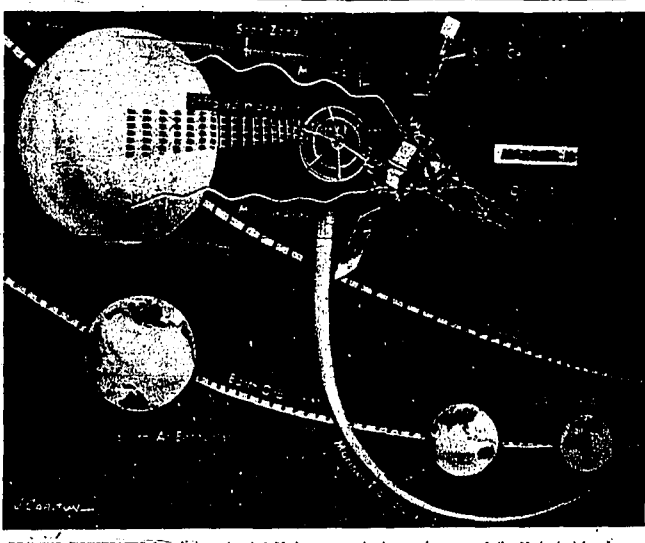

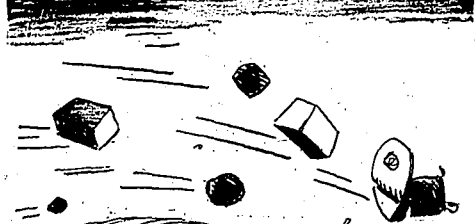

Farm Unit to Battle "Big Government"

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 14 (AP)—The American Farm Bureau federation pledged today to wage a "striked wide war" against big government in the fields of agriculture, spending and social welfare at the closing session of its convention Thursday.

Delegates from 46 states have decided to issue a resolution of approval to resolutions criticizing federal farm programs, government spending, federal control over the farm, and protection of the farm health and education programs.

The Only Georgia indicated a possible dissent at the closing session of the convention was the president of that state's farm bureau, told the convention his group reserved the right to take a contrary position on the farm control issue. No roll-call votes were taken.

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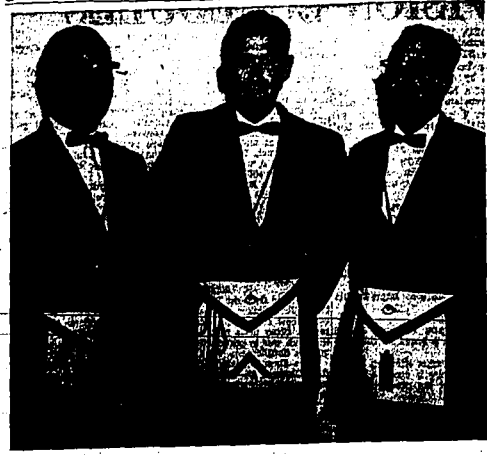

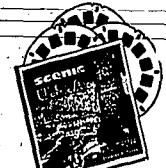

Adequate Records Needed To Make Payment on Wool

Wool growers who marketed lambs this fall should keep adequate records of their sales so that they will be able to make proper applications for payment under the new wool program, says Carl Boyd, chairman, Twin Falls agricultural establishment and conservancy wool committee.

The wool record for lambs sold must include the name of the buyer, his signature, and the number of livestock lambs sold, says the committee. It also includes the date of sale, the number of lambs, and the weight of the wool.

The chairman emphasized that growers should get all their fall sales records together and either keep them in a safe place at home or file them at the ASWS County Office. The final date to make the payments is April 30, but the application may be submitted at any time after the wool has been marketed.

Feed Grain Support Rates Raised to Aid Voluntary Land Retirement Plan

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman took a second look at the 1962 support rates for feed grains—and then raised them.

He said the increased prices for corn, barley, grain sorghum, oats, and rye would encourage farmer participation in the voluntary acreage reduction program for next year, improve farm income, help balance feed grain supplies with demand, and discourage excessive livestock expansion, particularly hogs and poultry.

Freeman had announced the 1962 feed grain supports on Nov. 14. Then he and department experts took their second look. They decided that the Nov. 14 rates would fall shy of inducing farmers to divert some 20 million acres from feed grain production to conserving uses.

This is the acreage reduction beyond necessary to bring feed grain supplies down to easily manageable size. They decided to sweeten the kitty.

The new rates, announced at a news conference, are: Corn—112¢ a bushel, up five cents from the Nov. 14 rate (78¢ per cent of parity).

Barley—90¢ a bushel, up three cents (70¢ per cent of parity).

Grain sorghum—\$2 per hundredweight, up nine cents (78¢ per cent of parity).

Oats—65¢ a bushel, up three cents (77 per cent of parity).

