Recovery Teams On Guam Begin Toil in Junkyard

(See Photos on Page 13 and 34)

AGANA, Guam, Nov. 14 (AP)—Recovery teams began toiling through a rubble field today in preparation for the massive junkyard on Guam today left by Typhoon Karen, Karen, victims in the history of this strategic American outpost in the western Pacific. Most of the wreckage is still piled up on the island. Winds up to 174 miles an hour blasted the island for four hours Sunday night.

So far, 45 Guamanians have been reported dead, at least 100 other natives and military men and dependents injured and damage estimated at more than 100 million dollars.

Red Cross and civil defense officials have been set up to coordinate recovery. U. S. District Judge Paul D. Shirrer has been named as head of this effort.

Most of the wreckage is still piled up on the island.

"When we finally get to cleaning up the mess, we'll probably find more bodies," Police officials said.

Ading Gov. Manuel Guerrero said he did not know.

Most schools and businesses were closed. Many teachers were assigned to a security force to protect schools and property. School teachers and students were working with the Red Cross and other recovery groups.

Emergency hospitals have been set up. Most residents were still living in hospitals, churches and schools.

Water was in short supply and food scarce.

Freeman Sets Price Support For Farmers

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman today set the total price support rates for the 1962 farm grain crops at the same level which prevailed in 1961.

Except in the case of grain sorghum, the main sorghum, total support for 1962 is two cents per hundredweight under the 1961 rate.

The 1962 total rates established are: Corn \$1.20 per bushel, 75 per cent of the November parity price; barley, 93 cents per bushel, 73 per cent of parity; grain sorghum, \$1.91 per hundredweight, 78 per cent of parity; oats, 69 cents per bushel, 73 per cent of parity; and rye, \$1.02, 70 per cent of parity.

The total rates include payment-in-kind rates of 18 cents a bushel for corn, 14 cents per bushel for barley, and 23 cents per hundredweight for grain sorghum.

In order to be eligible to receive the total support rates for grain, hay, and grain sorghum, farmers must participate in the voluntary acreage reduction program. There is no acreage reduction program for oats and rye.

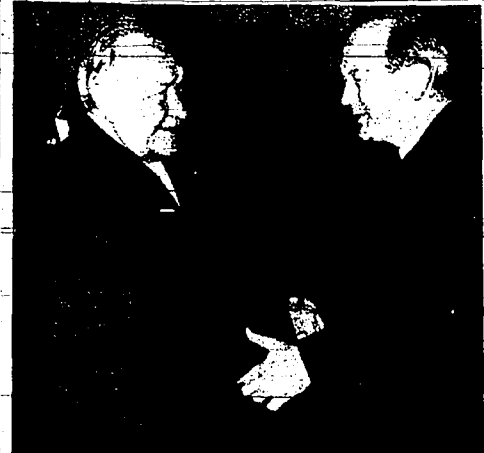

University President Asks Funds

HOUSTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—President D. H. Thropius urged the pro-educational budget committee today to approve a 25 per cent increase in state funds for the University of Idaho for the next two years.

The University of Idaho is a good university, he said, "it can do a lot more than we are doing if the youth of the state are to progress. We cannot stand still."

The Thropius proposal is \$15,000,000, of which \$13,000,000 would come from state appropriations and \$2,000,000 from federal sources, grants and local income. During the next biennium, the university has a budget of \$17,782,211 by the state, \$5,000,000 from grants, federal sources and bond proceeds.

Miller said Hiss appeared in advance of the program and called an Eisenhower aide. The Buffalo Evening News quoted Miller as saying, "I was amazed to see Hiss appear on television. He looked like a young man. I thought he was 60."

Labor Group Hits Activity By NAACP

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—A book of relations of the AFL-CIO with the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People to protest against the NAACP's labor secretary, Herbert Hill, was announced here today. The book, published by the federation's executive council, is the AFL-CIO NAACP board's response to a cooperative pact to continue to cooperate in a "no-racial discrimination" pact. Many said Hill has been making "swastika charges" of racial discrimination and has been trying to force and has been trying to force unions to practice discrimination and said it must stop. The board plan to remove any pending trials from unions and do nothing to end discrimination practiced in plants.

In the New York NAACP Executive Secretary Roy Wilkins said the national unions contribute financial support to the NAACP and that the AFL-CIO does not. He continued: "They are asking something that doesn't make sense. I am a little puzzled at the report of a break off in relations. We have always worked with the labor movement. They have recognized our primary goals, we have recognized theirs."

