First Group of Prisoners Freed Today

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 22 (AP)—U.S. official sources said Saturday night the first plane-load of Cuban invasion prisoners would be flown to Florida about 8:30 a. m. EST on Sunday. The source, at Homestead air force base where the captives are to be housed, said a Pan Am jet with the prisoners would depart at 6 a. m. American Western Airways plane would depart at 6 a. m. from Miami International airport for Havana. A second flight will leave Miami at 6:30 a. m., the spokesman said. Meanwhile, other Pan American planes will fly to Havana carrying cargo which will supplement the drugs and "food" demanded by Prime Minister Fidel Castro in modern history's largest ransom deal for 1,113 men captured in the April 17, 1961, invasion of the Bay of Pigs in southwest Cuba.

The transfer of the property will be made after official acceptance of the offer next week. The department of health, sanitation and welfare spokesman said transfer of the property would be completed within five to four weeks. When acquisition of the building is completed by the local school district, it must be used for educational purposes for 20 years and cannot be disposed of before that time.

"We are buying this for the post office to put it to," said the school superintendent. "The school superintendent is to be used for several functions in the district. The way they are used is now being studied and the way they are used is being studied. By consolidating storage space and administrative offices, space will be made available for other purposes" in the junior high school and Bickel elementary school.

Considerable space in the junior high school is being used for school district offices, school board meeting room, and storage of maintenance equipment. More space in Bickel school is now being used by offices for the district's school lunch program and storage of large quantities of foodstuffs.

Final plans for remodeling the old postoffice building have been drawn by Harold Gerber, local architect. The structure will be renovated to accommodate an office and storage facilities. Gerber mentioned nearly all personal property which had not been taken to the new postoffice including cabinets, tables, heavy desks and moveable shelf units. He also mentioned that the school district as surplus property.

Moving from the old building to the new one was completed about the middle of January and the new postoffice was dedicated in February.

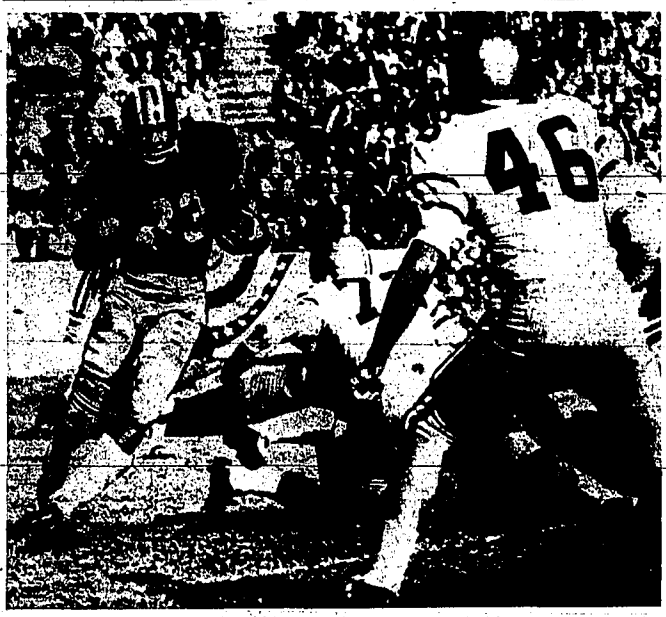

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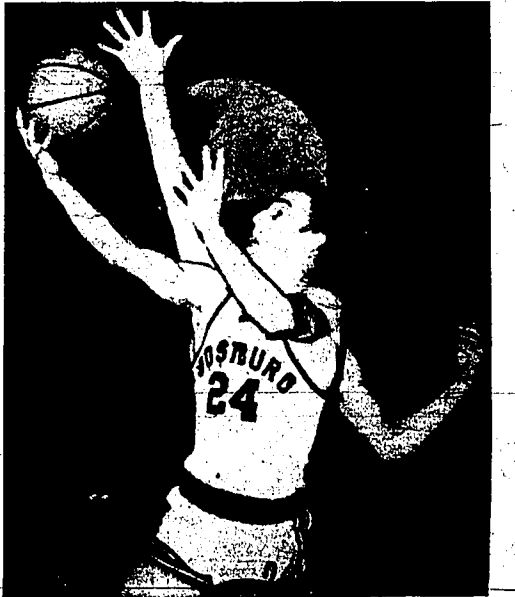