Rye—115¢ a bushel, up five cents (75 per cent of parity).

Cassia Livestock Marketing Association Meets in Burley

BURLEY, Dec. 14—Cassia Livestock Marketing Association, which includes sheepmen from throughout the county, held their annual meeting Wednesday at the Elks club here.

Speakers were Wade Wells, extension animal husbandman for the University of Idaho; A. K. Walker, state sheep commission director; Mel Clark, executive director of the Idaho Wool Growers association; and Elmo Packard, Logan, Utah, manager of Cache Valley Breeders association.

Wells spoke on improving quality of sheep by keeping records and making selections by use of the records. He compared the quality of animals in the dairy industry which have been produced by this method.

"Sheepmen must face the fact they have to produce an animal with less fat which will be a meat-type animal and still keep up the wool production," he declared. Using records as a basis for culling and replacing stock is one good method.

At the afternoon session Wells discussed the research which has been done at the University of Idaho research center in Coaling well on dry lot vs. range care of sheep.

Clear dry lot feeding looks promising. In tests there were nearly one-half less replacements than on range feeding, the speaker concluded.

Kuttler discussed sheep diseases, listing nine diseases commonly found in sheep and described how to recognize them. He also gave prevention methods.

Clear reviewed briefly high lights of the state Wool Growers convention in Pocatello. He pointed out the fact the European wool market is very tight and the U.S. sheep industry.

Artificial insemination and use of hormones to concentrate estrus was discussed by Packard. He pointed out artificial insemination is not yet practical but it probably will be in less than two years.

"Value of this type breeding," Packard stated, "will be to produce a better meat-type animal and it will be possible for each

ewe to produce two lambs each year."

J. Ward Chaturon, Albon, president of the association, conducted the business meeting at which three new directors were elected. They include Jeff Matthews and Janis Duke, both Burley; and Carl Newirth, Malheur.

Directors will meet at 7 p.m. Wednesday at the courthouse to elect new officers. The president appointed a committee to promote the use of lamb in cafeterias in the schools and in local processing plants. Members include Ernest Reed, Jimmie Dulse and Wilford Digby.

A luncheon was served at noon in the Elks dining room.

There were 2,566 dairy cows on production testing during November according to County Auditor David Youst.

Soil Testing Is Better In Fall

JEROME, Dec. 16 — County Agent W. C. Prater, Jerome, cites two reasons why testing the soil in the fall is better than spring tests.

"A sample taken following removal of a crop gives a more accurate measure of the plant food left for succeeding crops. It also gives the information back to the farmer in time to plan and arrange for the fertilizer needed before spring planting time," he said.

Prater points out the extension service and the soils department of the University of Idaho provide a soil testing service at cost to the farmer. The standard test gives soil reaction, per cent organic matter from which the potential nitrogen can be determined, and pounds of available phosphoric acid and pounds of available potash present in the soil.

Envelopes and directions for taking the samples are available at the county agent's office. Prater said farmers can either come in and pick it up or phone and have it mailed to them. "Soil testing reports returned quickly," Prater said.

Light Bulbs Which Give No Light Are Being Developed for City, Farm Use

NEW LIGHT intended for lamppost, not seeing, starts doing its job in one minute, according to Westinghouse scientists. The same bulb which the boy uses for the lamp.

BLOOMFIELD, N.J., Dec. 14 — Each year in the U.S. alone nearly three billion light bulbs (lamps) are produced to help man see. But few persons are aware that several million bulbs are produced which give no light at all or which are not used to see by.

In this strange group of bulbs and tubes lies an intriguing story of lamps which have nothing to do with "seeing" but which are invaluable to man's welfare. According to Dr. Roland M. Bechtel, engineering manager—charge of Westinghouse lamp division, these "dark" lamps perform such varied tasks as taking the tough, fresh, helping to capture criminals and deterring and preventing disease.

Other lamps, Dr. Bechtel reveals, will counteract bad odors, bleach fabrics, sprout plants, make pictures "talk," help produce fertilizer, cure rickets, produce sun tan, bake paint or perhaps save lives.

Among these weird bulbs is a steadily enlarging group of lamps known as "ultraviolet radiators." These lamps emit an invisible light which produces a so rapid and so powerful as to shorten the human eye cannot "see" it.

Included in this strange group are "black light" lamps.

Most of the use necessary vapor and argon gas within a special glass tube or bulb. After all visible light has been filtered out, the remaining ultraviolet radiation is capable of producing fluorescence or phosphorescence in certain substances—the brilliant fluorescing colors of advertising signs, or the magical brilliance of many cool, glowing minerals, glow of plants.

This ghostly black light, Dr. Bechtel revealed, has been used to unveil the hidden beauty of mineral ores or to enhance the appearance of a myriad of fabrics, wallpaper, plastics and window glass. And black light is used to disclose aespilgram, to locate otherwise invisible traces of drugs or poisons, or to apprehend the criminal by reason of the fluorescing of finger markings, stains, or the clothing.

