Kennedy Strikes at Critics of Tax Cut

Going before a black-tie audience of business leaders, Kennedy called Friday night for an early cut in both individual and corporation income taxes—without saying just how soon he would want the reductions to become effective. After he attended college he worked for J. C. Penney's store in Twin Falls. He married Janet Shrum about 1939 in Wendell and they lived in Twin Falls until World War II, in which Mr. Olson served in the U. S. Army in southern California.

Dire Money Problems Haunt Solons

BOISE, Dec. 15 (P)—It takes only a glance at a few figures to see that the nation's money problem is absolutely right in tabbing money the biggest problem ahead of them in 1963. Here are some of the figures which add up to the potential headache for the lawmakers: General fund appropriations for the current biennium were \$6.5 billion dollars. General fund revenue for the year period will amount to about \$7.2 billion dollars. The budget for the period was balanced through the use of the two-year period beginning next July 1 is estimated at \$9.5 billion dollars. 

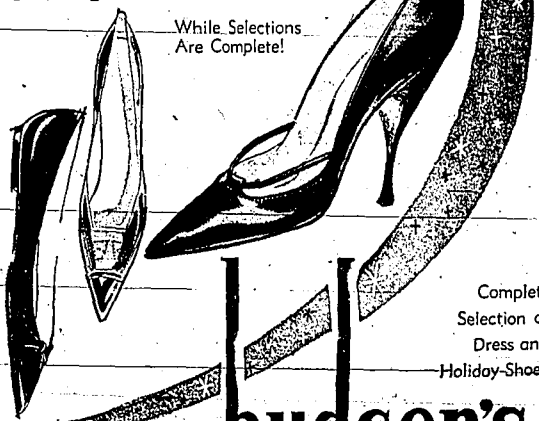

News Around Idaho

IDAH0 FALLS, Dec. 15—The Idaho potato growers is threatened from the front by a national potato marketing order and by acreage control. Orval Hansen, Idaho Falls attorney, told members of the New Sweden Farm Bureau Friday night. Hansen, who is attorney for a group of east Idaho growers at a recent potato controls hearing in Denver said: "At the Denver hearings, it was obvious that the supporters of the marketing order are also pushing hard for contractual approval of acreage control in an attempt to bring the potato industry under tight government regulation."

ARCO, Dec. 15—An Arco ordinance setting the salaries of the mayor and city councilmen and establishing office hours for the mayor has been approved by the city council. The new ordinance will not take effect until Jan. 1, 1964. The present salaries will be \$4,000 for the mayor and \$2,000 for the councilmen. The new ordinance will set the mayor's salary at \$10,000 a month for the mayor during his term of office, and the salary of each councilman will remain unchanged as it is now, \$4,000 a month for each regular meeting and \$5 for each special meeting attended.

IDAH0 FALLS, Dec. 15—Herman Wilfred Hammond, 82, a former city councillor, died Friday night while attending a wedding reception at the American Legion hall for his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Jimmie Hammond. His death was attributed to a heart attack. The family indicated he had been in poor health for some time.

IDAH0 FALLS, Dec. 15—All personnel in the livestock feed industry must realize the exactness of their work if mediated agricultural feeds are to accomplish their intended purpose through meeting food and drug administration regulations, Leland J. Fife, Boise, stated Friday night at a meeting in Idaho Falls. The law is so strict that more strict standards in the animal, poultry, feed manufacturing and, consequently, feed control than all previous years combined, he said.

NAMPA, Dec. 15—Jarvis Freeman, 60, Nampa, was injured Friday in an accident at a gravel pit north of Nampa. Fred Fitch said he was working alone at the time and in some way lost control of the tractor he was operating. He was thrown from the machine, which then ran over the lower portion of his body. He died in a hospital several hours later.

IDAH0 FALLS, Dec. 15—The atomic energy commission reported today the 23rd nuclear reactor at its testing station in eastern Idaho became operative at 1 p. m. Friday. It is a reactivity measurement facility, the third at its station. Incorporation of the reactor was developed from experience with its predecessors. The first such facility was put into operation in 1944 and the second in 1949. The AEC said that one of the major improvements in the newer reactor is its "read-out" system which records test measurements automatically on punch cards for processing in electronic computing machines.