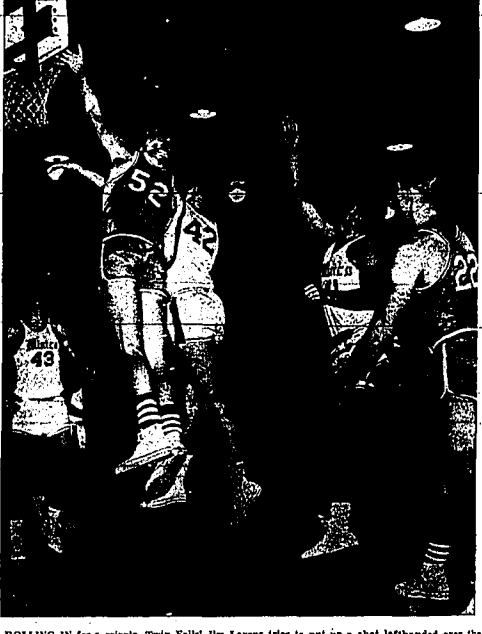

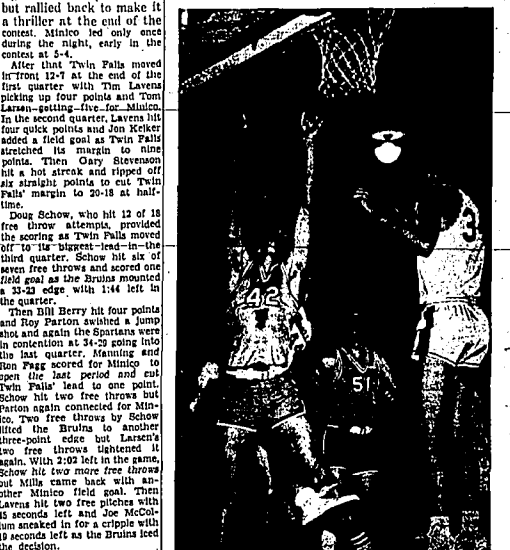

Don't Get "Het up" When Mercury Soars--It's Cold Way up Yonder

"Think it's cold where you live? It was a cool 85 degrees below zero, Fahrenheit scale, at 80,000 feet over Twin Falls the other day. At 20,000 feet it was just over seven degrees above and on the ground it was a rather warm 45 degrees.

They find out these things way up there in the blue? They do it by means of balloons and radiosonde observations. The data thus gathered is rolled together, and weather experts like B. Nelson, advisory agricultural meteorologist and chief of the weather bureau service office in Kimberly, are able to tell ground level residents what will happen tomorrow, next week, next month or perhaps next year.

Although some of the instruments used have "dropped" by parachute around the Twin Falls and Magic Valley areas, they are not sent up from here.

In this area the ascent is started from the weather headquarters in Boise. The radiosonde observations are made in this area except from there because by the time man became an unemployed cripple.

The ascent is made in a helium filled balloon, reach some 35,000 feet in the morning. The pilot knows about all he has to know.

In the upper air the temperature, for instance, remains practically constant at a given altitude, being unaffected by Earth's surface temperatures at lower altitudes.

Actually, the weather station at Kimberly is able to forecast temperatures and pressure changes at altitudes up to 30,000 feet than those above 80,000 but

the data is recorded because the balloons go about that high before inside pressure is more than outside pressure and the balloons permit the parachute to return the instruments.

In this area, wind direction and velocity balloons and instruments are sent aloft from Pocatello. Actually, eight in the middle, Twin Falls acts a better reading from Pocatello and Boise instruments than if they were sent up from here. These results go by teletype to all offices—including to a weather machine which operates practically around the clock in the Times-News office, the only newspaper in Idaho with this special service.

Nelson explained that a three-dimensional picture of the temperature, pressure and relative humidity distribution in the atmosphere is essential for weather forecasting and for meteorological research.

During the latter part of the 19th century, this information

was obtained mainly by sending meteorographs aloft on kites to automatically record, on a single sheet, the measurements of two or more meteorological elements such as air pressure, temperature and humidity.

Weaknesses of the system included the fact most flights never got above 10,000 feet; the data could not be evaluated until the instruments were found; results could be flown only in good weather, and there also was

Vault Time Lock Expert, Spouse Enjoy Having No Permanent Home

Mr. G. Lawrence Cummins is no home—and she loves it. So does her husband.

