

Kennedy Arrives In Nassau

NASSAU, Bahamas, Dec. 18 (AP)—President John F. Kennedy and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan stressed close U. S.-British friendship—overriding various differences—in a meeting today under a brilliant subtropical sun.

In a series of little summit talks ending late Thursday, they are expected to discuss such details as a formula for ending their split over the Bay of Pigs missile plan for joint military aid to Cuba.

They also plan to survey the world situation in the Caribbean and try to figure out whether there is any profit to be made by the United States from Cuba and the Russian-Red China drive.

The prime minister, wearing a light gray suit, said he had met 16 times with American presidents and had concluded that "the most important and vital element of all such conferences is the friendship between our two countries."

He reminded Kennedy that the United States and the United Kingdom have been through "much together in the past" and said that this is their sixth meeting during his own two years in the office.

The president quipped that he was not sure the world was much better off after each of his meetings, but that he had benefited greatly from the counsel and friendship you have shown to me."

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Donovan Arrives in Havana to Discuss Release of Prisoners

HAVANA, Dec. 18 (AP)—James B. Donovan arrived today to resume negotiations with Fidel Castro for the release of 1,113 Cuban prisoners captured in the invasion of the Bay of Pigs in April, 1961.

Donovan was accompanied on a flight from Miami, Fla., by Berta Barreto, coordinator between Cuban officials and Cuban exile groups, and two members of the prisoners' families committee.

The International Red Cross, which assumed sponsorship of the exchange, also waited for Castro's word.

A flow of medical supplies to Miami has been, presumably, the condition of the exchange.

However, in a chaty interview that set a new record for Monday night, the President said "we ought to be rather pleased with the balance a power struggle has struck."

But it is he said, the Red Kennedy and Soviet determination to make a communist world in a balance of power "makes the stakes so dangerous."

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\$800,000 Blaze Destroys Harper Potato Warehouse

From 2:22 a.m. to dawn Tuesday Twin Falls firemen battled a huge \$800,000 blaze in a 219 Ash street southeast of Fifth Points east. The warehouse, belonging to E. S. Harper, Inc., burned to the ground while firemen fought throughout the early morning hours to keep it in check.

E. S. Harper said Monday morning that he won't know the exact total loss until later in the day, when the office safe, containing all business records for the Twin Falls warehouse and other warehouses in Idaho Falls and Payette, has been recovered.

Harper said there was about \$400,000 worth of starch stored in the warehouse, along with an special 18000 hooking machine designed for his operation. Also lost in the fire were three large potato and onion trucks and a dump truck.

Famed Star Dies of Cancer at 70

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 18—(AP)—Thomas Mitchell, an actor's actor, honored by his colleagues to the highest award of stage and television, is dead of cancer at 70.

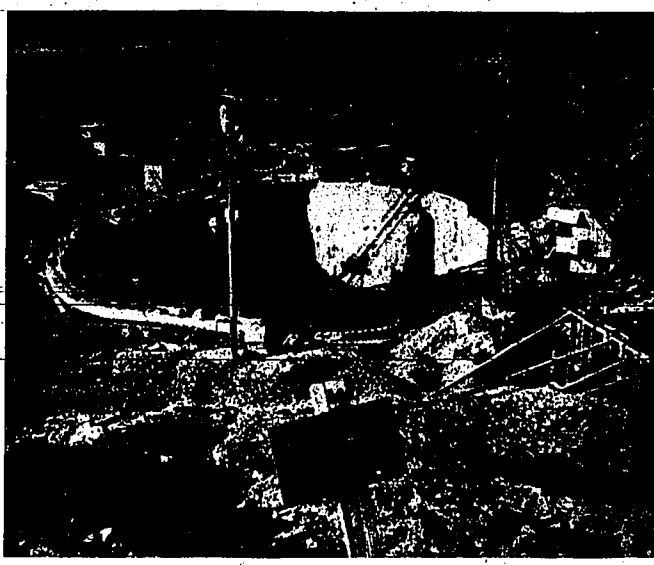
He died Monday, the deadly disease's second victim in two years among the famous names of Hollywood. The other was Charles Laughton, 69, who died Sunday.

They appeared once together in a movie—"The Hunchback of Notre Dame" in 1923.

The husky-browed Mitchell, who had the face of an Irishman and the soul of a Greek poet, was most famous for his role of Scarlett O'Hara's father in "Gone With the Wind." That same year Mitchell also played the booby frontier doctor in "The Treasure of the Sierra Madre" which he believed the finest Western ever made.

In the academy awards that year—1939—Mitchell was mainly in competition with himself. His performance in "The Sign of the Cross" for best supporting actor.

Born in Elizabeth, N. J., Mitchell started as a newspaper reporter and drifted from the city room to the stage door. One of Mitchell's earliest Broadway appearances was with John Barrymore in the 1918 production of "Redemption."

Telegram Rate Hike Given Okay

BOISE, Dec. 18 (AP)— Idaho's Public Utilities commission has granted permission to the Western Union Telegraph company to boost its Idaho rates for teletype messages and messages sent over the counter above certain word limits.

