WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 — President Kennedy's tax cut proposal, which appears to have momentum, is the first mention of a cut in the tax rate which has come to be known as the "tax cut" has been growing. Big business, small business, labor, and consumers are all clamoring for the cut. The law has grown so strong that only a few congressmen would dare to vote against any tax cut submitted by the administration.

However, in recent days, some have become serious doubters about the ability of a tax cut to stimulate the economy. It has been strong enough to still the clamor but not strong enough to still the clamor but they have made some economists uneasy about the cut.

OBJECTIONS—The biggest doubt is that the tax cut will do little to stimulate the economy. It is a matter of first spending, and that does not seem likely.

Some economists say that one politician can't win by promising more and more benefits for the voters, there is no turning back; that the gray train always picks up speed.

SIZE IS FACTOR—So far, there has been no official word on the size of the proposed cut. The House's labor management advisory committee recommended a cut of 10 billion dollars.

Walter Heller, head of the President's Council of Economic Advisors, came out in favor of a billion dollar cut in the federal income tax.

Raymond A. Sandler, who headed the same committee under President Eisenhower, was the loudest sound almost entirely in favor of a tax cut of more than \$20 billion dollars was unnecessary in view of the improvement in business activity.

Different Effort

The Red Cross blood program in Magic Valley continues to present its puzzle. The bloodmobile visited Twin Falls Monday and received 147 pints of blood, 47 more than its quota. The very next day, the bloodmobile was set up in Gooding but failed by 23 pints to reach the 125-pint goal.

It's true that Buhl's population exceeds that of Gooding by 200 or 300, but Gooding should be able to get 125 pints among a population of more than 2,700 to donate a pint of blood each. Here's the same problem that stymied Twin Falls for a long time. Twin Falls made an attempt to raise the quota the bloodmobile stopped here, until in desperation someone hit upon the idea of giving turkeys to blood donors. The plan worked, but many of those associated with the program were not quite a gimmick to get donors to turn out.

Since then, Twin Falls has managed to exceed its quota—several times—without a "something for nothing" appeal. There's every indication the answer holds true to better blood, better publicity use of the telephone, better publicity and perhaps an increasing awareness on the part of potential donors of the importance of the blood program.

Although it's tempting to put the finger on one phase of the campaign in an event of failure, analysts usually mention that failure is attributed to several things. If all factors are working smoothly, then there's little doubt about the outcome.

Above all, it has been demonstrated most donors are quite willing to give a pint of blood, but are reminded repeatedly of the hours, date and location of blood drawings. If no one has the time or inclination to take care of the reminders, it's difficult to achieve a quota.

By watching results when the bloodmobile visits a community, those who are associated with the program can get an inkling of difficulty. In Twin Falls, for instance, the turnout has been blood for each of the last two visits of the bloodmobile. If nothing in Twin Falls can expect to raise its quota again the next time the bloodmobile stops here.

Above all, it has been shown quite effectively that the blood program will not operate itself. It requires continued efforts on the part of all concerned.

Forestry Research Is Reviewed

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 17 (AP)— A 10-day forestry program is under review by federal officials and it adopted a new plan for Thursday morning.

The program is in all parts of the country, Edward P. Cliff, chief of the U.S. Forest Service, said today.

Speaking before the 33rd annual Western Forestry conference, said the program would include federal research and funds needed to "understand all forestry aspects on other public and private lands."

He said the program would provide for stepped-up research on timber, water, wildlife habitat and recreation, and aimed at protection of resources against fire, insects and disease, engineering aspects of forest management and timber harvesting, forest products utilization and marketing, and forest resource economics, including forest surveys.

In biological control, Cliff said, foresters are beginning to control insects through the medium of their own diseases and predators but "more knowledge is needed to make this medium effective."

Borneo Revolt Collapsing As British Continue Attack

LABUAN, Brunel, Dec. 12 (AP)— The North Borneo uprising appeared to be on the verge of collapse today as British troops mounted coordinated attacks on centers of rebel strength.

The British announced the recapture of a holdout center in the oil town of Seria, and claimed three other rebel-held towns were taken.

In taking the town's jail a pocket of 45 men who had been held hostage there for four days.

"It was reported one American—his name was given as Harold Elgin of Winalahche, Washington, was wounded. He had been used as a human shield by a group of rebels when they attempted to take Penang police barracks nearby on Saturday and had been held hostage since."

The British command said Labuan and Limbang in the adjoining colony of Sarawak also were recaptured. Reports from Sarawak said the fight for Limbang was continuing with the rebels still in control of about half of the town.