Both like to travel, and his job, which requires the services of an expert in his line, takes the couple all over Idaho and to other states and over portions of Europe and Washington. They are on the go constantly.

The job is a three-pronged chair. It involves keeping time locks on safes and bank vaults on time; it involves combinations

In fact, the time mechanism in a modern vault is so good that there have been no significant improvements made in this area since 1870.

As in the case of the Twin Falls bank, there are three time pieces in operation and any one is capable of unlocking the vault after a certain number of hours.

There are three, for one safety margin, to assure the bank opening on time each working day.

Cummins' father was a railroad and the family traveled

Newest Heart Surgery Will Raise Hopes

NEW YORK, Dec. 22 (AP)—At the prime age of 43, a once-vice president of a national firm became an unemployed cripple.

The slightest exertion, even climbing stairs, would result in stabbing through his chest. So narrow was his margin between life and death, his doctors were watching a football game on television could kill him. He was depressed, worried and sad.

And also very, very brave.

He volunteered for pioneering, but risky, surgery to drop the heart out of his chest and ream out the biological tract clogging his heart arteries. The operation was a success. He is now a healthy man, his blood pressure is normal, his meninges date with death.

Success could mean renewed life. Further, it might help pave the way for saving many thousands of men and women each year whose coronary arteries become narrowed or blocked with the cholesterol and other fatty materials.

He also knew that almost half the men undergoing this surgery had died on the operating table.

For several years he had proved too great a challenge to weakened hearts.

The patient was a debilitated gambler and won, through a technique to open the plugged arteries. The patient was Dr. Cannon and associates of the University of California at Los Angeles.

"Afterward, I tell the volunteers they are members of the 'Heart-Healthy Club,'" says Dr. Cannon.

Brazil Ready To Celebrate At Christmas

RIO DE JANEIRO, Dec. 21 (AP)—There is no snow for Brazil Christmas, but "Jingle Bells" and "White Christmas" are popular tunes.

It is midsummer in this hemisphere, in downtown Rio de Janeiro, near Copacabana Beach where the bikini-clad girls are mahogany brown and a 50-foot Santa Claus dwells traffic.

In back of the Santa Claus, against a cliff, are a giant painted star and the green and red "boas" festoons.

Towering over all—a constant reminder of the nation's basic plight—stands the Christ the Redeemer, the rocky, high-peered shanty towers of the poor.

Brazil has the biggest deficit in history, the 1952 budget (for nearly two billion dollars), beans and rice are scarce in a country where the average citizen raised the cost of living about 60 per cent for the year. But Brazilians appear determined to celebrate a wave of spending.

Part of the motivation comes from the rapidly declining value of the cruzeiro. This monetary unit dropped this month to 850 to the dollar—the lowest ever—and threatened to go even lower as printing presses worked overtime to produce paper money to meet Christmas obligations.

Colorfully wrapped Christmas packages hang from trees in Rio's business areas, brightly lit at night. Here and in other cities and towns the Nativity scene, complete with shepherds and animals, is a part of the celebration of the birth of Christ.

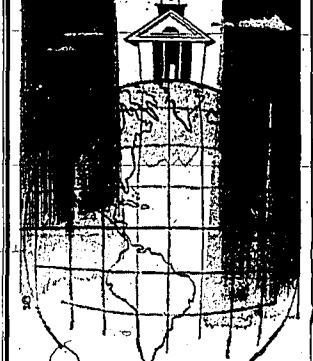

As the instruments are aloft, all readings are carried to Earth by means of the radio transmitter and are recorded at the weather station. Thus, if the instruments are lost, the information gathered is not.

Emergency Operation Highlights Cuba Blockade Duty for Twin Falls Sailor

The blockade of Cuba by the U.S. navy was a life thing—but so was the concern of the service for Dale Earl Denney, signalman from Twin Falls, when he became ill during that crucial period.

Denney, a former student of Twin Falls high school but who graduated from Brannan high school when his father moved there in construction work, has been in the service for 29 months. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Orville Denney, live at 1615 Kimberly road.

As a signalman the young sailor was stationed on the destroyer John W. Weeks when the Cuban crisis erupted.

