# Squatters in Mexico Seize Five Ranches

EL PASO, Texas, Jan. 5 (U.P.)—Hundreds of squatters reportedly seized five large ranches in the northern part of the Mexican state of Chihuahua, the El Paso Times reported today.

Times reporter, Manuel Munoz, chief of staff of the 5th military zone in Chihuahua, said the squatters ordered to move into the selected areas, of about 100,000 acres, declared illegal by the acting governor of Chihuahua, Juan Manuel Carrasco, in 1952.

Munoz said by Jacinto Lopez, secretary general of the Union Nacional de Campesinos y Trabajadores, the organization has been active in the area since the seizure of the ranches.

The land grab movement, which has been taking place for several months, also spread to Chihuahua's neighboring state of Durango. Reports from there said squatters had already seized the famous hacienda of Camalillo, which once was owned by Pancho Villa.

# Adenauer Celebrates 87th Birthday

BONN, Germany, Jan. 5 (U.P.)—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer celebrated his 87th birthday anniversary Saturday without a visible trace of regret that it may be his last as leader of West Germany.

Adenauer has promised to step down next fall after 14 years of guiding West Germany from the rubble of World War II to a state of respect and independence.

Adenauer stood in the front row of the 100th anniversary of the German cabinet chamber of the Reichstag, where he has spent more than seven hours, shaking hands with hundreds of well-wishers.

He has said often he doesn't like the big yearly parties, and he has refused to attend them. But there was little doubt he was enjoying himself.

At the Old One's home, he is popularly known, accepted congratulations and gifts of handkerchiefs from other children and exchanged gifts with his wife, Gertrude, and his children.

A special mass was held by his son, Rudi, at the Bonn cathedral.

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# President Attends Last Kerr Rites

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Jan. 5 (U.P.)—President Dwight D. Eisenhower's home town statesman, was laid to rest Friday in simple rites attended by a national President Kennedy and other national leaders.

Kennedy delivered his eulogy as he sat in a front row, a few feet from Kerr's rose-draped casket. He was flanked by Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson and Oklahoma Gov. J. Howard Edwards. Behind him sat the state delegation of 28, several congressmen, Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon and hundreds of Oklahomans and national officials.

The casket was surrounded by scores of wreaths and flower sprays, was not opened during the service. An eulogy was read by Rev. Robert H. Taylor, pastor of the First Baptist church, and hundreds of others stood outside in a steady cold rain.

Kerr died Tuesday in Washington of a heart attack. He was serving his third term in the senate and was considered one of its most influential members.

He was eulogized by his Baptist pastor, Dr. Herbert Hobbs, as a man who rose from humble beginnings on an Oklahoma cotton farm to become one of the nation's most powerful leaders because of his vision, wisdom, courage and faith.

Kennedy walked quickly from the church and joined the Kerr family in a motorcade to Rose Hill mausoleum, where the body was interred during private rites Monday by 120 persons.

The body will be moved to the south central Oklahoma, where a memorial is planned for the late cabin where Kerr was born.

that a good deal of the progress and improvements listed so far has been achieved since the switch to city manager government.  
The city has developed a parks and recreation system second to none for cities of similar size.  
Merchants, individually and collectively, have contributed to improvement of the city. There has been a general modernization of storefronts in the business district, making the city more presentable and giving residents more of a feeling of pride. Shopping-center development has been a major addition to the city. A new traffic pattern with one-way streets through the center of town has improved traffic conditions. However, many residents still feel further improvement can be achieved by taking through-traffic off Main avenue, routing it instead down Second avenue and through town.  
Second avenue proposal because of two trade schools—should consider that children would have to watch only one way for traffic.  
Not the least of the many improvements of the past has been development of wells as a source for domestic water. Here again, Twin Falls faces a continuing problem, and one that probably ranks at the top of the list of matters for future action.