IDAH0 FALLS, Dec. 15—Cattlemen were urged Friday night at a meeting of the Bonneville County Cattlemen's association to continue to upgrade the quality of beef through bull grading and production feeding methods. Jim Ellsworth, president of the Idaho Cattlemen's association said the best beef industry "looks good" for the next few years, but he encouraged growers to continue projects aimed at higher quality. The association, he said, has asked the University of Idaho to conduct a study on the "Bull" and "calf" disease of cattle that was severe last year in Idaho.

FOOTCALLE, Dec. 15—Idaho State college will continue to seek a \$3 million dollar appropriation from the 1963 legislature to fill "the need for increased faculty salaries," its president, Dr. Donald E. Walker, said today. Walker said the college's budget for the 1963-64 year is \$10,700,000. He said the legislature will raise \$16,174,000 of this figure from what is called local income.

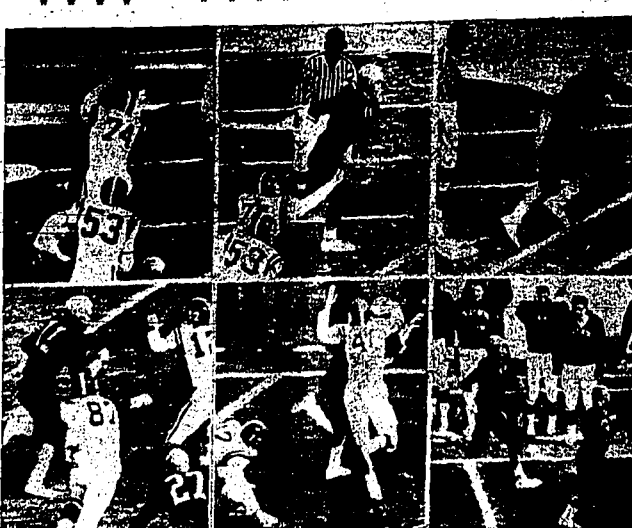

Solicitor Scored For Handling of Basketball Case

RALEIGH, N.C., Dec. 15 (AP)—District Solicitor Lester V. Chalmers, Jr. came under fire today in a Wake county grand jury report which called for an investigation of his office over the handling of a basketball case. 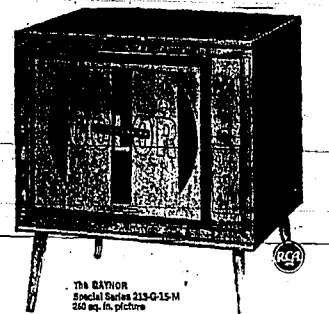

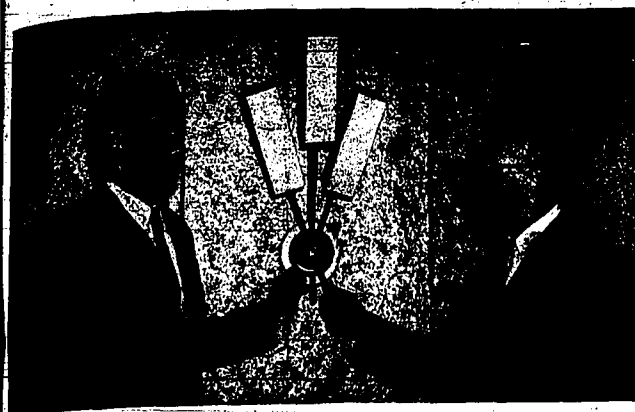

Washington's New Airport Makes Big Hit

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—Washington's new Dulles International airport is making a big hit with just about everyone who sees it or uses it.

"The Federal aviation agency, operator of the 110-million dollar airport, says public enthusiasm over the terminal building and the mobile lounges that shuttle to and from the jet air-planes is even greater than had been anticipated.

Strikes though by day, the Zero Starline-delegated terminal is even more beautiful at night. Lights inside its vast glass-walled concourse, the luminous cascading effect of the outer lower walls, and the dramatic spot-lighting of a parade-like control tower that appears to rest on a pillar of flame—the whole a dream-like appearance.

