CHRISTMAS GIFTS SHOULD BE SENT EARLY, OFFICIAL SAYS

Assistant Postmaster Vey Gish said Friday, "Right now is the best time to start your Christmas cards and gifts on their way. The calendar says Christmas is only a month away, but in the postoffice, it will be Christmas every day from now on."

Gish said getting into the mail a lot of headcaches can be avoided when the last Christmas mail begins.

"For example, don't take chances on mailing postpaid wrapped packages. Use sturdy corrugated mailing cartons, heavy paper cartons large and strong, and use sturdy cardboard cartons containing several gift packages should be padded to cushion the contents."

If you have articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the postoffice before attempting to mail them.

He says it's especially important to include your return address on every Christmas card envelope. Besides being socially correct, this is a big help to both you and your friends in keeping your mailing lists up-to-date.

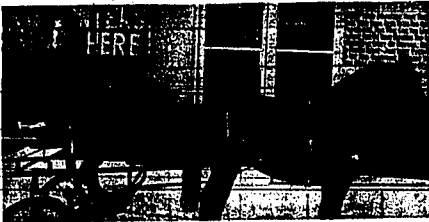

Rogerson Rancher to Note Difference In Australian Agricultural Systems

One of the highlights of the Range Society meeting Saturday afternoon at the home of Tom Callen, Rogerson rancher, Callen will report on his recent visit to Australia.

Callen spent two and one-half months "down under" traveling and talking to people interested in agriculture.

Most of Australia has a problem similar to the western United States in that it has little water. The problem is complicated by the absence of any real high mountain range to stop the water. The continent is divided into eastern and western drainage. However, Callen noted, the divide is only 200 to 400 miles in length and the southern slope. Consequently the balance of the nation is almost arid.

Considering the size of the country, the lack of water cannot be illustrated by the fact that in the western United States the majority of the winter harvested is a brush wood, said Callen.

The area of the southeast water extends from the arid section of the nation, where it is very dry, to the southern slope and then water across the bottom of the country. Most of the rivers and streams in the west central area are dry during the summer. In many spots it is sometimes years between rains, said Callen.

The study listed three reasons for the continued high death rate in farm accidents: The increasing average age of people on farms; the increasing age of people with little supervision of work and an injured person to obtain first aid promptly; and traffic on rural highways is less controlled than on urban streets.

The annual mortality from farm accidents is estimated to range from 50 to 100,000 of farm population.

Researchers found that accidents resulting in non-fatal injuries cost about a third of the farm population annually. About 18 per cent of farm people are injured severely enough to require hospitalization. About 10 per cent are permanently disabled.

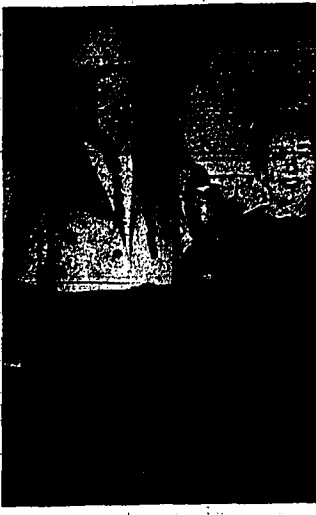

Farm Taxes Will Rise During Year

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30—Farm real estate tax levies in 1962, generally payable in 1963, are expected to rise 1.5 per cent over 1961 levies, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

The levies of 1962 are expected to increase to about \$1,409,000,000 from \$1,385,000,000 in 1961. These levies were calculated on the basis of 1961 farm real estate tax levies comprising six per cent of total production expenses.

In general, the proportion of total production expenses accounted for by farm real estate taxes has been rising since 1947. The 1961 percentage is the largest since 1947.

Three states—California, Illinois and Iowa—accounted for more than one-fourth of the taxes levied on farm real estate in 1961. These three states accounted for 33 per cent of the 1962 levies.

Taxes per acre of farm real estate in 1961 were higher than in 1960 in every state except Rhode Island, which showed a very small decrease. The greatest increase was per acre in Alaska. Six other states showed increases of more than 10 per cent.

Majors Return to One All-Star Game

NEW YORK, Nov. 30 (AP)—Major league baseball players and club owners agreed Thursday to return to one all-star game a season and it was learned the game would be played at St. Paul-Minneapolis on July 9, return to one game, rumored since during the world series, was sealed when the club owners agreed that in the future the players pension fund would receive 95 percent of all receipts, including radio and club owners' share of the game, an increase of 35 per cent.

Commissioner Fred Pick said the club owners allocated all but five per cent of their 40 per cent of the minor league fund. This fund was abolished earlier today under a minor league reorganization plan adopted in Rochester.

Pick said that the actual loss to the players would amount to about \$50,000 a year for their pension fund.

Under the two all-star game schedule, in effect since 1958, the players received an average of about \$225,000 per game for a \$450,000 total. Taking 95 per cent of the receipts for one game, Pick said, the pension fund would be reduced to about \$225,000.

"This will still be sufficient to keep the pension plan moving as planned," Pick said after a meeting of the player representatives and the club owners which he described as accompanied by the "best feeling in many years."

In other action Thursday, it was agreed that the teams finish up their season on Saturday and Sunday. The teams would be included in the spirit of world series receipts; that is, the teams would play one game before a following day game and that there would be no regularly scheduled day-night doubleheaders at which separate admissions are charged.

It was learned that the owners had rejected a players' request that the minimum salary be increased from \$1,000 to \$1,500.

Frogs Hope For Bid With SMU Victory

The Texas Christian University Frogs have more than the usual effort to win the Cotton Bowl Saturday to victory over Southern Methodist in the Cotton Bowl. The Frogs hope to win the game, rumored since during the world series, was sealed when the club owners agreed that in the future the players pension fund would receive 95 percent of all receipts, including radio and club owners' share of the game, an increase of 35 per cent.

Commissioner Fred Pick said the club owners allocated all but five per cent of their 40 per cent of the minor league fund. This fund was abolished earlier today under a minor league reorganization plan adopted in Rochester.

Pick said that the actual loss to the players would amount to about \$50,000 a year for their pension fund.

Under the two all-star game schedule, in effect since 1958, the players received an average of about \$225,000 per game for a \$450,000 total. Taking 95 per cent of the receipts for one game, Pick said, the pension fund would be reduced to about \$225,000.

"This will still be sufficient to keep the pension plan moving as planned," Pick said after a meeting of the player representatives and the club owners which he described as accompanied by the "best feeling in many years."

In other action Thursday, it was agreed that the teams finish up their season on Saturday and Sunday. The teams would be included in the spirit of world series receipts; that is, the teams would play one game before a following day game and that there would be no regularly scheduled day-night doubleheaders at which separate admissions are charged.

It was learned that the owners had rejected a players' request that the minimum salary be increased from \$1,000 to \$1,500.