The destroyer Weeks left Norfolk, Va., under sealed orders on Oct. 22 and was off the coast of North Carolina when crewmen realized something big was in the air. Denney said the executive officer passed the word.

When the destroyer reached the area off the southeast section of Cuba, the blockade started. So did the abdominal pains.

That was about 4 a.m. of Oct. 30, Denney says he knows the date well because it was payday and, although he was in sick bay, a friend brought his pay down to him.

As the pain continued, the ship's doctor diagnosed the ail-

ment as acute appendicitis and recommended immediate surgery.

The destroyers had no facilities for performing the operation so at 7 p.m. that day a helicopter from the carrier Randolph picked up Denney and transported him to the Randolph where surgery started just before midnight.

"At first," Denney said during the visit with his parents, "I could see what was going on but then they put up a blockade in front of my eyes and I could only listen. The doctors had given me a spinal shot."

The next seven or eight days were spent aboard the carrier where, among other things, he was given several pints of glucose and numerous injections.

About the time he was up and around the carrier had returned to Norfolk, but his own ship, the destroyer Weeks, was not around

He hopped from one ship to another in his chase of the Weeks. The trip included back to the Cuban area and then back to Norfolk again before he got aboard. He finally made it on Nov. 24, right back in Norfolk where the chase originally started.

Anything exciting happen during the blockade beside the operation? Denney said that while on the Randolph a Russian submarine was forced to the surface for inspection.

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Algeria Full Of Woe After Independent

ALGIERS, Dec. 28 (AP)—Five months after independence, Algeria is a land of economic hope and unfulfilled promises and hardship.

To a handful of politicians with more experience than others, the aid of France—not so long ago a bitter enemy—represented the only hope for relief.

But many of those in power think there should be no compromise with the principles of the revolution, that one million men did not die so that colonialism could reconquer Algeria in a different form.

From east to west, from Bouk Khas to Tlemcen, across the arid plains and rugged mountains, the problem is how to fill empty stomachs, how to clothe children suffering from exposure. The United States as well as France is helping.

The country found itself on its own with brutal abruptness.

Eighty-five per cent of the million European settlers who were Algeria's economic backbone have left. The result: the economy is at a virtual standstill with 90 per cent of the adult men lacking work.

Algeria's politicians grope for a solution amid promises and delays. Disillusioned troops, only yesterday national heroes, sit across the countryside in search of food and supplies.

Faces are tense in the National Assembly building, where the place in the windows still has not been replaced after plastic bomb attacks by European extremists last year. For hours on end, the deputies listen to charges of corruption and inefficiency, to calls for new economic and financial measures and calls for unity.

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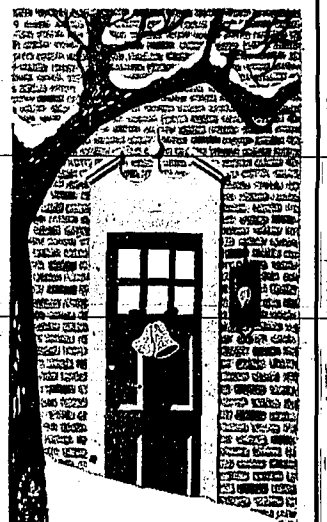

BOISE, Dec. 22 — Christmas Eve or morning, depending on individual family tradition, thousands of boys and some girls will find new rifles and fishing gear under their Christmas trees. This custom generally is approved by the rod and gun fraternity as well as other men and women who simply love the great outdoors but have no particular bent for either the angling or shooting sports.

Much has been written on the subject of Christmas guns and youngsters. One of the best and most-quoted articles was published several years ago by the National Rifle association of America. It examines "mother's rights" and "father's rights" to shoot, and Dad's parental responsibility for making correct decisions. All are involved, and much more.

For example, a popular myth is that "teaching a boy to hunt automatically inculcates a person's ideals and attitudes toward the wild resources and indeed, toward all mankind. It does not. A large proportion of anglers and hunters are precisely nature's enemies.

Sociologists and psychologists have long puzzled over the question as to why the underlying motivations that drive some people one way and the other, when the majority answer, in any case, is not enough to say that a person's basic nature comes to the fore, that he was born that way and that a given set of circumstances will bring out the best or worst—there is no man.

