

# News Around Idaho

**REXBURG, Dec. 8 (AP)—**The Idaho Municipal League's proposal urging the legislature to reappropriate the highway user's tax to give cities a greater share drew criticism from some county commissioners at a meeting of area legislators, county and city officials here Friday night. The county commissioners objected to the proposal's reappropriation because it would take away some of the county's operational funds. It was pointed out that at present the formula returns 30 per cent to counties of the amount collected in the county.

**BOISE, Dec. 8 (AP)—**Mrs. Green Barrett, Boise, Idaho Republican committee woman, has been named to a committee to select the site of the 1964 Republican national convention. **BOISE, Dec. 8 (AP)—**The stepfather of a 19-year-old girl murdered here last month has been charged with reading stolen property. Robert Hovey is accused of buying \$200 worth of merchandise from two teen-agers, including furniture, a gun, a toaster and musical instruments. Hovey is free on his own recognizance.

**BOISE, Dec. 8 (AP)—**Three federal judges have been named to consider a request for an order to the Idaho legislature to reappropriate its money. In addition to U. S. District Justice Charles A. Clark and Fred M. Taylor of Boise, Judge M. Oliver Koehsich of the ninth circuit court will consider the case. Oliver Koehsich, now in San Francisco, is a former Boisean and a former third district judge.

## Volunteers Prepare Large Light Poles For Erection at High School Field

The new Twin Falls high school football stadium and track field north of the school gymnasium was a scene of busy activity Saturday morning when about 30 high school students and several Bruin Boosters prepared six large light poles for installation. Holes for the 90-foot poles were dug and crossbar sections, which will hold a total of 123 lights, were mounted on the poles and bolted down. The holes were dug by Idaho Power equipment under the supervision of Paul Bell, a power company representative.

The large, metal crossbar sections were constructed by Bell Manufacturing company, which donated time and labor, and furnished materials at cost. Digging fixtures, conduit wiring and switchboxes were obtained as surplus material from the Mountain Home air force base. The materials were used during 17 1/2 months during 1961 and 1962.

Three poles will be placed on either side of the field and another also planned for both ends of the stadium. Holes for the poles are 11 feet deep. Students were lowered into the holes to help bring out the dirt. The holes were dug by Idaho Power equipment under the supervision of Paul Bell, a power company representative.

## Cracker Jack Event Brings Lions \$650

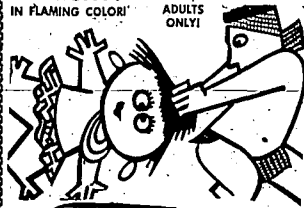

The four-tiered wedding cake, topped with a miniature bride and bridegroom, was decorated with yellow roses.

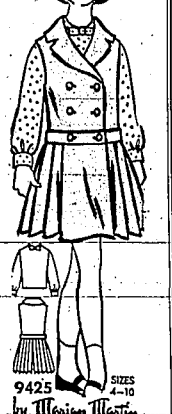

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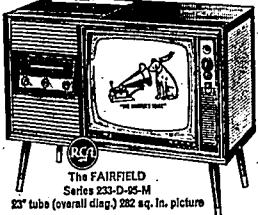
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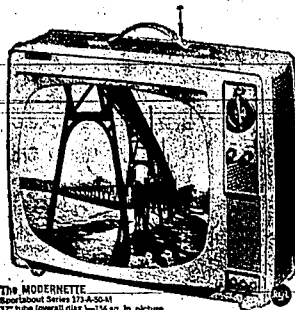

## Visiting Kipuka in Craters of Moon Like Returning 2,000 Years in Time

TWIN FALLS, Dec. 8.—Probably fewer than 50 white men had ever walked over this undeveloped Indian trail which led us from the 20th century back in about 2,000 years.

