

Shivers Stab Dixie With Record Low

A tremendous mass of polar air dropped damagingly over the southernmost quarter of the country today, plunging temperatures below zero or slightly above in the heart of Dixie. Mother nature's turnabout produced these readings: Mt. Mitchell, N.C., -10; Crossville, Tenn., -18; London, Ky., -7; Nashville, Tenn., -18; Bowling Green, Ky., -7; Asheville, N.C., -6; Louisville, Ky., -3; La Grange, Ga., -1; Atlanta, Ga., and Birmingham, Ala., -1; Roanoke, Va., and Charlotte, N.C., -2; Raleigh, N.C., -4; Mason, Ga., and Montgomery, Ala., -3; Jackson, Miss., -1; Memphis, Tenn., -1; Savannah, Ga., -2; Mobile, Ala., and Wilmington, N.C., 0.

In Florida, snow and sleet fell and temperatures dropped to the lowest point of the century and drizzle-killing snow to the state's lush orange groves and sugarcane fields.

Tallahassee had 10, Apalachicola 12, Gainesville and Jacksonville 15, Tampa 18, West Palm Beach 33 and Miami 25.

The loss to winter vegetables and other crops is estimated at millions of dollars. In the state's citrus belt—there are 600,000 acres of citrus groves in Florida and oranges in Florida—it is said the crop would be "drastically" reduced.

Deaths attributed to the Northeast snowstorm and bitter cold were reported in the Northeast beyond 100. Damage to property was almost incalculable.

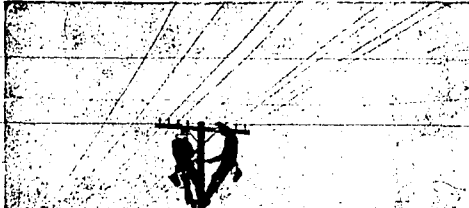

14 Men Fall From Roof; Five Killed

HILLSBORO, Ore., Dec. 13 (AP)—Fourteen men plummeted 60 feet to the ground in the collapse of a newly completed reservoir roof Wednesday night. Five of them were killed.

"I felt a blast of air and the only man who was still on the roof after the collapse."

"I looked and saw chunks of concrete flying into the air."

There was no noise from anything that I could remember.

People on the ground said there was a hell of a noise, but all I remember was a school, and there it was on the bottom, a big mass of concrete and timbers," said the man, J. Duane Cox, a city building inspector.

Newspaper Strike Talks Are Delayed

NEW YORK, Dec. 13 (AP)—Negotiations in this city's newspaper strike have been called off until next week by federal mediators in the face of a solid deadlock that caused one negotiator to comment: "We are in a state of war."

The action late Wednesday meant that eight million persons would have to do without their daily newspaper for at least five more days. Also, it would mean that hundreds of thousands that depend on the papers to advertise their wares in a critical Christmas shopping season.

The strike of printers represented by Local 6 of the International Typographical union is already in its sixth day. Nearly 20,000 employees of the papers have been laid off.

Director William E. Simkin of the Federal mediation and conciliation service said after the talks were resumed that he would return to Washington and would remain there subject to call.

Federal mediators said "the papers and the Publishers' Association of New York were almost too far apart for productive negotiation."

Both publishers' Chairman Amory H. Howard and the Publishers' Association president, Britram A. Power, seemed to agree.

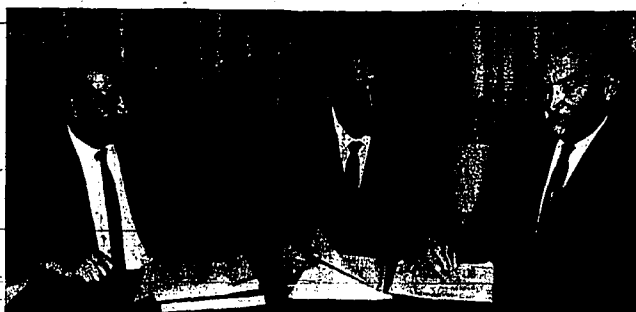

Jury Holds Decision in Murder Case

BEAUMONT, Tex., Dec. 13 (AP)—An eight-man jury today deliberated the fate of John Mark Herrin, 30, of Odessa, charged with the "murder" of a 17-year-old woman.

The jury held its last night in March, 1961.

The jury had spent the last night in March, 1961, and the evidence and took over the evidence before it returned a verdict. Judge Owen Lord recessed the trial until today.

The jury is called for the death penalty. However, no state attorney has asked that a death sentence be returned.

The state told the jury that Herrin was sane. Judge Lord then made his charge to the jury.

