# U. N. Nations Ask Penalties For Portugal

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Dec. 19.—The U. N. general assembly asked the Security Council Tuesday to impose penalties on Portugal for its refusal to permit an effort to set the African territory of Angola on the way to independence.

The resolution was supported by the communist bloc and approved a harshly worded resolution that asks the Security Council to impose penalties on Portugal for its refusal to permit an effort to set the African territory of Angola on the way to independence.

The United States, Britain and France have joined the resolution. That cast doubt on any actual pact for sanctions since each has a veto.

Five additional allies of Portugal in the North Atlantic Treaty organization joined the resolution. They were Canada, Italy, the Netherlands, Luxembourg and Turkey. Other allies included Austria, Bolivia, New Zealand, South Africa, Spain and Portugal.

Three NATO powers were among the abstainers—Denmark, Greece and Norway.

The resolution was the toughest yet of any passed by the Security Council since the approval of the apartheid territory on Africa's southwest coast where Portugal has been seeking independence.

The Security Council's action is a step toward imposing sanctions on Portugal—a move directed at the NATO allies.

# News Around Idaho

**BOISE.** Dec. 19.—A bill for the one-half mill tax by counties for election expenses was among proposed laws adopted by the executive committee of the Idaho state legislature today. The committee also adopted a 10-point program for presentation to the 1963 session of the Idaho legislature in Boise Tuesday.

### Driver Dies After Plunge In Bulldozer

**BRIDAL VEIL FALLS, Utah, Dec. 19**—Investigators say a 25-year-old bulldozer operator apparently misjudged the distance between his machine and a 40-foot precipice Tuesday, resulting in a fatal plunge to the canyon floor.

### Researchers Find Value in Mother Milk

By The Associated Press

Passive disease protection for infants in mother's milk, what little girls are made of, and a look at the baby's bottle—there are subjects with a focus on health.

**Protection From Mom**

There is new evidence that babies may get some disease protection from their mother's milk.

Researchers at the University of Wisconsin find that antibodies—disease fighting elements formed in the blood—can enter the infant's milk. The antibodies travel, probably the inactive.

Babies don't start producing their own antibodies against disease germs until the second or third month of life. But the baby inherits some antibody protection from its stay in the mother's womb. Now it appears that breast-feeding babies receive this basic arsenal with more antibodies from mother's milk.

Researchers fed antibodies to newborn babies and found that the antibodies in the blood increased. This adds up to new evidence that the breast-feeding baby has real advantage over the bottled baby.

**Fatter Than Men**

Studies of the body composition of young women have yielded some interesting facts also.

Cornell university nutritionists studied a group of 4 women students, average height—almost 5 feet, 8 inches; average fasting weight—about 130 pounds. These women, the scientists could be taken as fairly typical of a more-or-less normal weight population of American young women. The average age was about 20½ years.

The researchers measured the amount of fat in the bodies of the women and found the average was roughly 28 per cent of the total body weight.

That means that the fat percentage of body weight for these young women was two and one-half times the fat percentage in male youths of the same men in similar weight groups.

**Hot and Cold**

Doctors estimate that it takes 150 to 200 mother- or father-hours a year to warm baby's bottles.

This may not bother them so much—but recent studies indicate that 60,000 observations of premature infants before, during and after feedings have been made, and subsequent studies of weight gain, food intake and other feeding elements have been reported.

Truth of the matter is, researchers say, baby doesn't care if its body temperature or cold, he just wants the bottle.