We had reached a track some 180 acres in size which escaped a structure when the most recent lava eruption, in billions of tons of hot, molten rock cascading over the area now known as Craters of the Moon. The 180-acre plot of earth we had reached was bypassed, but completely surrounded, by the lava and thus became what is known as a kipuka—land completely surrounded by lava.

Only a few days ago President Kennedy, by official action, set this particular area aside as a portion of the Craters of the Moon National monument. At the same time, it would remain undisturbed except for scientific study. It is an area which has never been grazed by domestic stock or otherwise altered by white men. Because of this, it will furnish scientists opportunities for ecological investigations to determine what constituted the natural vegetation and soil profile of the Snake river plain, and what floral and soil modifications have occurred under various types of land utilization on contiguous areas.

No such similar area exists in this monument and only a few in the entire world.

Our party, the first in after the Presidential order, included W. Vern Appling, chief ranger of the monument, who was making his first trek into the Kipuka; Frankly H. Hamby, chief park naturalist; Clarence Ford, sr., retired businessman, and this Times-News writer, Hamby, and Ford were entering the Kipuka for the first time and the trip also was my first, making me no farther as is known, the first newspaper writer-photographer ever to visit the site.

The trip from Carey led nearly 20 miles over half-frozen dirt roads, muddy in places, and sometimes deep in water.

After a drive of nearly an hour, because of the slippery condition of the road, we arrived at a point where Ranger Appling said we would park the four-wheel drive vehicle and walk.

Because of threatening weather, emergency supplies were carried as the walk was to be about a mile in length over a recent lava flow, jagged in nature and designated as type "AA."

Supposedly, we were to follow a trail, but it was only by the most strenuous stretch of the imagination that it could be designated as such.

Originally this trail, which really was not much more than a slightly disturbed path, was blazed by Indians who carefully marked it by piling several rocks on top of each other at more or less even intervals.

With the going anything but easy, although modern hiking boots were worn, everyone wondered how Indians with feet covered only by thin animal skin and ever waded the distance. But they had, and had blazed another trail out the other side

of the flow. Officials said a few arrowheads are all that have been found to prove Indians once were inside the Kipuka. There is no evidence of any large animals, such as deer or elk, ever having been killed there by the Indians, although it is believed some must have entered over the lava flow.

Coming up over a rise, the kipukas spread out before us. Actually, it was disappointing. It looked like any other pile of dirt that is covered by grass and sagebrush.

But, then, we could see that the grass was tall, even though in winter death. Many sagebrushes were taller than any of us and the dirt was soft to our feet. Soon we discovered a hole about six or seven feet deep and half that distance across. Some scientists there have been two

of three small groups which investigated the area before President Kennedy took it into the monument) had labored there. This hole caused even the least scientific among us to realize the importance of the site. There was no lava under the soil, at least not that many feet down. A mile back, where the car was parked, the soil was only inches deep.

It held the key to a study which could change the thinking of scores of scientists who heretofore had never had the opportunity to study an unspoiled area.

The area taken into the boundary of the monument totals just over 7,000 acres; with the Kipuka just about the only acreage not covered with the lava flow.

In the past, experts have been led, to believe that pedicelled plants in an area was due to overgrazing, regardless of soil type or condition. The Kipuka is dotted with pedicelled plants, although it is believed that the area never has been grazed.

Scientists first visiting the region in 1935 reported that by chance they started across the lava very near the old Indian trail and soon cut into it. The trail, they said, was faint but well marked with rocks piled one on another indicating the way. These still stand and were photographed on this trip.

In a report of the first field investigation of the Kipuka, which took place on Sept. 3, 1934, and which ultimately led to President Kennedy putting the area under park service jurisdiction, it was stated that "the value of relic areas of native grasslands for the study of grassland ecology is, of course, well recognized."