Beet Sugar Areas Won't Meet Quota

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—The agriculture department said Wednesday the domestic beet sugar area will fall to supply 50,000 tons of the 1962 sugar quota for continental United States and that Mexico will fail to meet its quota by 40,000 tons.

The department also re-evaluated these sugar deficits—100,000 tons to the United States and 70,000 tons to Western Hemisphere countries as a group.

The sugar market reached the United States before the end of the year, the department said, and the termination of the deficits and the restoration of quotas made no change in the overall marketing of 10 million tons of sugar for 1962.

Coach Travel On Airlines Increasing

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—Cow traffic is continuing its domination of the domestic air travel market, the Air Transport Statistics Board reported yesterday.

Cowhairs accounted for 20 percent of total revenue passenger miles in November and for the first 11 months of 1962.

In November 1961, cowhairs accounted for 21.5 percent of the first 11 months of last year.

The board also reported that the percentage of available seats occupied by paying passengers in November was 51.5 percent, up from the same month of 1961 to 49.5 percent. The overall load factor for major airlines in November was 53.5 percent, compared to 52.5 percent a year ago.

The load factor dip came despite a decline in available seats from 22.3 billion compared with 21.5 billion in the first 11 months of last year.

\$55,525 Auto Damage Suit Filed in T. F.

Mrs. Geneva Baird, 503 Fairway drive, has filed a \$55,525 lawsuit in Twin Falls county clerk's office against John B. Kleckner, 59 E. D. and 4th Ave., charging him with driving in a "dangerous and reckless" manner and negligent manner.

The suit results from a three-car accident which occurred June 19, 1962, at the intersection of highway 30 and a side road to Blaine, just before the intersection.

The petition claims that as a result of the accident Mrs. Baird was "temporarily" rendered unconscious around the inside of her car and was knocked unconscious. She said she sustained a severe brain injury, impairment of vision and other permanent injuries.

She asks \$50,000 general damages, \$1,000 medical damages, and \$325 for damages to auto not covered by insurance. Her car was damaged and the petition said although she had collision insurance, counting the deductible provided and loss value, she asks \$233 damages.

Mrs. Baird remained in a conscious state for about two weeks after the accident, she was driver of a 1961 Falcon which was hit from the rear by a 1961 Cadillac driven by Kleckner, whose car apparently struck her before crashing into Mrs. Baird's vehicle.

"The motion man around and hit the rear of a 1959 Ford driven by Carol Trenchell, 16 Main, who had damaged her car in the accident," the petition says. Mrs. Baird's vehicle tipped onto its side.

Kleckner was cited by state patrolmen for following closely and for failing to keep his car under control.

Intercept by Nike Zeus Is Successful

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—A Nike Zeus sprang to within 100 miles of an Atlas intercontinental ballistic missile Wednesday in mid-Pacific in the second of two Zeus interceptions of the missile.

The Pentagon announcement described the firing of the Atlas as a training exercise for the crew at Vandenberg.

"The Nike Zeus, under development since 1957, is a complex device the army has been striving to perfect as the nation's key defense against nuclear attack. But the careful wording of the defense department announcement indicated Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara still has strong doubts that the missile is promising enough to warrant ordering production.

A strategic air command group fired the Atlas from Vandenberg air force base on the California coast. As it sped westward at 10,000 miles an hour a pair of two Zeus missiles was fired from Kwajalein island in mid-Pacific.

One of the antimissile missiles was destroyed automatically by a technical defect in its second stage.

But, as the Atlas soared 5,000 miles from Vandenberg, the other Zeus missile—armed with a very solid warhead—was fired. The missile was destroyed by a technical defect in its second stage.

CAB Blames Mechanics For Crash

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—The civil aeronautics board today blamed the 1961 crash of a Northwest Airlines Electra at Chicago's O'Hare airport, in which all 27 aboard died, on improper installation of a vital control part by mechanics.

The big propeller crashed shortly after taking off when the airman in the left wing (airborne control turns a 90° turn. The plane, flight 706 to Miami with 23 passengers and a crew of five, continued in its gradual increase in bank until it hit the ground and exploded.

The CAB said its investigation determined that Northwest mechanics, in replacing the hydraulic boost system that moves the ailerons like power steering on an automobile, left two cable connectors—manufactured and unscrewed. When the new unit was installed about two months before the Sept. 17 crash, mechanics failed to tighten and reseat the connectors and the cables gradually worked loose and failed.

"They want it (disarmament) because they think it would be to their advantage," Mason Willich of Washington, D. C., told the second plenary session of the eighth student conference on nuclear disarmament at Texas A. and M. college.

"We are haggling about the price," he said. "The price is simply too steep."