The fund was designed as a reasonable logical means of accumulating money for the water plant without the worry and expense of periodic bond elections. There are a number of other programs and projects that should be included in Twin Falls planning. They are not listed as they are beyond the scope of this necessarily being covered in the order of importance.  
Anyone who walks around Twin Falls is aware of the city needs extensive gutter, street and sidewalk repaving and improvement. It is necessary to realize there is no stopping in the offstreet parking project. Instead of leaving it to private resources, the city also should take an active role with each repaving year.

# Helicopters In Viet Nam Given Okay

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5 (AP)—The defense department announced today its determination to continue use of helicopters in Vietnam.

The decision was contained in a summary of the battle earlier this week in which five helicopter units were destroyed by red gunfire.

Three Americans were killed and 19 others wounded in that battle near Tan Hiep.

The policy, recommended by Gen. James D. Hays, chief of the commander in Viet Nam, had the concurrence of the joint chiefs of staff and the defense department, a Pentagon spokesman said.

The statement said: "Use of helicopters to provide transportation for the Vietnam force will continue as a primary means of pressing offensive operations against the VC force. Experience has shown that such operations permit the arrest and deprive guerrilla forces of the initiative."

# Light Plane Crash Takes Three Lives

SPRINGFIELD, Wash., Jan. 5 (AP)—Three Sunnyside residents were killed in the fiery crash of a light plane here before dawn Saturday.

The tragedy orphaned three children.

Scorch marks in the first field indicated it burst into flames as it crashed. The bodies recovered from the charred wreckage were burned beyond recognition.

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 5 (AP)—Plans for further hit-and-run attacks against Fidel Castro's Cuba are proceeding, a leader of the second Miami Front in December, said Saturday.

Such forays are designed to "destroy the legend that Fidel is invincible," said Maj. Armando Pielis, secretary-general in exile of the group, who has joined forces with the another, called Alpha 66.

Forces of the two organizations have made three attacks on Cuba to date, and there will be more, he said. Pielis returned from a trip to New York, Washington and Philadelphia, where he contacted fellow members.

The last attack, Pielis said, was an invasion of the Florida beach in Las Villas Province Dec. 4.

In reference to a recent U.S. government crackdown on Cuban raids, Pielis declared, "We have no fear of American attacks and have no plans to do so. Our forces depart from secret spots in the Caribbean."

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Jan. 5 (AP)—The developer of the Sabin oral polio vaccine said last night he would be glad to see the vaccine done in the United States.

Dr. Albert Sabin said the controversy over the use of his Type III vaccine did not bother him.

He said that controversy on such a matter actually was good for it brought matters into the open.

The University of Cincinnati researcher said he believed there is no danger of anyone of any age contracting polio by taking the Type III vaccine.

He said he disagreed with Surgeon-General Luther Terry, who in approving use of the vaccine on Dec. 19 here there was a potential risk to persons over 20 years old.

# Blast Blame Laid to Ill Or Fanatic

HOT-SPRINGS, Ark., Jan. 5 (AP)—Investigators here were inclined to blame a fanatic or mentally deranged person for the explosion that injured 11 persons and damaged a "school for gamblers" at a swank night club and gambling casino here.

Dame Harris, president of the Park Realty company, Inc., which operates the "Vapora-Club," said, "If it was a bomb planted in the club, I believe it was the work of someone mentally sick."

The gambling school was under way at the club when the blast occurred. None of the 11 persons were hospitalized. More than 30 other persons in the club escaped injury.

The explosion apparently went off in a men's rest room and blew a hole 30-feet wide in the roof.

Capt. W. C. Struening of the fire marshal's office at Little Rock confirmed that an explosive caused the blast and not an accumulation of escaping gas, as was first speculated.

The school for gamblers was one of several set up in this resort city to train operators for roulette wheels, dice tables and other gaming devices. Federal laws prohibit bringing persons across state lines to run gambling devices.

# New Voice Hurls Charge Of Hot Gold

LEW LISKERARD, Ont., Jan. 5 (AP)—A mining official added his voice to charges that large amounts of stolen gold and silver are being shipped from Windsor into the United States.

George McLeod, manager of the castle division of McIntyre-Potteridge Mines Ltd. at Gowganda, said provincial police "seem to know that high-grade ore is going through the city of Windsor to the United States and that big rings are operating in the racket."