In making an application for a rate boost, the company contended it lost \$2.25 in Idaho intrastate business last year.

The commission ordered the charge for words in excess of 15 in full rate telegrams and in excess of 50 in day and night letters to be increased for full rate messages by half a cent per additional word. For day-rate messages the charge will be boosted half a cent for each additional five words and by half a cent for each additional five words in full-rate messages. A cent will be added for each additional five words in other applicable rate zones. Night letters will cost a half cent more for each additional five words in all rate zones applicable to intrastate service.

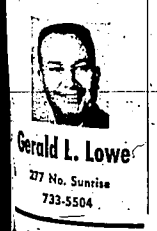

Foggy Thinking

The order to ban Christmas trees from three schools in Sharon, Mass., is an example of foggy thinking. It's also a good example of the type of incident over which parents are aroused quite easily.

In the first place, school administrators decreed there would be no Christmas trees in the schools because they feared the trees would violate laws governing separation of church and state.

Then when mothers got up in arms and started getting signatures on petitions, the confusion was compounded. One can only wonder if the mothers of Sharon, Mass., are equally quick to protest if they feel their youngsters are not getting an adequate education.

The Christmas tree incident at Sharon is a good example of something to be avoided.

DIFFICULT PROBE

In police work, it's always easy to follow the course of least resistance. When a crime is committed, there's an immediate effort to apprehend the person responsible.

Such a case is the murder of Bernard William Bailey in Twin Falls more than a year within a reasonably short time, usually because there is a witness or someone has knowledge of the crime.

Two suspects in the murder are in jail on other charges and the investigation is on.

Whether evidence will ever be developed in the case to the point where charges can be filed remains to be seen. Everything was against police almost from the moment of the murder.

Yet it speaks well of local law enforcement officers that the investigation has gone on, even under difficult circumstances.

RISKY IF TRUE

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Publisher Tells of Red Science City

NEW YORK, Dec. 18 (AP)—For nearly a month, William Benton of Connecticut back from a trip to the Soviet Union, reports the Soviets are building a vast new "science city" deep in Siberia. He calls it "one of the most extraordinary scientific centers in the world."

Written in the current issue of the Saturday Evening Post, Benton said the center, with 16 major scientific institutes and designed to house 20,000 research workers, "is a striking symbol of the Soviet intellectual challenge to the West."

He said the center is the first of several such centers the Soviets plan to build across Siberia. He said it could be matched in the country only if the theoretical research departments of several universities were combined with research divisions of several industrial plants.

Freeze in Florida to Hike Prices

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 (AP)—Effects of the Florida freeze are likely to be felt soon by housewives in the form of higher prices for fresh fruits and vegetables.

Arnold E. Chase, price studies director for the bureau of labor statistics, said Florida officials of the labor and agriculture departments are watching closely the freeze damage estimates in Florida crops to determine their effect on the nation's living costs.

A freeze of such magnitude usually is felt rather quickly at the retail level. New living cost figures due this week will show up the price situation in November. A new reading last week measured mid-December prices, but was too early to reflect the impact of freeze conditions on produce prices.

So it probably won't be until the January figures are announced in late February that the toll on living costs — probably sending them up to another record — becomes known.

Chase pointed out that a big freeze in 1955, one that hit crops in both Florida and Texas, sent over-all food costs up more than 3 per cent and jumped the fruits-vegetables index up more than 12 per cent. Texas was spared the latest freeze.

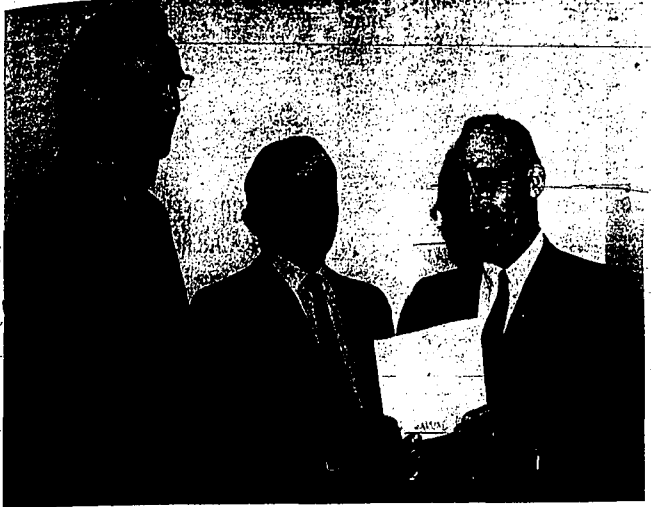

Safety Group Says Many to Die on Roads

CHICAGO, Dec. 18 (AP)—Traffic accidents during the long Christmas holiday, the National Safety Council estimates, may kill between 550 and 750 persons and cause disabling injuries to between 27,000 and 33,000 others.

