Is White House Dinner Legitimate Tax Deduction?

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—President Kennedy and U.S. Sen. John F. Kennedy, embassies, are given special pay for their "official" White House dinners for dignitaries or for this year's White House dinner. This question was raised Tuesday by a St. Paul, Minn., business executive who is protesting the new law designed to curb expense account abuses.

Testifying at public hearings on the proposed rules, Henry G. Fousard, president of the St. Paul area chamber of commerce, argued that wives attending business dinners have as much right to eat on the expense account as does the first lady and other wives of American ambassadors.

They claimed the proposal would impose an impossible burden and discourage business parties at hotels, restaurants and taverns, with adverse effects on the national economy and federal revenues.

The theme was repeated today by a spokesman for the National Association of Manufacturers.

The NAFA general counsel, Lambert H. Miller, argued the proposed tax reporting provisions would "discourage a breakdown of the self-assessment tax system and curtail such business expenditures to a point of serious economic impact on many important sectors of the national economy."

Mr. Miller said the NAFA would go out with the committee, without their year-end hearings Tuesday by announcing that some of the record keeping proposals already have been discarded. He promised reconsideration of other drawings (file from 60 witnesses who asked to be heard).

U.S. Holds Anti-Castro Rebel Band

KEY WEST, Fla., Dec. 5 (AP)—Thirteen anti-Castro sympathizers sat in jail today 90 miles from Cuba charged with violating the Neutrality Act.

The 13 including two Cubans and a Canadian—were picked up early Tuesday on a tiny island in the Florida keys and accused of preparing an expedition against Cuba.

U. S. Commissioner William V. Aubrey called the thirteen, 10 of whom are American citizens, "just an adventure group that could get our country into trouble."

Miami, Fla., and held them on \$1,000 bond each.

In reply to the charges, one of the group, Henry A. Lewis, 25, of San Francisco, Calif., asked, "Does it matter who violates neutrality, the government or us?"

"We have no blame and belong to no other anti-Castro faction," said the apparent leader of the group, Gerald Patrick Truman, 26, of Los Angeles, Calif. Hearing indicated, however, he knew of other anti-Castro groups training in the keys.

Idaho Construction Program Draws Support From Solons

BOISE, Dec. 5 (AP)—The \$4 billion dollar construction program at state institutions, enacted by the 1961 legislature, was endorsed by Gov. Robert F. Schmidt as the outstanding accomplishment of that session.

Continuation of the program appears to have widespread support from the legislators who will meet on the 1963 session, which opened Jan. 7.

There are some indications, however, that the financing plan may be altered. Some have suggested use of bonds and others "direct" appropriations from the general fund.

The 1961 program set a priority schedule for construction at state institutions and estimated tax revenue to finance it. Diverted to the building fund were portions of the taxes on cigarettes and beer, all the revenue from the 10-cent tax, revenue from an excise tax and a portion of the state's profits on sale of liquor.

In the first full year of the program's operation—the estimated tax revenue amounted to more than \$2 million dollars, with about 2 million dollars of that coming from the "meat tax" revenue.

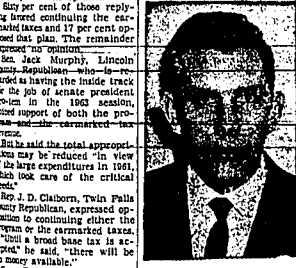

Check Points For Gifted Child-Noted

By PATRICIA McCORMACK
NEW YORK, Dec. 5 (AP)—Your child stopped sucking his thumb when he was 2.
He was tying his shoe (knots) by the time he was 3.
By the time he was 4, his finger-paintings looked like something only Picasso could produce.
The tunes he hummed sounded like Bach melodies from his aunt.
What's more, all the while, the child's been talking to the college professor. He's been saying profound things so long, you hardly remember the little space of time in which he was reduced to communicating via a-goo and other baby sounds.
You have other signs that there's a genius in the house. But you never had the fact documented. Now, then, can you be sure? And what about you, do you, too, fit the bill in a school for geniuses—or what?

First of all, don't call your bright one a genius. That term has been replaced by the term "gifted child."
The gifted also are called talented, superior, bright, able, exceptional, rapid learner, accelerated.
All of these terms are used to designate youngsters with potential for outstanding achievement.
Sometimes, such terms carry an adjective—mentally academic, artistically or mechanically.
One expert who surveyed the field found no fewer than 51 different terms used to describe children with unusual potential.

Dr. A. Henry Passow, professor of education, Teachers college, Columbia university, noted the fact in a report—"Educating the Gifted"—published by the New England School Development Council.
In answer to the question—how are the gifted identified?—Dr. Passow, in interview, identified 10 "self-identifying" processes and trying on tested means to which the child is exposed in the better school systems.
"If appropriate educational experiences are to be provided, gifted students must be identified," he said.

Such identification programs involve study and assessment of individual differences among children as factors in instructional program planning.
The tests, usually batteries of these, identify youngsters with high academic potential. The relationship between test-measured academic potential and scholastic achievement is, of course, not perfect.
But the tests do help identify a larger number of students who are in the "score ranges" from which creative scholars, writers, philosophers, historians, economists, psychologists, educators and jurists are most likely to emerge.

Such identification programs are systematic and continuous, keeping the doors open by providing periodic opportunities for youngsters to demonstrate previously unrecruited potential.
Such identification, according to Passow, isn't just to label the youngster an expert. Rather, it is for the purpose of educational planning.
"Development of individual talents," he said, "depends on many factors beyond one's potential."
Quality education program is no guarantee that the bud will flower, although the "nurturing environment" can probably reduce talent wastage.

The identification of society, culture, family and personality determines how fully prediction of giftedness becomes fact.
The educator said no single formula for the gifted applies equally well in every community.
Many different plans and program modifications have worked. For example, one school system might help its gifted students by permitting them to skip grades.
Another helps the gifted by enriching the program in each grade, permitting the talented to tackle more material in depth in each subject or in several subjects.

In the long run, what will help the gifted or guarantee that they don't get short-changed once they go to school?
Passow answered the question this way:
"Increasing the counseling staff and generally upgrading guidance provisions within the school system, to make the possibilities for meeting the special needs of the talented."
