

## Mystery Of Crash Deepens

NEW YORK, Dec. 1 (AP)—Authorities puzzled today over the cause of an airplane crash that killed 25 people and destroyed a while making a fog-shrouded landing described as the type "done every day."

Twenty-five persons escaped as their lives in the flaming crash which occurred as the plane was attempting a landing without the assistance of two ground systems—that officials said were inoperative at the time.

One was a weather bureau device that measures visibility on the ground and also the radar ground system that checks on the accuracy of landing.

The plane, a Boeing 707, was on route from Charlotte, N.C. missed a runway by yards in coming in for a landing Friday night in patchy fog.

Hyman Mandelkern, air safety investigator for the civil aviation authority, said the landing was perfectly legal—it done every day.

"As far as we know, the weather conditions and the equipment available were sufficient for the approach."

One radar approach system was not working but another was operating. Radar was also used in the "four-right."

"Some passengers said the pilot had appeared dubious but he landed at Philadelphia, but he later said: 'There is a little hole. I think we can make it.'"

The four-engine, propeller-driven craft slammed to the ground and burst into flames. The aircraft was on a runway, and burst into flames. Chattered wreckage on the ground.

## Change of Seat Saved Life of Man

WASHINGTON, Conn., Dec. 1 (AP)—An airplane crash Sunday that killed two men from death in Friday night's crash of a DC-7 airliner at New York's Idlewild airport, Robert B. M. Pevic said today.

Pevic, 27, an underwriter for the Travelers Insurance company, was one of the passengers on the crash at the foot of the field. He was returning from a business trip to the east.

"When I climbed aboard the plane in Charlotte, N.C., I sat in a seat near the front of the plane at his home. But the plane was brighter in the rear than in the front."

"The poor souls in the front of the plane were the ones who got it."

"The Eastern Air Lines plane approached the field and dropped to about 50 feet. The pilot suddenly raised the engine, apparently trying to climb, he said."

"Then the plane dropped like a bomb to the ground," Pevic said.

"We bounced along violently. People couldn't get out of their seats and were hurled all over the place. Then the flames broke out from under the cockpit and spread to the rest of the plane."

## Airman's Wife Says Anderson Left Home, Returned Happily

MOUNTAIN HOME, Dec. 1 (AP)—The wife of an airman charged by the air force with the same double-slaying civil authorities say another man committed said today her husband left their home on the night of the murders. Mrs. Anderson said her husband and she were together at 9 p.m. and then returned home.

"I was real happy," she said. "We sat and watched TV all evening and talked. It was the first night in quite a while we had been home."

Therese Thomas Dickie, a laborer, has confessed to killing Mrs. Johnson and her 12-year-old son.

Mrs. Anderson confirmed reports that her husband choked her until she was unconscious last Jan. 1. She said it happened after he had been out drinking.

"I don't know he didn't deliberately try to kill me," she said. "I'm an actually quiet person normally," she added. "But he gets upset easy. Any little thing upsets him."

## O'Mahoney Dies at 78 After Illness

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1 (AP)—Joseph P. O'Mahoney, 78, died today after 25 years as Democratic senator from Wyoming, died Saturday in a hospital in Washington, D.C. after a long illness.

He was appointed to the Senate in 1933 by the Wyoming legislature.

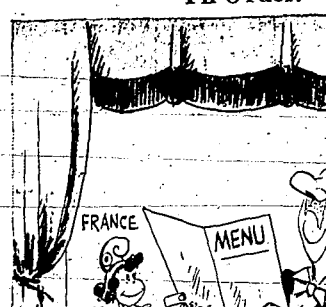

### Booming Car Sales, Boost in Steel, Brightens U. S. Arena

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—Booming automobile sales and a resurgence in production of steel brightened the business arena this week.

The brightening was helped by an unexpected surge in appliance sales, a fast start on the Christmas season and good corporate dividend signals.

All of these things tended to push the odds of a possibility of a business recession early next year.

The high volume of automobile sales gladdened and surprised analysts. Deliveries were near 225,000 in the Nov. 11-20 period, 22 per cent ahead of a year earlier and a record for the period.

Deliveries have set records in 10-day periods since the first third of October. As a result, inventories have been reduced sharply.

Production rose to a new 1962 weekly high of 1.6 million units. The steel industry's increased output of steel has helped to speed the pace of the automobile industry.

Steel mills last week operated at 95 per cent of capacity, turning out 1,644,000 tons, a gain of 3.5 per cent over the week of 1,584,000 tons.

