

Dock Crews Close Ports In Walkout

NEW YORK, Dec. 24 (AP)—A strike of longshoremen began to spread rapidly today along docks from Maine to Texas. The International Longshoremen's association reported that in New York alone it had immobilized 25,000 men. Pickets began marching in a dozen or more Atlantic and Gulf coast ports, but the union said full picketing would not start until after Christmas. The walkout began at 5 p.m., Sunday on the expiration of an injunction that had held the ports closed since last October. A last-minute appeal by President Kennedy for a postponement was rejected by the union. First reports showed 21 ships tied up in Baltimore; 20 in Houston, Tex.; 14 in New Orleans, La.; three each in Boston and Seattle; and two in Newark, N.J. Many ships sailed Sunday in order to beat the deadline for closing the ports almost empty to start the holiday season.

Famous Idaho Judge Dies In Pocatello

POCATELLO, Dec. 24 (AP)—District Judge John A. Carver, 71, Pocatello, renounced in the local profession after being blinded at an early age, died Sunday at the age of 66 of a heart attack. Funeral services are pending. One of his sons is Assistant Secretary of the Interior John A. Carver, Jr. Another is Dr. Terrell O. Carver, Idaho state health commissioner. Judge Carver was born in 1896 in Preston. He had been blind since childhood. He attended the University of Idaho law school, where he was elected to three terms as Franklin county prosecutor. In 1928, he moved to Pocatello to take the job of assistant city attorney. Shortly after, he was appointed municipal judge and served four years. Judge Carver developed an early interest in politics, which led to his appointment as U.S. attorney for Idaho in 1932 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. Three years later he ran for the United States senate, but lost to the late Idaho Gov. Owen Chamberlain for the Democratic nomination. Carver served as U.S. attorney for Idaho for 19 years, until he resigned after the Republican victory in the 1953 election. He returned to Pocatello and served as mayor of the city until the peace in 1954. He won a district judgeship and was reelected in 1958. The current term would have his last under Idaho law. He would have served the age for one of the heaviest attacks and could not seek reelection. Survivors include his widow, four sons and three daughters. Deceased John A. Carver and Terrell O. Carver, the other said his son Monroe D. Carver, who is with the U.S. Bureau of mines and Murray A. Carver, an insurance man in Boise. Mrs. Carver was the judge's secretary for many years and typed his legal papers in Pocatello.

The board of Cuban officers demanded every promised pound of the 70 million ransom in drugs, medical supplies and foodstuffs before he permitted continuation of the flights to freedom. The Red Cross said the goods finally had been delivered.

MIAMI, Dec. 24 (UPI)—For more than seven months, the day began about 6:30 a.m. with a push, a shove, a loud noise. Each day was like another. And always the starting light of the sun in the daytime and the electric bulbs when it was dark outside. About 300 of us—some were political prisoners—were crunched in a cell maybe large enough to hold 60 beds.

After our ruds awakening by the guards, we waited for breakfast. Sometimes it came. Sometimes it didn't. We had to warm it up when it did come. Normally we were served coffee and bread, sometimes coffee and plain.

Sometimes, for as long as a month, we would be given our breakfast at 11 a.m. Our lunch at 2:30 p.m. and our supper at 7 p.m. Normally, however, we would get our lunch—usually commensal with nothing to drink—about 3 p.m.

After long hours of waiting we would be permitted to take turns at the two shower baths provided for us. Then we would be served supper.

It was macaroni. Always macaroni as long as I can remember. It was terrible, just terrible. Then the walking again, always dressed as Par 2, Colman U.

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After that, starting at 9:25 a.m. EST, the first plane carrying 109 captives imprisoned in the so-called Bay of Pigs invasion was permitted to take off. It was followed by a second plane carrying 48 former prisoners. Added to the 425 freed yesterday, this left only 47 prisoners still in Cuban hands.

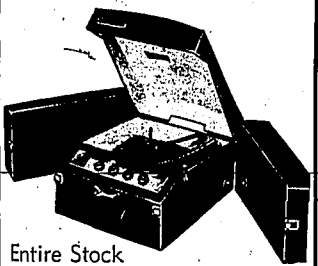

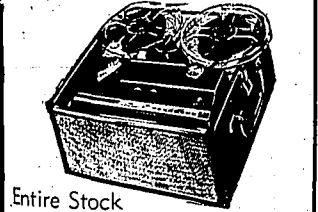

About the only thing that would have pleased the communists would have been an open disagreement between the leaders of the U.S. and England.

Anyway, the Russians seem determined to make as much as possible out of the decision. Since some sources in England weren't exactly overjoyed on the decision to abandon the Skybolt missile, and concentrate on the Polaris missile, the Russians saw an excellent chance to stir up some trouble. They immediately claimed Britain's prestige had been dealt a heavy blow and nothing good could come from the deal so far as Britain is concerned.

Inasmuch as there are some disgruntled people in England, the communists are bound to make some propaganda gains with their claims.

