

# Russian Bombers Will Remain on Cuban Airfields

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—U. S. authorities report today they have no evidence yet that the Soviets are packing up the atomic-capable jet bombers in Cuba. It was reported to be a matter of concern to President Kennedy, who wanted removal of the 103 bombers from the Soviet missiles in Cuba. U. S. surveillance has shown that the missile dismantling promised Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev is well along, officials said. But American intelligence has not found any packing of uncrated IJ28s to be under way, they said.

# New Throttle Demonstrated for Rockets

UNIVERSITY CITY, Mo., Nov. 5 (AP)—The United Technology Corporation has exhibited a new throttle to control the operating power of rocket engines that may be used in space landings and take-off from the moon. The firm, which has pioneered the field of solid propellant rockets, claims the new throttle was the world's first gas pressure system for wide range control of liquid fuel engines. The principle of the system, a company spokesman said, is to use a gas pressure, mixed in a special manifold with the liquid fuel, to control the engine's thrust. The ratio of the gas to liquid determines whether the engine will exert more or less thrust. In addition to being able to start and restart the engine, the throttle can be used to control the engine's thrust in a range of 100 to 10,000 pounds of force at any point in flight.

# Wilderness Moratorium Is Pushed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—A moratorium to suspend temporarily consideration of legislation to establish national wilderness areas in the public domain was supported by conservationists today.

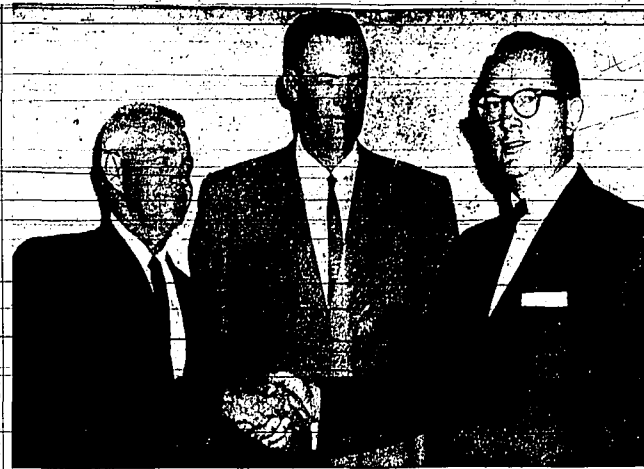
Chairman Wayne M. Aspinall, D-CO., of the House Interior Committee, has said that before a moratorium is considered the committee should first pass a measure to define the executive's responsibility in the field of federal-land management.

Aspinall passed a letter today to President Kennedy. But Kennedy received word from the conservationists that they disagree with Aspinall's plan.

Dr. Ira N. Gabrielson, chairman of the citizens committee on natural resources, said he agrees with Aspinall that there is a need for a moratorium on the "wilderness bill."

"Opportunities for progress in wilderness acquisition should not be suspended," Gabrielson said, "simply because Mr. Aspinall has a suspicion that some new relationship may be established and accepted is needed."

The controversial wilderness proposal has turned the brow of many a congressman.

# Miles of Film Became Key To Cuban Missile Buildup

A photo of a Soviet freighter shows some large crates on deck. In the photo, they look cylindrical, like miniature Quonset huts. Examination indicates they are probably Ilyushin-28s, a Soviet light bomber, with a range of 1,000 miles. These crates are unloaded in remote ports, not Havana, and solely by the Russians, not the Cubans.

## Payoff Day

Tuesday is the big day. The one toward which Idahoans have been pointing ever since the day nominations were opened for political office several months ago. The general atmosphere seems to be one of "I'll sure be glad when these elections are over and I can get on with my job." It is hard to see how there could be any other reaction. The campaigning has dragged on for months with voters bombarded from all sides by a variety of claims, charges and counter-charges. It's no wonder many voters are fed up.

Yet no voter should say away from the polls because of any personal reaction. Voting is a precious right to be exercised at every opportunity. If the right is not used, then there is always the danger it will disappear. Disgust, indignation, feelings of futility or apathy are no reason to stay away from the polls. Each and every voter should resolve to vote. After all, that's the reason for all the campaigning. At this point, no one can know for sure what candidates or issues will carry the day. As has happened in the past, some citizens are not going to be happy with the results while others chortle with glee. For the candidates themselves, it's payoff day. Naturally, each and every candidate will try to carry off as much as he can. One will lose and another will win. In some cases of losers, they will drop out of the public spotlight while the winners prepare to take over their duties and responsibilities of public servants. Then for another two, four or six years, as the case may be, the voter who went to the polls has the right to be a critic. In effect, he is an employer of the public servant and has every right to pass along his opinions and suggestions.

## IT'S CENSORSHIP

Government use of the news as an added weapon in the cold war with Russia disregards the right of Americans to govern as they wish. Perhaps the clearest right along as part of the propaganda war, but the open admission is shocking. It's particularly disturbing that such use of news is admitted in conjunction with the Cuban crisis.

