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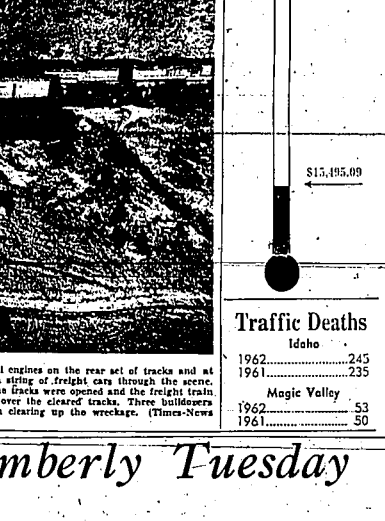

Many Events Will Open New Airport

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—Highlights on the opening of the new \$100 million dollar Dulles International Airport:

—The public will see the past as well as the present at the dedication ceremony. Pan American Airlines has on display a Ford trimotor, completely new, that once flew its routes from the carrier was known as the American Airways Eastern line. It is an old Pittsford Mail-tug in an old Pittsford Mail-tug, a biplane used in the 1920's for hauling mail.

—Dulles' runways and parking areas can support aircraft weighing up to 500,000 pounds, as heavy as current jet-type aircraft.

—The mammoth terminal building, supported by a single interior girder, is actually a huge drain that can carry 1,000 gallons of rainwater from the 25-acre roof to a storm drain leading to a 25-acre artificial lake.

—The air lines came up with the most original gimmick of the dedication day. The Atlantic City Airlines will give away one million dollars in confederate money.

—Passengers using the new terminal lounges will be protected from the weather at all times. The 100-pound "mattie" aircraft entrances, and take only six minutes to run from the terminal building to jet parking areas where they "august" up to the planes.

—The glass in the Dulles terminal building covers the equivalent of two acres, with some panes stretching a full 18 feet in length. The glass is the original estimate, but to save at least \$500,000 the Federal Aviation Agency has scrapped a plan to add a restaurant from the 14-story control tower.

—The first flight from Dulles for it will be an Eastern Electric round for Atlanta. The first transatlantic jet flight will be Pan Am's 707 flying to Los Angeles, leaving a half-hour after the Eastern plane.

Peacetime Veterans Can Now Benefit

BOISE, Nov. 17 (Special)—Idaho peacetime veterans who have suffered service-connected disabilities will benefit under terms of the peacetime vocational rehabilitation bill approved by President Kennedy.

Loyrn E. Kopan, director of the Boise veterans administration center, said today.

This bill extends to these peacetime veterans the benefits of VA's wartime vocational rehabilitation bill.

The veterans administration reports that some 12,000 peacetime veterans in the nation incur injuries each year and may be eligible for the new benefits.

The new law provides similar

vocational rehabilitation training for peacetime disabled veterans as did the original vocational rehabilitation bill.

Veterans entitled to the benefits are those who sustained service-connected disabilities while in the armed forces (a) during the period between World War II and the Korean conflict, and (b) since Feb. 1, 1955.

One difference between the original vocational rehabilitation law and the new law is that peacetime veterans with a disability rated less than 30 percent must have a "pronounced employment handicap" in order to qualify for vocational rehabilitation.

Another very important change is that there is no time limit or final date for benefits under the new law. Under the previous law benefits for most World War II veterans ended July 25, 1956, and

for most Korean veterans will end Jan. 31, 1964.

From 1943-62 the veterans administration has provided vocational rehabilitation services to 2346 disabled veterans in Idaho. Their disabilities cut across injury and disease categories from the veteran with relatively minor disabilities to the quadriplegic paraplegic or all extremities, and the veteran with very serious psychiatric history.

From this group alone, quite aside from the 41,101 Idaho veterans who took their training under the G. I. bill, have come men with many skills in a wide range of occupations, contributions to the community.

Father-Son Typesetting Duo Has Experience Record of 102 Years

A father and son combination with more than 100 years combined experience in the same profession is hard to beat—especially if both are still at it. E. A. Erickson, 76-year-old chief typesetter on the Times-News staff, and his son, E. V. Erickson, 27, are still at it.