The boom in sales of appliances and other consumer goods is expected to increase their production schedules in the next few weeks.

Refrigerators, washers and other appliances are expected to be sold ahead of the 1961 period, with sales up 40 per cent over this time a year ago.

With most areas prevailing in the winter, shoppers were jamming the stores. Merchants reported a "boom" in the sale of winter products usually so down.

In the first 10 months of this year, a sales of refrigerators, washers and other appliances were up 40 per cent over the same period last year.

The ratio of advances to declines was less heavily weighted than in the Dow Jones industrial average. Along the same lines, the S&P 500 index was up 25 points to 1,100.25.

Business news was compatible with the advance in view of the Christmas dividends, the steel output, and spiraling retail prices produced by Christmas gift buying.

International developments were also a factor in the advance, with the market continuing to delight stockholders with generous Christmas dividends.

However, it was the psychology of the market that intrigued the analysts and guided sentiment.

One group maintained that the rally of prices to sell off and consolidate suggested an impulsive national trading movement.

Another group for the bears expressed it: "Everyone is trying to recoup last spring's losses and this is the result."

The bulls retorted that the market has been going up while the bearish institution have been waiting their opportunity to sell.

As one optimist put it: "When a major change in psychology occurs, mass thinking seldom goes back to the way it was before the change. Phenomena like we have seen in the past five weeks tend to prevail rather than the opposite."

The week, the S&P 500 stock index showed a gain of 0.72, finishing at 62.25. In the Dow average, industrials were up 4.45 to 649.20, rising to 3.22 to 329.77, utilities to 0.27 to 127.27, and transportation to 0.26 to 225.52.

Trading over the five-day period netted to 27,509,210 shares, compared with 18,100,120 in the previous holiday week and 22,285,470 in the last period of 1961.

The week's most active issue was General Dynamics which climbed 7/8 of a point to 47 1/2. It was named as co-contractor for the Sperry T-12 fighter program.

It was followed by Raytheon, which rose 1/2 to 104 1/2, and Chrysler up 1/4 to 79 1/2. U. S. Steel rose 1/4 to 47 1/4 and Bethlehem up 1/4 to 31 1/2.

White movements were scattered among the blue chips but American Tobacco rose 1/4. United California 3/4 and Standard Oil of California 1/2.

The week's neglected tobacco shares were 10 1/2, notably Philip Morris with a gain of 4 and Consolidated T-12 up 1/2.

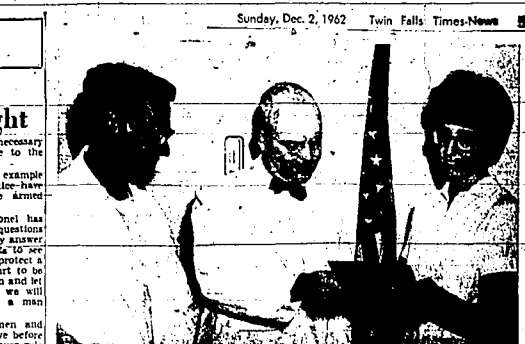

## New Armory For Rupert Is Dedicated

## California Solon Attacks Kennedy's Control of Press

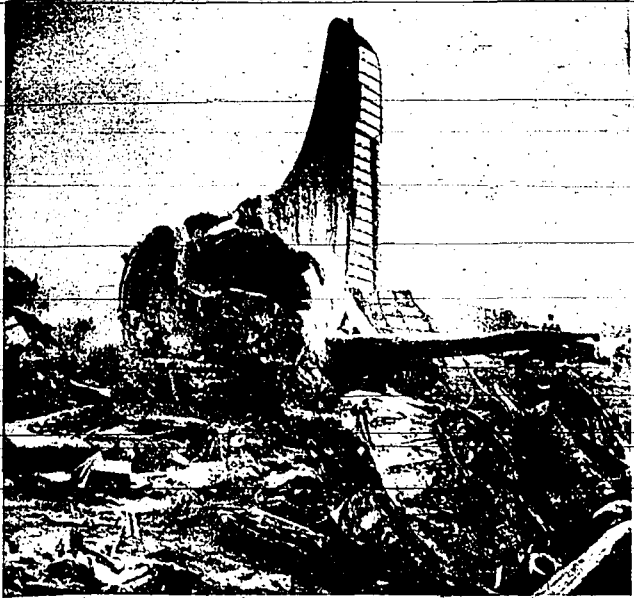

The New Idaho Education-association pamphlet, "Focus on Education in Idaho" was reviewed by Rex Hamblin, it suggests a broad base tax as a means of providing additional money for the operation of the schools. Hamblin noted that at present Idaho spends less on the education of each child than does any other western state.

