The Idaho Public Utilities commission, which authorized the increase, said it will cost power users of southern Idaho about 2 million dollars per year. The higher rates will be effective as soon as the company submits a new schedule which will increase revenue by 7 1/2 per cent.

Towns Paralyzed, Highways Blocked Across Midwest

A powerful snowstorm bucked up by sub-zero cold paralyzed towns and blocked highways across a suffering electric area today. The morning storm packed a blizzard punch in Ohio. It closed schools by the thousands. Hundreds of motorists were marooned. Scores of communities called out all their resources to battle drifts which mounted as high as 30 feet.

Both the snow and cold which followed it were of record-breaking proportions. The sky blacked out over Florida and the state's rich winter vegetable crops were damaged. The temperature plunged to 20 below zero at South Bend, Ind. A record-breaking zero at Chicago. Temperatures below the zero chilled snow-strewn towns in Indiana and Michigan. A mist of deep, silver snow fell over a wide area covering most of the northern plains—the upper and mid-Midwest.

A Herreid attorney, Mrs. Gloria Renner, brought the chief's bones into the dispute. She said a group of North Dakotans would support Herreid's claim to the AGCS office if Herreid would help North Dakota relative Sitting Bull's remains.

North Dakota has contended that a South Dakota raiding party years ago stole the bones from Fort Yates, N. D., and buried them on a bluff overlooking the Missouri river at Mowbride, S. D.

Many Legislators Oppose State Probe of Hospitals

BOISE, Dec. 11—Demands for a legislative investigation of treatment of patients at state hospitals north were voted in the general election campaign.

But 50 per cent of the legislators replying to an Associated Press survey say they see no need for any such investigation. Another 23 per cent say they favor it while others had not decided or did not answer.

Verdon K. Smith, Democratic nominee for governor, issued allegations of irregularities at the hospital as a campaign issue. He based his charges on interviews he conducted with former and present employees at the hospital who said they had observed sexual promiscuity among patients and other irregularities.

The allegations aroused strong feelings on both sides. Some of the people who talked to Smith picked the hospital last month demanding an investigation.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie labeled the charges politically motivated. Dr. T. O. Carter, administrator of the State Health department, expressed complete confidence in the treatment program at the hospital.

He said any deficiencies could be traced in lack of funds and difficulty in finding properly trained personnel.

Dr. Myrick L. Pullen, director at the hospital, said he would resist if Smith were elected. Smith carried narrowly Democratic Clearwater county, but by less than 150 votes. Democratic congressional candidates carried the county by margins of nearly four to one.

The state board of health reported that it had received no complaints of improper patient care through the hospital staff. A health department rule requires that an employee report any irregularities to a superior.

Two of the employees who talked to Smith were dismissed for violating that rule.

The mental health committee of the Idaho Medical association visited the hospital Nov. 16. It is making a survey of all mental hospitals in the state, a survey that was planned before their charges about state hospital north were publicized.

Rep. Harold Sims, R. Latah, said the investigation should be conducted to "clear the charges made by Smith, before they are given an investigation."

Sen. Arthur Humphrey, D. Shoshone, was one of the legislators who said there is a need for an investigation. Another Democratic senator, R. M. Wertheil, Mountain Home, said he sees no need for it.

Some legislators seem to be concerned that a legislative investigation would lead to a possible "shoot the gun" by Rep. Tony Vaccarel, D. Ida. said there should be an investigation, but by "impartial members" of the legislature.

But Poor Politics

President Kennedy doesn't face the easiest task of carrying out his avowed program of reducing taxes early next year. In the opposition that seems to be growing, there's a question if Congress will approve his proposal. Some members of Congress have spoken out already in opposition to the plan and others are waiting until the winter of cutting taxes in the face of what is almost certain to be a whopping deficit.

