Dickie Charged; Two Men Now Held For Twin Murders

BOISE, Nov. 29 (AP)—Warrants charging murder were sent to sheriff's offices here today, accusing an itinerant laborer of a double slaying for which an air force airman also is in custody. The warrants were sent here by the Elmore county sheriff's office for Sheriff Theodore Thomas who already is held in jail, awaiting court action against him for another killing. Serving of the warrants will complete immediate action in the case, the Elmore county sheriff's office at Mountain Home said. Further legal procedure will result only if Dickie is cleared of the first of the three slayings with which he is charged. Civil authorities are extending the confinement of the slaying of the wife and young son of an Elmore county resident. But the air force believes the Dickie confession is false and is holding 24-year-old Altran 1st, Gerald Anderson, San Diego, for the murders. Anderson also had been charged with the murders by air force officials in nearby Elmore county, but was released Monday after seven months confinement when Dickie confessed.

Roman Catholic leaders around the world were asked to pray for his recovery. A Vatican communique said the anemia—a blood deficiency—resulted from an aggravation of symptoms of "astropathy," which the 82-year-old pontiff has been for some time under necessary medical and dietary treatment.

Education Aid to Laborer

With No Learning, Knowhow

CHICAGO, Nov. 29 (U-P)—Clarence Wallace took a wrong turn in the road of life when he was the poorest slacker in school. Wallace, who was born on a farm in the hill country of Texas, never got back to school because he became a common laborer. A heart condition at the time prevented his ability to lift himself out of his condition. Seven months ago he was relieved in Chicago. Wallace, a bachelor, dreams of learning the first two R's and then finding a job in a plant where machines provide, the muscle. Wallace is one of 252,000 persons receiving some form of public assistance in Cook county (Chicago) a number equal to the population of Dayton, O., or Tampa, Fla. A sampling of able-bodied reliefers indicated this fall that 50,000 are functionally illiterate. They read and write so poorly, if at all, that they have little chance of getting past the application blank desk of an employment office.

When machines do the work that men once did, those who are chiefly hurt are the unskilled whose manual labor isn't needed, the young and untrained who find the available new jobs beyond their experience, the middle-aged who find the skills they'd learned over the years outdated and unwanted.

Labor unions, business management and government officials have their ideas of how this problem of the 1960s is to be met.

Union leaders urge spreading the available jobs among more workers by shortening the work week, lenienting vacations, encouraging earlier retirement with pension benefits. Management counters that all of this costs money, just as much as wage scale hikes do. And they argue that with profit margins already squeezed, any higher production costs would cripple business and hold down the number of jobs rather than increase them.

Management's favorite solution is to encourage business by cutting taxes, holding down production costs, fostering profit making. This, it is argued, would mean more jobs in the long run, with everyone the gainer.

Government officials are all for boosting the growth rate of the economy. Some say more government spending would speed this, along with tax cutting to build consumer demand and

business outlay for expansion. And many officials rely on Keynes' theory that would lower both wage and price increases to keep consumer demand rising.
