food, gasoline, travel, etc.

All of these measures are provided in programs that have been in readiness for some time. The Cuban crisis has not been a factor in the planning of these programs. It is only one development.

Onion Harvest Results in 1,200 Sacks To Acre on Glavin Land West of City

Anyway you look at it, 12,000 tons of onions are a lot of onions. Don Glavin, who harvested 10 acres of onions this week, ended up with that number of sacks. They will be stored in sheds on the Glavin property and then will be sorted during the early part of the winter.

The onions are of the yellow sweet Spanish variety and are large, firm and of an extremely top grade.

Don Glavin, who supervised the harvest, said these particular onions were planted from seed. Ideal harvesting weather aided the project, he said.

The Glavin property comprising about a section of choice land, is located four miles north of the intersection of highway 30 and 93, west of Twin Falls. Some of it is divided by highway 93.

The spread is one of the best in the valley. Although in years past great fields were devoted to onion raising, today a 10-acre tract, producing 12,000 sacks, is unusual.

Normal Water Year Ending West Drought

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—The soil conservation service said the 1962 water year was a turning point in water supply conditions in the West after three successive years of drought.

Water was available to meet most normal demands except where local streamflow is always inadequate. There was enough excess water to restore many of the severely depleted reservoirs to near, but still below, normal carryover levels.

Exceptions to this generally favorable condition are along the Rio Grande in New Mexico, east of the Cascades in Oregon, and streams in southwestern Utah. In addition, there are some large reservoirs which could not recover completely in one favorable water year.

The service said adequacy of water supply for 1963 will be largely dependent on the winter snowfall.

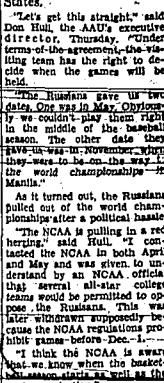
He says he expects the team to have just as rough and tough a type of team as Missouri has, he said.