Temperature Control Vital For Efficient Hog Growth

CHICAGO, Dec. 16 — Temperature control at 80 degrees Fahrenheit increased feed efficiency in growing-finishing pigs, increased rates of gain and, in a winter trial, increased the percentage of lean cuts in hogs, says a report from the American Society of Animal Production at its meeting here.

The tests were made with two groups of 48 pigs and housed in confinement from three weeks of age to market weight. Temperature levels were maintained at 80 degrees and 60 degrees in summer and 60 degrees compared with a cycling temperature between 30 and 80 degrees (averaging 55 degrees) in the winter.

High-protein levels started at 20 per cent when the pigs were 10 weeks old, dropped to 15 per cent at seven weeks and to 14 per cent at 110 pounds weight. The low-protein levels started at 15 per cent and dropped to 13 at 110 pounds.

Bechtel reported the interrelationships of protein and temperature on amounts of feed required per pound of gain was significant. The pigs weighed 210 pounds in summer, and 210 pounds in winter.

Western Ranges Above Average

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 — The crop reporting board said the supply of winter stored on ranges is the largest for Dec. 1 since 1958. Most states have above average grazing conditions.

The board said the condition of cattle and calves in the western range area, defined as grazing portable grinder-mixers, is well above average.

English Plan Might Curb Hog Cholera

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 — The foreign agricultural service said a compulsory hog slaughter program designed to eliminate hog cholera will begin in England, Wales and Scotland on next March 11.

In 1961 a slaughter and disposal program was announced to become effective in early 1962, but it was deferred because of large government spending and the need for economy.

A slaughter program was operated for two years after World War II. However, carcasses were salvaged and restrictions on the movement of hogs were only partially effective in controlling the disease.

Graduation was not achieved and this policy was abandoned in 1916.

Since then some control of the disease has been brought about by isolating infected herds and controlling the movement of infected or exposed hogs.

Storage Life of Spuds Can Be Aided With Proper Control of Air Activity

A different method of moving cool air through potato storage in Idaho was used for the first time by a commercial plant during the past storage season, and reports are enthusiastic. The method, that of using 10 cubic feet of air per minute per ton of potatoes, forced through the mass of potatoes, and developed to Idaho storage conditions by Walter C. Sparks, horticulturist, University of Idaho, 200 branch experiment station.

"This method of moving air through potatoes is not new, but for several years in various parts of the country," Sparks explains. "But the amount of air used in Idaho under our conditions, was definitely not known. Some of the countries in Europe use as high as 100 to 200 cubic feet of air per minute per ton of potatoes. In 1951, the volume movement ranges all the way from 18 cubic feet of air per minute per ton up to as high as 100 cubic feet."

"In the past we have achieved excellent storage by merely digging the potatoes, spreading them out and covering with straw and earth. No air was moved within these storages. Therefore, slight volume air movement, such as found in storage in other parts of the world, seemed unnecessary for modern Idaho potato storages. Through research we found that 10 cubic feet of air per minute per ton of potatoes, when the potatoes are going to be held in storage beyond March, this amount is automatically meaning that as the temperature of the potatoes goes above a certain point, usually about 60 degrees, a fan automatically begins blowing cold air in through the bottom of the potato mass. When the mass is cooled down to about 55 degrees, the fan turns off. This 'on again-off again' air movement of the potatoes is uniform temperature throughout a potato pile as deep as 20 to 25 feet.

"This is the third season we have used the new potato storage research building," Sparks reports. "But we have carried our storage studies for several years in the old potato storage. In our studies we used a two-stage storage system (where the cooling air was only allowed to go around the potato mass and cool by radiator action) and a conversion current system, where within the mass as compared with a through-the-mass storage system (putting the air through the potato mass).

"These actual studies proved that more uniform temperatures are obtained with the through-the-mass cooling system. For

crossed, the amount of oxygen decreased. Potatoes at 50 cfm/ft bins had a 10 to 15 percent higher rate. As for the future, Sparks reports. "This test year we will compare the 10 cfm/ft flow rate with a 5 cfm/ft rate to determine whether a storage equipped with air flow action can obtain as good results with a continuous air flow. This is to determine whether refrigeration is so vital as we conclude with a continuous flow of cool air as a storage without refrigeration is a shorter period of time to effect a more rapid cooling."

