### Study Shows Venus to Be Hot Desert

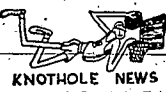
WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—A study of Venus by radar and radio signals has shown that the planet is a hot desert. The study, which is the most accurate picture to date, shows that the atmosphere of Venus is so thick that it traps heat, making the surface temperature about 600 degrees Fahrenheit. The picture is based on radar research done by the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif., the Washington Post reported Monday.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 8 (AP)—The president of the U. S. Track and Field federation, claiming support of 90 per cent of the nation's track and field groups, said Monday the federation was "willing and anxious" to proceed toward arbitration of its dispute with the Amateur Athletic Union. At the same time, President William B. Russell of Inglewood, Calif., speaking at the National Collegiate Athletic Association's annual convention here, called eligibility cuts and threats by the AAU "frantic efforts to justify its continuing existence as a monopolistic controlling body."

NEW YORK, Jan. 8 (AP)—Seven college track coaches, headed by George Eastman of Manhattan, said Monday they would defy the Eastern College Athletic conference and send teams to AAU-sanctioned meets during the indoor season. The ECAC, in a letter mailed to its 130 members Monday, urged that they boycott the indoor meets unless they were sanctioned by the Eastern College Athletic Union. The USTF, with the backing of the NCAA, has been trying to wrest sanctioning power from the AAU. The ECAC, in turn, is a member of the NCAA. The action sets up a rivalry between the Eastern College Athletic Union and the Eastern College Athletic Union.

## Grid Deaths Reduced by 29 Per Cent

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 8 (AP)—Football deaths decreased 29.7 per cent in 1962 but added controls could reduce the toll still further, the American Football Coaches Association was told today.

Dr. Floyd R. Eastwood, who conducts an annual survey of football fatalities, reported 26 players died of direct and indirect causes last year. In 1961, the total was 37. High school football accounted for 12 of the deaths, 10 attributed to the game last year. Dr. Eastwood said, six died in hand-to-hand games and one in a scuffle.

He noted that, during the 31 years "the study" covered, 23.1 per cent of the 633 direct fatalities occurred in unsupervised games. It was believed that indirect deaths in 1962 numbered seven, with heat stroke included. Dr. Eastwood complicates his information from news accounts and questions were sent to school and medical authorities throughout the nation.

Dr. Eastwood, a consultant at Los Angeles State college, also detailed recommendations he said would make the game safer. "Our whole problem of pre-season training is tremendous," he said. "The National Collegiate Athletic Association convention."

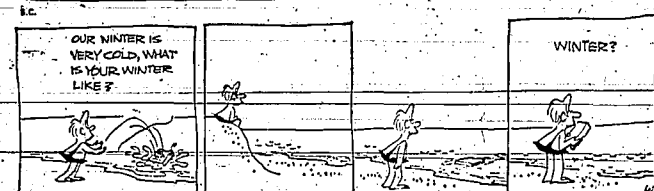

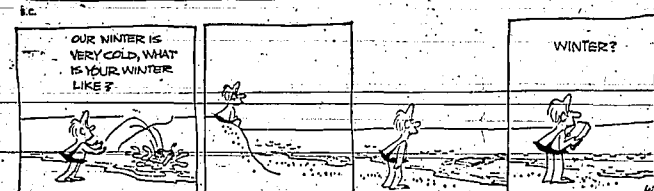
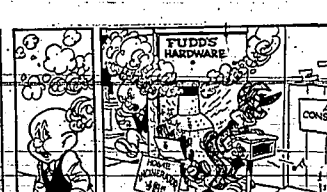