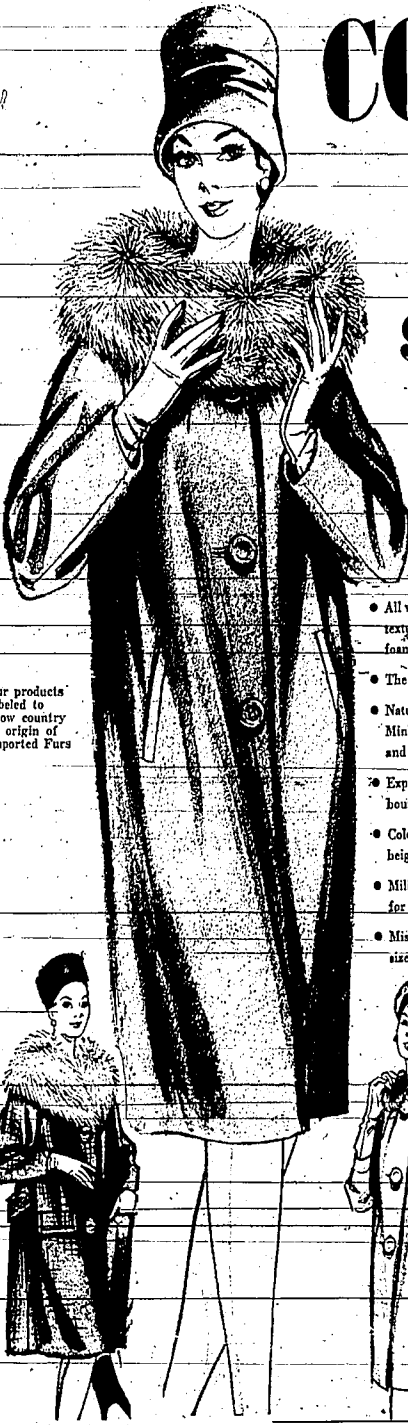

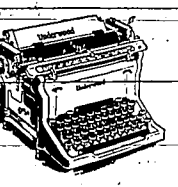

Convict May Taste Lash In Delaware

Superior Court Judge Stewart Lynch yesterday sentenced Franklin W. Cannon, Jr., to a penalty of 20 lashes on his bare back, "well laid on" under provisions of the state's 1717 lash law, the only one of its kind still in effect in the United States.

Lynch had sentenced Cannon to the lashing and three years' imprisonment last December following his conviction on grand larceny charges. But he suspended the sentence in favor of five years' probation.

Cannon violated terms of the probation last April when he was sentenced to 60 days in jail for petty larceny and receiving stolen goods.

Huge Government Deficit May Doom Tax Cut in 1963

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14—Administration officials are forecasting a federal budget deficit this year of 7.8 billion dollars. This could be the biggest, perhaps, to imperil President Kennedy's plans for a 1963 tax cut.

Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., was one of the first congress members to comment today on the official deficit estimate announced Tuesday by the budget bureau.

"Under the circumstances," he said, "it would be a serious mistake to give the President the tax cut which he indicated last summer. He will ask what congress means."

"It may have been no accident that, just prior to the deficit announcement, it was reported that the administration was going through a budget tax reduction that would take effect in several steps over a period of one to two years. Such a plan would soften the immediate impact of lower taxes."

The budget bureau said several factors were responsible for dashing its dream of keeping out of the red in the current fiscal year that began July 1. NEW YORK, Nov. 14—Political oil is just one of many problems besetting the American oil industry this year. But this one at least had better be left to the federal government.

An industry leader today says that the federal government dumped on scattered materials to clean up the mess.

And a U. S. government official says that the world arena "will" for stronger bonds between the petroleum industry and the federal government.

Boyet oil in itself could be met competitively by American companies, says L. P. McCollum, president of Continental Oil company, Houston, Tex. But

Moscow has used oil for other than economic purposes.

McCollum—chairman of the American Petroleum Institute—said in a speech before the American Petroleum Institute meeting in Chicago:

"This threat goes far beyond the oil industry. This is not just an attack on petroleum or any other single industry. It is part of a planned campaign to wreck the free enterprise system worldwide."

"More often than not, Soviet oil deals are made for political reasons rather than commercial ones," he said.

The federal official—John M. Kelly, assistant secretary of the Interior department for mineral resources—speaking today at the same meeting, stresses moves underway to prepare the oil and gas industry for meeting supply and demand requirements in an emergency. Ranking high are both "national security and eco-

Kelly says. "Once again the events of history have demonstrated the compelling need for strengthening the bonds between the petroleum industry and the federal government."