There is an increase of fish and game hogs in the field. But there is a real increase in the number of sportsmen whose consciences who practice self-restraint and abide by the conservation laws. This is not to anticipate, often with championship skill. The national rifle championship of the Old West had but one leg and obviously did not find his handicap a difficulty in competing for the title of best marksman of the country.

died, literally, and other factors are all suspected—the artery becomes plugged much like a rusted pipe.

Dr. Canton and Dr. William P. Loughead, chairman of the UCLA department of surgery, and Dr. Albert Kattus, a cardiologist, accept only volunteers for whom nothing else offers hope. All have severe anginal pain because the heart muscle cannot get enough blood and oxygen under the areas of physical activity or emotional stress. One man was swallowing 40 to 50 nitroglycerine pills daily to ease his heart pain.

With dye injections and X-rays they locate the blocked coronary arteries. The heart is laid bare, the arteries slit open, and the plugs removed while the patients are kept going with a heart bypass machine.

Among 19 men and one woman, four men have been restored to family activities and one is even playing tennis again, Dr. Canton said.

Nine died during or immediately after surgery and two died months after their operations. One of the latter was fully active for two and one-half years. One day he put a new roof on his house, went to a baseball game and took his wife dancing in the evening. But later a return of the artery blocking brought death.

Three others appear definitely improved, and two did not benefit.

The approach is experimental, and "we do not try to sell it to anyone," Dr. Canton said. Some men decline the chance and sometimes wives say no.

The death rate has been high, as it usually is in any new technique, as it was in the initial operations to correct congenital defects in children's hearts. Today, those operations are much safer and surer.

Areas Exist in Magic Valley Where Citizens Can Chop Christmas Trees

One of the most widespread Christmas customs is the Christmas tree, which in modern days decorated with all kinds of things, ranging from popcorn to bright lights.

Science Now Makes Ahab "Fade Away"

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 22 (AP)—Captain Ahab would talk over in his watery grave if he knew what was going on today at the University of Washington computer center.

There, in an electronic Sargasso sea, scientists are using international whaling commission data to feed into a machine facts and figures gathered during the last 21 years by expeditions to the Antarctic, the only major whaling grounds left in all the seas.

The data will be used to determine catch limits, hunting and methods of conserving the last large specimens of these mammoth marine animals.

It's a far cry from the days of Moby Dick. Gone are the Nanucket steeple-chases. Gone are the cries of "Tain't she howl! 'Tain't she breach!" and "Dead whale or stove boat." Gone are the Queequegs, the Tajiings, the Starbucks.

Science has replicated the mad, mad lookouts' eyes, with radar and the harpooners' skill and muscles with powerful, accurate guns. And the knowledge, experience and instinct that the successful whaler had to have in Ahab's day has been supplanted by an electronic brain.

The man who runs this computer is Dr. Douglas G. Chapman, a 46-year-old biochemist, a biologist who became an international authority on the use of statistical methods for solving biological problems when he conducted similar work on fur seals. This is his first whaling adventure.

Safety Director Tackles Hard-Sell Job on Freeway

BOISE, Dec. 22 (AP)—An idea is a walking lion to sell to a man scooting 70 miles per hour down a spanning new interstate freeway.

This is the task, however, of Idaho's traffic safety director, Robert McCall, a former state police lieutenant who has been trying for four years now to speed down the freeway.

It's a job that doesn't decrease with the times, or the introduction of seat belt headlamps, safety glass or seat belts. As a fact, it's increasingly burdensome with the expanded leisure time of America, faster highways and climbing auto registrations.

"We do have problems with traffic safety," McCall says, "but we've also had some luck."

National highways deaths this year have risen 10 per cent, he said. Idaho, even with the increased miles to drive, time to drive them in and an interstate highway program, has risen only 1 per cent.

The state's biggest and as yet unlicked problem, according to McCall, are country roads which so far have claimed some 65 per cent of all the lives lost this year in Idaho auto accidents.

McCall said he has spent more than a year traveling around Idaho talking to county commissioners and city leaders to make directional signs uniform and visible to drivers.

"This is our biggest problem," he said. "Sometimes these road signs are 'blocked' by crops or weeds and obscure to the driver. There was a case some years back where five people were killed near Butte. The intersection had yield right-of-way signs, but nobody knew whether to yield or not because they couldn't see into the intersection for the weeds."