High grade is ore illegally removed from a mine. Windsor, an industrial city—lies across the Detroit river from Detroit, Mich.

McLeod told a newspaper police are searching for a hidden cache of stolen silver, whose size is unknown, pulled up by high grade ore in past years when the price of silver was lower. He also said the police high-grade squad had been ready to close in on the rings at Windsor, when it had to act prematurely because of recent high grade occurrences in cobalt mining.

Arnold Peters of Timiskaming, a new Democratic party member of parliament, said, Thursday, "The violent death of a combat mine last October may be linked with what he called a multi-million dollar high-grade racket in northern Ontario."

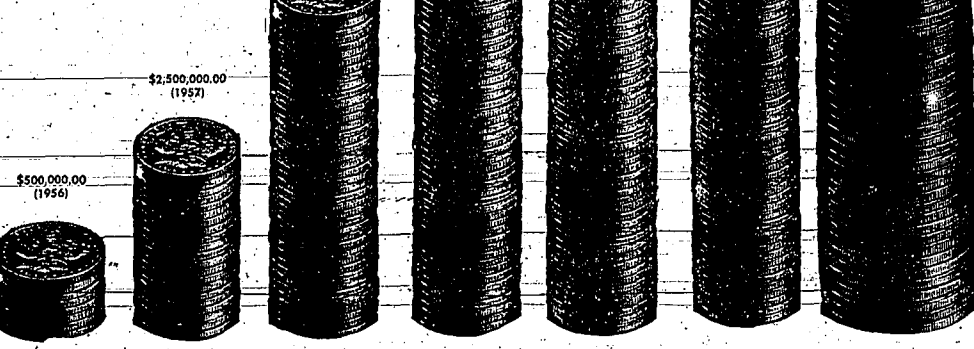

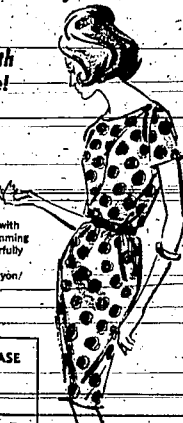

### Domestic Peace Corps Will Need Volunteer Group

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5 (UPI)—The proposed "domestic peace corps" program will call for an initial 1,000 volunteers to be increased to 3,000 over two or three years, Washington Gov. Albert Rosellini reported. Rosellini, here for the national governors conference, which he is chairman, said Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy and other officials gave the state executives details of the plan. President Kennedy is expected to ask congress to approve a domestic version of the peace corps, to be called the national services corps.

### Soviets Bounce Radar Signals Off Mercury

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5 (UPI)—Soviet scientists have successfully bounced radar signals off the Soviet academy of sciences says. In a statement released by the Soviet embassy here, the Russian scientists said the Russians successfully beamed radar signals toward Mercury last month when it was 52 to 64 million miles from Earth. At the same time, the Washington Post reported, American scientists deliberately bypassed a radar attempt on Mercury, planning instead to try for the even harder target of the planet Mars. Scientists of both nations have been conducting radar experiments and the relatively nearby planet Venus.

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 5 (UPI)—The federal appeals court Saturday ordered Mississippi Gov. Ross R. Barnett and Lieut. Gov. Paul B. Johnson, Jr., to show cause Feb. 8 why they should not be held in criminal contempt for blocking desegregation of the University of Mississippi. An order signed by six judges of the 5th U.S. circuit court of appeals said that if the two officials show cause either by pleading innocent or by other means, they will be tried by the federal court. If they fail to show cause, they could be held in contempt and penalized immediately. Barnett and Johnson have both been held in civil contempt and are in the appeals court, for refusing to say they will cease interfering with admission of Negroes to the university. Criminal contempt generally is considered a more serious offense with penalties generally left to the discretion of the judges.