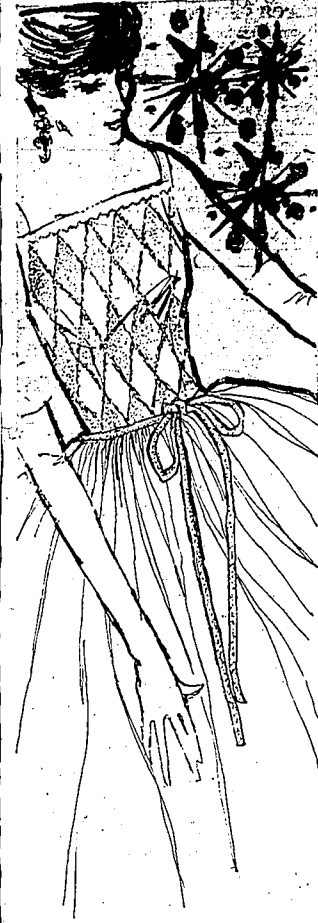

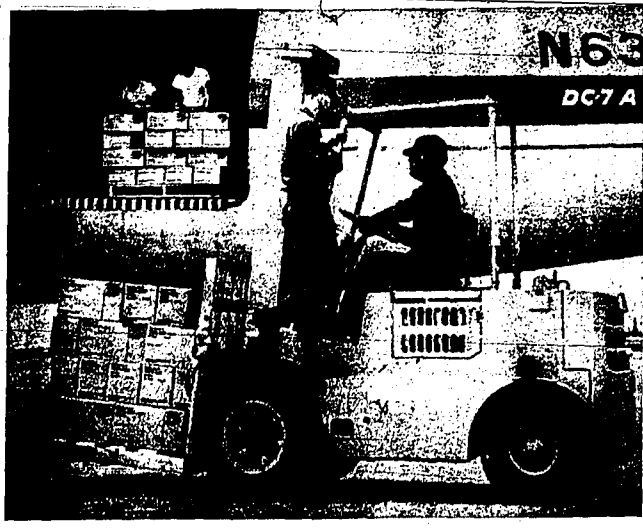

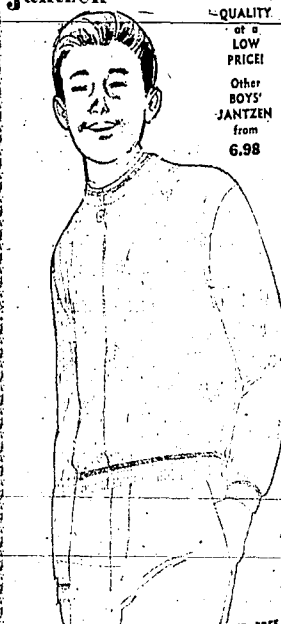

### Solons Take Dim Views of State Reorganization Plan

BOISE, Dec. 19.—Attempts to reorganize Idaho's state government appear likely to be not more successful in the 1963 session than they have in the past. Only a thin majority, 53 per cent, of lawmakers expressing their views in a survey by the Associated Press said they favor any reorganization of state government. It would take a two-thirds majority to approve a constitutional amendment, if that were required.

Only a slightly larger majority, 55 per cent, said they favor creation of a state department of natural resources, into which would be consolidated various agencies dealing with land, water, timber, minerals, game and the like. Most of the latter proposal might be accomplished without a constitutional amendment.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie, who has proposed various reorganization plans in the past, says he will suggest to the 1963 session the calling of a constitutional convention which could make the changes needed in the state's basic code. He is not likely to go into details of reorganization in his proposal.

A Democratic member of the senate, Sen. R. M. Wetherell of Blaine county, says he would favor such a plan—the calling of a constitutional convention—but would oppose attempts to bring reorganization by any other method.

Although statistically the replies of the legislators indicated reorganization proposals might be in for rough handling, comment by some of them indicates there could be a change in sentiment.

Success in achieving at least some measure of government reorganization was forecast by Sen. Perry Swisher, Bannock county Republican.

"There is," he said, "good reason to believe this session, both in mood and membership, will do something on critical governmental reorganization matters and modernizing the budget and revenue programs."

Rep. George P. Broeke, Latah county Democrat, said he favors "no changes in the executive branch of our state government."

"I do favor," he added, "changes to improve the legislative part of our state government. I favor annual sessions of the legislature or longer sessions, or sessions that will give the legislature ample time to give serious consideration to all legislative problems of our state."

"I also favor senate terms of four years."

Sen. Arthur P. Murphy, Blaine county Democrat, said he is uncertain regarding governmental reorganization generally but added he is in favor of the creation of a state liquor board, "thus removing it from the legislature."

Sen. Joseph L. Austch, Custer county Democrat, said he would support reorganization aimed at economy.

Rep. would be a great shock to that vanishing breed, commonly known as the taxpayer," he said, "if the legislature would once again try to relate economy in its vocabulary."

He said he favors a study by a "small Hoover commission" and added: "There are so many departments that could be eliminated or consolidated that we could unquestionably effect savings at the state level."

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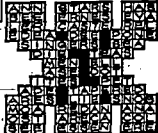

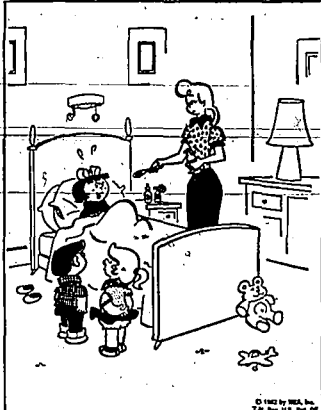

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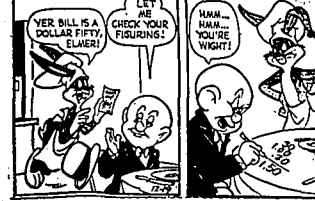

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# Opinions Differ on Plan for Free Library District

A petition has been presented to Twin Falls county commissioners asking them to establish a free library district for all areas of the county except Twin Falls city and Buhl. The city tax-supported libraries already exist.

In a survey by Times-News reporters in all communities within the county, a wide divergence of opinion was found regarding the proposal. Ideas ranged from apparent widespread knowledge and support in the Kimberly area to apparent lack of understanding at Pler and considerable opposition in the Buhl area.