He said Canyon county has a man who does nothing but make sure people can see country road signs. "This man has done a terrific job, too," McCall said.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie has said he will ask the legislature for a law making seat belts mandatory in Idaho. Such a ruling has already gone out for drivers of state government autos—periodically checked by the state police to see if seat belts are fastened.

As in previous years, the governor is expected to make separate address to the legislature on traffic safety when it reconvenes in January.

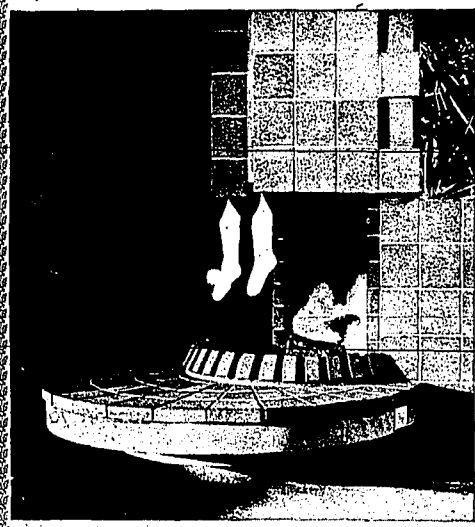



Budapest Taxi Driver Lives Grimly in Workers' Paradise

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Dec. 22 (AP)—So you are another wicked American Imperialist? The Budapest taxi driver said with a wry laugh.

"I'd give anything if I could be an Imperialist and leave this workers' paradise."

Istvan RMC, a burly, good natured fellow in his early 30s, had picked this reporter up in front of a Budapest hotel, just before he dropped me, he invited me to visit his home.

"Pick you up tomorrow night," he said.

Istvan's life is in sharp contrast with that led by the members of Communist Hungary's new privileged class. They live in different worlds.

The worker for whom communism ostensibly was created, is still waiting for his blessings. On the average, he pays two weeks' wages for a pair of shoes or a month's salary for a suit. He may wait three years for an apartment, despite Hungary's many housing projects.

Members-of-the-elite—on the other hand—are eligible to obtain houses in residential districts in the hills overlooking Budapest. They get preferential treatment in buying the 6,000 to 7,000 cars imported annually. They can buy French fabrics and Western delicacies.

The road to Istvan's apartment led out of brightly lit downtown Budapest to a grimy industrial area. Here workers fought against Russian tanks in 1956.

Air Force Takes Over Atlas Site

PLATTSBURGH, N. Y., Dec. 22 (AP)—The air force has taken over the first intercontinental missile installation east of the Mississippi river.

A ceremony put the "operational" sign on 17 Atlas-P missiles built in the vicinity of the strategic air command base here at a cost of 200 million dollars. Ten are in Clinton, East and Franklin counties, and two in neighboring Vermont.

The Atlas-P, launched from deep in the ground, can carry a payload warhead a quarter of the way around the Earth in 30 minutes.

The complex was completed 19 days ahead of schedule. Ground for the first launch also was broken at nearby Champlain on June 17, 1960.

Directives Add Security To A-Weapon

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—The Pentagon has issued new regulations to guard against developing nuclear weapons either through improper security measures or "human failure."

In two separate directives issued and signed by Deputy Defense Secretary Roswell Gilpatric, the department warned that ordinary standards for security procedures are inadequate in the storage and handling of A-weapons.

One provision would deny access to nuclear weapons for "over indulgence in alcohol, financial or family irresponsibility, or a poor attitude or lack of motivation toward the mission of the military program or toward duty with nuclear weapons."

One of the directives dealt at length with procedures for storing and transporting nuclear devices.

A spokesman said most of the regulations are already in effect, but that the directives will unify them throughout the army, navy and air force.

Businessmen Have Doubts Over Proposed Tax Slice

NEW YORK, Dec. 22 (AP)—Getting America going again, say many businessmen, is not nearly so easy a matter as merely cutting taxes.

Some while they feel it must be done, doubt that it would pep things up much.

Others, while they feel it would indeed pep things up, question whether current budgets could stand it.

Interviews with businessmen and business economists across the nation found little agreement on the administration's reported plans to try to reduce rates on personal and corporate incomes by 10 billion dollars in 1960.

The Kennedy administration thesis is that cutting taxes will generate enough additional business activity to produce enough new tax revenue to replace cuts.

