

## Nehru Says Russians to Send Jet Fighters for Use Against Red China

NEW DELHI, India, Nov. 10 (AP)—Reporting a slight shift in Soviet attitude, Prime Minister Nehru said today the Russians will send MIG21 jet fighter planes for India's possible use in the undeclared border war with Red China. Nehru said a closed session of the joint committee of parliament that a number of the jets would arrive in mid-December. India put in the order for the jets long before the Chinese opened an offensive Oct. 20 on two fronts in the Himalayas along India's northern border. The jets were ordered for delivery in batches of six more for delivery as requested later date.

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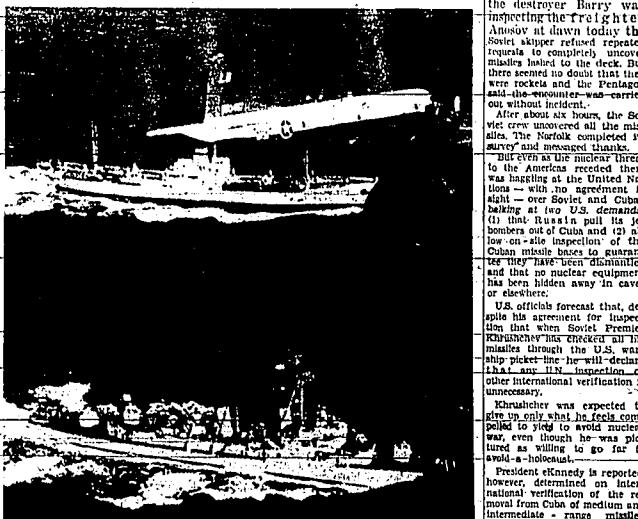

He said the state department of education has declared there is no way to remodel the rooms without "looting" in the basement of the old building. The rooms have concrete floors, low ceilings and rows of posts in the center of the rooms. The woodwork is dark and the rooms are dark with inadequate lighting.

The two rooms now used for junior high are the only two rooms in the high school that can be made into a laboratory setup satisfactory to the state.

When these rooms are utilized for science the state has awarded bond issue for the purpose it will be necessary to build class rooms for the junior high, Fagg notes.

Those will be constructed immediately adjacent to the high school in order that the junior high will be separated from the high school and yet be in a position where students may utilize the high school library and the science gymnasium, the superintendent said.

## History Plays Important Role In Background of T.F. Resident

History and Mrs. Hazel D. White are synonymous.

Her forebears were deep rooted in colonial days in Virginia and in moving from Ohio to the headwaters of the Ohio river were attacked by Indians, many were killed and many were held prisoner for several years until a treaty was agreed upon and they were released.

One who survived was Aaron Barker, father of Mrs. White's great-grandfather, William, who was born in 1784. He married Sally Crawford and eight boys were born to this union. One of them being Mrs. White's father, ZASAR W. BARKER, a Civil war veteran and brigadier general.

Through his religious history once more touched the Barkers because their church, the Pigeon Baptist, was the same as attended by Abraham Lincoln's family.

Her great-grandfather, William Barker, was appointed as clerk of Baptists in these early days of the nation.

As chairman of the committee for the repair of the church (church) he had written that Thomas Lincoln, father of Abe, gave 24 pounds of "whisky corn," amount to make a gallon of whisky.

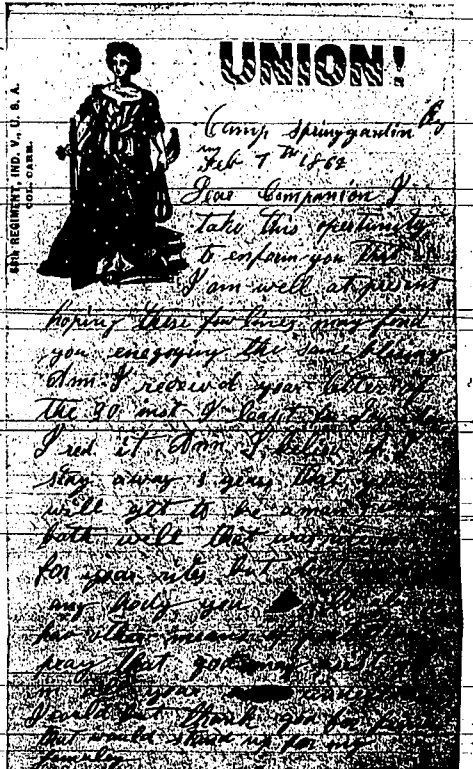
He kept a close score on church donations and noted that he had given himself credit for 30 cents on a note in 1851. Another Barker was credited with donating 10 cents toward wine for communion.

The close family relationship with the Lincolns continued when in August, 1826, Abraham's sister, Sallie, married Aaron Orsby, Aaron's mother was a Barker, the sister of Mrs. White's great-grandfather, William Barker.

Likewise, William was the first communication officer of Spencer county, Indiana. He did the work of all the present officers and took over the county horseback with his books in a saddle bag and collecting the taxes as he made the assessments. He held court in Rockport one week each year.