He remarked that Idaho is capable of providing an education program with the second highest teacher turnover in the United States. One out of every six teachers moved on to another job at the end of the last school year.

It costs 30 cents per hour of class time to educate a child in Idaho schools, Hamblin said. In other western states the cost is about \$77 per child.

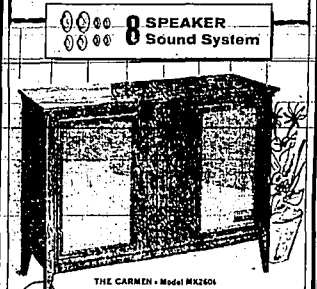

The total cost for the average sewage treatment plant will be \$225,000. The city recently received a federal grant of \$71,000 to apply against the total cost of the program.

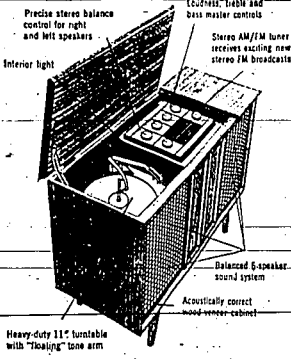

# "Bargains" On Perfume Are Exposed

A warning against opportunistic promoters who seek to capitalize on gift-giving at Christmas time by offering supposedly high priced perfumes allegedly as "bargain" prices, was heard today by William Grange, secretary-manager of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce.

Grange cited the National Better Business Bureau, with which the chamber is affiliated, as stating that a variety of ingenious schemes which have been employed during previous Christmas shopping seasons are making their appearance again and can be expected to reach a crescendo of activity during the next few weeks.

"Thus, the public gets the impression that it is purchasing expensive perfume at a very low price. Actually, cologne or toilet water being sold at a price which is exorbitant when compared to the regular retail price of the manufacturer," Grange stated.

Grange warned that these so-called "bargain" perfumes which are boldly used commercial labels of well-known brands and have fraudulently palmed off as cheap imitations are the genuine article and water have been pre-ticketed with prices ranging up to \$40 when, as far as cologne and toilet water are concerned, the products so designated have customarily sold within a price range of \$1 to \$2.

"Gift-shoppers can best protect themselves against valueless merchandise by avoiding fly-by-night operators, and by purchasing their Christmas perfume packages from retailers who are well known to them. Such dealers do not knowingly participate in these hoaxes. Christmas, or at any other time, Grange added.

## Road to Catholic Priesthood Nears End After Years of Formal Study

Tommy O'Halloran is going to be a priest.

When next spring rolls around the stocky, muscular former athlete at Twin Falls high school will be ordained in the Spokane diocese of the Roman Catholic church. Shortly after that, he will celebrate his first solemn high mass at St. Edward's church in Twin Falls.

More formally, Tommy is known as Thomas Joseph O'Halloran, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry O'Halloran, 442 Blue Lakes boulevard.

When he is ordained a priest, it will mark the culmination of school which, from the first grade in St. Edward's to now, will total 22 years—10 years in secondary work and the same number in college and special training.

When a young man decides to become a priest, is it on the spur of the moment or the result of long and searching?

With Tommy, who was born a Catholic and whose parents are Catholics, he had the thought in the back of his mind for as long as he can remember.

Perhaps many Catholic boys have the same thought, but only a relative few carry it through to the desired end. There are many reasons.

Some boys, by thought and mind, are just not cut out to be a priest. Others cannot take the long and hard study course, still others find it difficult to give up so much of what, for many, is a better world, some people call "living."

But O'Halloran said that all these doubts and obstacles were settled in due time so far as he was concerned.

Known in Twin Falls high school days as being "budd close to the ground" he received football letters three consecutive years, mostly for play at center. He lettered three times in track, running the distance. Among other things he was president of the Bruin club and a candidate for student body president.

At Carroll college in Montana he lettered three times on the varsity football team.

Along the way he dated several girls and at one time was seriously considering marriage.

In his high school days he worked summers at the Saw-Mer drugstore in Twin Falls and thought he might like to be a pharmacist.

Graduating from high school in 1953 he entered the school of pharmacy at Idaho State college, and studied for two years.