"Because grasslands are usually readily accessible for grazing

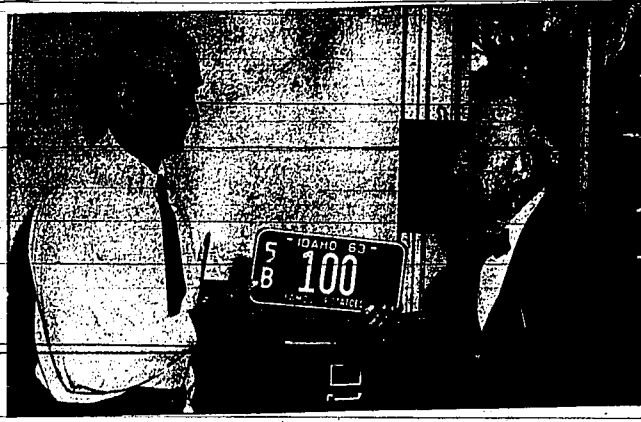

## Life in MAGIC VALLEY

As romantic as any novel is the description of the history of the Wendell library, which observed a half-century of community service this fall. The Sherrin Wendell Smith Memorial public library grew from a nucleus of leather-bound volumes donated and shipped from New York by Mrs. William Chester, mother of Sherrin M. Smith, who pioneered in the small desert settlement of Wendell back in 1909. Mr. Smith was cashier of the Wendell State bank, owned by his uncle, Fred Merrill. In the fall of 1912, accidents of the community were shocked and saddened when an accidental discharge of a gun ended his life.

Mrs. Chester met with the town officials before returning to New York and offered a shipment of books with a request that a library be started as a memorial to her son.

The first home of the gift books, as well as many other donated by civic-minded patrons was a back room of the Wendell bank (now Marlow's market). Mrs. Ralph Dillon served as librarian.

With the sale of the state bank a number of years later, the library was housed in a room of the Wendell town, now Magic Valley manor. It was moved again to the postoffice building on Avenue A a landmark that has been removed.

During the year of 1919 the city hall was erected on West Main street and the library moved there to share a room with the water office until March, 1962.

The library, then, with its meager but had original ownership and housing and was moved to a spacious basement room in the city hall with Mrs. Ben Morgan as librarian.

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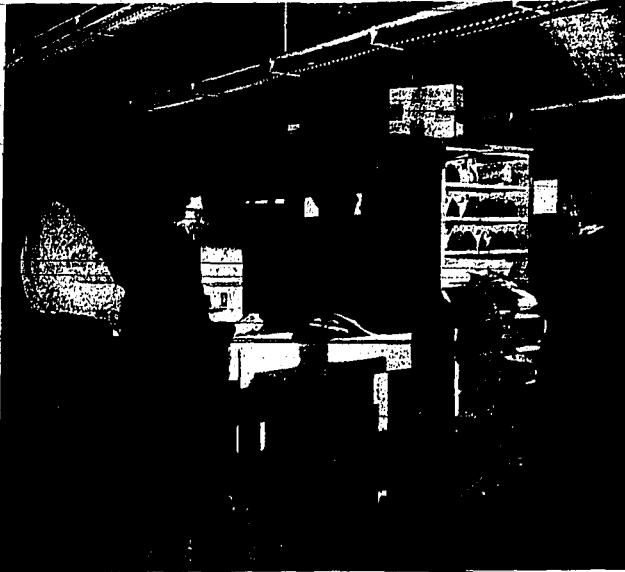

# MAGIC VALLEY PORTRAIT Doran Butler, Life-Long Resident of Bliss, Sees Great Change in Farming

BLISS, Dec. 8.—As a community resident all his life, Doran Butler feels the new era in farming is a great change from the past 20 years, that took place from the time back to the time of Christ.

Having been born in the first year of the century, he recalls trips to Gooding for supplies took two days by horse and wagon.

During his years of farming, Butler states chemicals to kill weeds and insects, weed killers, commercial fertilizers and electricity along with modern machinery, have all been added to aid the agriculturist.

Butler feels that many of the so-called progressive farmers, conservation, forest, service, grazing rights and educational aids have been tools of progress, much needed, but also feels that government controls tend to make persons less independent, and he believes the less government control the better.