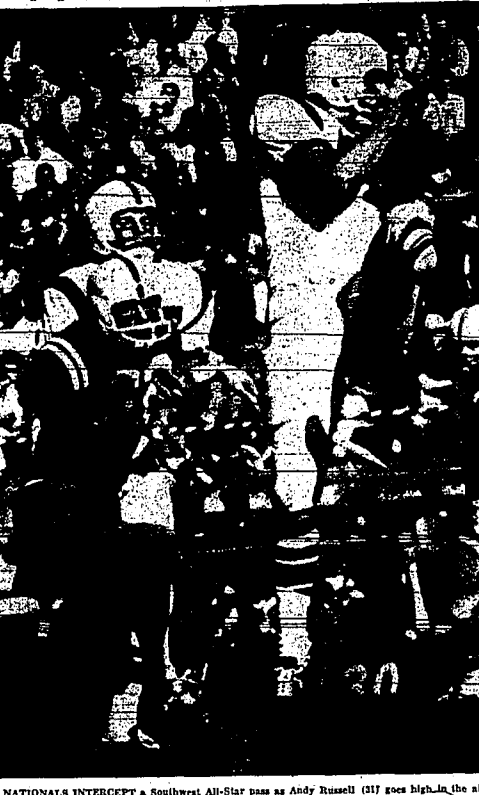

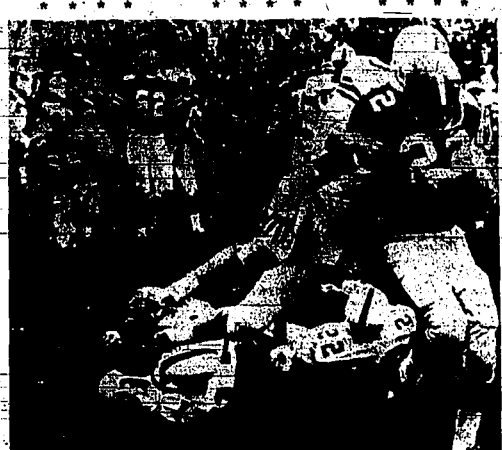

# Reservoirs Are Outdoor Haven

Major reservoirs of Magic Valley are just "a-tittin' and fillin'" for next spring, summer and fall, when they once more will offer visitors and residents alike recreational opportunities.

Two of the big ones—Magic and Salmon—have had recreational facilities improved to the point they are becoming well-known throughout the area.

In the case of Magic, for instance, a two-runway landing strip is now open for use, permitting tandem use for skiers and travelers who just cannot wait to throw a hook into the water on ducks or geese.

The landing area is right next door to Don and Frank's Magic Lake resort where scores of picnic cabins are scattered around in a small city, just across the water. In another cabin area known as Magic City, while at the mouth of the reservoir still a third area, Hot Spring, is situated.

All three areas have facilities for getting boats into the water and the reservoir offers miles of open water boating.

Officials of the Big Wood Canal company anticipate that water in the reservoir is far more than was there last year at the same time. Given any kind of a good snowfall on the river watershed, the reservoir will insure another good year for those who get irrigation water from Magic.

At Salmon reservoir the carry-over from last year was good and a more or less normal winter will assure good water for the Salmon tract.

Water also will be adequate for boating, with all popular areas around the reservoir shore being accessible and having water in quantity.

Upstream on the Snake river, Magic reservoirs make it practically a "cinch" that the Twin Falls tract will have another abundant water supply for the next growing season. Likewise, the city of Twin Falls, now using well water exclusively, will have a ready peak supply for drinking purposes after treatment at the city plant.

At Salmon reservoir, where water is diverted to three canals, including the one to the Twin Falls tract, water was spilling for downriver use at the rate of 2,000 second feet. At Minner, (Continued on Page 22)

## Sawmill Harvests Lumber Hauled From Heglar Area

HEGLAR, Jan. 5—Located at Heglar, just west of 2000 Highway, are three sawmills owned by Wendell Sawmill and Lumber company. The other two sites are at Fairfield and Bellevue.

The sawmill, located on the north side of the Snake river opposite the Burley Municipal airport and west of the J. R. Simpson business, has been in operation almost five months. The duration of the operation depends on how long it takes to harvest some 30 million feet of lumber at Heglar.

