Death Rate Rises in Late Report

The last hours of the 102-hour Christmas holiday proved to be the deadliest and the total of highway deaths during the long week-end passed 650, late reports showed today. The first surge of fatalities reports came as the experts look tragically correct. The National Safety council had estimated that from 650 to 760 persons would die in holiday traffic accidents. When the first hours of the holiday passed with a comparatively low death rate, the council revised its estimate to 650 deaths. But the hopeful second thought did not last long. The United Press International count from 6 p.m. Friday until midnight, Christmas showed 652 traffic deaths.

More than 200 persons have died in traffic accidents on roads, highways and in fires and weather-connected fatalities. Ninety-seven died by 4 p.m. today in Britain. The continental toll with 40 dead, is directly attributed to the fog-breeding weather. The Netherlands 15, Germany 9, Spain, Switzerland and Sweden 3 each.

Three dozen avalanches struck Swiss resort areas in four days but only one man was reported to have been killed. In France, where a truck was overturned and killed four people.

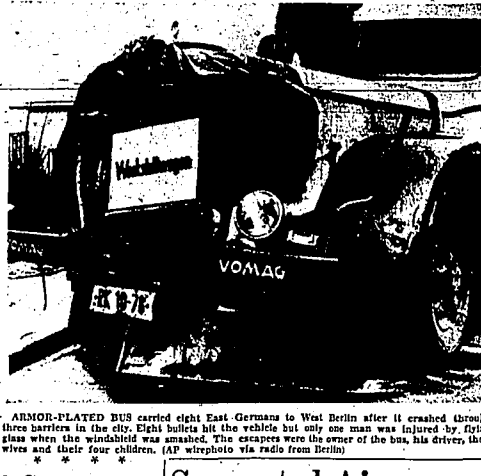

8 Germans Suspected Airman Case Tops '62 News

The bizarre murder mystery resulting from the slaying of a young mother and her son outranked politics as Idaho's number one news story of 1962. Battering by newspaper and radio newsmen from throughout the state gave the double killing and the strange course of its investigation 233 out of a possible 270 points.

The death in July of the Idahoan, married and appointment of former governor Len B. Jordan to succeed him was the fourth ranking story for 1962, and the first place vote, three, and in the top points.

Close behind was the primary election, marked by the Democratic gubernatorial candidate Vernon K. Smith for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination.

Ranked sixth with 63 points and the only other first place vote were the 1962 Christmas plume of a Northern Pacific train off a trestle into a north Idaho gulch.

Charges of irregularities in patient care at State hospital north of Boise during the general election campaign ranked seventh with 62 points, just one more than the eighth-place story, dedication of the Lewis-Clark highway.

Unsuccessful attempts to win an order for reparation of the legislature by county Board in 1962 election ranked ninth with 50 points. A district judge ruled that there should be no reparation but the Idaho supreme court reversed the decision, leaving it up to the legislature.

Rounding out the top ten stories was the failure of five-term veteran Rep. Frank Plog to win reappointment but the Idaho senate sent against Sen. Jordan. It won 54 points.

The death of the boy of a 15-year-old girl in a shallow grave on the Port Hill Indian reservation and the unsuccessful hunt for a slayer missed the top ten by one point.

The Mountain Home murder case, a fine case wanted by an air force officer against A-1 Lt. Gerald M. Anderson after a court-martial, was ranked 11th, failed to rank first or second on only one half ballot and it was third on two-thirds of the ballot.

Senator Davenport's death won 11 points, but it was not ranked higher than seventh. (Continued on Page 2, Column 1)

Frigid Air Mass, Storms Plummets Northwest Mercury

Frigid air drove temperatures far below zero throughout the great plains today. The mercury plunged more than 40 degrees in the upper Midwest after a massive Christmas day snowstorm created hazards for holiday-homegoers. The temperature dropped to 31 below at Eagle, Colo., and 27 below at International Falls, Minn., where the mercury dipped to 9 below at Manitowish.

The weather was bad from New England, where small craft fatalities were raised from Eastport, Me., to Block Island, N.Y. In San Francisco, where bay area refueling barges up in 20-degree temperatures, Florida was one of the few areas which showed a rise. It was 66 degrees at Fort Myers yesterday.

MOSCOW, Dec. 26 (AP)—The Soviets announced today the dismissal of agricultural expert Nikolai G. Ignatov as one of the Soviet Union's 11 deputy premiers. A shakeup in the Communist party of the Kazakhstan virgin lands also was announced.