"I can't get it through my head," said H. O. Berthey, president of International Harvester in Chicago, "how you can get more money by cutting revenue."

"The general agreement in principle, however, that taxes are too high in relation to business activity."

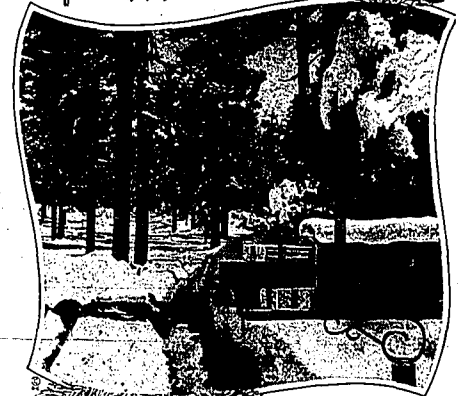

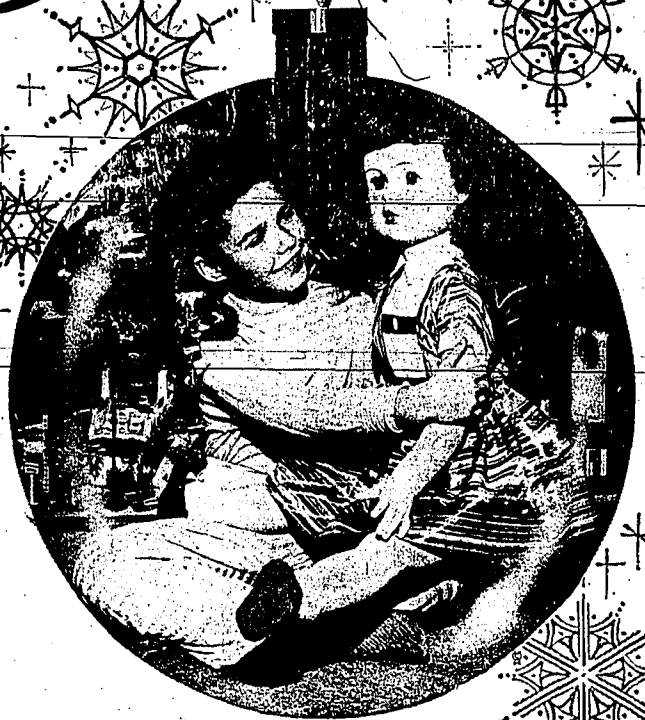

Executives Now See Need For Increased Education

NEW YORK, Dec. 22 (AP)—Robert S. Bell already had a bachelor degree and a law degree Nevertheless, in 1925 when he was 40, Bell returned to the campus one day a week for a semester to a year.

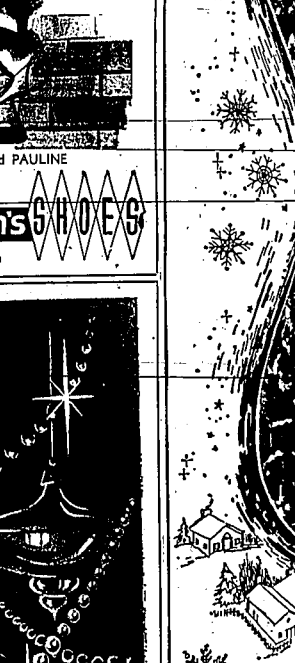

He is Mr. Average Englishman, according to a government survey published last night.

The report, based on a two-month survey, presents a picture of a man very different from the usual overseas picture of John Bull as an individualistic sort of man, at peace with his world and finding his pleasures among his books, his guns or in the village pub.

Indeed, it portrayed him as a member of a vast, rather featureless middle class, living in "sprawling suburbs on the American model," the materialism of society, but unwilling to go against his own current.

Oxford Research Opens Avenues On Skin Disease

LONDON, Dec. 22 (AP)—A medical authority says that research at Oxford university has opened avenues which may lead to the eradication of leprosy and the control of many common skin diseases.

Dr. A. G. Med. Weddell, neurologist and professor in human anatomy at Oxford, has told reporters about research into the cause of itching and skin pain.

"We found that bits of skin nerves are constantly dying and being replaced. It is this turnover of the skin which, in susceptible people, causes all the trouble in leprosy." He also said that nerves had been found at the bottom of the trouble in another common skin disease, psoriasis.