It has been a fact for many years and the degree of danger during the Cuban crisis. The U.S. may have been bluffing or leaders of the nation may have decided the situation had reached a point where the charge could not be reversed, even if it meant nuclear war.

The Times-News contends the citizens of America are entitled to know the extent of war danger at any given point. In these days of mislead, every citizen should be given some idea of what can be expected.

Any other policy than the free flow of news could backfire against the U.S. government. If citizens are kept in the dark as to the progress of the struggle of leaders, the strength of the U.S. is curtailed. The administration, military leaders or whoever decided to turn the news into a weapon, or the full backing of the American public.

The technique of justifying the means with results is a better description of what could be expected from Russia. The United States is a Christian nation and should never entertain even the thought of stooping to the communist level.

Freedom of the press, which includes freedom of the news, is one of the cornerstones on which this nation was founded. Any move to curtail or control the news is a violation of the principles of the republic and must not be tolerated. As an exception, no thinking citizen ever would criticize suppression of the news or "managing" of the news or the security of the nation would endanger the Cuban crisis.

# WHORLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The American abandonment of nuclear and air bases in Turkey would necessitate a radical rearrangement of the barrier against communist aggression which the United States and its allies have built along Russia's borders. It is also possible that the very cooperation from our European allies, especially France, in erecting the barrier will be nullified by their own withdrawal from power.

In a puzzling note presuming to differ from the American position, Moscow, Nikita Khrushchev agreed to withdraw his offensive from bases on his southern boundary. President Kennedy refused to sign to this kind of transaction since it would mean to discuss the prospect of future negotiations.

The swap offers a possible prospect for face-saving on both sides. It would be far less humiliating to give up the Turkish bases than to sacrifice them. The deal, which is the main objective in his Cuban adventure. President Kennedy has said that this question is "not negotiable" under any circumstances.

SHISHLES OBTAINED—A withdrawal from Turkey, however, has its perils. Although the 15 Jupiter missiles stationed there are virtually obsolete, requiring a long time to build, they have a range of 1,700 miles. They can hit targets in Russia's interior centers and oil fields. Besides, the missiles are not the only kind of arms which the U.S. can put in Turkey.

Moreover, this complex of nuclear and aerial strength carries such weight as the Eastern Mediterranean, Suez canal, North Africa, Middle East oil wells and our military buildup in Europe. There also would be a psychological disadvantage if a retreat is made. It would tell other Allies to question whether we would abandon them in some future crisis. It might cast doubt on our honesty and good faith. It would have given to more than a score of nations throughout the world.

Before the new Cuban crisis, the United States had been considering possible abandonment of certain advance posts on the Soviet peninsula. With the detente which is inherent in the use of nuclear arms, the United States has been planning to remove most of the 60 Thor bases in Britain, which now has her own Thor capability.

FRANCE WANTS OWN FORCE—The "most delicate" task in the development of an anti-communist defense system would involve our relations with France. Until now, that country has been a member of the NATO alliance. She has insisted on building her own nuclear force in the face of our warnings against "proliferation" of nuclear weapons. The U.S. has refused to agree that only the President of the United States shall decide when and where there shall be a transfer of nuclear weapons. She has insisted on other major differences with President Charles de Gaulle, including his refusal to accept the U.S. as the NATO. Other NATO members share his concern on this issue, although not so vigorously. Nor do they have the resources to develop their own establishments.

However, in view of the new "cold war" which is now in progress, it may be necessary to give well as Cuba, it may be necessary to give NATO with its own separate nuclear arm. One of the main reasons for this is that the U.S. has been reluctant to accept a joint nuclear force which would require legislation by Congress.

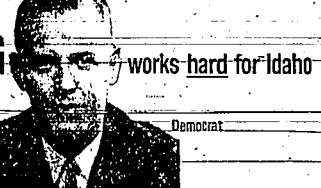

## Pacific Test Series Ends On High Shot

**HONOLULU, Nov. 5.**—The United States has lowered the curtain on its Pacific high-altitude nuclear test series by detonating an unpopulated low-yield device over Johnston Island. The shot was the fifth success in nine high-altitude tests in 1962, and represented a breakthrough in the series. Only two weeks ago, the United States had one success and four failures.

Four straight "winners" put the program on a plus side, and the joint force announced the completion of the long-drawn-out series "which" has been under way since last July.

After testing the Hawaiian islands to two magnificent aerial displays, one of which was seen as the high-altitude nuclear test series was brought to a close, scientists at distant Johnston Island bowed out with a relatively small explosion.

In Honolulu, some 750 miles away, it appeared only as a blue and white flash of light, although it was the first of the series and the most powerful.

The low-yield device was lifted aboard an aircraft carrier, the USS Intrepid, and launched by its crew. The device was seen to explode in a cloud of fire and smoke.