Born north-west of Bliss area, one-half mile from his present home, Butler has lived in the Bliss area since his birth. Butler, his father, was born six miles from the home place and here in the Bliss area, before the railroad was built in 1882, so residents both present and past, of this community know the Butler name.

He moved from the home where he was born to Bliss, where he lived until he married and home-kept. He now resides in the Bliss area, on the home place, where he has lived for seven years ago, when he built a new home and moved to Bliss.

In his high school days, Butler was active in 4-H work, placing second in the Northwest show, and along with Bill Burkhardt and Bob Huff, composed the Northwest regional judging team, which placed first at the Pacific Northwest International livestock show at Portland, Ore.

He also received first in fitting and showing beef cattle last year. The Thomas E. Wilson award was presented to the judging team. During a 4-11 allotment course at Gooding, he met the girl who was to become his wife.

With the assistance of a Union Pacific scholarship, Butler entered the University of Idaho in 1927, where he spent three years studying in agricultural education. When the draft for World War II was eminent, Butler signed up, hoping to be allowed to finish college.

He was unable to go back to school the following fall because of draft status and so started at home to help his father, who raised purebred Aberdeen Angus horses and Aberdeen Angus beef cattle. He was not drafted and has been back to school at college since. He still hopes to finish by correspondence courses and extension courses.

While William Tamama, a foreign exchange teacher, taught foreign at Bliss, both Mr. and Mrs. Butler took evening French from him and he gained three more credit hours.

While at Moscow, Butler again met Helen Haveron, Pasco, and they were married in 1944. Having attended Bliss school for 12 years, his children are following in his steps. Butler is secretary of the Gooding county extension advisory council, a service for assisting the extension service through the county agent's office. Butler is the best cattle representative on the council.

He received his 15-year certificate from Gov. Robert E. Smylie last year as a supervisor of the Gooding county soil conservation district.

Butler is a supervisor, he and Bill Hawkes, as a farmer, won a week's trip to Phoenix as prize for the Gooding state achievement contest in soil conservation for the Gooding district, which placed first in the state.

Butler is on the Bliss school board, and has been for the past 10 years.

He has led 4-1 livestock clubs and is president of the West Bliss Grazers association. This group was instrumental in getting range fenced along Highway 20 west of Bliss.

Butler was chairman of the Bliss Citizens committee, an organization formed to work on consolidation plans for the Bliss school.

Butler is an elder in the Bliss Community Christian church and has held most of the offices of the church board.

Butler is "master of the Bliss Grange" and has held many offices in that organization, having been master before in 1931-1932.

The past five winters he has fostered cattle, but since 1946 still has a cow, he plans to still be a member of the organization, getting man down to the "grass root level."

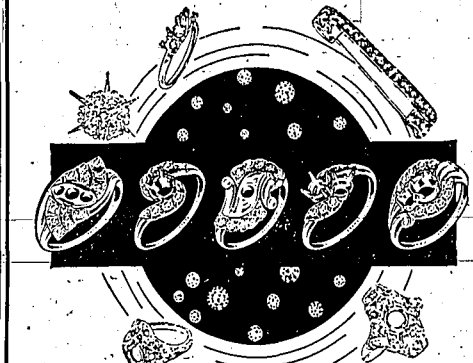

### Rainbow Trout, Potatoes From Idaho Sent Over Nation as Christmas Gifts

Two of Idaho's best known products—potatoes and rainbow trout—are gaining new popularity nationwide as the result of efforts during the Christmas season by a Twin Falls potato firm and a trout ranch near Dubois.

Shipping Idaho's famous spuds is getting to be a habit for E. M. (Ed) Harper, operator and owner of the E. S. Harper company, Inc. When his father ran the business 30 years ago in Idaho Falls, the first "gift" potatoes were shipped and the idea caught on immediately. When the Twin Falls war house and business was opened in 1932 the idea was transferred here.