Lumber is trucked some 10 miles from Heglar canyon to the facility in Heyburn.

According to James Shaw, general manager, the sawmill is cutting right on schedule.

Lumber trucks bringing cut timber to the mill drive past the piles and dump their loads into a small logging pond. Two trips a day is all that the trucks can manage. When the combined payroll of the log operations at Heyburn and Heglar is totaled, it amounts to a sizeable industry. Almost two dozen men are employed at the sawmill and a similar number is involved in the cutting and transporting of lumber.

Once the lumber is "ponded," it is prepared for cutting. Floating the lumber on a pond makes it easier to handle; logs individually keep the supply constant and cleans the dirt and bark from the logs.

One man with a pole hook can keep a steady stream of logs floating into the sawmill. The sawmill itself is a big story. (Continued on Page 21)

## Russian Dam In Egypt Is On Schedule

ASWAN, Egypt, Jan. 5 (AP)—The morning alarm clock in Aswan is the roar of 5,000 pounds of dynamite.

At 6 a.m. each day some 15,000 tons of granite erupt, moving that much closer to reality the giant Aswan dam—Egypt's dream and the Soviet Union's largest foreign aid venture.

"We are right on schedule," says Gamal Ahmed Osman, contractor who is a key man in the project which may largely decide Egypt's place in the 20th century and President Gamal Abdul Nasser's role in history.

Nasser sees the dam as the crowning symbol of his social revolution.

To back Nasser the Russians have lent 200 million dollars and pledged as much again. This followed U.S. refusal to finance the dam.

The well-being of Egypt's impoverished millions could depend on the outcome. The dam is Egypt's chance to ease the relentless pressure of an exploding population—27 million people, a total which will be doubled in 25 years.

The dam will give Egypt vast electric power plus almost a million acres of new farmland.

## No Boom Expected, but 1963 Business Forecast Calls for Good 12 Months

NEW YORK, Jan. 5 (AP)—What does 1963 hold in store for the U.S. economy?

For months the question has been asked, analyzed and predicted. The answer? A year of continuing general prosperity, of economic and some government-spokenness freely predicted an early recession in 1963.

Buy-into-pickup in business activity, the prospect of a tax cut, high auto sales, higher consumer spending, and a restoration of national confidence—a result of the Cuban crisis, brought about a new resolution for the year.

The thick gloom of late summer and early autumn has disappeared. The pessimists have retreated and the widespread talk of recession is no longer to be heard.

The X-factor in how the economy performs next year is the tax cut.

President Kennedy has promised that the widespread individual taxes. He has been joined in this by leading members of the cabinet and by a great majority of the business and financial communities.

But how much the tax cut will help? How much will it do? It is still unclear.

Kennedy himself has not spelled it out. Some powerful congressional forces already have objected to a quick reduction, some demanding compensation drops in federal expenditures to make-up for the loss in revenue. Others say the economy is healthy enough without a cut.

The argument for a tax cut is that it is needed not so much to forestall a possible recession but to jog the economy out of its sluggish state of growth by 500 billion more money—both corporate and consumer—into it.

Automobiles also see a bumper year for their industry which will offset the economy's bellwether of the economy.

On a statistical basis government economists expect the gross national product—the value of all goods and services—will total \$75 billion dollars to \$90 billion dollars in the year ahead.

There will be a record, about 25 billion dollars above 1962. The economists also predict the GNP may move up to a peak of around \$100 billion dollars by next year.