There and moving there for the man desired to become one of the oldest active union operators in the United States. He was in Devils Lake, N. D., from 1900-1906 in quiet association with the great wave of immigration from the old Twin Falls News. It was in 1912 that he went to the Tribune in Puenteillo and then to the Salt Lake City Telegram and also the Herald Republican through 1917.

Together their total experience in the "printing game" amounts to an even 102 years with the father starting to set type by hand when he was just over 30 years old (they started working young in those days) and the son going into the "game" in 1936.

Many are the tales he has gathered through the years, but perhaps the most startling came when a printer, somewhat intoxicated, asked the foreman for the night off. Getting a refusal he went to the washroom, spread lathered soap over his lower face and in his mouth, and emerged with the indication that he was going mad. The foreman gave him the night off.

At present, both are employed at the Times-News, but on different shifts. The son, E. V., works the day shift while the older Erickson works at night. For E. A., it all started back about 1890 in the hand typesetting job on a weekly paper at Troy, Wis., a town of some 2,000 people. He stayed there until 1903 when a doctor told him he would have to give up the printing because of his health. So, for a few months, he took a job on a ranch in North Dakota and this proved to be so beneficial that in that time his weight went from 120 to 170 pounds and he felt so good that he decided it was back to the newspaper business for him and this led him to the St. Paul, Minn., paper when he worked through 1906.

It was in that year, and in that town, that he earned the right to become a union operator and joined on June 20, 1906. Meanwhile, he became operator of a paper in Garzon, N. Y., where type still was set by hand and then on Jan. 3, 1908, he went to Baker City, Ore., where he set type for the first time on machines. From then on, it was moving west.

Drop Noted in Use of Forest Camp Areas; Highway Traffic Is Normal

Compared use in that part last season compared with the Sawtooth national forest over season of 1961. This was revealed in a report issued by Jack J. Lavin, recreation staff officer, and Harry C. Ames, staff engineer, both headquartered in Twin Falls.

The report showed that highway use in the area this year during the same period of last summer showed about the same as the previous year.

Although not detailed in the report, officials are of the opinion that the situation resulted because many travelers on highway 93 were making the loop trip to the fair at Seattle and did not take time to stay overnight in Sawtooth valley although they traveled the highway through there.

Normally, they point out, a tourist going through the scenic area remains at least a day in some location and would have been counted.

The report also shows that the Redfish lake road, for instance, carried about the same number of cars in both summer seasons but that fewer people camped in the area this last season or brought trailers up.

Part of the tourist drop in June was brought about by a cold June. With trails up in July and August it nevertheless was not enough to compensate for the bad start.

In both years it was estimated that some 91,000 visits were made to the lake. The visit total does not include forest or private employees of the action who come and go during the entire season. These people are not counted in the total. Cars using the Redfish lake road averaged 299 a day during the summer season.

The count totals at Redfish show that in July of 1961 there were 43,006 people noted and in July of 1962 a total of 50,003. Annual totals were practically the same with a total of 42,142 for 1961 and 50,005 in 1962. June totals were much less, being only 40,775 in 1962.

Of the number of persons visiting the area the percentage staying for one or more days was less last summer.

The 1963 summer season is expected to set records for area visits. In getting ready for this influx much improvement work has been completed on many campsites, the two officials point out.

Much work has been done for instance, at the new Mt. Heyburn camp on Redfish lake. This includes parking spaces for trailers and tents and also boat landing facilities. This area will be ready for use next season.

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Three charter members of the St. Benedict's hospital guild at JEROME are responsible for helping to smooth the way for hundreds of children when they enter the hospital. Mrs. Marie Wolfe, Mrs. E. H. Turner and Mrs. Irene Smith have donated more than 300 hours each making the hard puppets that are given when children are admitted to the hospital. All three women are grandmothers and are all over 70 years young. Mrs. Wolfe has three children, Mrs. Turner four children and Mrs. Smith has two. These, of course, are all adults now.