With the fish ranch—the Snake River Trout Company—adjacent to the Dubois, Idaho, six miles north of Dubois—the operation has been showing continued growth since it started 10 years ago.

Declared to be the world's largest trout ranch, the firm attracts thousands of visitors throughout the year and also interested overseas foreign lands intent on producing the famous rainbow in their native lands.

The gift trout, all hand selected, are shipped via Railway Express anywhere in the continental United States. The Express company's large wired box full of clipped "wet" fish, delivery is guaranteed.

Regardless of distance shipped, the specially packed trout arrive in their large crate with the ice applied. The Express company's reputation is all along the way.

These also are packed and selected specially. They are definitely not the kind that can be bought "over the counter." Each one weighs between 10 and 12 ounces. They are wrapped in tissue or foil and then packed in specially constructed shipping cartons filled with shredded cellophane.

The boxes of potatoes in 15, 30 and 60-pound weights go into every state in the union and also such foreign countries as Switzerland, England, Italy and France in addition to Alaska and Kentucky. They are also shipped by boat or plane overseas.

The rainbows go out in a trout box of six trout or 10 trout weighing two or five pounds combined or in a special crate with the gift-tipping scale at the top. Each dressed trout is packaged in a special gift box. Each weighs about 10 ounces. The crate can be painted, decorated, bouquets or even a holiday instead of the hold fish if the trout owner desires.

The fish are packed in clear plastic bags and placed in the crate or gift box or the packing ice touch them. The box in which they are packed is large enough to hold a couple dozen gift packages because of the state mail available for clipped fish.

Shipment of potatoes does not have to be treated as accurately as shipment of fish, so far as the time element is concerned. The potatoes are packed in crates and shipped to the destination just before a week-end.

Trout shipping by the Dubois company started by popular demand and has increased each year, according to Lee Sousa, sales manager. Harper credits that shipment of choice selected potatoes was started by his father ahead of all Idaho dealers because some people in eastern markets complained that the potatoes they bought were "not big like those from Idaho."

Right now is order time for the two plants and records in each instance show that this year, as in past years, that the Idaho's rainbow trout and famed potatoes once more being shipped to every state in the union as well as some foreign lands.

### New Gem Conservation Educator Has Wrangled and Tugged Idaho Wildlife

Idaho Fish-Game Department BOISE, Dec. 8.—Devin D. Hubbard, the man just appointed to the fish and game department, replaced George Nichols as conservation educator for all of eastern Idaho, in a transfer of honor, medals and deer, if not words, now is in the throes of moving his matched team of mule and horse from Montpelier to Pocatello, where he will be headquartered.

Since the winter of 1957-58, when he worked with Conservation Offices Fred Wadell, the man, and more recently with D. O. Davis-Dale Jensen, Soda Springs, Hubbard has wrangled, tugged and released over 100 deer in southeastern Idaho. This, of course, is only part of the continuing statewide program which has produced "IDR" for some 1,600 big game animals. These include 2,800 antelope, 713 deer, 76 elk, 48 moose, 23 mountain goats and at least 20 bears.

The main reason for this work is to get a line on the migration patterns of these animals between summer and winter ranges. But much information also is gained on the life histories, diseases, animal behavior and abundance.

Hubbard is a graduate of Utah State university, class of 1953, majoring in wildlife management. His wife is the former Debra Allman of Bern. They have five children, two boys and three girls, and will relocate just north of Pocatello on a 30-acre tract.

He explains the "why" of deer trapping and tagging with an example. Back in 1957, multiple deer hunting seasons appeared desirable in parts of southeastern Idaho because some large herds of a m a j o r winter range had been over-browsing. But where were the deer during hunting season? Desirable herd management could not be achieved unless the deer could be found in all seasons.