Willich, 29, was a U. S. delegate to the 18-nation conference on disarmament in Geneva, Switzerland in 1961. He is a legal adviser to the U. S. arms control and disarmament agency.

British Chase Rebels Into Dense Swamp

LONDON, North Borneo, Dec. 12.—British troops pushed out rebel forces in Brunei today and captured Sarawak today as they moved into dense jungles and swamps.

Several British commanders said that the rebels, whose strength still is unknown, had attempted to organize a long march from Sarawak to Brunei.

Several hundred tribesmen from the interior of Sarawak, according to an incident, hostily joined the rebel coastal dwellers, who were reported prowling the Brunei-Sarawak border areas in an effort to cut off rebel bands.

However, Lieut. Gen. Sir Nigel Scott, commander of British Far East land forces, declared after a visit to operations areas that the possibility of rebel guerrilla resistance already was remote after six days of revolt.

"We have broken the back of the rebellion," he said.

He pointed out that the rebels, who wanted to set up an independent state composed of the two neighboring crown colonies of Sarawak and North Borneo, were armed only with shotguns and a few rifles.

Paper Will Refuse All Timed Copy

In a front page announcement, the newspaper said its editor and publisher, Oakley Dighe, had become increasingly concerned "at the tendency of governments, organizations and individuals to distribute material to press with the stipulation that it could not be printed until a specified day and hour."

He said there was "no doubt that such release times were used to obtain maximum impact for the interested parties."

The Globe and Mail admitted that occasionally release times were set for the convenience of all concerned but that "the value of such convenience was frequently outweighed by the artificiality of holding back news in order to benefit the interests of those making the news."

"In the United States such use of psychological timing has led government spokesmen to think of the press as part of the weaponry to be used in the cold war," the newspaper said.

Argentina's Airmen Given High Praise

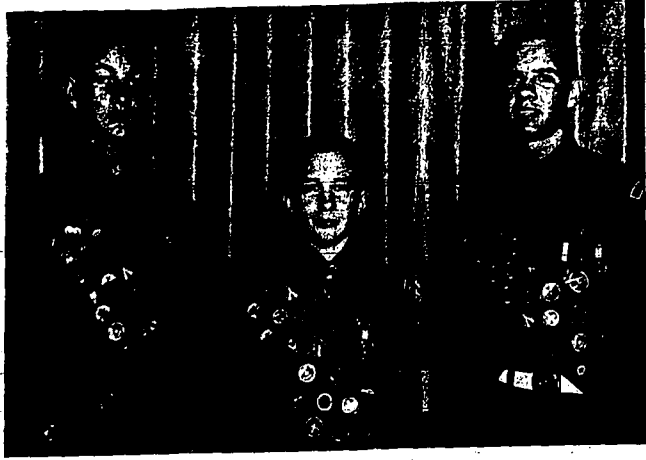

MOSCOW, Dec. 13 (AP)—Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko declared today the Soviet Union would like to negotiate a settlement of the Berlin question but he set no deadline for an agreement.
Gromyko told the supreme Soviet, in the presence of Premier Nikita Khrushchev, that the Soviet Union is prepared to continue an exchange of opinions with the West on a solution of the German problem.
While saying no time limit was placed on such negotiations, he said the communists would sign an agreement with the Western powers immediately would sign a separate peace treaty with communist East Germany if the Western powers refuse to come to an agreement.
"But we will not count the pages of the calendar," he said. Gromyko repeated the proposal by Khrushchev Wednesday to replace the Western Allies' troops in West Berlin with the flag of the United Nations.
He said that after a treaty is signed and the Allies troop out of West Berlin, the Soviet Union would give guarantees for the city's independence.
Gromyko said Soviet guarantees would be just as dependable as those of the NATO powers.

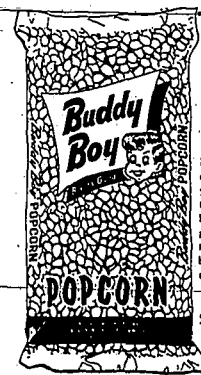

Congress May Get Huge 1964 Budget

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—A new shape up, the 1964 budget President Kennedy is preparing to send congress in January will reflect spending of nearly 100 billion dollars.

Planned outlays for the fiscal year which starts July 1 may well exceed 90 billion dollars, topping the record of 83.3 billion dollars reached in 1945 under war financing pressure. Spending in the current fiscal year is estimated at a pentecost record of 93.7 billion dollars.

Expenditures could easily top 100 billion dollars in 1964. Qualified government sources indicated that annual congress to enact amendment farm legislation in 1964 and outlays above the 100 billion dollar mark.