There in those days amounted to two or three dollars on 100 acres of land.

Even "Honey" Abe himself entered personally into the history of the Barkers. Logs split by the president-to-be in order to put for a borrowed book which had been damaged by the weather.

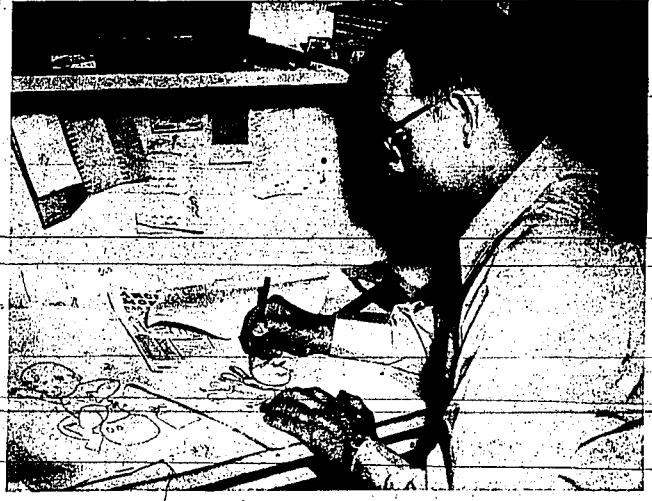
But a gentle revolution is under way in Uganda, the latest colony to become independent. A small group of women is leading a campaign to bring women into the new world of freedom.

British colonial officers, the churches and a few progressive Ugandans have made some progress in emancipating women in the cities. In the rural areas, where 90 per cent of the population live, tribal customs condemn women to a life of toil and bearing children.

Uganda fathers still extract a bride price for their daughters from prospective husbands. In some places this may amount only to a goat and a few small presents, but in northern Uganda may run to 10 or more head of cattle.

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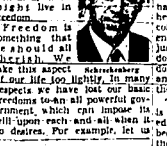

### "Face on Barroom Floor" Identified as Artist Dies

CENTRAL CITY, Colo., Nov. 10—The identity of the famed "face on the barroom floor" in Central City's Teller house, portrait which was born of life pictures, no longer is a mystery. For more than a quarter of a century, the identity of the beautiful young woman whose face was painted on the floor of the famed hotel and opera house was a closely guarded secret, shared by only four persons. When 65-year-old Herndon Davis died Wednesday in Wray, Mont., the cloud of mystery was lifted. Davis was the artist and the model was his wife, Nina. She, of course, knew the inside story. Denver Attorney Fred Maszula and Dr. Nolle Nunez, also Denver, were the only others privy to the secret, and they were sworn to silence until the artist's death. Davis, a former Denver Post and Rocky Mountain News staff artist, painted the picture one night during 1904, following a difference of opinion with an official of the Central City Opera association. Davis had been engaged to paint pictures for the Teller house and one Sunday he became involved in an argument with Ann Evans, granddaughter of former Colorado Gov. John Evans, regarding the authenticity of some Western paintings. The argument was heated and when

the woman left, a 18-year-old boy said to Davis, "You're going to get fired, you know that." Davis apparently agreed. "Why don't you give them something to remember you by? Paint a picture on the floor," the boy counseled. "When the bar closed for the night, Davis armed himself with a brick—a bottle-opped and painted materials. He smoothed the floor with the brick and paced his rendition of the "face" with tips from the rum bottle. For years, hundreds of visitors and local residents wondered who the painted lady might be, but no one, not even the bar boy, Joe Libby, now a Denver bartender, could guess. About 10 years ago, when the Teller house began charging admission to the public to view the face, Davis hurried up to Central City from Denver and signed his name to the portrait. Davis was working on plans for a mural in the new architectural building at the Smithsonian Institute in Washington when he died of an apparent heart attack.

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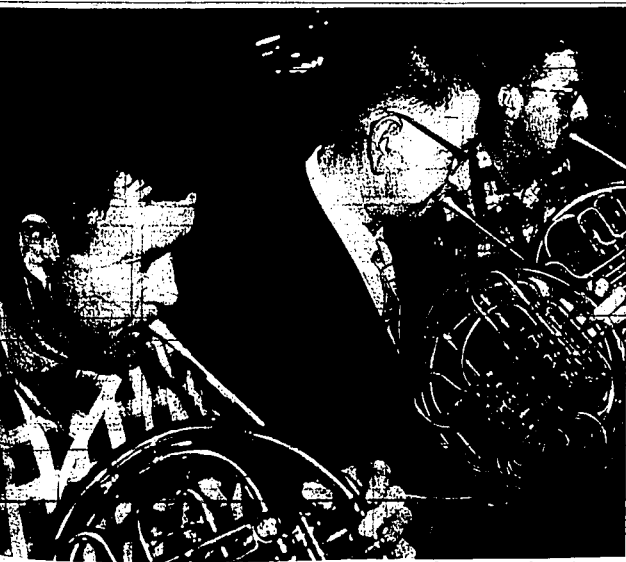
