Idaho's top official family remained pretty much the same after all the shouting and voting. Idaho went into the election with a Republican governor, one Republican and one Democratic senator and two Democratic congressmen. And that's just the way the Gen State came out of the election.

One change that might be quite noticeable in the months ahead is the election of a Republican to the office of attorney general. The two candidates are Gov. Arnold Smylie and a minority on the important board of examiners. That's where most of the squabbling and bickering arose in the state's official family. After Nov. 7, Republican Governor Sheppard will join the governor on the board with the third member, Secretary of State Arnold Williams.

The mixture of political affiliations and the gambling issue brought some strange voting in a race around the state. For instance, Bannock county, normally heavily Democratic, gave a margin to Governor Smylie. The county is also heavily unionized and union support had gone to Smylie.

Constitutional voting in Ada and Canyon counties was important and significant. Ada county (Boise) gave Governor Smylie an edge of 7,318 votes over Vernon K. Smith and Canyon county (Caldwell) gave Governor Sheppard 1,000 votes. The total Smylie victory in those two counties was a major portion of the governor's victory. Canyon county has always been considered quite similar to Twin Falls county, economically, politically and socially.

Idaho's top official family remained pretty much the same after all the shouting and voting. Idaho went into the election with a Republican governor, one Republican and one Democratic senator and two Democratic congressmen. And that's just the way the Gen State came out of the election.

There's a good chance Idaho won't hear anything more about gambling as an election issue. It has been a thurd in the last two elections. It has been and has been defeated both times.

However, the two consecutive defeats aren't the reason gambling may be dead as an election issue. The next session of the Idaho legislature, convened in less than two months, very likely will be handed a proposal to change the state's primary election law. Both Democrats and Republicans will give strong support to the change because it would allow voters to select candidates.

Even with its acknowledged shortcomings and charges of "smoke-filled rooms," the convention system has the definite advantage of permitting the voters to choose their own representatives. They also can avoid rather easily such embarrassing issues as gambling.

One other factor in the gubernatorial election is noteworthy. At this writing, 46 percent of the voters cast their votes roughly 46 per cent of the vote. It's an impressive showing, particularly for a candidate who was practically repudiated by his party from the beginning and had no active party support.

On the other hand, Governor Mr. Smith was handicapped by active opposition of all sorts of groups, including such diverse organizations as the state labor unions and clergymen. Consideration of the state's political climate could he could poll 45 per cent of the vote. It's rather frightening to think that such a large proportion of the state's voters could fall victim to demagoguery, yet citizens should never forget that the state that elected Gen Taylor to the U.S. senate.

Part of the answer may be that voters still vote their pocketbooks and Mr. Smith held up the promise of tax reduction. He voted for a tax cut that gave the voters a very favorable impression but somehow hoped to abolish all taxes. Many voters like to hear that sort of talk even though they might admit in more rational moments that it is an impossibility.

### Coal Miners Come up With New Bushy-Browed Chief

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 (AP)—Coal miners have come up with another bushy-browed labor union chief to carry the mine opera. W. A. (Doc) Boyle is touring the coal fields and rousing the miners for something. The operators expect it may be their "four years have come by" time. John J. Lewis, now officially retired, got the miners their last pay raise.

Boyle is 68. He has a fine set of red eyebrows and a folksy sort of speech. He can't compare, of course, to either department with his mentor, labor's old-time boss and thunder expert, Lewis, now 82.

Lewis is still around, still active as president emeritus of the United Mine Workers union; privately reading Boyle along. He usually Boyle is the "old man" as vice president. But he's operating like No. 1 since President Tom Kennedy, at 75, has been ailing for some time.

Coal labor relations, at least with the major industry producers, have been serenely peaceful since the last industry-wide strike in 1950. There have been constant troubles with small mine operators, particularly in eastern Kentucky and eastern Tennessee, who have balked at paying the 40-cent-a-ton welfare royalty in the face of slack demand and declining prices. The UMW welfare fund, in turn, has had to reduce pensions and take steps to dispose of a chain of mine area hospitals. Among other UMW troubles are the fact that non-union coal production has risen from 20 to

71 per cent of the total and that union membership has continued to dwindle until it now is only 100,000.

Although nominally in retirement, Lewis is reported still the man in charge of the UMW while putting Boyle forward as the man he wants the industry to deal with.

Thus, when coal operators received a hot message from Boyle, carrying an underline saying the contents were attested to by Lewis, the industry sat up and took notice.

Boyle said in about as many words that if the coal operators went ahead with plans to put discredited equipment in coal mines they would have a fight on their hands.

### Food for Americans

By GAYNOR MADDOX

Let's do a little turkey talk first, about the supply this Thanksgiving. Turkey will be abundant in all sizes. Pies are expected to be low, but perhaps not quite so low as last year.

Now about how to roast your turkey for best results. The following rules, tested on hundreds of birds by trained cooking experts of the Poultry and Egg-National Board, are simple to follow. They will save you a lot of guesswork and worry, and produce tender and succulent results.