They are all three proud recipients of Jerome's recently the hospital guild honored them for their outstanding record. Except for when they have been confined to bed or the hospital with illness they have never missed a sewing day. The sewing sessions usually last all day.

Sister Mary Ida, office manager said the pinkie project started in 1954. Up to now 1,000 puppets have been given to youngsters between the ages of 1 and 10.

Sister M. Ida said that when entering children for admittance they are not interested in the questions but usually keep asking "When do I get my pinkie?" If perchance the admittance clerk forgets to give the pinkie she is certain to be reminded, Sister M. Ida said.

"One who also points out that many mothers have been given the pinkie puppets to take to the youngsters in the hospital who have either died or are about to die." The pinkie is a new-found friend in a strange world for the child. It is not unusual to see a stretcher coming back from surgery with a sleeping child on it and a pinkie perched heavily as a mascot.

Though the mothers cannot accompany their children on this lone journey, pinkie can seem to comfort the child, the sisters said.

Sister M. Ida said that mothers have told them they have overheard their children saying "It's going to the hospital and get a pinkie—and get my tonsils out."

As the child is recuperating pinkie continues to be his "pal" and as the child gets well he stops the nurses from demonstrating how pinkie can wave, clap his hands and bow. When the children are ready to go home they may go without their new friend, Sister Ida said.

Often as they go out the hospital door the office staff overhears, "Did you remember pinkie?"

A daughter's interest in rock collecting has led to a lifetime hobby for J. W. Henry, OOOO-INDO. He said he became interested in rock collecting about 11 years ago when he took his daughter on several trips to look for agate.

This interest in rocks has grown to a collection of great proportions and also to his learning to cut and polish stones. Henry now has a collection of 218 spheres which he has collected from all over the world.

Included in the collection is a tiger eye from Africa, blue agate from Italy, agate from Brazil, snowflake obsidian from Utah, down to blue agate from Carey and several stones from Fairfield. Henry purchases these stones from other collectors and then cuts and polishes them himself.

All the spheres were made by Henry and were made by a machine he has built. He explained it involved 26 cuts with a lathe and a machine with cups and then polished.

Over a period of years, Henry has used over 500 pounds of carborundum grit in the polishing of stones and has a box full of worn-out cups from the machine. Since he has retired from his plumbing and heating business, Henry says he usually devotes several hours a week to his hobby, and he can't begin to estimate the value of rock collecting and cutting as a hobby, especially for retired people, such as he is.

He and his wife are both avid collectors, but Henry says she hasn't the patience to cut and polish stones. To complete polishing a stone for jewelry takes about an average of six hours, Henry explained, as he demonstrated the machine and method he uses for his work.

He has an sphere of which he is especially proud. It is a glass which came from a factory in Wyoming in early days. It seems the factory caught fire, and melted the glass, which was being made into insulators for a telephone company. Some of the glass had started to crystallize, and after the first of the glass cooled and hardened. Over a period of years it was

haunted to different parts of the country, and eventually came to the attention of rock collectors, and now it can only be bought at a premium price.

Henry purchased what he has from Bristol, S. D., and has a beautiful green color, with many

white bubble-like lines in it. Both Mrs. and Mrs. Henry are looking forward to the National Federation of Mineralogical Society meeting to be held in Twin Falls next year. This is a three-day show and attracts exhibits from all over the world.

Henry has already cut and polished several gems for this show and says without this interesting hobby he is sure time would become a burden to him.

Shoshone Church Once Served as Base For Minister Who Buried Gen. Custer

SHOSHONE, Nov. 17—In Idaho and the mountain states, Father Jennings was a Cornishman from Elliptical Hill war sent to Butte, Mont. to serve the Cornish miners. He was then transferred to southern Wyoming and served the southern as a base of operations. A rail road siding was named for another minister. An Idaho governor helped raise funds to build the church.

It has been 80 years since the Rt. Rev. James Bowen Panken, third Episcopal bishop of Idaho, consecrated the church on Nov. 10, 1902.