The British also announced the regaining of Kuala Belait, another oil center south of Seria.

Boston Gets FBI Expert For Probe

BOSTON, Dec. 17 (AP)— The FBI sent an expert here today to help police in an all-out drive to capture the "phantom stranger" who has slain seven women since last June.

Police Commissioner Edmund L. McNamara, a former FBI agent, disclosed last night that Walter McLaughlin will conduct a week-long course for detectives on the solution of the crimes.

Five of the seven victims had been sexually assaulted, police said.

"McLaughlin" is "without a doubt one of the country's greatest authorities on the subject," he was able to get him for Boston because of the seriousness of our strangulation wave," McNamara said.

Still being questioned was the 25-year-old son of a Cambridge minister.

But Lieut. Det. Edward Sherry said last night the suspect appeared to have had nothing to do with the strangulation death of Sophie Clark, 19, in her Back Bay apartment last Wednesday. Then Englewood, N.J., native was the latest victim.

French President Will Ask Ballot In Assembly

PARIS, Dec. 12 (AP)— President Charles de Gaulle's government authorized Premier Georges Pompidou today to ask the existence in a confidence vote of the National Assembly tomorrow.

Pompidou will read a statement outlining his government program to the assembly tomorrow afternoon. The statement will be followed by a debate and vote.

An announcement following a two-hour cabinet meeting under De Gaulle's chairmanship this morning said the government authorized Pompidou to state his government's existence on the confidence vote.

However, the government's life was not in danger. Pompidou commands considerably more than an absolute majority of the new pro-Ouallit assembly following a De Gaulle landslide victory in the November parliamentary general elections.

3 Proposals Are Given to School Board

JEROME, Dec. 12 (Sup.) Earl Shaffer made three recommendations to the Jerome school board Monday, but members tabled the recommendations until the January meeting.

The first recommendation was to give the superintendent the privilege of transferring pupils to other schools when necessary because of too large or too small a class.

The board approved the bus going to the farm in bad weather, temporarily. The bus will have to back out after picking up children.

Board members discussed the Unified Education council recommendations to the legislature. Shaffer also explained the financial situation to the board concerning proposed state aid.

Shaffer announced a meeting of all trustees, school personnel and interested citizens which will be held at 8 p.m. Wednesday at the Twin Falls junior high school auditorium. A discussion will be held on the required amount of money for the department of education.

The board approved a three-day leave per teacher for preparation at a loss of only half salary, effective next year.

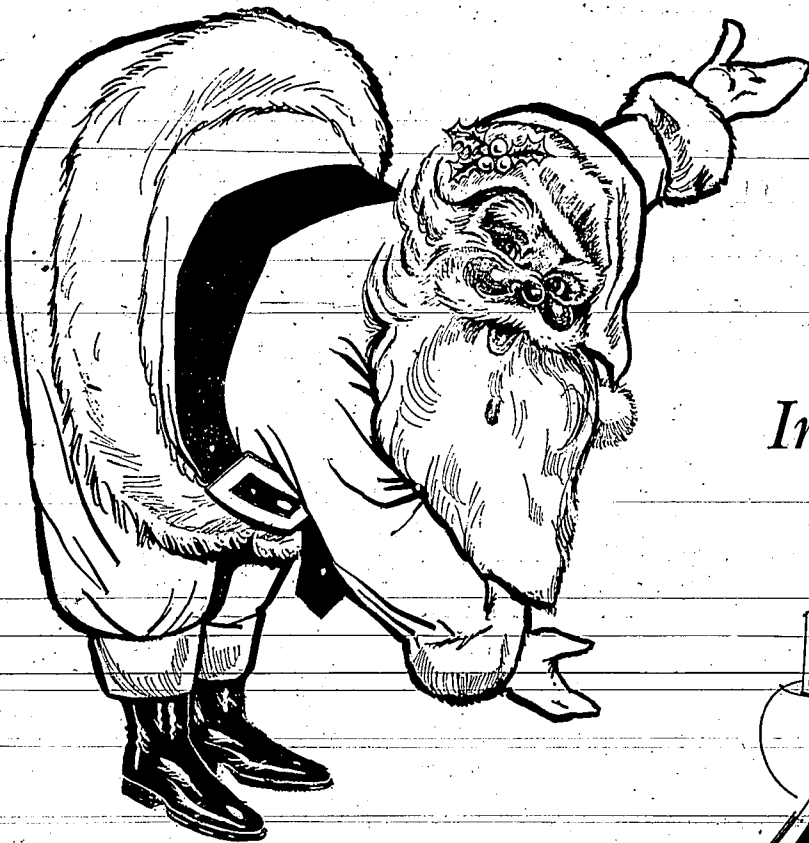

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 12 (AP)—Pope John XXIII spoke calmly today of his illness and said he might die in a year or two, but he said he was "not there will be another."