President Diem himself is said to be working out the design details for the interior, but they have been kept secret.

Well-informed government sources say the building will be a replica of the pale yellow pseudo-classical structure constructed for the then French governor-general of Indo-China in 1953.

"Dead Man" Wants Out Of Hospital

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 22.—A 77-year-old man who was in a hospital for a week and a half is trying to get out of the hospital in time to go home for Christmas.

George Skranec, 77, Mequon, attempted to leave the hospital after a cardiac stimulator slipped off his chest. "We brought him to the hospital said he was 'stone cold,' but in ten minutes he was dead," said the doctor.

Dr. Robert Merwick, 27, a medical resident from Chicago, discovered Skranec's heart was beating about once every 15 or 20 seconds.

"I gave him a cardiac stimulator and then pumped in glucose with a drug to raise the blood pressure," Merwick said. "We gave him oxygen and generally showed improvement, although he was in a coma for three days.

Now the "dead" man walks around the hospital, wondering if he will be out before Christmas.

"We'll probably let him go soon if nothing else turns up," Merwick said.

Scientists Take Time to Study Codes

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—It will take scientists weeks to translate the code which the Mariner II told them about Venus during its 43-minute fly-by Dec. 14.

Why? Because the interplanetary space language used by the satellite in its agreement with Mariner and by Mariner to its radio reports to Earth is an extremely complicated code.

East Germans May Have Poor Holiday

Faced by widespread discontent and grumbling from East Germans, the communists have made great efforts to cheer up the population by dressing up East Berlin.

But the city still is drab compared to West Berlin. Shop window displays in East Berlin are neat and attractive and scores of Christmas trees have been put up along the eastern side of the anti-edge wall.

The fair's cupboard, like that of East Germany, is almost bare. Snacks on sale at the fair include apples on a stick, potato cakes and "blutwurst," blood sausage. All the same suggests the sausage has very little meat and that is of the cheapest "block."

Absent from this year's fair is Germany's hot dog, "Kuckwurst." In the past hot dogs were always on sale at the fair. Missing are nuts, Christmas cake and chicken. But present, none and in large quantity, is the propaganda.

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Ulbricht Says Economic Need Tops Berlin

BERLIN, Dec. 22.—Walter Ulbricht, East German communist leader, has been quoted as saying that building up East Germany's shaky economy is more important than solving the Berlin problem.

"To be sure," he told a group of party leaders, "we are considering the political fight for the peaceful settlement of the German question, a peace treaty and the solution of the West Berlin problem."

"But in fact economic tasks take first place."

Ulbricht spoke at a meeting of local party leaders in Leipzig last week-end. His words were published in the official daily Neues Deutschland.

DOESN'T WANT PAY HIKE

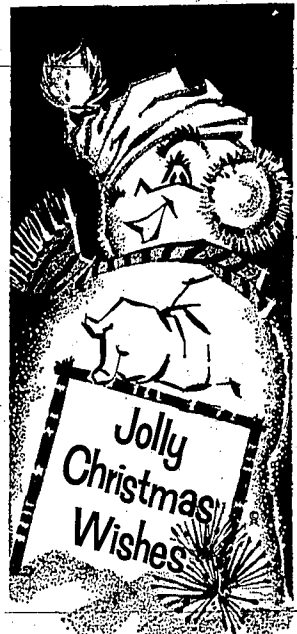

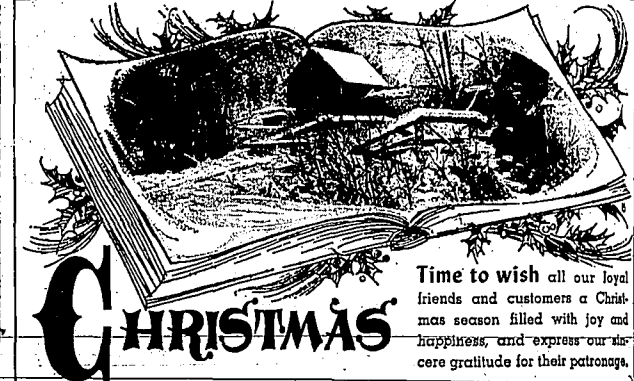

New York Newspaper Strike May Be ITU's Do-Die Effort