Members of the present congregation are planning an observance honoring the efforts of the pioneer families and minister who founded the church. The small white "candlestick" church was erected opposite the county courthouse in the summer of 1902 and the consecration took place Nov. 10. Episcopal services were first held in Shoshone in the early 1800s by the pioneer Episcopal bishop of Idaho, the Rt. Rev. Daniel Sylvester Tuttle, who traveled about the state for six months of each year holding services in all the mining and railroad camps.

In frequent services continued to be held until 1880, when the organization of a congregation began. As the territory grew, records it is hard to piece together an accurate history of this period. But by 1891, regular services were being conducted by the Rev. J. T. Osborn, who was minister of the Episcopal Church in Hallett, Kelchum, Bellevue and Millerton. Minister Osborn's clerical from other parts of the state. Father Osborn continued to minister to the spiritual needs of the congregation until the arrival in 1892 of the Venerable Samuel James Jennings, the first resident vicar.

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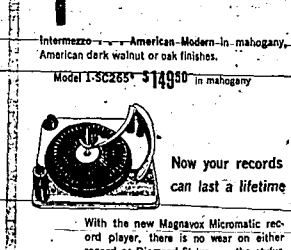

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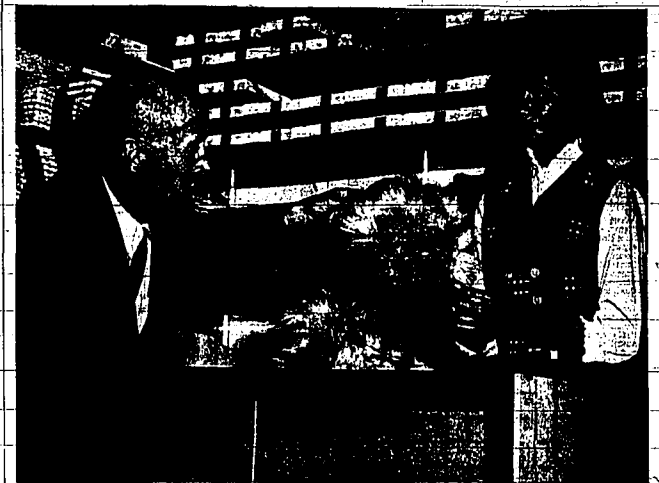

Adequacy of Blaine Schools Discussed by Guidance Head

HAILEY, Nov. 17 — Jean Mizer, guidance director for Blaine county schools, guest speaker at the Blaine County school system, Professional Women's club meeting at the IOOF hall in Bellefour, discussed the adequacy of our school system. Miss Mizer was introduced by Mrs. Johanna Povey, civic affairs chairman, who was unable to attend. Miss Mizer paid tribute to the outstanding teachers in the Blaine county school system, relating the fields in which they are especially trained and are doing tremendous jobs in teaching, but are greatly hampered because they are required to teach several other subjects in addition to the ones they are trained in. She stated the Blaine county teachers' salary scale is in the top 25 percent of the state. "However," she said in finishing, "are other considerations besides salaries which are determining factors in a teacher's decision to stay in a school system, and one of the main ones is a constructive and academic program. She stated there is no good preparation of teachers in Blaine county schools. "Our system can only be as adequate as our communities order it to be," she stated, "and unless there is an initial move for academic excellence we are not going to have it." "There is too much athletics and too little school," she stated. Our school should give the same recognition to honor athletics which would give students more of an incentive to develop their minds. "The state is developing the Blaine county schools with others of the state," she said. "We do better than the ordinary school." "The state is developing the entire community is weak in English," she would have rated top in the state for our class school of two different organizations if it had not been for English," she stated.

Inconvenient Is Tag Given To Drink Law

ALBANY, N.Y., Nov. 17 (AP) — New York's 18-year-old age limit on purchase of alcoholic beverages is merely an inconvenience, according to a report by a joint state legislative committee. Republican State Sen. John March, in releasing the report, said it showed that 50 per cent of a group of 1,133 children, between the ages of 14 and 18, in 10 communities throughout the state already were drinking in their own homes, homes of parents, cars or secluded spots. "Most remarkable, though, they seem to get into these places more often when they are cold sober than when they are drinking," the committee stated in the 26-page report.