William E. Cullinan, airport manager, said that the practical-minded regular traveler appears most pleased with the new mobile lounge technique that does away with carrying suitcases down long corridors.

The passenger arriving at Dulles by limousine walks from the entrance to the ticket counter, and then to the waiting lounge, all on the same level. The total walking distance is no more than 150 feet.

The lounge in effect is a comfortable waiting room on wheels, exclusively for the use of passengers on that particular flight. The time that the lounge draws away from the terminal building, to go to the airplane, is the official departure time for the flight.

Dulles has parallel north-south runways 11,500 feet long and 150 feet wide, 6,700 feet apart. A third runway 10,000 feet long extends on a west-northwest-southeast line, and there is provision for a fourth

The percentage of Idaho's population 25 years or older having less than five years of schooling is only 3.2 per cent. Some states honor around the 20 per cent mark, showing lack of education—surprisingly—quite a few in the Middle West approach being 100 per cent behind Idaho.

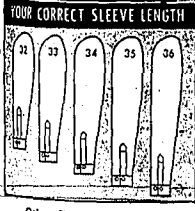
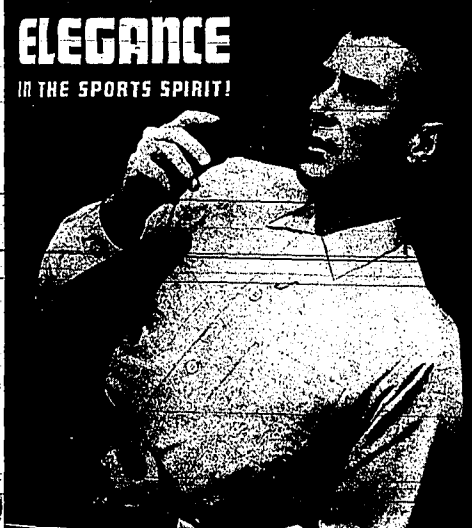

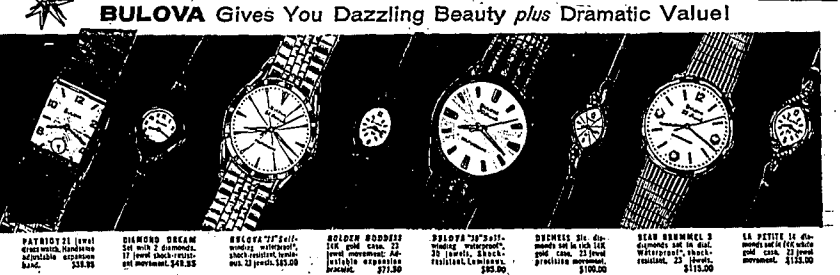

Tempest Still Hot Around Adlai's Head

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Dec. 15 (AP) — Friends of Adlai E. Stevenson may be neither surprised nor dismayed by the fact that he is not to be fired as a result of the ruckus over his ill-fated trip to Cuba.

There is plenty of talk in U. N. corridors, however, about possible damage to his prestige here.

There is speculation that he may be on the ax as a result of his assurance Stevenson "will not support" of President Kennedy.

A "Dear Adlai" letter from Kennedy, expressing fullest confidence in Stevenson, undoubtedly bolstered his position. But many U. N. diplomats believe Stevenson's difficulties are more likely to mushroom than to subside.

There is evidence forces are already against him both inside and outside the administration.

Some of his friends are convinced that someone high in the administration had a hand in the controversy. Stevenson, who was touched off the hubbub, they say Stevenson's views were distorted in an effort to please him as favoring a soft policy toward Cuba.

Stevenson's associates firmly reject any theory that Kennedy himself was connected with the Saturday Evening Post story. Although one of the authors was Charles Berlitz, a newspaperman close to the President.

Reasoning in the Stevenson camp is that the President and his chief U. N. delegate were closer than during the Cuban crisis, from the early private discussions in Washington to the present time. The say Stevenson advocated the successful Cuban policy of the blockade and non-aid, even from normally critical newspapers and politicians for his speeches here.