Still a bit pale, the 76-year-old Roman Catholic ruler seemed cheerful at his first general audience since becoming seriously ill Nov. 27.

His mood spread to the 1,000 persons admitted to the audience in the Sistine hall of the Vatican. They laughed as he spoke of his health and age.

It was not his first appearance in public since a severe disorder and anemia forced him to curtail his activities. He attended the last sessions of the first phase of the Roman Catholic council. He also participated in confirmation ceremonies on Sunday.

Need for New Fighter Is Stressed

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Dec. 12 (AP)—The United States must develop a new long-range fighter plane if it is to meet the threat from "hunted" bombers in the foreseeable future, Gen. John K. Guibart, commander in chief of the North American air defense command said yesterday.

Guibart told a group of touring newspaper correspondents that America's latest fighters, such as the F-105 and F-106, were "not enough now, but not for the future."

"We must have longer range and more speed in our fighters as soon as possible," he said.

"We need a new fighter which will have the high speed and altitude that can seek out at great distances and intercept and kill attacking bombers before they can strike the North American continent."

Guibart stressed the necessity for development of a new jet-propelled fighter "unless the enemy (in the future) is going to have a complete free ride with his high speed bombers."



WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (UPI)—Sen. Harry F. Byrd, D., Va., predicted today congress will turn down President Kennedy's proposed 1963 tax cut unless it is accompanied by a promised reduction in spending.

Byrd, who holds the senate's finance committee, said in an interview he is opposed to "tax reductions out of borrowed money"—an objective he said the administration has spelled out by contending that spending cannot be reduced at this time.

In this connection, the Virginia senator predicted the federal deficit will run nearer 10 billion dollars in the current fiscal year than the administra-

tion's most recent 1.7-billion-dollar estimate.

"If congress could be assured of a clear cut reduction in expenditures, I believe it would vote a clear cut rejection in taxes," Byrd said. "But I don't believe congress is going to be so irresponsible as to reduce taxes in the face of a tremendous deficit."

Byrd said he supports the position of Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D., Ark., of the house ways and means committee that there is no economic justification at this time for reducing taxes effective Jan. 1, 1963, as Kennedy has suggested.

Sen. Frank Carlson, R., Kans., a member of Byrd's committee, said Thursday there should be no tax cuts unless there are accompanying savings in expenditures. This was the position taken by members of the Republican national committee at a meeting here last week.

Byrd expects to expand on his opposition to immediate tax reductions in a speech Thursday night to the National Industrial Conference board in New York. Kennedy will speak before the same group Friday night.

Chemical Explosion Is Touched Off

LAS VEGAS, Nev. Dec. 12 (AP)—The atomic energy commission announced today that the third in a series of chemical high explosive detonations was touched off Tuesday at the Nevada test site.

The original series was stopped because the results were not satisfactory.

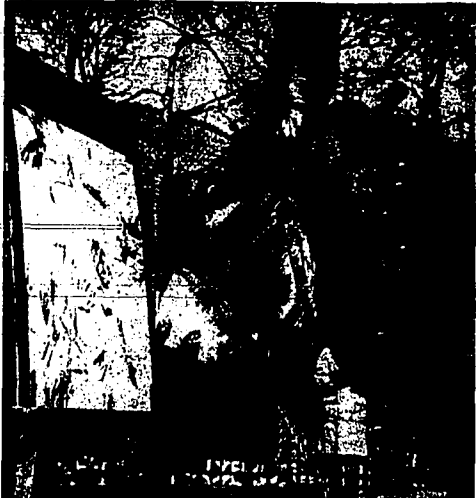
The first detonation in the series was Wednesday, Dec. 10, and the second Monday, Dec. 11.

The series involves firing six 100-pound chemical explosive, designed to obtain information for use in the Phoenix program for the development of nuclear explosives.

In three final experiments, set for next week, five 1,000-pound charges buried in a row will be fired simultaneously.

A short-lived radioactive tracer in each charge indicates the production and release of radioactivity from nuclear explosions.

The experiments will also provide information as to how deep buried charges should be buried in earth-moving projects to obtain maximum throwout and minimum radioactivity.

