Rockefeller Courts All GOP Shades

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York has started courting Republicans of all shades of opinion in his obvious quest for the 1964 GOP presidential nomination.

Gov. George Romney of Michigan is playing it cool on whether he will be attracted later by the "green pastures" of national office.

Gov. Elect William W. Scranton of Pennsylvania—who will have a further opportunity to pitch off when he formally takes office Jan. 15—Already has said he would not resist an "unlikely" draft for the nomination.

That's the political roundup at the beginning of 1963 for the three Republicans most talked about as the possible GOP choice for undertaking what promises to be a Herculean attempt to oust Democrat John F. Kennedy from the presidency next year.

Rockefeller taking initiative his second inauguration as governor, chose to spice his homily on the virtues of the American system with advice to Republicans to forget the labels which tend to divide them—and to unite in a happy family.

Rockefeller obviously has felt constrained for some time to try to shake off the liberal label generally pinned on him because of his blue-ribbon-and-white-tie-forward-looking Republicanism.

It could hardly be regarded as accidental if Rockefeller warned former President Dwight D. Eisenhower with his observation that "the local community can best appeal to the state for help in meeting the economic and social needs only if it does all in its own power to satisfy these human wants at the local level."

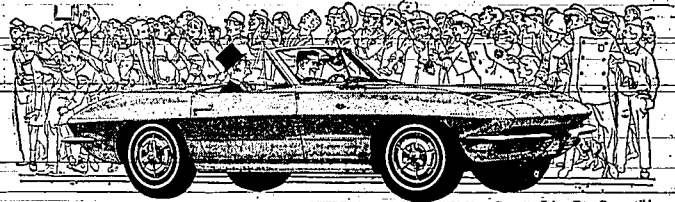

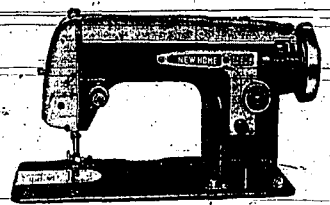

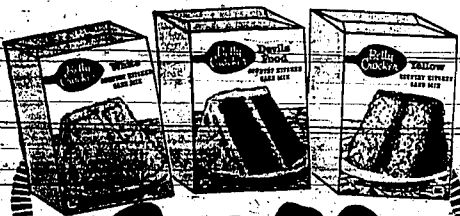

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—The government has set the brakes on free-wheeling fun at the expense of other taxpayers.

The cost of business travel is a legitimate income tax deduction. But too many trips—those examined by the tax man—have turned out to be vacations and party excursions with the emphasis on play.

From Jan. 1 on, out-of-town parties is strictly at the taxpayer's own expense under the new revenue service's new regulation for business travel, entertainment and gifts.

Shortages in All Military Forces Told

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—In 1961, the aircraft carrier Forrestal had to put to sea without essential parts for the fire fighting equipment and main engines.

At the same time, a guard of the M48 tanks at Fort Bliss, N.M., were out of operation.

These situations were disclosed in a major report by the general accounting office yesterday, which said the combat preparedness of U.S. military units has been "seriously affected" by military equipment replacement parts and other supplies, even though the material was readily available.

The GAO, congress watchdog on federal spending, said the failure of arms, heavy armaments and other needed items significantly contributed to—or was directly responsible for—much combat equipment being unserviceable.

The deficiencies seriously curtailed troop training at home and overseas, it said, and resulted in warships opening windows and other damage that would be needed in an emergency.

Comptroller General Joseph Campbell said the army has already taken some remedial steps, and the navy and defense departments are studying possible action.

As prime examples, the GAO said one fourth to one third of the M48 tanks at Fort Bliss were out of operation during the fiscal year and were in "substandard condition" at various times.
