LONDON, Dec. 7 (AP)—A south wind gently eased London's lethal smog away today, but not before the foggy fumes had been blamed for 106 deaths and put more than 1,000 persons in hospitals. Government reports said some patches of the smog were as thick as predicted most of England should have been clear about Saturday's dawn. During the morning, patches persisted in some areas of the British capital but in most places the sun peeped wanly through the haze.

CARMICHAELS, Pa., Dec. 7 (AP)—Rescue workers plodded to within some 4,000 feet today of 37 men trapped deep underground by a tremendous mine explosion. U. S. Steel corporation, which operates the Robena No. 3 mine, said a check of its records showed a 37th man missing. At first, 36 men were believed trapped. The men have not been heard from since the explosion at 1:15 p.m. Thursday. Rescue crews have been digging more than half way into the two-mile tunnel from the mine shaft after more than 22 hours of digging.

Army and Air Fore-Rapped For Policies

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (AP)—The general accounting office said yesterday it has fore-rapped the army and the navy way they could save the taxpayers about 66 million dollars a year on motor pool repairs.

The advice came in a report to congress to accelerate maintenance of service vehicles.

Citing examples ranging from a \$2,000 repair bill for an air force station wagon that could have been replaced for \$1,000 to an army sedan that had 22 en-

gine tune-ups in a six-month period. The agency said the services could cut 66 million dollars from a maintenance bill that now runs about 160 million a year for all three services.

The auditors said the average maintenance cost per vehicle amounted to \$710 for the navy. No comparable average cost was available for army vehicles, but the report said the average annual cost for commercial motor vehicles such as sedans and station wagons was \$200 for the navy, \$353 for the army and \$605 for the air force.

The agency's investigation covered military organizations responsible for maintenance of about 230,000 non-combat vehicles at a cost of about 160 million dollars a year.

"If the army and the air force operated as efficiently as the

navy does on maintenance, the report said the air force could save about 55 million dollars a year and the army about 11 million dollars.

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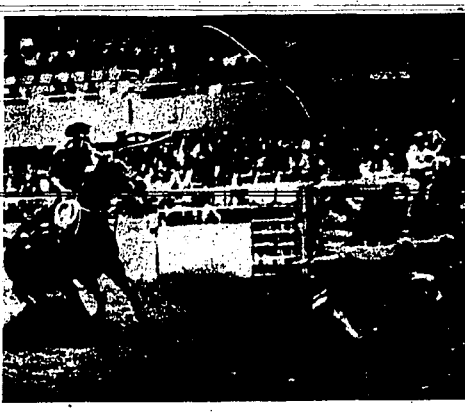

Trace Elements Can Aid Depleted Soil on Farms

CHICAGO, Dec. 7.—Five years ago one of the most respected soil scientists of the country, Dr. Herman Blair, gave the advice: "If land is getting old, check trace elements!"

Soil specialists have become increasingly concerned during recent years about the depletion of standard fertilizer elements such as phosphorus and potassium, and the concern has extended to trace elements like boron, copper, zinc, manganese, iron and molybdenum.

Dr. Horvath Deere, University of Wisconsin, reported that in central Wisconsin, corn responded to fertilizer mixtures topped with copper.

Alfalfa and other legumes are known to need copper for best results and corn needs zinc. Some other crops, oats, soybeans and sugar beets, have responded to iron, manganese and molybdenum under varying soil conditions.

In these cases it is the crops that benefit directly from the addition of the fertilizer with the trace elements and the benefits is indicated by higher yields.

Crops do not respond, so far as is known, to applications of iodine or cobalt, that are absolutely essential for farm animals. It seems that the crops need one kind of trace minerals and the animals need a different one, though crops assimilate all of the trace elements to a greater or less degree.

The point is old soils that have been farmed for many generations have become deficient. This Dr. Blair implies in his comment quoted at the beginning of this article.

Definitely the picture are the greatly stepped up yields of both grain and forage crops that have pumped up larger and larger amounts of all kinds of minerals.

Boyle explained the different kinds of loss, and chemicals necessary to kill each type, for approximately 15 cents per acre. The most problem could be eliminated in concrete tubes making it possible to run water in the canal the entire season with out turning the water out of the canal for mosting twice a year, he said.

As for the laterals, Boyle says tests will be made during the coming irrigation season to determine effectiveness and cost. If tests are satisfactory and economical these will be moosed by chemicals in 1963.

These suggestions are basic and should be used by the farmer and those who use the toxic pesticides. These suggestions include: 1. Do not use the pesticide beyond the date and place on the label. Often this is found on the back of the product.

The suggestions are no guarantee that the container will be decontaminated; they are simply suggestions.

For all empty containers of toxic pesticides, do not re-use the container. Do not use the container to store anything else.