It's not difficult to see why the Russians are trying to do this. The split between the U.S. and England, if they could somehow start a rift between the two great powers, communism would stand to gain. It's also not difficult to see why the Russians aren't happy over the decision to concentrate on the Polaris. The missile, designed to be fired from a submerged submarine, has been proved quite effective. It is an operational weapon that can be stationed on a mobile, underwater launching platform quite difficult to detect.

On the other hand, the Skybolt has had only one successful test after a whole string of failures. Significantly, the one good test came after President Kennedy and Prime Minister Macmillan made their agreement at Moscow.

The Skybolt is designed to be launched from an airplane which is a lot easier to detect than a submerged submarine. So long as the communists holler, the free world can be fairly confident it is on the right course.

ILL-ADVISED TRIP

Some 76 American college students, who may be victims of communist propaganda, had planned to visit Cuba during their Christmas vacation. The U.S. State Department promptly threw a thumb down on the project, pointing out the U.S. could not guarantee the safety of an American citizen in Cuba. The state department move could have been anticipated because the U.S. is not anxious to get involved in any more incidents than necessary with Cuba. Moreover, the possibilities of propagandizing the students are quite obvious.

But the 76 students didn't give up immediately. They announced they would fly to Cuba from Canada and the Cuban government started working from the other end to gain Canadian approval of air transportation. Here is a clear indication communist propaganda is involved in any manner, and the Cuban government would not have stirred.

As everyone is aware, the U.S. and Canada work quite closely on many things, so in due course, Canada also refused to permit the students to fly to Cuba, presumably if the U.S. can get to Mexico, they can obtain transportation to Cuba, but the route has not been smoothed for them.

Time was when students weren't looking for a special trip during the Christmas holidays. They were only too anxious to spend the holiday with their families and friends. It still seems like a good idea.

With steady deterioration of the family unit, and the resulting social turmoil, it would seem college students would be only too eager to do their part in preserving the family. Yet a certain percentage continues to look for reasons to go anywhere except home at every holiday from classes.

The trouble that follows when vacationing students gather at some resort is a powerful argument for them to vacation at home.

PARENTS' RESPONSIBILITY

There will be much debating over the Woodside, Calif., school proposal to approve paddling of students as a disciplinary measure. If the next time a school administrator can expect nothing but trouble.

Many parents feel physical punishment of their youngsters is something that should be left up to the parents, and some do not believe in any type of physical punishment.

If a student is so unruly in school that instructors and others feel physical punishment is in order, the student should be punished until such time as parents can guarantee good behavior. And if parents are unable to discipline the youngster, then it becomes obvious the student is bound to become a problem in society. Most states have correctional institutions for such youngsters.

But paddling as a disciplinary means is something that should be left up to individual parents.

NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (UPI)—Russians have accused three more United States embassy staff members in Moscow of spying to learn Russian secrets. The charges are the latest in a series of such accusations against Americans so accused in the last three months.

These, may include everybody under the ambassador's cover, not including, under the ambassador's cover, the ambassador is never a spy; in fact some of the agents keep their eyes on him.

Who is no secret. Every country assumes that everybody on these levels is a spy and they act accordingly.

On the other hand, every embassy in Washington is assumed to have a large contingent of espionage agents. All, of course, have jobs they do not know how to do, and the other jobs serve as "cover" for their spying activities.

SPIES USEFUL TO US—Since we have cataloged all the agents in, say, the Russian embassy, why don't we bundle them up and ship them home? And why don't the Russians do the same? The answer is simple: The Russians expect instead of only seven?

The reason is that the known Russian spies are useful to us and our spies are useful to the Russians. Through other agents, acting as informants, they get information, which do the same.

The information sometimes has a bit of truth to it. Sometimes it is false to throw the spies off the scent. Some of the information, true or false, leaks to Russia. And why don't the Russians do the same? The answer is simple: The Russians expect instead of only seven?

MORE QUESTIONS, ANSWERS—Why, then, if both we and the Russians know agents are being fed a mixture of information, why do the spies report to both Washington or Moscow? Because it is sometimes possible to separate the truth from the false. The true may be valuable and the false may be dangerous.

Maneuvers End May Mar Test Finish

MOSCOW, Dec. 24 (AP)—The scheduled ending of Russia's Christmas military maneuvers in the Arctic region renewed speculation today that the Kremlin may declare a unilateral suspension of nuclear tests as of Jan. 1.

The United States and Britain already have announced that they will not abide by any nuclear moratorium which is not policed by on-site inspections. They point out that Russia broke the last unpoliced moratorium.

Western observers speculated the end of the maneuvers would signal the conclusion of the current series of Soviet tests. They believe the Kremlin leaders would seize a propaganda opportunity and announce that Russia would stop testing as of the first of the year.

Anti-Red Dominican Claims Win

SANTO DOMINGO, Dec. 24 (AP)—President Luperon lifted anti-communist presidential candidate of the Dominican Revolutionary party, claims victory and said he is not bothered by reports of a plot to assassinate him.