The government newspaper Izvestia announced firing of two party functionaries in Kazakhstan—First Secretary Dinmukhammed A. Kunayev and Second Secretary N. Radnikov. Kunayev was criticized severely for the poor harvest this year in the vast wheat-growing region.

Izvestia said the serious shortcomings and mistakes of the party leaders were criticized. And it said party and government organs in the republic had "weakly directed industry, construction and especially agriculture."

Nina II Is Safe in Port After Voyage

NASSAU, Bahamas, Dec. 25 (U)—Nina II, a close copy of the smallest of Christopher Columbus' ships, reached San Salvador island Tuesday night 117 days after sailing from Spain in an effort to relive the voyage of discovery.

The Nina II left from Palos, Spain, with a nine-man crew on Sept. 19, hoping to reach land at San Salvador at the eastern fringe of the Bahamas on Oct. 12, the place and date that Columbus made his famous landfall in 1492.

Columbus' three ships, the Santa Maria, Pinta and Nina, sailed from Spain on Aug. 2, 1492, with 120 men and made the voyage in 70 days.

Aboard Nina II were the captain, Carlos Etxayo, 42, a retired Spanish naval lieutenant who long dreamed of the venture and financed the building of the ship; Robert Marx, 26, a Pittsburgh-born underwater explorer; Michel Viales, a Frenchman and six other Spaniards.

The ship, a 45-foot, carved hull of oak from plans of the Nina in the Columbus Museum in Spain, carried no radio, engine or other modern equipment. Its crew lived on food such as the 1492 crew had—lentils, honey, rice, beans and biscuits—and depended on 15th century navigation instruments.

ALL WRONG
From the beginning, there was scarcely anything right with the Bay of Pigs invasion of Cuba that landed more than a thousand men in Cuban prisons.

History will determine whether the United States was right or wrong in organizing and directing the Bay of Pigs invasion. But once the decision was made that it should have been given a chance to succeed, military men argued for adequate air support, but civilians in the form of the Kennedy administration decided against air support for the invaders.

WILL HE GO DISTANCE—However, Governor Rockefeller is involved in the same trouble. Did he start too soon? Will he still be running strong 18 months from now? Will he, too, be exhausted by the time the Republicans convene to make their demand for the presidential derby.

Rockefeller did not win the New York governorship last November by a landslide. He won by a slim margin. If his decline is projected mathematically, his hold on voters in 1964 will be slim.

NEW BLOOD—However, there is always the possibility that a new candidate will arise. In 1964, the position may be different. John F. Kennedy is the champion of youth. Just as President Eisenhower was sold to America by the fact that he was young, so has Kennedy been sold in the youth image.

Chief Sees Changes as Big Challenge

BOSTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—President Kennedy says the greatest challenge facing the Western Hemisphere is whether common sense and peaceful democratic methods bring a profound change in Latin America in the 1960s.

The President's views were expressed in a taped television program being made available to national TV stations across the nation through WOBH-TV in Boston.

Kennedy said the people of Latin America are moving through a period in which they are determined to change. "For too many years, too many millions of them have known poverty, disease, illiteracy, lack of education for their children, lack of employment during their working years, a lack of security in their older age," he said.

"Millions of our close neighbors live on an average income of \$60, \$60 or \$70 a year, a life expectancy of 25 or 30 years. They want to enjoy some of the benefits of life which we in North America have known and taken for granted."

"The great question is whether this change is going to come through revolution and communism or whether it's going to come through peaceful, democratic means."

Kennedy said that for this nation's own security as well as the well-being of Latin America, the inevitable change must come democratically.

"The United States will be a joint effort by the countries of Latin America and ourselves to

provides that better life for the people through democratic society," he said. "If we fail, this will be a far more dangerous and difficult world for those who come after us, not only in Latin America, but all over the world."

Former U. N. Delegate Is Dead at 85

BURLINGTON, Vt., Dec. 25 (AP)—Warren R. Austin, 85, who campaigned against U.S. entry in the League of Nations after World War I, and became U.S. ambassador to the United Nations after World War II, died at his home Tuesday.

Austin, a Republican, turned internationalist in the 1920s when he supported Franklin D. Roosevelt's foreign policy while opposing him on domestic issues.

He served in the senate from 1921 until he was appointed to the U.S. mission to former President Harry S. Truman in 1949. He became head of the mission until 1953 when he was succeeded by Henry Cabot Lodge.

It was Austin who led the fight for a U.N. resolution naming communist China as the aggressor in Korea after the Reds came to the rescue of the North Koreans when they had been banished by U.N.—1950-1954.