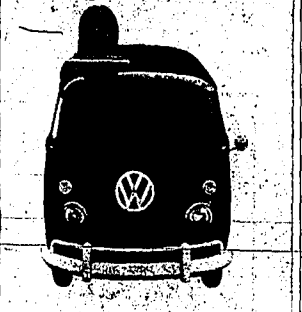

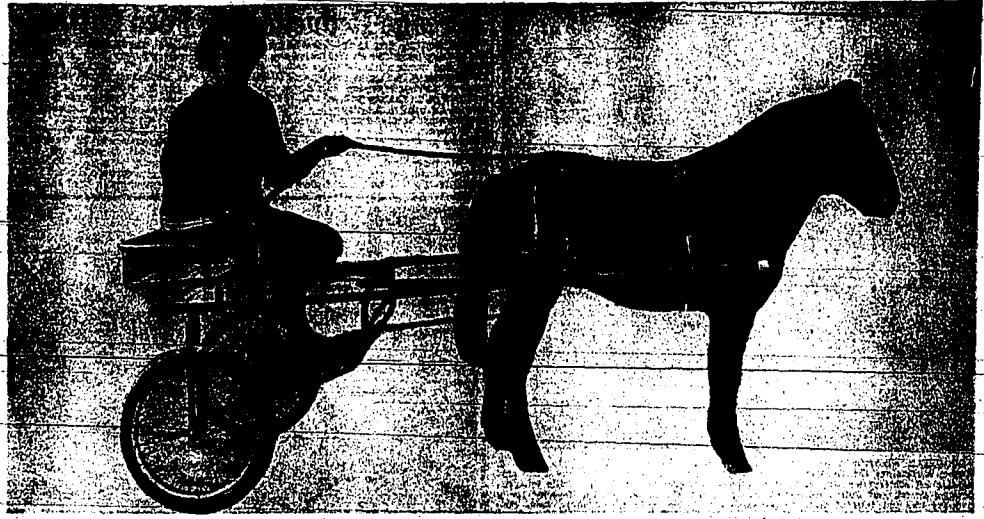

Advisory Unit Recommends Voluntary Acreage Reduction for Feed Cattle

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—The advisory committee on feed grain has recommended that the government feed grain program of acreage reduction be continued on a voluntary basis in spite of its belief a mandatory program would be more economical to operate. Committee Chairman Fred J. Ludwig, Lawrence, Ia., reported this recommendation after a two-day closed meeting of the committee. He said he doubted that congress could be persuaded to approve a mandatory acreage reduction program for feed grains. It turned down such a program embodied in the early draft of the food and agriculture act of 1962. Furthermore, according to Ludwig, most farmers prefer a voluntary program because the inducements to participate are better than under a mandatory program. Also Ludwig said most farmers want to operate their farms as they see fit. The committee noted that the voluntary feed grain program in 1961 and 1962 have reduced surplus of feed grains by about one billion bushels through offering inducements to farmers to plant smaller acreages to corn and grain sorghums. Ludwig said the committee recommended no changes in the previously announced 1963 feed grain program. This calls for price supports, through loans and payments in kind, and diversion

payments. Producers who do not participate in the voluntary program will not be eligible for price support. Ludwig said the committee anticipated "real good participation" in the 1963 program. For the 1964 program and thereafter, the committee called for an increase in farm income support through a combination of increased price supports, production payments, and diversion payments. Willard W. Cochran, director of the department's division of agricultural economics, said the group made some recommendations on specific details for second year contracts for feed grain. New Standard To Define Unit

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—The small business administration has proposed a new standard for the dairy industry, including cooperatives, for the purpose of government procurement or SBA loans. The present definition of a small business for the dairy industry is 500 employees or less. In September the agency proposed to change the definition to apply to a concern which has annual receipts of not more than five million dollars. Last receipts that a higher figure of annual receipts would be more equitable. The present proposal is not more than 10 million dollars in annual receipts, exclusive of receipts from sale of raw milk or cream.

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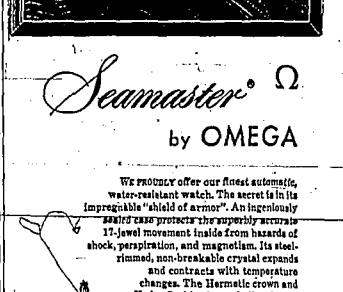

A traffic policeman found Machen in a parked car near Vallejo Wednesday afternoon. There was a loaded pistol on the seat beside him, Machen had fired three shots into the roadside mud. When officer Bill McClellan came up, Machen was writing a "farewell letter" to his wife, then in Portland.

The powerful Negro heavyweight slugger was trouble on the way to the hospital but Dr. Miller said he became very upset Wednesday night, requiring heavy sedation, before the outbreak.

Machen's last fight was a relatively unimportant one last July 11 in Houston, Tex. He boxed 10 dull rounds to a draw with Cleveland Williams. It was a cautious fight which Houston writers said ruined the chance of both fighters for a title shot.

Only bright spot was a gate in excess of \$70,000, of which each boxer got 30 percent.

Since then promoters there have tried to line up a bout between Machen and Chaslin Clay, the talkative young slugger who recently finished off ancient Archie Moore.