To get the answer, traps were set up on winter-ranges near Soda Springs and St. Charles. Deer were trapped by the score, marked with ear tags and sometimes limps, then released and observed during spring, summer and fall. In this way, hunting seasons can be timed to use the herds on overworked winter ranges will be harvested the heaviest.

Hubbard says a type of trap is used for deer. The larger is similar to a two-trap. On one occasion, a two-trap buck, making a mighty leap, soared over the top of the eight-foot panels forming the walls of the trap. This type of trap caught up to 14 deer at a time. More than 60 buckskins were observed in it simultaneously but most escaped before the gate closed behind them.

The automatic trigger system for closing the corral gate is complicated but effective. A three-foot trap almost always is broken by an entering deer. This trips a moose trap which causes a release circuit and detonates a dome cap. The explosion breaks a rope, releasing the gate, and it falls into place.

Trapping and tagging big game animals often creates scenes resembling the rodeo arena. The animals must be bulldozed and attached before tags and bells are studied. Hubbard says no serious injuries to workers have occurred but scratches and torn clothing are commonplace.

Blood samples are taken from many deer and other animals to check on diseases. The smaller "covey" traps are made of steel pipe covered with nylon rope netting. They are four feet wide, four feet high and seven feet long. Anyone entering these traps occupied by an antlered buck has some misgivings. The situation often develops into a show of strength between man and beast, a rugged experience for both.

One and two-year-old bucks are the most aggressive. They charge the trapper, trying to hook him with their antlers. Hubbard says the best method is to bait the deer into retreating. It is possible—when the deer is on the opposite end of the trap—by pressing the animal down until it collapses and falls, the worker can get on with the tagging and bellings.

"Shot-cats" is used to run the traps because of deep snow. Clover traps are set out a mile or so apart over a 10 to 30 mile square. They are baited with hay and visited daily by the trappers. Usually only one deer at a time is caught in this type. On rare occasions, however, a doe is a few—on—two—acres together. Once two bucks were found.

are more mature than any seen in the present Craters of the Moon national monument area. The early proposal that the kipuka be preserved against "human" invasion for all time was made by Floyd Henderson, then monument superintendent; Adolph Mittle, biologist; E. W. Tudale, ecologist, University of Idaho; and M. A. Foerster, ecologist, Washington, D.C.

So, now, the several thousand acres of lava, with the precious 100 acres of 500, are a part of the Craters of the Moon national monument.

There is nothing of beauty about the area or the lava surrounding it. That lava looks just like all other vast lava fields. The area will never be of commercial value or will it even attract tourists.

Its value is simply scientific. Scientists may perhaps be the secret of what the snake river-plains area was really like 2,000 years ago as looked up in the soil of the kipuka.

Now they can make their studies undisturbed and in no fear of "invasion" from the outside world.

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# Robert J. (Bob) Casey Was Last of Chicago's Tribe of Marco Polos

(Editor's note—Robert J. (Bob) Casey, veteran Chicago newspaperman, war correspondent and author, died last Tuesday at 77. "A Chicago Daily News" staff member for 27 years, Casey traveled widely, wrote vividly and built reputation as one of the great newspapermen of his time. In the following dispatch, Ben Hecitt, another veteran Chicago newspaperer, sets down his recollections of Casey, a member of the "wanderers' tribe of itinerant literators.")

Bob Casey was the last of Chicago's tribe of Marco Polo wanderers. He was a reporter and writer who turned out manuscripts as well as cameramen.

The tribe of which Casey was the last died with him. It included Richard Henry Little, Fred Gibbons, Julius B. Wood, Charles Day, James H. Don Levine, John Gunther, Vincent Sheehan, Paul G. Mower, Eddie Price, Bill Cecil, Howard Wallace Smith, Gordon Billie. These globe-trotting wanderers were a varied breed, but they were one thing in common. Once out of range of a managing editor's voice, they made their own assignments. They high-tailed it for peculiar destinations, and their cover was a 50-50 mix of news.