Austin was born in Highgate, Vt., and after graduation from the University of Vermont, entered his father's law office. He was admitted to the bar in 1902.

He married Mildred Marie Lucas, whom he had met at college, 41 years ago. She was with him when he died. They had two sons, Warren, Jr., and Col. Edward Lucas Austin of the U.S. army.

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Solon Works To End War-Over Cotton

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—Rep. E. C. (Took) Gathings, D. Ark., must settle—least tentatively—a bitter civil war among the nation's cotton growers.

"If we cannot—and the fight is there—there will be no cotton legislation this year although everyone recognizes the need for it."

Gathings, chairman of the house cotton subcommittee, is also plagued by time.

But a new law to have any effect must be in shape and ready to go to the President around the end of February. Otherwise, it will be too late for growers to make their plans.

The cotton war pits the Southerners against the Westerners. The mid-South states are split or uncertain.

Growers in the South—the traditional and historic cotton land—want to keep their supports up with no change in acreage allotments.

In the West—where there is more room for planting—there is more room for acreage even if it means lower price supports.

Gathings feels the subcommittee can work out a compromise which will be acceptable to the South and West although it cannot fully satisfy either.

The most probable compromise is a choice plan. Under such a program, growers could plant additional acreage above the 182 million acre national allotment which would receive a smaller price support.

Civil War Pension Cost Stays High

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—Civil war pensions have cost the federal government more than \$3 billion dollars and the cost is not in sight, a check of veterans administration records showed today.

The last Union veteran died in August, 1956, and the last Confederate in December, 1955.

But last July 1 at the start of the current fiscal year, 2,850 Civil war veterans' widows and other dependents still were receiving government aid ranging from about \$65 to \$75 a month.

If records of earlier wars are reliable indicators, it will be close to the year 2000 before the last Civil war pension payment is complete.

The last dependent of a Revolutionary war veteran died in 1909, 123 years after Cornwallis surrendered at Yorktown. The war of 1812 ended in 1815, but pensions to widows and dependents continued until 1945. Pensions still are being paid to the widow and child of a veteran of the Mexican war, which ended in 1848.

Fire Wipes Out Business Area

EAST OTTOW, N.Y., Dec. 25 (AP)—A roaring fire yesterday virtually wiped out the business section of this tiny western New York state hamlet.

Firefighters from as far as 30 miles away were called in to help battle the flames that destroyed a Roman Catholic church, the village postoffice, two grocery stores and a hardware store.

There were no reports of injuries. Many persons were reported visiting friends and relatives for the Christmas holidays and were away from numerous apartments over the area.

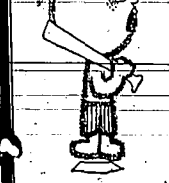
The fire apparently started in a Red and White grocery store on the main street of this village of 700 persons.

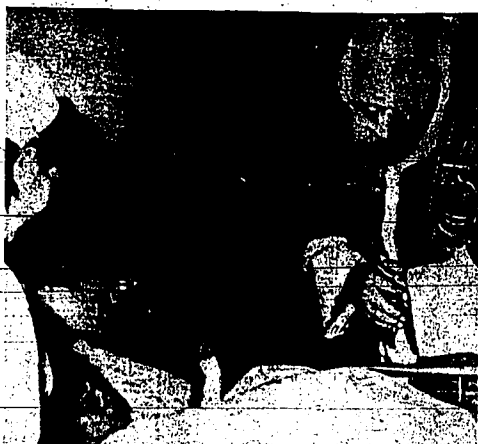
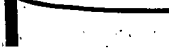
First reports said there were no casualties, but in Lisbon windows were broken and chimneys toppled.

Hoffa Voices Criticisms To Officials

DETROIT, Dec. 26 (AP)—Teamsters union President James R. Hoffa has criticized severely the federal judge and prosecutor in his Nashville trial which ended in a hung jury Sunday.

Hoffa especially critical of the decision of Judge William Miller to present to a federal grand jury January evidence of alleged jury tampering during the 12-day trial. He also had verbal fire for Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy.

His remarks came in a taped interview with television newsmen Ven Marshall in Detroit.

Asked for his views on Judge Miller's conduct of the trial, Hoffa replied:

"My reaction is that we had ready and was set to file an affidavit of prejudice not only during the trial but before the trial."

Of prosecutor James Neal, Hoffa said:

"He is one of the most vicious prosecutors who ever handled a criminal case for the justice department. Half truths, innuendoes and every sort of underhanded tricks were used by him in this trial."