The council's estimates cover the 102-hour holiday period from 9 p.m. local time Friday, Dec. 21 to midnight Dec. 25.

The council said Monday that during a comparable nonholiday period at this time of year, 470 persons are killed and 20,000 suffer disabling injuries.

The second-highest death toll for any holiday period was the four-day Christmas period of 1958 when 700 persons lost their lives in highway accidents. In last year's three-day Christmas holiday, traffic deaths totaled 624.

The nation's traffic death toll in the first 10 months this year averaged 110 a day for a total of 34,830, a record high for any single 10-month period.

Cincinnati, riding the crest of a 24-game winning streak in a two-season span, was nearly everybody's choice for the third straight week as the nation's top college basketball team in The Associated Press poll.

Figures compiled Monday gave the Bearcats a total of 433 points on 42 first place votes and two seconds among the 44 sports writers and sportscasters comprising the voting panel.

The two non-Cincinnati ballots gave first place to Duke's Blue Devils for the third straight week, placed second to the Bearcats with 349 points, a bare 84 points ahead of third-ranked Ohio State.

Loyola of Chicago, with 218 points, placed fourth and fifth respectively, leaving last week's first five unchanged.

There was a general shuffle in the lower half of the top ten. Kentucky and tenth ranked Seattle joined the elite, as Wisconsin and Oregon State dropped out. Wisconsin plummeted all the way down from seventh place after losing to Indiana State. Oregon State's downfall resulted from a split in a week-end series with California.

Colorado's unbeaten Buffaloes advanced two notches, jumping into sixth place after a beating of Pepperdine early for their fourth victory. Illinois (13-0) moved up to eighth, a saving of a saving of about \$14,000 over the year. 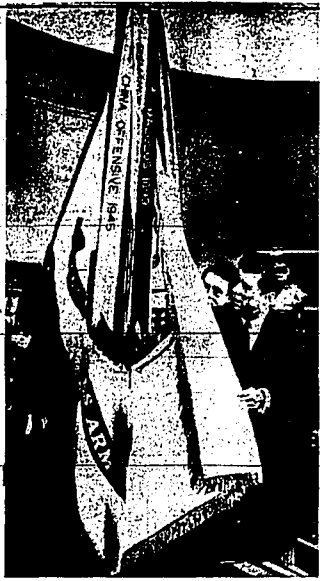
Osiris Espinola, a free-lance reporter from Istanbul, said in an interview that there are resistance movements but the organizations cannot get together.

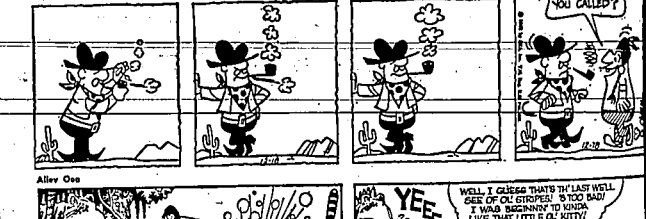
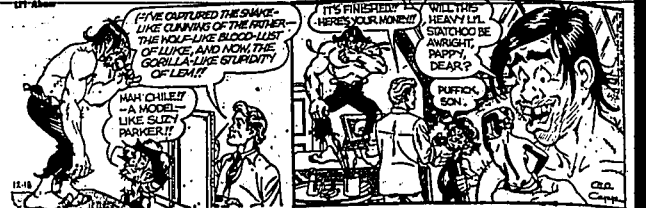
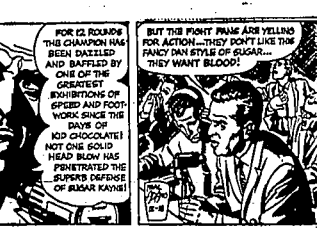

Yule Traffic Toll of 750 Is Predicted

CHICAGO, Dec. 18 (U. A. Christmas holiday) — A toll of between 650 and 750 is predicted for the nation by the National Safety Council.

The 102-hour span for 6 p.m. Friday to midnight Christmas day, the council said Monday, also could bring disabling injuries to between 7,000 and 10,000 persons from auto accidents.

One of every four of the impending traffic deaths is likely to be that of a pedestrian.

The estimates were based on an evaluation of traffic experience in past Christmas periods and an evaluation of this year's traffic volume.

During a comparable nonholiday period at this time of year the council said, 470 persons are killed and 20,000 injured in traffic.

Howard Pyle, National Safety Council president, said studies of past Christmas week-end accidents showed more than half the drivers involved had been drinking and that speed—driving too fast for conditions—was a factor in several-tenths of the accidents.

The most deadly span of the Christmas holidays week-end for pedestrians has been the last six hours of Christmas eve, with the final hours of Christmas night almost as lethal to walkers.

Pyle repeated an often-voiced caution to party tipplers: "If you have been celebrating, please don't try to drive or walk home. Take a cab or bus, instead."

"The number of traffic deaths during the holiday period would be sharply under estimates, were Americans to heed basic safety rules, he said.

"These include: Don't drink too fast for road and traffic condi-
