1962 Ends With Record Rate of Airline Deaths

LONDON, Jan. 10 (UPI) — Air accidents killed 1,511 persons around the world last year, a survey showed today.

The survey, carried over for crashes of jet transports, the survey in the periodical "Aeroplane and Commercial Aviation" noted.

Eight jets were destroyed in accidents last year, bringing to 20-19 American-built aircraft, 11 European aircraft and 11 of jets which have gone down since October, 1958.

The survey said 1,511 accidents killed 1,227 passengers, 277 crew members and 7 persons on the ground. European airline accidents accounted for 259 of those deaths, it said.

Survivors include one son, Everett Bonnichsen, of Philmont, Calif.; two daughters, Shirley Berkley, Calif., and four grand-children.

SYNOPSIS AND AGRICULTURAL SUMMARY

The cold Arctic air continues its path southwest. This cold air has moved much farther east of the Rocky mountains and is now over the Great Plains and southeastern Idaho valleys. Where it has pushed through Wyoming, eastern Colorado and western Kansas, West of the Rocky mountains in the south, the temperature has been lower. This morning and tonight the southern valleys of Idaho were already under the influence of the Arctic air this far north. The temperature at Idaho Falls is above and in the upper 20s.

Locally where the temperature is now occurring in Montana, South Dakota, Nebraska and parts of Colorado and Wyoming, the temperature is below zero. There are inches of snow reported now in the northern Idaho valleys. Other areas scattered a few showers but in the remainder of the southwestern valley snow showers will occur, mainly in the afternoon.

Lows tonight will range from around zero in the southern valleys and Magic Valley to 15 below in the upper Snake River and extreme Southeastern valley. Minimum temperatures expected tonight Saturday, 20°.







WASHINGTON, Jan. 10 (UPI)—The new five-cent-first class and eight-cent-airmail stamps are selling like hotcakes, the post office department reports.

But the old penny stamp suddenly is the most popular of all. And it's still flying off the shelves.

Refugees of Castro Have Been Settled

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10 (UPI) — Some 2,000 Cuban refugees have been settled in 1,000 communities across the United States, and only 600 more will require government help.

A spokesman for the health and welfare department — which administers today refugees who number 10,000 remain in the Miami area. Of these, 85,000 are being assisted.

The federal help began in late November, 1960, when the government decided the problem had become too big for Miami to handle alone.

Some \$4 million dollars were spent in July and some \$70 million dollars have been appropriated this fiscal year but the new spokesman said all of it may not be spent.

A spokesman noted that since Oct. 23, the day after President Kennedy's Cuban exile, 1,000 people from the island have been prisoners and their families that Premier Fidel Castro released.

Those referred to as "cubans" were wearing the clothes of every three arrived in Miami in need of immediate medical aid.

Here, the welfare program begins. It is administered for HFW by the state office of the American Red Cross, which generally applies the same rules as it would to any other applicant in determining who gets aid.

Those who are may get medical aid, surplus food commodities and up to \$60 a month if single. A married couple with one child, may draw up to \$100.

Demo Mayor Gives Office To Socialist

MADISON, Wis., Jan. 10 (UPI) — Former Socialist Mayor Frank Zelder had been named as state representative by the state Democratic Gov. John Reynolds' administration.

The announcement came during a press conference held at the state capitol by the State Chamber of Commerce and was greeted with stunned silence.

Zelder, 50, had been mayor of Madison from 1958-60.

"I have considered seriously the fact that he is a member of the Socialist party," said Reynolds. "But I have also considered the fact that he is recognized throughout this nation as one of the leading authorities on civil rights."

Since leaving office when he decided to seek reelection, Zelder had conducted a study of urban renewal problems and the sponsorship of the Ford Foundation. He also was a consultant to the University of Wisconsin extension on studying the same problem.

Zelder, 50, retired during a period when problems of urban renewal, race relations and the industrial climate were pressing acute in Milwaukee.

Bidwell Goes Free Over Tax Charges

NEW YORK, Jan. 10 (UPI) — Truman Bidwell, former board chairman of the New York stock exchange, was acquitted Wednesday on income tax evasion charges.

In a federal court jury brought in from 36 hours' deliberation.

Bidwell, 58, told newsmen the trial was a "testimony to my faith in the jury system."

A first trial ended in a hung jury Oct. 2. The second trial began Dec. 6 before Judge Thomas P. Grier.

The government tried to prove that Bidwell and his wife filed returns for 1958 and 1957 with intent to evade about \$35,000 in taxes.

Vietnamese Claim Many Reds Killed

BANGKOK, Thailand, Jan. 10 (UPI) — The South Vietnamese government reports that its forces killed or wounded at least 740 communists guerrillas in two recent clashes, and that the rebels put the figure much lower.

The government said the communists had 470 casualties in the two battles, while the rebels had 210 casualties in a clash in the so-called "Zone D" — government's own "Zone D" — where the rebels had their bases in the two conflicts.

Uninformed military figures said the government figures were correct. They said the total communist losses were closer to 75. They said 34 communist weapons were captured in the clashes while weapons lost by the rebels during the past week could equip another Viet Cong battalion.

The South Vietnamese press was expected to stage a campaign aimed at countering

United States' statements in the recent government losses.

U. S. military advisers have expressed disappointment at the behavior of the government troops during a big battle in the north charging that they defected against their American advisers and refused orders. Three American advisers were killed and 10 others were wounded in the battle.