Still, in the back of his mind, he wanted to be a priest. So he stayed out of Idaho State for a semester to "think it over."

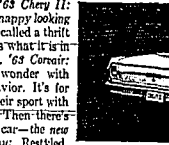

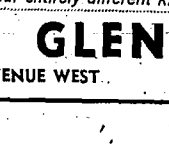

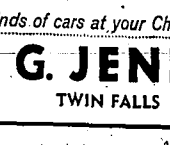

The oil boom is so terrific that city planners have talked in terms of an Arab metropolis of three million dwellers, forming the cultural and industrial center of the Middle East in a place that 25 years ago lived on the sleepy Persian gulf trade.

Producing more than 60 million barrels of petroleum products a year and owning a fifth of the world's oil reserves, Kuwait has a leading role in the Arab economy. Britain relies on this state the size of New Jersey for about 10 per cent of its oil.

### Idaho Wildlife Federation, Typical Of Sport Clubs, to Hold Annual Meet

**BOISE, Dec. 1**—The occasion of the 20th annual meeting of the Idaho Wildlife Federation in Moscow, Dec. 7-9, poses the perennial question, "Why join a sportsman's club at all?"

One answer will be obvious to everyone who attends the meeting next week-end in north Idaho. Delegates and their friends will be typical of the more than two million members of the National Wildlife Federation in Idaho.

As elsewhere, by far the majority of Idaho sportsmen belong to no club at all. Yet this group has relatively little influence on conservation programs compared to organized sportsmen. In effect, they are a group of individuals who are interested in state-wide and national conservation issues, thereby becoming less provincial about local matters and correspondingly more devoted and more powerful concerning good overall conservation legislation.

Actually, there are a great many organizations involved in outdoor recreation in one way or another. These basically are of three types: They are the organizations that represent administrators or recreation resources, those that represent the users and those that represent the manufacturers of recreation equipment.

The Association of State Foresters is one of the most effective of the national organizations that represent administrators of recreation. Organizations representing the users include the Wildlife Management Institute, the National Wildlife Federation, the Sports Fishing Institute, the National Park Association and the various wilderness, hiking and climbing clubs.

There are many others such as the American Forestry Association, the Outdoor Boating Association, the American Automobile Association. However, the great majority of camps, walkers, picnickers and skimmers on public lands have no organized voice. This is a substantial gap. Another weakness is

## West Berlin Housing Area Work Starts

By GEORGE BOULTWOOD BERLIN, Dec. 1 (AP)—The ever-optimistic West Berliners have begun a housing project that will take six years and cost 120 million dollars.

It is springing up within view of the barbed wire separating the southern border of this city from surrounding communist East Germany.

Undeterred by threats to the city's future, the planners have forged steadily ahead with the project to cost 600 acres of open space to build a new housing area in the Britis district.

It has been temporarily dubbed "Crosius Block." Architects Walter Gropius, now an American citizen, was responsible for the general plan. Gropius was one of the original thinkers at Germany's famed Bauhaus school of architecture in Weimar, it was shut down by Hitler.

He and Gropius had a big part in the postwar rebuilding of bomb-hattered Berlin.

His latest contribution four years in the planning, will consist of 14,500 homes for 60,000 people. It will have churches, nine schools, eight nurseries, three shopping areas and three subway stations.

Most of the homes will be apartments of one, two or three rooms—built for cheap rental with government funds. They are to be in buildings of three, eight and 16 stories.

Plans also provide for 23 individual homes to be sold at normal prices.

Some of the tree-lined streets will be reserved for pedestrians. A power station will provide central heating and eliminate the dirt associated with traditional coke heating.

Best architects will carry through the plan under the supervision of Gropius.

Thus Rathenberg spent several months in California and the other sections of the United States before coming to Magic Valley. Many visitors from other lands feel New York City is a difficult place to get acquainted with. Rathenberg added he likes this section of the country because it is mountainous like his native area.

"It was everything I ever imagined and more so," Rathenberg said. The immense size of the buildings amazed him. He claims he had no concept of irrigation systems until he came west. He remarked that he was amazed when he saw crops on land that was at one time barren desert, such as the new land around Hazelton and Sedley.

He pointed out that in Germany they have little or no irrigation and depend on rainfall for moisture for their crops.

Concerning farming methods, Rathenberg believes Sweden is more mechanized for agriculture than any other nation in Europe. He adds most of the farming is done on a small scale, thus most of the mechanization is on a