Another budget deficit in fiscal 1964 is certain. The 1963 deficit is estimated at 7.3 billion dollars. With tax relief effective in 1962, the administration's announced goal, the 1964 deficit could exceed the 12.4 billion dollar peacetime record posted in 1959.

Partly to hold the deficit down, the administration is considering proposing to congress a 2 billion dollar boost in social security payments as a substitute for 2 billion dollars of general tax relief. Social security payments come out of a special trust fund, not the federal budget.

Some officials have argued within the administration that retaining payments to retired persons and survivors would stimulate the economy more than giving a like amount of tax relief to the general public.

They contend that retired persons, having little income, would spend virtually all of the extra money, whereas most taxpayers would save some.

Khrushchev Foreign Policy Speech Sounds Defensive

BY WILLIAM L. RYAN

Premier Khrushchev's foreign policy speech before the Supreme Soviet sounded like the statements of a witness on trial before a court of world communist opinion.

Despite tough-sounding phrases and implied threats against the West, the speech was definitely defensive. It spouted speculation that opposition to Khrushchev's policies, including his stand on Cuba, has important support in the Communist camp even outside the ranks of Red Chinese and Albanian leaders.

There were curious notes in the speech.

Khrushchev repeated over and over that the USSR is Cuba's friend and will not abandon her, as if to suggest that somebody somewhere in the communist camp or in Cuba, had to be re-assured on this score.

Khrushchev revived the Berlin question, but mildly. Ever since the Caribbean showdown Soviet propaganda had permitted this to reverberate—the insinuation that the Russians had been caught off balance by the Kennedy-Khrushchev showdown and that the Berlin situation was ever it might have been, was thrown out of whack.

There was no suggestion in the speech that Khrushchev was ready soon to do anything about Berlin. He repeated the promise to sign a separate treaty with East Germany unless the Allies agree to create with both Germany. The idea is that Allied rights in West Berlin were allegedly would be cancelled. He revived the idea of stationing United Nations troops in the isolated former German capital.

Possibly Khrushchev is throwing all his proposals into a grab bag in preparation for the next discussions may come up. He applied no deadline. But seemingly was implicit in talk about Berlin, perhaps to allay some of the criticism of his at-

titudes in the communist world. The sub may lie in Khrushchev's passing mention that "all our thoughts are concentrated on the construction of communism."

Of course, referred to the recent central committee meeting which adopted a drastic party, and government, structural shakeup to attack economic problems. Here a kind of desperation may be setting in.

Since Stalin died, Khrushchev's series of schemes for bolstering the Soviet economy, particularly as they applied to agriculture, failed one after another. The consumer and farm industries have painful ailments, even though the USSR has leaped ahead in space and arms developments. In fact, it may be because of those advances.

Now Khrushchev is making a new try. From the look of it, the attempt is all-out. If this one should fail, Khrushchev and his Kremlin supporters might find themselves in an uncomfortable position.

Thus, Khrushchev would find it difficult to link up with highly inflammable world issues while restoring the Soviet public to apply every ounce of energy to solving domestic problems.

Consequently Khrushchev appears in the position of explaining to world communists why he did not do it in the Cuban crisis, and justifying it in light of the violent criticism from Red China and Albania.

The Soviet leader tried to justify his Cuban setback by saying that the "imperialists" could be prevented from starting a war. That is the gist of his argument, which with the Red Chinese, who still contend the big clash between two systems is inevitable.

Khrushchev agrees with the Chinese that "the imperialists" have not changed their aggressive way. But he argues, the balance of world forces has changed, and thus war can be avoided. The Soviet Union has too much to lose to risk any more dangerous doctrine than that.

Peace Savings Stamps Urged

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Dec. 13 (U)—Cyrus urged Wednesday that the United Nations set up peace savings stamps to encourage ordinary people throughout the world as one means of financing the cost of operations such as in the Congo and in the Middle East.

Gen. Ruzhicki, head of the Cyprus delegation, advanced the proposal in the assembly's budgetary committee, which is attempting to find a way to wipe out more than 150 million dollars in past debts and to finance future peacekeeping operations.

"This would bring the little man everywhere in direct contact with the United Nations, which was organized to save future generations from the scourge of war," Ruzhicki said.

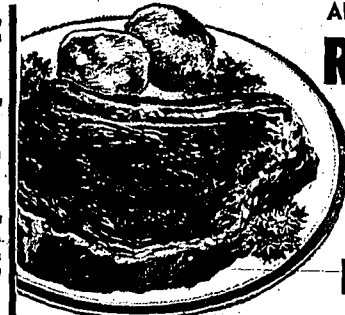