One of the high spots in the Cuban debate was the dramatic confrontation between Stevenson and Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian A. Zorin on Oct. 21. Stevenson repeatedly demanded to answer "yes" or "no" as to whether there were any Soviet missiles in Cuba. The U. N. delegate admitted that he was prepared to wait "until hell freezes over" to get an answer.

Stevenson claims that every reference to him in the Post article was inaccurate, but there were enough accurate statements in the rest of the article to convince him that someone high in the administration had leaked information on the confidential discussions which led up to the blockade. The most disturbing thing about the leak, in the view of Stevenson's associates, is that an administration official apparently tried to discredit him by misrepresenting his position.

While Stevenson publicly insists that he is not worried, it is doubtful his position at the United Nations was strengthened by last week's discussions. Possibly his strength in the United States will suffer if readers accept the Post story at its face value. His strength in U. N. negotiations may be sapped if the Russians and others at the bargaining table have doubts as to whether Stevenson really is making some observers in the U. N. lobby concerned.

Northwest States Combine Effort and Funds to Produce Hunter Safety Film

The fish and game departments of Washington, Oregon and Idaho announced today the completion of a 22-minute sound and color motion picture film, "Hunter Safety," which is being distributed through the basic rules of firearms.

The film, titled "Hunter Safety," was produced in the Northwest as a cooperative education project of the extensive firearms training programs now being carried on in Idaho, Oregon and Washington.

Almost a year in production, the film presents a simple theme, with a positive approach to gun handling and actual use during hunting trips (kill). A father and son make up the cast. They appear first on a deer hunting trip in the remote mountains of the Northwest, and then in a real hunt after completing the standard hunter safety training course that is now taught throughout most of the nation.

A few weeks later, the family group spends a day hunting in a wooded area in the valley where their attention is placed upon such items as always having unobstructed rights in the valley before ammunition; correct ways to carry guns when hunting; safety rules to cross a fence; family members to cross a fence; family members to cross a fence; family members to cross a fence.

Produced on a three-way basis, film production costs have been equally shared by the three states. Each state has contributed department personnel combined their time and talents to do the story writing, filming, directing and editing that go to make up a complete production.

The Idaho fish and game department has been reviewed by officials of the National Rifle Association who first designed and made available the safety training course now followed throughout the country. In addition to their advice that the picture will be useful as a part of the course they say, "We were very favorably impressed with the film. We think it is an excellent and sensitive job, our highest congratulations."

Speaking of the new film, John Nigg, director of the Washington department of game, said, "This motion picture will prove an important addition to our safety training program. It will be a big help to instructors wherever classes are conducted, especially in reviewing lessons and helping to establish safety rules firmly in the mind of our young people."

"I know this basic information film will prove invaluable to us in presenting the firearms safety course," John R. Woodworth, Idaho fish and game director, stated. "A lot of work and study has gone into making the picture hold the interest of every viewer, whether a youngster with his first gun, or an adult hunter who has put in many hours' field."

W. Schneider, director of the Oregon game commission, said two important areas had been left out of the film, but the Idaho film and game director, stated, "Cooperation between the three states in this effort has been most commendable," Schneider said. "By working together we came up with the best thing of each."

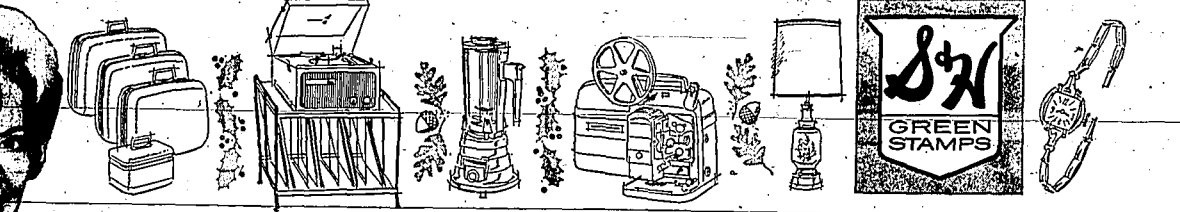

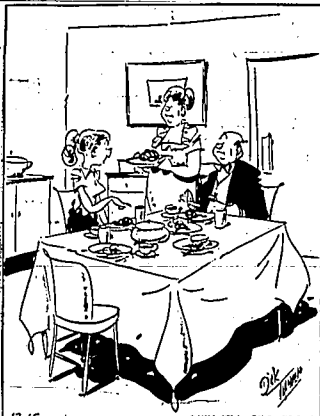

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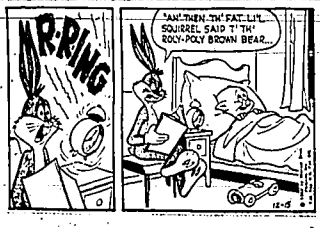

