Government Slaps Brakes On Huge Expense Accounts

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (UPI)—The body of American taxpayers isn't getting the bill for freeloading fun at the expense of other taxpayers.

The cost of business travel is for vacations under the southern sun, junkets, night club and other entertainment at the big city, and winter trips to the mountains.

Decades ago, many trips were examined by the tax man. Items must now be turned out to work in a diary or account book every day and play it down with the expense on playtime.

From Jan. 1 on, out-of-town meals, lodgings and incidentals are to be kept at the tax rate strictly at the taxpayer's own expense. Intertown services are limited to business travel, entertainment and gifts.

Shortages in All Military Forces Told

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (UPI)—

In the aircraft carrier Force, naval had to put to sea without essential parts for the fire fighting equipment and gun engines.

At the same time, all tanks of the M48 tanks at Port Hueneme, Calif., were out-of-operation.

These situations were disclosed in a major report by the general accounting office yesterday. It said the combat preparedness of U.S. military units has been "decidedly poor" because they do not contain replacement parts and other supplies, even though the material was readily available.

The accounting office, which monitors federal spending, said the failure of army, navy and marine units to get needed items adequately reflects the fact that they are responsible for much high priority combat equipment being unserviceable.

The accounting office again called for training at home and overseas; it said, and resulted in warships operating without essential materials that would be needed.

Comptroller General Joseph Campbell said the army has already taken some remedial steps, and army, navy and defense departments were studying possible action.

As prime examples, the GAO said, the army has repaired 100 of the 140 tanks at Port Hueneme.

They were out of operation during the 1962 fiscal year and were in a "substandard condition" at various times.
