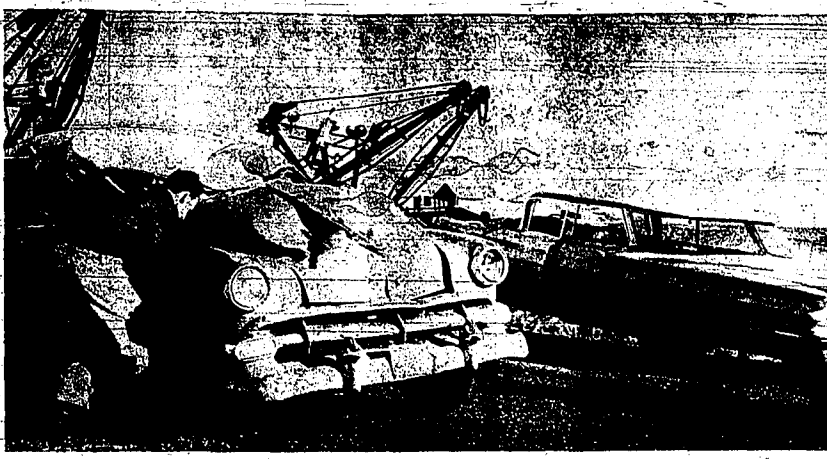

Idaho Power Sets Expansion Of 10 to 15 Million Dollars

BOISE, Jan. 10.—Idaho Power company will invest 10 to 15 million dollars in new service facilities during 1963 as part of its continuing expansion program, the utility president pointed out.

Rosch, reporting that the peak demand on Idaho Power's system is expected to rise to a record of about 850,000 kilowatts in 1963, cited the gain as "an excellent indicator of the vigorous state of the Snake river valley's economy."

The company will continue extensive survey and engineering work that is a vital preliminary to construction of a new 250-mile, high-voltage transmission line between American Falls and Ansonia, Mont. Idaho Power will build the line jointly with Utah Power and Light company.

The new heavy-duty line will provide Idaho Power's eighth transmission line in connection with the Northwest power pool and further strengthen coordination of the three utility systems for the benefit of customers.

More than 150 miles of new high-voltage transmission lines will be built by the company in 1963. Largest of the new facilities was a 120,000-volt line from the Lower Salmon generating plant on Snake river to Halley and a 160,000-volt line from Halley to Scotchman—a total of 70 miles.

Rosch said other transmission distribution and substitution construction will be added to projects already on the 1963 program, "especially in the next few months as irrigators complete their plans for new electric pumping developments."

Idaho Power extended service to more than 350 new pumps in 1962, boosting the total supplied by the company to 6,235 pumps. Totaling nearly 200,000 horsepower, the pumps provide water to some 651,800 acres.

Army Trying To Acquire Land Access

YAKIMA, Jan. 10 (AP)—The army hopes to obtain permits to use about 800,000 acres of state and private land in a 41,000-acre muck bog near May 5-10, Lt. Gen. John L. Ryan, Jr., said.

Burley police said it was reported that Mrs. Aerts went with Boon to a drugstore to get a bandage for his foot. When they returned Mrs. Aerts went into one of the rooms and was awoken by a loud noise. When Boon stabbed her, according to court records.

Boon fled and was apprehended in Tooele, Utah, 48 hours later. He was tried by jury and sentenced to first degree murder in February, 1957.