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Cuban Naval Base Families Back Home

QUANTANAMO BAY, Cuba, Dec. 15 (AP)—There is now time to reflect on what happened during the Cuban crisis at this 40-square-mile U.S. naval base during its 20th anniversary of the United States. It was a great "welling-up" of the spirit from which the world could learn a great deal about what makes the United States tick.

There was the young Marine corporal who brought an American flag in 1956 to mark the piece of Fort Rucker. There were the "air" posts to hold in the name of the United States. When he flew it from atop his bunker here, the flag had only 48 stars, but it fluttered clean and crisp, and the defiance was clear.

At no time was Quantanamo the true focal point of the crisis, though the men here thought so. It takes the physical man to understand that where he stands is not necessarily the center of the universe.

But the fact remains that had war come, Quantanamo would have been under the gun. And however inconsequential the base was in the over-all scheme of things, young Americans were here to fight and die if need be.

Every time I saw these youngsters I remembered the observation of a non-ironist European observer who said, "Young Americans are the most peaceful warlike people in history."

There was a self-deprecation among these youngsters which was a marvelous, if understood, here. They asked the more than sure how they felt about the possibility of actual combat, they would say something like this: "Hell, man, don't talk like that. I am a lover, not a fighter."

The other all important was one of shy inarticulateness. There was something incongruous and appealing about these youths as they fumbled for words.

Most expressed themselves in halting, embarrassed sentences, which ended, "You know what I mean, don't you?" None wanted to come right out and say it as a patriotic. The tritons of earlier Americans sound foreign to these youths.

When he said Quantanamo was returning to its placid way, I meant only outwardly. It is doubtful if the people here will ever be quite the same.

On the way to church the other morning an officer said, "I think that this crisis has strengthened every family here, made the ties a little tighter. It is one thing to be together during your family during a time of war but another for your family to be together in the best sense of your life have to be readjusted. I think it gave everyone a greater understanding of each other and each other's problems."

The dependents who left Oct. 22, when it appeared war over the practice of Soviet missiles and a bomb in Cuba might break out at any moment, are coming back. Most should return before Christmas.

The behavior of the wives and children at the moment of crisis should be recorded, too. They behaved with a great coolness and calmness.

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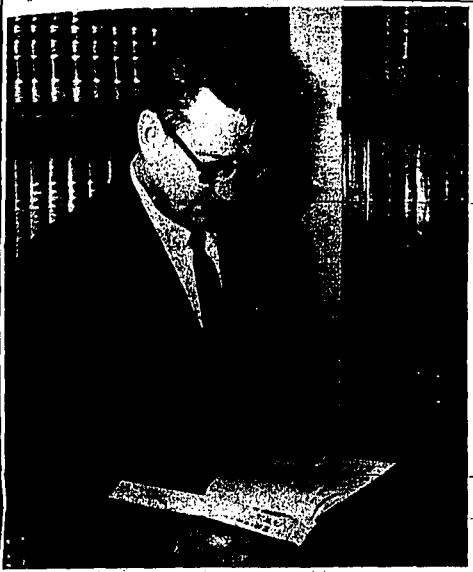

Legal Questions Facing Lawyers Are Answered in T.F. Law Books



RESEARCH IS EASIER for District Judge Theron Ward, thanks to the excellent law library maintained by Twin Falls county. Often during the course of the day's events many Twin Falls county lawyers find themselves without proper reference material. So they do as anyone else would. They go to the library.

Only they don't use the Twin Falls public library. They use the law library in the Twin Falls county courthouse.

"Not too many laymen are aware of the law library," notes District Judge Theron Ward. Ward admits that, from all outward appearances, the system doesn't look much like a library, and he is right.