The Soviet moves which have cut companying with international operations had a stake have concentrated on offering oil at prices well below the American U. S. 80-cent a barrel. The Kremlin can get any price that falls in its political purpose without regard to cost of production—and certainly without any need to show a profit as the privately owned American firms must strive to do.

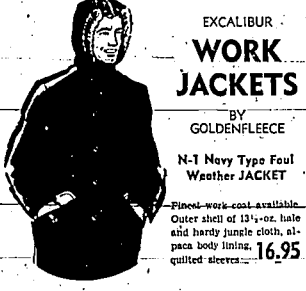

Adenauer then turned his energies to building the Christian Democratic party as a successor to the old Centre party. Most of his supporters were Roman Catholics and Protestants as well.

When he got to power in 1949, West Germany was a war-torn

"They are suspending something that doesn't exist," Wilkins said. "Frankly I'm a little puzzled at the report of a break in relations."

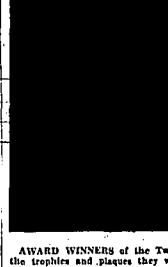

Military

Warns of Red Spies

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—The military is warning its personnel going abroad about communists spy techniques ranging from tapping the neck of a shoe to using infrared detectors to listen to conversations inside a room.

The advice is contained in briefings given service personnel, self-dependents and contractors who plan to travel in or through Sino-Soviet bloc countries or attend symposia, abroad or at home, where communist scientists—and spies—may be present.

Regulations to carry out an over-all order issued by the defense department are being distributed by the air force, navy and army.

The scope of communist espionage activity is pointed to in the air force directive. It says that the Sino-Soviet bloc nations have 27 intelligence and security services employing an estimated 300,000 trained agents.

The air force says—one may be certain that telephones in hotel rooms are tapped and that listening devices are planted in bars and restaurants, or even automobiles used by tourists.

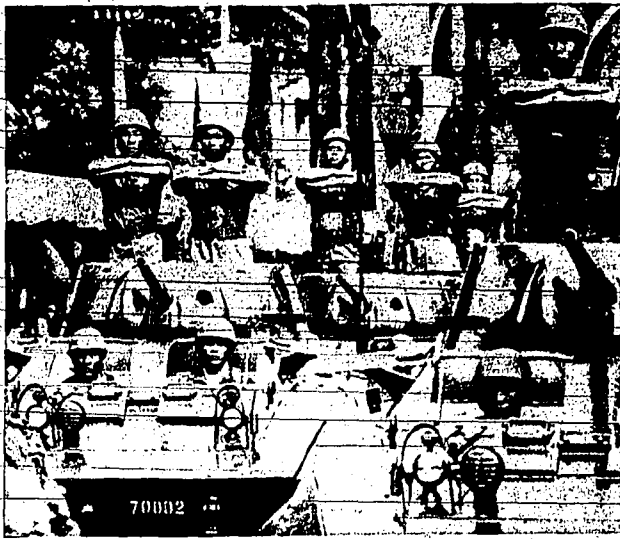

Court Stands Firm on Drug Case Ruling

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—The supreme court refused to reconsider its decision that California law requiring imprisonment of persons addicted to criminals inflicts cruel and unusual punishment.

This is the stand the ruling of the justices—declaring the law unconstitutional. The petition for reconsideration was based on a statement that the addict involved had died 13 days before his attorney appeared and 10 months before the high tribunal ruled, unaware of this development.

Justice Tom C. Clark, John M. Harlan and Potter Stewart said that while no rehearing is necessary, the court should have wiped out its judgment, which Clark said "is but a meaningless gesture in view of the addict's death."

In another decision, the court upheld the conviction of William Presser, an Ohio Teamsters union official, sentenced to eight months imprisonment for obstructing the work of the state troopers investigating subcommittee. He was accused of tearing and mutilating an invoice from a jewelry firm which—how else to get \$100 silver champagne buckets for Christmas in 1952.

This case was argued before the justices twice this year and Tuesday's decision was by a 4-4 vote. Six justices split the court upholds the lower tribunal and how the various justices vote is not disclosed. It was noted, however, that newly seated Justice Arthur J. Goldberg did not participate in the case.

Last spring's decision on the California narcotics law set off a nationwide debate on how addicts should be treated.

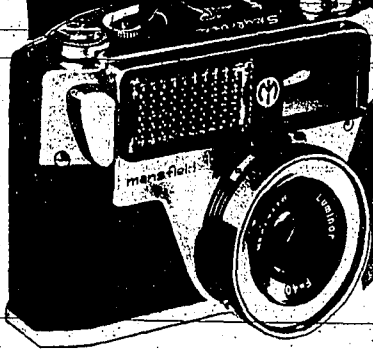