Olsen, who is medical officer with the USPHS in Kansas City, Mo., said the attack rate for paralytic poliomyelitis in Nebraska is directly related to the feeding of the Babcock type II B vaccine.

### Seat Muddle Goes Into Voting Booth

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—Legislative reapportionment, triggered by a U. S. supreme court ruling this spring, moves from the courtroom to the election booth in 17 states Tuesday.

While congressional and gubernatorial races catch most of the attention, voters will be making decisions regarding the makeup of their state legislatures in these states: California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Mississippi, Nebraska, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Oregon, Tennessee, Washington and West Virginia.

Most of the proposals would give urban or suburban areas a bigger and sometimes commanding vote in at least one of the legislative districts.

But voters in Nebraska, Oregon and West Virginia are being asked to solidify urban rural strength in the statehouse.

In most cases the referendum and constitutional amendments being voted on were in the works before the supreme court ruled that "one-man, one-vote" reapportionment is a legitimate matter for federal courts to consider. That ruling looked at some 10 lawsuits across the nation, most of them aimed at breaking rural control of the legislatures.

The legislature came up with a plan which the judges approved and which Florida voters will decide on Tuesday. It increases the number of representatives from 38 to 48 with most of the new seats going to urban areas.

An apparently unpublished letter from Washington to Benjamin Franklin, written from Newburgh July 10, 1783, mentions negotiations for the "definitive treaty" to mark the end of the war.

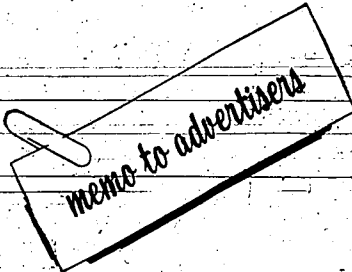

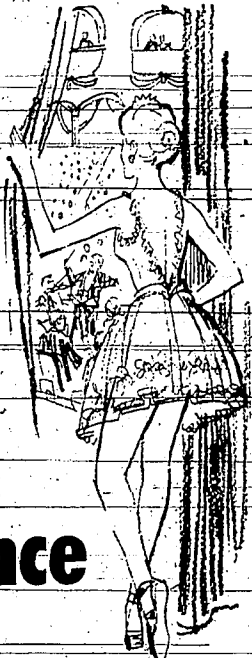

### Navy Polaris Blows Apart On Launch

CAPE CANAVERAL, Nov. 4 (AP)—A navy attempt to fire its highly advanced Polaris "A-3" missile on a long test flight failed today when the rocket exploded 30 seconds after it roared into the sky.

The bullet-shaped rocket, thundered from its launching pad at 10:30 a.m. EST. The rocket, designed for launching from a submerged nuclear submarine, was sent from a stable pad on the cape.

About a half-minute after blazing aloft, the Polaris appeared to disintegrate.

An official announcement said simply that the failure resulted from a booster "malfunction." Officials said the rocket was not deliberately destroyed, as happens when one tears off course, but had blown up of its own accord.

The shot, which was to have been a 1,000-mile experiment, followed three consecutive "partial" successes for the Polaris.

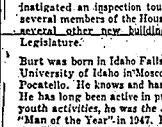

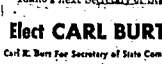

## Partridge and Quail Season Long

**BOISE, Nov. 5 (AP)—**Boys' ongoing hunting season on two kinds of partridge and four species of quail runs through the most arid, the fish and game department said today, adding that the season on birds ruffed and Franklin grouse is over in all parts of the state.

Exceptions in respect to partridges found in Bear and Kootenai counties, where the season on Hungarian partridge continues. Boys' season on these birds closes late in November and early December, depending on the location.

Director John B. Woodworth urges hunters to study the 1962 hunting and game bird regulations before going afield.

Chukar partridge and quail seasons both extend to December except in the counties of Blaine, Blingham, Bonanza, Blount, Clark, Jefferson, Madison and Power, where the chukar season ends Nov. 25. In Butte, Lemhi and Blaine counties, both seasons run through Dec. 31.

## Favorite in Race Comes From Behind

**MEXICO CITY, Nov. 5 (AP)—**Favorite Jim Clark of England, who had to change from one Lotus Elise to another early in the 11-day, 2,762-mile Argentine grand prix for standard cars, Sunday and won the 300-mile race (about 187 miles) Mexico City-Frize.

Jack Brabham of Australia, driving his own Brabham special, was second, and the only driver to complete the full 100-kilometer course, Innes Ireland of Scotland was third in a Lotus.

Preceding the race, a wreath of flowers was placed at the entrance to the Argentine, which claimed the life of young Ricardo Rodriguez in a trial run yesterday. His brother, Pedro, who was scheduled to compete in this, the first Mexico grand prix, withdrew.

Ewy, who came into the race as a 3-hour 3-minute and 52-second favorite, had an average speed of 39.7 kilometers per hour (about 24.6 miles an hour).