He charged Atty. Gen. Kennedy was trying to move Hoffa's next federal court appearance, scheduled for Miami Jan. 4, out of the jurisdiction of the Tampa federal court. "Kennedy viciously stated some time ago that the case belonged in the Tampa court. Now he is trying to move it to Miami."

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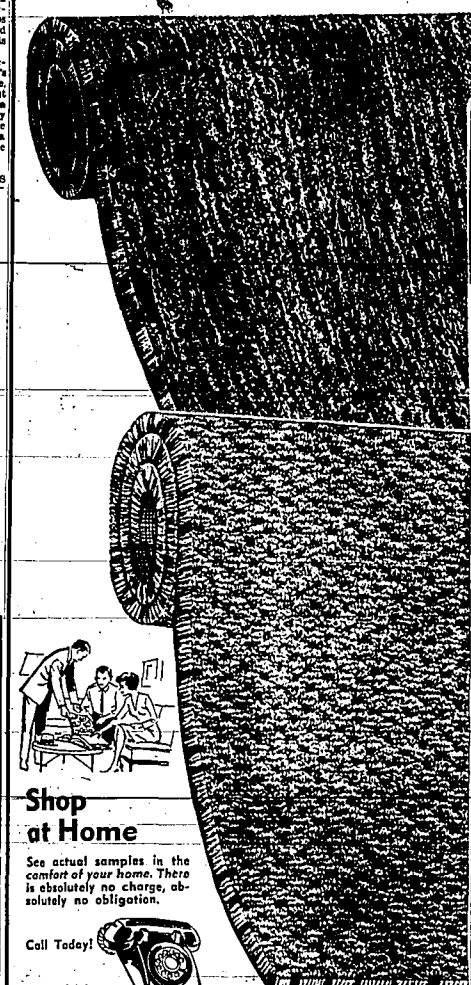


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Idahoans Observe Holiday With Food Gifts to Needy

Christmas 1962 in the Gem state was much the same as in previous years. It came and went Tuesday with its own nostalgic memories and Idahoans turned their faces toward the beginning of another new year.

This year's Christmas was crisp, cool, and generally clear, but with little snow. A few snow flakes flew in eastern Idaho, but this was minimal. Most of the state spent the day without snow—both in the air and on the ground.

Traffic appeared light on the state's highways and state police voiced hope there would be no more fatalities on this long holiday week-end which has already taken five lives on Idaho roads. Four people died Friday night and a fifth was killed Sunday morning.

Church services preceded the day's festivities—the traditional opening of gifts and holiday dinners.

Christmas music, carols, cigars and treats were provided for residents of the soldiers home in Boise by the Salvation Army and the valley entertainment group sponsored by the Pioneer club.

On the local level, needy families were generally provided with a happier Christmas by gifts from local service clubs and the Salvation Army.

In Boise, about 100 families had a brighter holiday after receiving food baskets distributed annually by the Salvation Army. The baskets, weighing about 80 pounds each, contained a ham or turkey, sweet potatoes, canned milk, fruit, canned vegetables and other commodities.

Major Ed Beriven of the Salvation Army estimated between 4,000 and 5,000 toys were picked up for children of some 400 families through the "toys for tots" program. The drive is an annual one carried out by the U.S. marine reserves.

At the veterans hospital in Boise, a special holiday dinner was served. Gifts were distributed on Christmas eve by veterans organizations and other groups.

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Dr. Bosch to Visit U.S. After Victory

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—Dr. Juan Bosch, who won the Dominican Republic's first free presidential election in three decades, says a four-day visit to Washington next week looking for firm commitments of alliance for progress assistance.

Bosch is expected to talk with President Kennedy and Theodore M. Connors, U.S. coordinator of the newly allied Caribbean republic on a steady path of political and material development.

Pending Bosch's formal proclamation as president by the Dominican electoral board on Dec. 29 or 30 there will be no official announcement of the visit.

When Bosch arrives, probably on Jan. 2, he can be accorded official honors as president-elect.

Russian Men and Women Leave Havana

HAVANA, Dec. 26 (AP)—While the American freighter African Pillager was being repaired yesterday to take on 1,000 Florida-bound family members of the newly-liberated Cuban invasion prisoners, hundreds of young Russian men, women and children were being taken in long trucks and bus convoys to a nearby dock where they boarded a Russian passenger liner.

The Russian vehicles blocked traffic along Havana's harbor-side highway.

Cuban officials had not announced that great numbers of Russians were to leave the island, but trucks loaded with rolled blankets, cardboard suitcases and boxes and duffel bags pulled up alongside the white-hulled liner with the hammer and sickle painted on its twin funnels.

