WASHINGTON Nov. 21 (UPI)—Through the pollsters are still debating the meaning of the recent election, the business community generally believes that it opens the door to greater economic progress than it had anticipated. But there are signs of a serious downturn in any field of business activity.

The price indexes for commodities, which peaked in August, are beginning to decline, with heavy losses in the steel industry. Justice Peeking

The unexpected twist in the Mountain Home murders case serves to emphasize that the prisoners who continue to protest their innocence also can be telling the truth. The mere fact a confessed murderer also takes the blame for the murders of a Mountain Home woman and her two children necessarily means he's telling the truth. But bizarre features of both crimes has admitted tend to lend some credence to his confession.

If investigation does verify that Theodore Thomas "Dick" had committed the crimes, a grievous mistake has been made in holding Gerald M. Anderson for the Mountain Home murders. Airman Anderson has been jailed at Mountain Home since April 11, before that date he was in the military police. After more than seven months in jail awaiting trial, an almost unbelievable development in the case would have been held for a court trial.

The question that must come to law minds is just how many times are innocent people arrested for crimes they did not commit and how many times are they convicted of crimes they did not commit? Naturally such a person can be expected to insist he did not commit the crime and to continue to maintain he is innocent. But how many prisoners who claim they are innocent are actually guilty? In many cases, no one is willing to believe them, including close friends or even relatives.

Here is a tragic loophole in serving the cause of justice. Courts go to extremes sometimes to avoid punishing an innocent person, at times even freeing those who are guilty in an effort to avoid wronging an innocent person. Yet law enforcement bodies are not necessarily bound by such technicalities. They are bound by the facts of the case. They are bound by the facts of the case.