Plan to Cut Air Pollution Is Proposed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—A Johns Hopkins engineer suggested Tuesday reducing air pollution by replacing big gasoline and diesel-powered vehicles with electric-powered ones.

The engineer, Abel Wolman, also proposed a study to determine whether individual family autos burning gasoline should be restricted from congested urban areas. All travel in such areas might be limited to mass transit, he said.

Wolman, addressing the National Conference on Air Pollution, reserved judgment on whether such ideas are feasible or desirable.

In discussing atmospheric poisoning by motor vehicles, he said the present trend is toward increasing the number of adding devices to existing equipment and mechanisms in order to reduce contaminants. However, soon will be taken into consideration by traffic engineers to alternative sources of power.

"Some suggestions have already been made that battery-driven vehicles of improved design and efficiency might well replace the urban freight and mass passenger vehicles of common use," he said.

He suggested that traffic managers of Los Angeles, New York City, Washington, Baltimore and Chicago and other urban areas should attend an air pollution conference.

"They can be excellent contributors to either increased or reduced pollution, depending upon their solution to the whole traffic problem of highly urbanized areas," he said.

HILL, Mich., Dec. 12 (AP)—Think your weather is cold? Well, it may just have been colder in Hill Tuesday. There were snow drifts three feet deep in Angie's pass in Batan's hills.

Thermometers stood at well below 10 degrees above zero in Hill at noon, up some 10 degrees from the overnight low.

Hill has a wintertime population of 80. It is in a summer resort area about 5 miles northwest of Ann Arbor, has a chamber of commerce and is listed on Michigan's official highway maps. Batan's hills are in the adjoining countryside.

Metal Grain Bin Split by Freeze

ELMONT, Kans., Dec. 12 (AP)—A large metal grain storage bin burst in rigid weather early Tuesday, spilling 900,000 bushels of wheat.

The wheat, which covered a main house, various pieces of equipment and a railroad siding, was valued at \$2,023,000 by Art Pfeiffer, manager-of-the-grain company.

The loss to the storage bin itself, the main house and equipment was estimated at \$100,000.

Officials said the round metal building contracted overnight during a sharp drop in temperature and burst under the pressure of the wheat.

At noon last Friday the instrumented satellite is scheduled to appear past cloud-encrusted Venus. It will report back the planet's temperature, surface, measurements and, if possible, information on surface deviations.

"The information will be generated in nature, we expect," Pickering told a news conference.

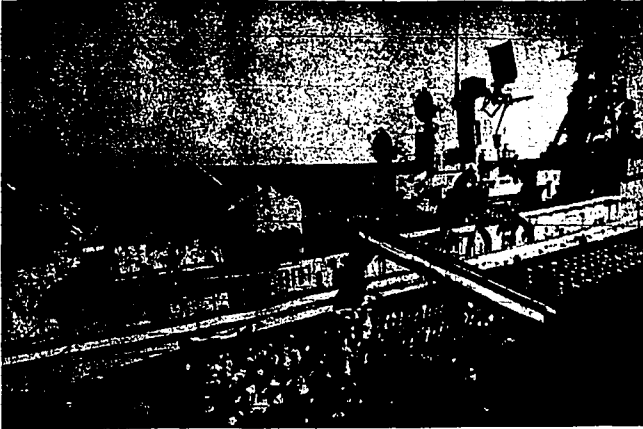
Franklin, 47, is chairman of the department of history at the department of New York, and a Pitt professor at Cambridge in England. He is a member of many books, including a history of American Negroes.

Court Ruling On Lashing Is Sought

DOVER, Del., Dec. 12 (AP)—Delaware's supreme court will be asked to decide whether Franklin W. Cannon, Jr., 20, shall be whipped as a criminal.

This was agreed upon Tuesday at a conference attended by Judge Stewart Lynch, who imposed the sentence; Harold Schmittner, one of Cannon's attorneys; Deputy State Atty. Gen. F. Norman Vessay, and Howard M. Hendeman, representing the American Civil Liberties union.

Delaware is the only state permitting the whipping of criminals. No such sentence has been carried out for years and Lynch has "set" a date for execution of Cannon's sentence.

By seeking a ruling from the state supreme court, Lynch told newsmen after the conference, a prompt ruling will be obtained on constitutional questions raised after the sentence.

Cannon, who had a record of juvenile arrests, originally was sentenced to 20 lashes by Lynch for automobile theft. This sentence was suspended and he was placed on probation. He was arrested a few months later and charged with theft. It was after this arrest that Lynch reimposed the whipping sentence.