The 53-year-old firebrand, who has lived half his life in political exile, summoned reporters to his suburban home today to declare "I have been elected by a sweeping majority." He said he will leave tomorrow for a Christmas vacation in the United States.

Unofficial returns bore out his claims of a landslide victory. With 612,167 votes, he held almost a two-to-one lead over conservative Viriato A. Fiala of the National Civic Union who had 308,278. The total vote was slightly over one million. There were three other also-ran candidates for president in Thursday's election, the nation's first free one since 1924.

Doach said "nothing but death" could prevent his inauguration. He said he indicated he did not place much stock in reports made by his supporters that there is a plot to kill him.

Reds Launch New Earth Satellite

MOSCOW, Dec. 24 (AP)—The Soviet Union launched another Earth satellite—the 12th since March.

The series of satellites, all unmanned, are probing space for information which will be used to solve future space flight by man.

The launching was announced by Moscow radio, which said the satellite's orbit time is 90.45 minutes.

At the highest point of its orbit, the satellite—called Cosmos 12—is 283 miles from the Earth. At the lowest point it is 120 miles away.

The announcement said the satellite's mechanisms are functioning normally. Its weight was not revealed.

When Cosmos-1 was launched in March, the Russians said the series would gather information about meteorites, cloud formations, radiation, temperatures and related matters.

Old Red Debt Payment Asked

RANGOON, Burma, Dec. 24 (AP)—Burma's military government is pressing the Soviet Union for payment of some 10 million dollars owed for rice shipped in 1954, the newspaper Hanthawaddy reported today.

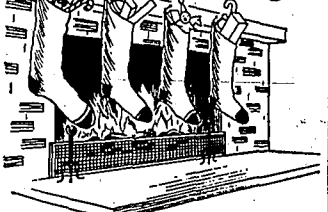

Personal Income in Idaho Expected to Rise Above '62

BOISE, Dec. 24 (AP)—Predictions as 1961's stage mid-year, although they were higher through July.

Sauce:

1 can (10, 2 1/2) whole tomatoes
1 clove garlic, minced
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon crushed sweet basil
1 teaspoon whole rosemary
1 1/2 cups finely chopped cooked turkey meat
Lasagna Noodles:
1/2 cup (10 ounce) noodles
1/4 cup (12 ounce) cottage cheese
-2 eggs, beaten
1/2 cup chopped parsley
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon ground pepper
1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese

1 pound mozzarella cheese, thinly sliced
Sauce may be prepared in advance as follows: Brown sausage in a large fry pan, then add remaining sauce ingredients except turkey meat. Simmer uncovered, until thickened, about two hours, stirring occasionally. Add turkey meat.
To assemble turkey lasagna: Cook lasagna noodles according to package directions; drain; rinse in cold water; combine cottage cheese, eggs, parsley, salt and pepper. Spread one-fourth of the sauce in a shallow baking dish, about 11 x 7 1/2 x 1 1/2 inches. Arrange in layers: one-third of the Parmesan cheese and one-third of the mozzarella cheese. Repeat sauce and layers twice, ending with sauce. Bake in 350-degree (moderate) oven one hour. Makes eight servings.

It was a slashing fullback Curtis McCullin said, "We just wanted the championship. . . we would have done anything."

Couch Frank (Pop) Ivy, whose Oilers were stopped in their effort to go up a third straight game, said he was "not a fan of missed opportunities in the first half."

"It was a tremendous comeback job but not being able to capitalize on opportunities in the first half is the difference," he said.

In discussing the field goal that was the margin of victory in the overtime, Ivy said: "These things go either way during overtime. We had our opportunity earlier in overtime but couldn't cash in on it."

"But then the arm atrophied. It was limp when I came out of an upper body cast after six weeks. The muscles were dead."

"We thought he'd never play again," says Patterson, who has an assistant coach named Robertson. "I knew for the meantime I was incapacitated," continues Robertson. "I was a varsity member of the team. . . ."

In its final game, Florida started flat, fumbled on the first scrimmage play and spotted Miami a 14-0 lead. The Gators came to life and eventually won in front 100,000 fans in a field goal in the final quarter.

Those were Florida's worst moments—the losing side of the coin of personality. When they were good, they were very good.

Just after losing to Georgia Tech and Duke, Florida led a team of impressive performers—beating Texas A and M 43-14 and Vanderbilt 42-7.

The Gators were at their best, though, in upsetting Auburn 41-14 in the first of five straight and were named ranked. Florida simply couldn't win.

It was a similar story again. Georgia and Florida played a natural rivalry who were tied for Florida but found the team demonstrating their winning personality.

Whatever it is that aces Florida to play so differently on various days—and even on the same day—most people who have loved them felt this was the best team in the country that last two games, judging them by the good days.

The mystery is—how will the Gators play Saturday?