The proposal to obtain improved library services for the county is not new. In at least two communities, Kimberly and Castledorf, previous efforts have been made to establish a lending library station from the state library.

Many persons indicated they did not know enough about the proposal to have an intelligent opinion. Fear also was expressed that funds derived from the two-mill levy would not be back in the local communities.

Robert Burrill, Twin Falls librarian, presented the petition which was prepared by Robert N. W. Butler, Twin Falls attorney. County commissioners are to call an election if the petition is found valid.

If the proposal is approved by a simple majority, county commissioners must appoint a five-man county library board. Burrill explained that the board would be elected at the next election. He said that a community might not get proper representation. Burrill said each area should suggest its own representative to the county library board. A local library board could be formed in each community area to advise the county board of local needs, he added. Such boards already exist in Pler and Kimberly.

"It is to be expected the county library board would try to serve the needs of the entire county first, but members no doubt would have local needs in mind," the librarian said.

He stressed the actual administration of the library district would be entirely in the hands of the board, so it is impossible to list exactly how the money would be used.

"The board would have the authority to build a library building, enter into contracts with the existing libraries in the county, obtain the services of a public unit, or work through school libraries," Burrill said. "They also could change any initial plans if it wasn't working out."

He added, it also is expected the board would be guided in its administration by suggestions from Helen Miller, state librarian, who currently is having an extensive study made in the state by the school of librarianship at the University of Denver. Such a library district is operating now in Pocatello.

"We can't in Twin Falls is trying to push something on residents in the rural areas," Burrill concluded. "If the district is not formed no progress can be made in improving library services. If it is formed, requests for services without such a district is to increase its own city tax levy."

Favorable comment on the proposal came from Herbert Thorne, Murtaugh LDB shop, grocer, and hardware dealer, who said he favored extending library service, depending on what the service offers to local people.

Florin Hulse, superintendent of Murtaugh schools, "Extended library service is a fine idea and one which we would like to have. It would be advantageous to have more books and technical materials available to adults and students."

The superintendent said the most logical location for a way-out library would be Murtaugh school where use could be made of present library facilities.

Hulse pointed out space is limited at the school building, but since consolidation of a local building program is indicated in the near future, plans could be considered for larger quarters. At Hollister, Homer Roberts and A. E. Kunkel, both retired teachers, thought it was a good idea because "the more books you can get to the public the better it is."

Mrs. F. E. Albin, Pler librarian, feels such a county library district could strengthen Pler's public library. The Pler library was begun by the Pler Women's club but the librarian's salary is paid now out of general city funds.

"Because it is not supported by a specific library mill levy, Pler residents would be included in the county district, while citizens of Buhl and Twin Falls would not."

Kenn Thurman, Pler city clerk, said if the library district worked in conjunction with the public library it would be good. Mrs. Clinton Dougherty, Twin Falls county Home Demonstration council, said there is need for more books than are available locally.

Representatives of the Orange Farm Bureau, Pler Women's club, American Legion and Home Demonstration clubs and several neighborhood clubs as well as church groups at Pler all were unaware of the proposal.

At Kimberly, Ron Miller, co-owner of a grocery store, approved the proposal. "Any addition to the educational facilities of a town is worth pursuing," he added.

Mrs. Robert Sherman, wife of the superintendent of schools at Kimberly, said, "I think it's a wonderful idea both from a personal standpoint and for the community."

Mr. and Mrs. A. P. Murray, farmers south of Kimberly, said they would vote for the proposal. " Taxes keep rising each year anyway, we may as well get something for it," Mrs. Murray declared.

Mrs. Don Whitehead, Mrs. Ivan Jackson, Mrs. Robert Deion and Mrs. Ralph Banning, all favor formation of a library district.

Beneficial to both students and adults were mentioned as reasons for support. Mrs. Williams, who worked getting signatures on the petition, said she was informed the county commissioners are "reluctant to set an election date because of lack of funds for personal notification of taxpayers."

She indicated the election would have to be held by Jan. 1 in order to get on the current year's tax rolls.

Irvin Kevan, Farm Bureau member and also Granger, said he would like to know more about the project but feels "townspeople would benefit more than country people."

Other persons also expressed the opinion that the project would be a loss because of additional taxes. Hollister residents also pointed out they could use the Twin Falls library for \$5 per year and felt it would be cheaper than the two-mill library levy which would be used to support the library district.

It previously has been pointed out by library officials the average cost to taxpayers would be about \$5 per year. The figure depends upon the assessed valuation for each individual taxpayer.

At Buhl, Mrs. A. S. Karaloff, librarian, said she felt the area was not so sparsely settled that there was need for a bookmobile and services could be offered from buildings already established.

The Buhl library charges 25 cents to all adults, city and rural residents alike. Residents there felt if more money could be obtained to keep the local library open longer hours, service would be adequate.

At Castledorf, Floyd Bowers, superintendent of schools, said he didn't know enough about the proposal to comment on it. There is \$30,000 allocated for library extension service in Idaho.