There are hundreds of legal books scattered on shelves, bookcases and what have you on the third floor of the courthouse. The library starts in the office of the district judge, runs into his outer office, then into the corridor and finally ends up in the county attorney's office. All in all, it covers eight rooms. All counties in Idaho are required by law to maintain such a library.

However, Twin Falls county has one of the better law library systems in the state, according to Judge Ward. He feels this might be one of the reasons the local bar association is one of the better associations in Idaho.

Twin Falls county lawyers don't have to have a library card. It is run on the honor system. When a book is checked out, the borrower writes his name on a slip of paper and puts it where the book was. They haven't lost a book yet.

All new books put into the library are posted on the bulletin board.

The county has at its disposal a complete "court reporter system" in the library. In addition, they have books on legal thought. Should a ruling be given in any major court in the United States, the reporter system will let Twin Falls county lawyers informed on how many times the ruling has been cited in court cases.

Lawyers from other counties frequently use the library.

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

Life in Magic Valley is pretty wonderful, especially to one RUPERT young man, Jack Schab, who had a closer brush with death than most people ever have and still live to tell about it. Schab, an employe of the Project Mutual Telephone association, was repairing a break in service last June 11, with a fellow employe, Harold Tanner. Schab was up on the pole and had just checked with the office, reporting completion of the job. Then he called his wife to tell her to get the coffee pot on the stove, as he would be home soon.

The next Mrs. Schab heard of him she was being rushed to the hospital, seriously injured. Just as she finished talking to Mrs. Schab and disconnected his phone, his companion said something like, "Look at that coming!" About that time, the car hit the base of the pole, breaking it off and throwing Schab to the ground. A large airplane, several feet long, was left upright when the pole snapped under the force of the impact, as he fell, the splinter penetrated his right side under his arm, about halfway down the rib cage.

The ribs deflected the wood slightly, so that it didn't go through the chest area, but followed around and emerged just to the left of the breast and making particles of bone from the ribs with it and pieces of material from his clothing. Tanner called from the telephone equipped truck to the manager of the telephone company in Rupert who in turn phoned police. The ambulance and officers were dispatched to the scene nearly 10 miles north of Rupert, where it was necessary to saw off both ends of the splinter before Schab could be brought to the hospital. He never lost consciousness, he recalls.

A specialist was summoned from Salt Lake to perform surgery necessary for the removal of the splinter which was two inches by three inches by 1/8 inch. Schab refers to it as his "loophole," and keeps it around in show friends.

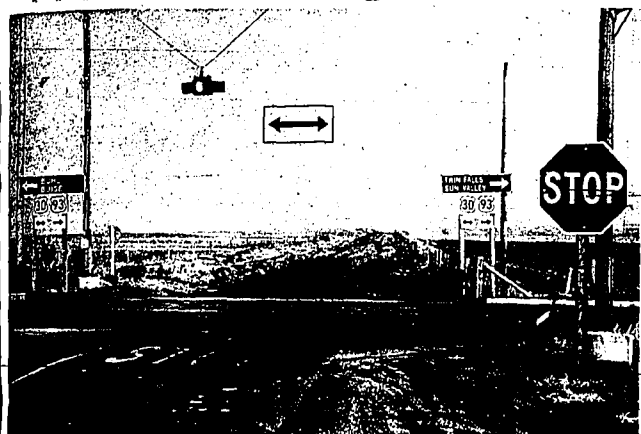

New Signs, Traffic Divider Installed West of Twin Falls to Cut Accidents

FLEET, Dec. 15—Something new has been added to two highway danger spots in an effort to reduce accidents which occur at these spots at frequent intervals.

Most radical change, and one which will probably confuse many drivers until they get used to the situation, is located at the curve of highway 30 at the west end of Hwy. 93.

The intersection in addition to being the 90-degree change in direction for highway 30 traffic, it also entrance and exit for traffic to and from the Clover area and also the farming area.

Most noticeable change in the driving area is a marked divider. It is situated so that traffic going west on highway 30 may continue on that road by a right turn or go straight ahead on the Clover road without stopping.