The Kennedy administration advocates the income tax cut as a method of curbing economic growth and reducing unemployment. It's almost a foregone conclusion the U.S. is going to have a deficit during the next fiscal year even without reducing taxes. The amount of spending will be more than the income tax receipts for a balanced budget during the remainder of the Kennedy administration. Anyway, a balanced federal budget has been rare in the last 20 years regardless of what party was running the Washington office.

One coincidence seems to offer at least a partial explanation of why the question of tax reductions is coming up now. The next presidential election is less than two years in the making. It's almost a foregone conclusion that Kennedy's world-shaking development that couldn't be postponed any longer, President Kennedy is expected to be up for reelection.

Perhaps common sense coupled with economic and financial responsibility might indicate it's not a bad idea to do anything. Yet that's hardly the sort of action designed to endear a politician to the public.

Three-Stage Indian Aid Plan Studied

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP)—Military members of a U. S. mission that surveyed India's tribal areas reportedly have recommended a three-stage aid plan that could last for years.

Beyond emergency patchup measures to bolster the outnumbered and outgunned Indians in their border—diapota—with Communist China, the U. S. experts recommend today that the United States take steps for next year and fundamental modernization plans to continue perhaps for years ahead.

Dollar figures were kept secret, but there was informed speculation that it might cost 1 billion dollars to bring India's outcasted areas and military organization up to standard.

Emergency help totaled to India by this country so far was said by qualified sources to total nearly 15 million dollars.

Gen. Paul Adams, chief of the U. S. strike command and senior military officer of the U. S. mission that returned recently from India, was said to have listed winter clothing as the first and most pressing need for India's fighting men. Many were rushed into the mountainous north wearing light dress suitable to the heat of the lowlands.

Adams was described as deeply impressed with the caliber of the Indian troops and their officers. It was considered significant that he sources said, that the Indian soldiers who were forced to retreat before heavy Chinese attacks often brought back their weapons. This indicated they were disciplined and not routed in panic.

The immediate need to gear the Indian light weapons and gear that can be carried on a soldier's back at high altitudes and in mountainous terrain.

A seventh laureate, Soviet Prof. Lev Davidov Landau received his award for physics in a Moscow hospital, where he is recovering from injuries incurred in an automobile accident.

Steinbeck, 66-year-old author of the "Grapes of Wrath," presented his diploma, gold medal and a \$50,000 check as the winner of the Nobel prize for literature.

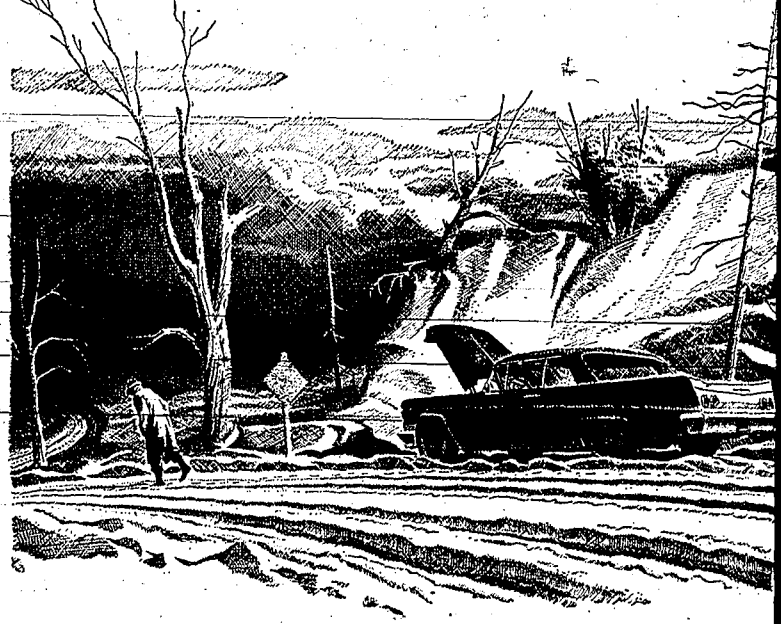