Maybe Richard Harding Davis, who was not a wanderer, best launched our wanderers' tribe of itinerant literators. But I doubt it. Mr. Davis covered the Republican party nominating convention of 1912 in Chicago. He took his place in the Coliseum in press section, Bill Cecil, Brock and a pilot helmet. This raised classmate him from the Casey tribe.

Casey, himself, was as far removed from the Richard Harding Davis news column as could be seen or heard. He dressed like a bank teller, vest included. His talk was modest, polite and sparse. He accepted the sort of fellow who was bound to get lost if he ventured too far from the local town.

When he joined our Chicago Daily News staff in 1920 even his name added to his office sign. Irish names were a dime a dozen among the press entry. Here are a few of them—Fanning, Minnow, O'Malley, Felney, Delaney, Duffy, O'Flaherty, McElroy.

# Saudi Arabia Is Nation Of Contrasts

By WERN MCKINLEY  
JDDA, Saudi Arabia, Dec. 8 (AP) — In Saudi Arabia, a land of contrasts.

In this hot sea port, big new cars and their trailers on dusty roads. At night goats roam along the main street, under the stars of a new moon. In a shop window full of Japanese transistor radios.

Visitors in the biggest hotel dine on a veranda as the evening comes. On the ground below workers are being down for their night's sleep. A nearby coffee house gleams off the tables as beds.

Outside the town there are only desert and an occasional oasis with date palms and perhaps a few meager fields. It rains only two to six inches a year in central Arabia. The Bedouins scratch out a living with their goats or cattle and the few seeds they throw into gulches that hold the winter rains.

They are hardy people who carry guns and curved daggers. Some Western customs still shock them. At Hilton once a year a boxer dog for an automobile ride in the desert and stopped to talk to a Bedouin group.

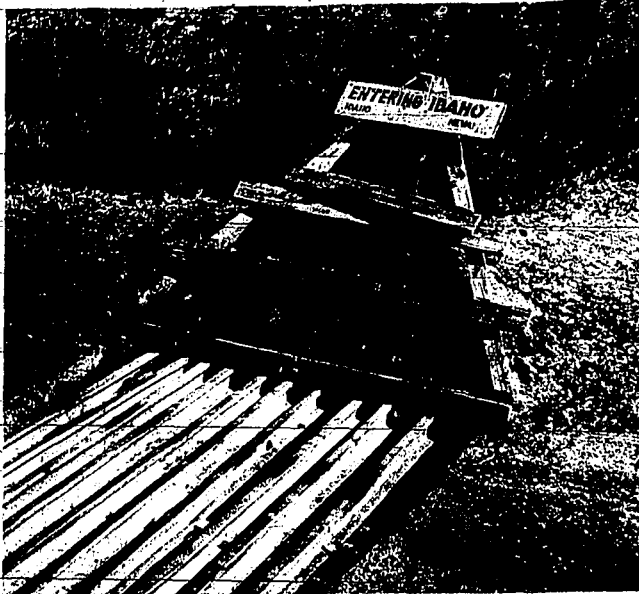
"Is that a man?" they asked, pointing to the dog's face grinning from the window. When the Britisher jokingly said "yes," the Bedouins fled in alarm.

The royal family, although under some restraint now, still lives in a combination of Oriental luxury and Western gadgetry. Its members, including all the wives, are referred to on Cadillac each a year. King Saud still has his personal jet Conquest airplane, a Conquest and two DC-3s to transport the family. A solid watch is not an unknown tip from a get young prince.

At the count there were 34 royal palaces. The one in Riyadh covers a square mile and cost 20 million dollars. It consumes most electricity than the rest of the capital (population about 200,000).

Near Haifa, a town with pristine nights, the summer palace is surrounded by villas stretching for a mile along the road where live the princes, wives, concubines, consorts and retainers. Last year when the royal family left for Riyadh, they bed up 20 Saudi Arabian airplanes for 15 days.