Traffic on highway 30 coming from Buhl toward Twin Falls will be required to stop at the west side of the divider and then turn left on highway 30 or right on the Clover road. Traffic also can move straight ahead from the stop to the farm area road.

The route of highway 30 is marked with large, newly installed signs which include destination arrows.

Fact that confusion will exist until drivers get used to the new setup is much in evidence. During a period of not more than five minutes, a car coming from the Buhl direction on highway 30, passed the large stop sign without a halt and turned toward Twin Falls. Seconds later another car traveling toward Twin Falls went by the divider on the wrong side which put the vehicle head on into traffic from the east. Fortunately there was no westbound traffic at that particular time.

The other attempt at accident control is at the intersection of highway 93 and highway 30, scene of scores of accidents and many deaths. Most of the mishaps occur because highway 93 traffic, going north at that point, fail to realize the road ends and joins highway 30 traveling at right angles until it is too late.

The new installation is a large sign with a double-headed arrow, 11 ft. installed across the road on the north side of highway 30 at a point higher than the blinker light. It has a black arrow and yellow background.

The last overhead sign brings to eight the number of warning signs and lighted arrows should notice before they reach highway 30 on highway 93 from the south.

Installation of the overhead sign and also the change in the "Y" curve area were completed by a crew from the Idaho state highway department.

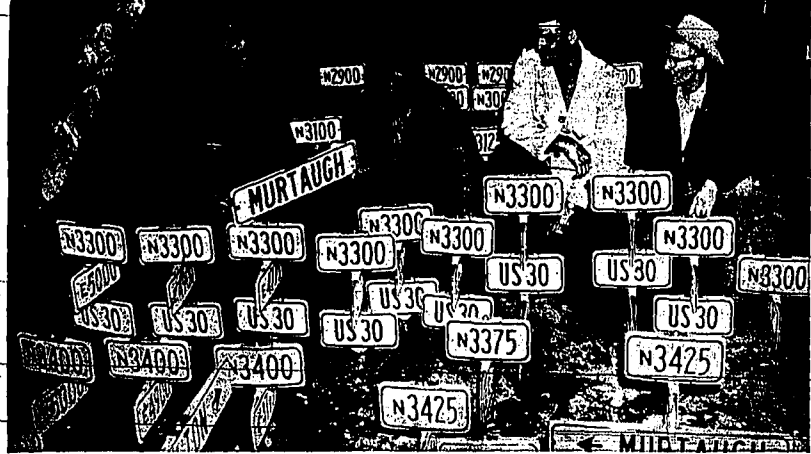

New Area Construction for November Under '61 Figure

New construction totals for November in Magic Valley were 1.2 per cent below that reported in November, 1961. Total for November reported 45 units valued at \$1,363,466; Twin Falls, 120 units at \$1,163,500; Jerome, eight units at \$28,700; and Rupert, 20 units at \$144,976. November's commercial and industrial construction was valued at \$141,000. Twin Falls reported \$4,000; Burley, \$133,000; and Rupert, \$4,000. This year's first 11 months commercial and industrial construction totaled \$1,579,197 for a decrease of 3.2 per cent below that reported last year. 5 Counties Cooperate In Building Boat Ramps

For the first time in the history of Magic Valley, five counties have gone together in a program to finance boat launching facilities at one spot accessible to residents of all the counties in question.

Elmer Annis, secretary of the waterways committee of Twin Falls county, together with Oliver Stewart, committee member, Annis and Stewart, are Fritz Bybee, Castelford, chairman; Gordon Young, Duhl, and Andrew Hansen.

Annis said the money expended comes from motor boat licenses in 1952. The committee members serve without pay.

In Twin Falls county, recent improvements with these funds have been made at Twin Falls, Shoshone falls, Cedar draw and at Crowley bridge on the Snake river, as well as at Salmon and Roseworth reservoirs. A seepage drain has been installed at Twin Falls and gravel has been spread at Shoshone falls.

At the John Courtney landing, extensive improvements have been made. Cleanup has been accomplished by employment of 2525 labor, it is pointed out.

Work planned for next season will include installation of garbage cans and fire grills along the river and adding more launching concrete at Roseworth and Salmon reservoirs.