It was not known how many passengers were being taken aboard the 16,000-ton liner, built 37 years ago in Germany. She had been berthed in Havana for the last two weeks.

Prelate Says Mass on Trip To Viet Nam

PLEIKU, South Viet Nam, Dec. 26 (AP)—Francis Cardinal Spellman, Roman Catholic archbishop of New York, walked along a dusty road here today to bring his blessings to thousands of Vietnamese who turned out to greet him.

Spellman flew to Pleiku to say mass for American servicemen stationed in the area, about 225 miles northeast of Saigon.

On the drive from the airport, the prelate left his car and walked along the side of the road to the church where he was to say mass.

The "shook-hands-with-and-waved-to many of the estimated 4,000 men, women and children who lined the half-mile route."

From Pleiku, Cardinal Spellman flew by helicopter to Kon-tum, about 25 miles to the north, where he also received an enthusiastic welcome from about 2,500 townspeople.

The prelate said the welcome was a "great surprise... a tremendous reception."

In Kon-tum, the cardinal dedicated a monument in honor of a U. S. military adviser, Lieut. Col. Anthony J. Tenza, who was killed in action July 15, 1962, while fighting communist guerrillas.

The cardinal flew back to Saigon later in the day. He was scheduled to call on President Ngo Dinh Diem later this evening.

Washington's River Scene Is Reenacted

WASHINGTON CROSSING N. J., Dec. 26 (AP)—Soft flakes of snow fell from the gloomy sky inside the 22-foot boat every-thing in the choppy waters of the Delaware river stood the commanding figure of a determined man.

It was Christmas day, 1962, but it could have easily passed as Christmas day, 1776.

The man in the boat and the four associates with him were reenacting the historic crossing of the icy Delaware by Gen. George Washington 186 years ago.

St. John Terrell, owner of the Lamberlyville music circle, played the part of Washington. Novelist Jacob A. Mitchell portrayed Col. Henry Knox, Washington's artillery officer and later secretary of war, and three actors played other officers.

About 800 persons watched from the banks in winter dress almost matched conditions during the real crossing as the boat prepared to cross the 300-yard-wide river. After a shaky start, which saw the current momentarily take command of the boat, the five men made it successfully to the New Jersey side just before dawn.

"New" Solons May Be Named For Legislative Leadership

BOISE, Dec. 26 — Whether a legislative session is regarded as a success or failure is dependent largely on the leadership of those chosen to direct it.

For 1963 the Idaho legislature will depend almost entirely on men who were not in a position of top leadership two years ago.

There is only one exception in the senate. Sen. Jack Murphy of Lincoln county, who was the majority leader in 1961, is back again. He is expected to be chosen by Republicans to be the senate's pro-tempore in 1963.

But most other leaders of the 1961 session did not seek reelection. Several ran for other offices and were beaten.

Among the 1961 speakers of the house, Republican William Eberle of Boise, who did not run for any office this year, and Republican Orval Hansen of Idaho Falls, the house majority leader, who failed in a bid for congress.

Also missing are the Democratic majority leaders, Clarence H. Higer of Emmett made no attempt for the Democratic nomination for governor. In the senate, Jay Roy Cox of Owyhee county, won Democratic nomination for attorney general but was defeated in the general election.

The 1961 senate president, W. W. Nagle of Idaho Falls, tried for the Republican nomination for lieutenant governor, but lost.

The assistant majority leader in the senate, Sen. R. H. Young of Owyhee county, is back, but the assistant minority leader, James Donat of Welter, did not seek reelection.

In the house, both men who were assistant leaders are rejoining—Republican Rep. Harold Snow of Owyhee county and Democratic Rep. Floyd O. Kistling of Lincoln county.

Few legislators expressed outright support for any candidates in an Associated Press survey of the 1963 lawmakers, but some names were mentioned.

Whether those listed will be the final choices remains to be determined at the party caucuses which come Sunday night and Jan. 7, preceding the opening of the session Jan. 7.

 1 teaspoon red food coloring
 1 cup milk
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 Melt semi-sweet chocolate morsels over hot (not boiling) water. Mix together flour, baking powder and salt. Beat together cream, cheese and shortening. Gradually beat in sugar. Add eggs, one at a time. Mix in melted morsels and red food coloring. Add flour mixture alternately with milk and vanilla. Turn into greased and floured 13 by 9 by 2-1/2 inch pan. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees), 35 to 40 minutes. Cool. Frost with Golden Glow.