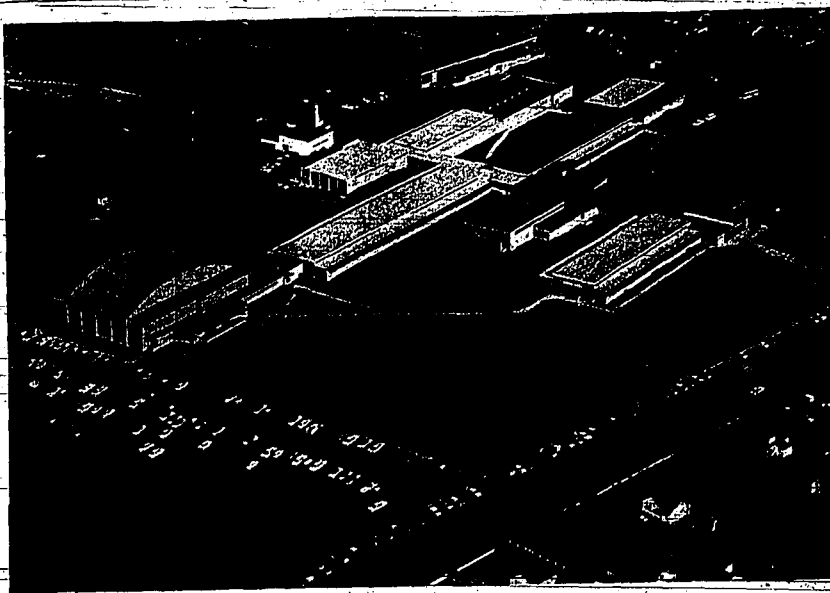




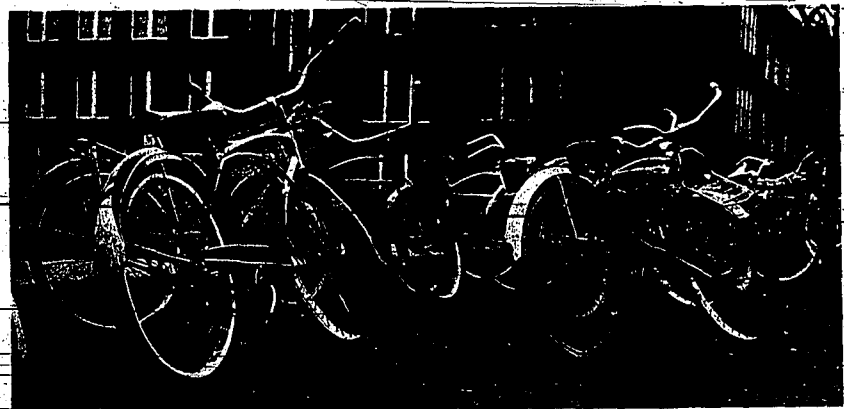

### Diamonds Uncovered in Meteor Study

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5 (AP)—Another diamond strike has been made in matter from space. The diamonds apparently were formed 10 to 20 million years ago when a couple of meteoroids collided with terrific impact millions of miles from Earth. The latest discovery of diamonds in a meteorite, the fourth in history to be confirmed, was reported in the technical journal "Science" by Dr. Michael J. Lipschutz in an article published on duty with the Goddard Space Flight center of the national aeronautics and space administration. The study of meteorites is considered by NASA to be an important phase of space exploration. These bits or chunks of matter, which have broken their orbital moorings deep in the solar system and crashed on Earth, have been called "space probes in reverse."

Lipschutz's discoveries will not alarm the diamond miners of South Africa or the diamond merchants of Amsterdam. Diamonds from space are extremely rare and are not of gem quality. They are tiny, they are black—as all meteoritic diamonds appear to be, and they are about half graphite. Graphite is a soft form of carbon which transforms into hard diamonds under great pressure and heat.

The recently discovered diamonds were in minute samples of the dyalpur meteorite which was seen to fall in India on May 6, 1872. It weighed about 15 ounces. Most of it is in the British museum, but the Chicago Natural History Museum obtained a bit of it weighing about one-seventeenth of an ounce.

The Chicago institution permitted Lipschutz to remove samples totaling about one twenty-eight thousandths of an ounce. The diamond crystals, in this sample, are so small that it would take hundreds or millions of them to measure an inch.

To observe them at all Lipschutz had to use an X-ray analysis technique. This modern method also was used to confirm the presence of diamonds in the other three meteorites.

As one school official puts it, "Recent government statistics disclose that high school students—71 percent more than half of them—were not able to pass the most simple physical strength tests."