- Roasting the Turkey
- Roast turkeys of any size by slow cooking by dry heat on a rack in an open pan. No water, no basting, no covering and no searing required. Always roast turkey in one continuous period. Use a shallow open pan to allow heat to circulate around the bird for even roasting. A rack at least 1 1/2-inch high raises the bird off the bottom of the pan, keeping it out of the juices.
- For best results, follow these simple steps:
  - Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. (slow).
  - Rinse bird with cold water, drain and pat dry. Rub cavity of unstuffed bird lightly with salt if desired. Do not salt if stuffed.
  - If using stuffing, fill wishbone area (neck) with stuffing. Paten neck skin to back with skewer. Fill cavity lightly. Push drumsticks under band of skin as tall, if present, or lie them to tall.
  - Place turkey on rack in shallow roasting pan, breast side up. Brush skin with fat. If a roast meat-thermometer is to be used, insert it so that the bulb is in the center of the inside thigh muscle or the thickest part of the breast meat. Be sure that the bulb does not touch bone.
  - Place in preheated oven. If desired, baste or brush occasionally any dry areas. When turkey is done, remove it from oven and let it stand for 15 minutes. Carve and serve.

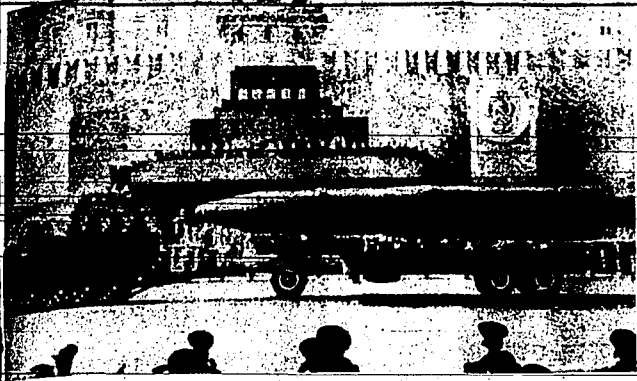

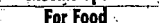

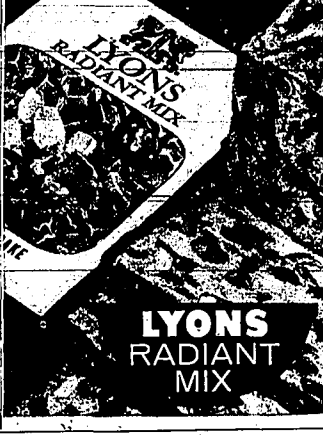

## Importance Of Missions Is Outlined

**RUPERT, Nov. 8**—The importance of the missionary program of the church was the theme of the quarterly conference of the Minidoka stake held here Sunday with Elder Henry D. Taylor, assistant to the council of 12 apostles, as featured speaker. A total of 1,800 persons attended the morning session.

Elder Taylor spoke of the great mission of the prophet Joseph Smith in founding the church and of revelations received by him in reference to the church. He told of recent visits he had made to historical points connected with the early days of the church, and especially of a visit to the Kirtland temple, and outlined the history of the building. Although not now owned by the church, Elder Taylor said that it remains much the same as when it was constructed. He recounted instances of persecutions undergone by the early day members, and Joseph Smith, along with other leaders of the organization.

"Through all the suffering which has come upon the church, persecutions leading up to his martyrdom, the prophet never once wavered in his testimony of the truth he had seen and knew," Elder Taylor pointed out. "The speaker said that missionaries often found people who could accept the teachings of the church in their entirety, but could not accept Joseph Smith as a prophet. A thorough, unbiased study of the life and works of the church's founder would usually convince them that only an inspired person could have written the Book of Mormon, and have set up the complete organization of the church," Elder Taylor pointed out.

"The church has grown from 10 members scattered throughout the world, and continues to grow at an unprecedented rate," the speaker stated.

Other speakers at the morning session were Rodney J. Hansen, stake president, and a number of returned missionaries.

David Green was released as first counselor in the YAMMA presidency and J. Lowell Mudgett, second counselor, named to his place. Lynn Heiner was named as second counselor.

Phillips was sustained as a president in the 219th quorum of seventies, and Glen Arthur, Jr., was named secretary of the second quorum of elders.

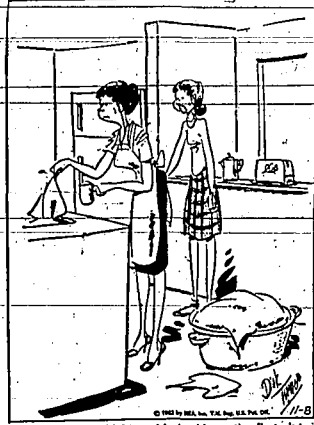

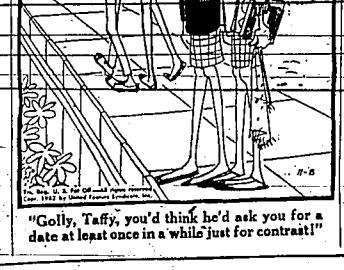
