### Dog Surgery May Be Aid To Humans

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (AP)—The successful removal of the adrenal glands from dogs and the transplantation of the organs in the same animal may point to a new way for surgically removing cancerous adrenal glands in humans today.

Dr. Richard C. Lushell, associate professor of surgery at the University of Minnesota, said the technique might also be used to remove cancerous adrenal glands in other human ailments— even radiation sickness.

In a report prepared for the 60th annual meeting of the Association of Military Surgeons, Lushell said the removal of adrenal glands for periods of up to six hours.

The said glandular had taken the adrenal glands from the back of dogs and put them back in the same animal without apparent ill-effects.

Lushell said the successful removal of dogs' adrenal glands indicated that a major gland in humans, the adrenal gland, is not essential to life.

### Postoffice Fluff Means 'Great Buy' in Dog Stamps

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (AP)—The post office department turned out what apparently was a real good bargain in imperforate stamp honoring Dog Hammarik. The "best buys" were advertised Nov. 13, but late to take advantage of them.

For at least three men the postal authorities are now a real bonanza: their imperforate 4-cent stamps may be worth hundreds of dollars apiece.

Stamp collectors prize such imperforate highly, and the post office department is waiting to see what happens when the market—and it turns out billions of stamps every 10 years.

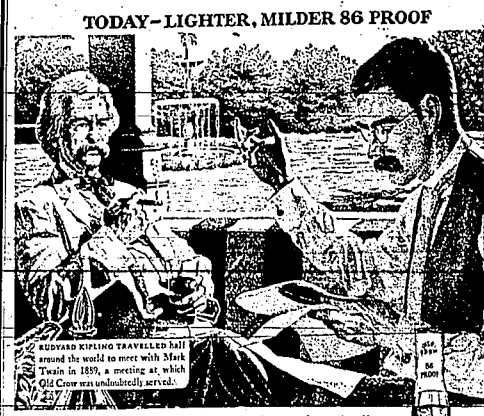

## Low Blow

The unsteady haste of the American Broadcasting Company to bury Richard M. Nixon's political life has backfired with a bang. Perhaps the idea had merit in that Mr. Nixon has been in the public eye for many years and has been mentioned in the presidential history of the 1964 campaign. But when Alger Hiss, convicted perjurer, was permitted to appear on the program, that was too much. It was, indeed, a low blow.

The appearance of Hiss brought immediate widespread attention. Situations prevented the trial-on-charges of Hiss. During the period in which he worked for the Russians, he was an official in the U. S. state department, but the extent and importance of his treason has never been ascertained.

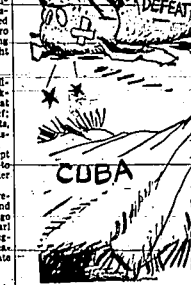

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13 (UP)—Increased federal money has been allocated for a search for an economical way to purify brackish and salt water.  
Congress put up \$8 million dollars for the office of saline waters activities this year, compared with 5.75 million dollars two years ago and about \$1 million in previous years.  
About 7.6 million dollars will be used for basic water research and development and \$1 million for operation of test plants converting brackish and salt water into water for domestic use.  
The saline water office, directed by C. P. MacDowall, has awarded \$5 million to develop several projects totaling nearly \$10 million dollars this year. The total for such work in the next five years is expected to hit about \$75 million dollars.  
This emphasis on fundamental research is aimed at finding new techniques for water purification which will be tested in the federal pilot plants.

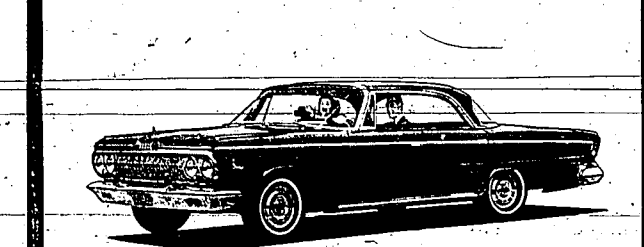

"Most scientists and engineers agree that the most effective and economical methods of saline water conversion may yet remain to be discovered and that the foundation of an effective program is continuous fundamental research."  
Among possibilities which some of the scientists and engineers believe promising are extraction as a byproduct of saline water recovery of minerals which could be combined into fertilizer.