Importance of the Magic reservoir cooperative improvement is shown by record disclosing that since the Magic lake resort started under the name of Olcott landing in 1937, some 200 cabins have been constructed there. Electrically available and a telephone will be added next season from the Mitchell exchange.

The year 1953 will mark the second one of having lake eradication removed trash fish. Last spring some 2,000,000 fingerling rainbows were planted as well as 20,000 three to four pound size.

When making a candy dish it is possible to put small emblems into the dish. The emblems become buried in the plastic. The plastic can be reheated and remolded a number of times. The best part of using crystals, they leave no smell, fuss or big mess to clean up.

The plastic muffin tins, even a cookie sheet can be utilized when making items from plastic.

Odd Plants and Weeds Are Converted Into Wall Plaques by Local Resident

Got any old weeds around the house? If you do, Mrs. Ray E. Jolin, 258 Fillmore street, might be interested in them.

Mrs. Jolin often uses old weeds and plants to form the centerpiece of wall plaques she makes. She got the idea from a magazine she converted it to fit her own design.

She claims she always is looking for something to keep her occupied during the day, and has, at one time or another, started on many other projects. The plaques, however, have kept her occupied. The reason for this is that many of her friends and neighbors have asked her to make them some.

Probably a comment from her husband prompted her into making a piece of ornamental aluminum into a rectangular base. The aluminum is scrubbed to remove all traces of oil and residue.

Next, the flower design is added. Instead of gluing the centerpiece to the plaque, Mrs. Jolin prefers to wire it with a special thin, hard-wearing wire. The flower design is spray-painted before being wired to the plaque. That is about all there is to it.

Once in a while, Mrs. Jolin will use oak or birch to form part of the centerpiece. These plants are well and are quite complementary to other materials used. Most of her floral patterns are artificial flowers and the berries of weeds or whatever she has in the background.

The main reason she uses weeds is because they have many unusual seed heads and leaf patterns.

The customer is given a choice of colors and patterns. The hard part of assembling the centerpiece is to keep them simple and uncluttered.

Mrs. Jolin habitually looks for plants matter that might fit well into a plaque. Small pine and fir cones are used. Dry milkweed is excellent and any odd-shaped plants having individual character works well into certain schemes.

She notes she has cleaned out many a garden of flowers that she didn't know enough to gather as many different varieties of plants as she wanted. For example, pussy-willows could have done well in many schemes.

Mrs. Jolin will be experimenting with other projects such as centerpieces for tables and letter holders. She has one request: a tissue box holder.

Mrs. Jolin finds her hobby rewarding in many ways. First of all, it offers something creative to do. Many times her three children participate in her projects and it has given her the opportunity to meet many new people.

Shakeup Seen In Leadership For Kremlin

MOSCOW, Dec. 15 (AP) — Premier Khrushchev, in a major shakeup, has let a lot of old horses go and added many new ones to his team at the top of the Soviet hierarchy. But he still seems to have a firm grip on the reins.

The Soviet leader still wears more hair than any of his colleagues. His jobs include: The chairmanship of the council of ministers of the USSR or premierhip.

First secretaryship of the communist party central committee secretariat.

Membership on the presidium of the central committee—sometimes he is called its leading member, although there is no such title.

And chairmanship of the central committee bureau for the Russian Federation.

All the recent changes in the party and government involved men who owe their careers to Khrushchev and who will be working under his direct supervision.

Polyansky was moved out of his job as premier of the Russian republic to become a deputy premier of the USSR, with no immediately announced duties.

The other two are Kosygin and Mikoyan, first deputy premiers.

Succeeding Polyansky as premier of the Russian republic was Gennadiy Voronov, 42, also a member of the presidium and a first deputy of the bureau for the Russian republic.

Voronov, with Polyansky, ran the Russian republic for Khrushchev.

At 45, Shelepin is one of the fastest rising young men in Khrushchev's apparatus. He was formerly a leader of the giant Young Communist League and, from 1958-61, headed the state security secret police organs.

His new inspection organization will have wide powers to ferret out corrupt officials in the government and it will be his duty to supervise the fulfillment of economic goals.

The job could become an important instrument of power in an ambitious man's hands, but Shelepin is still too small a fish in the Kremlin pond to misuse
