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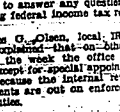

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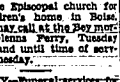

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# ERS Reports Record Tax Collections

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—The government collected a record \$10.5 billion in tax revenue during the 1963 fiscal year, ending Jan. 31, the Internal Revenue Service reported Monday.

The report said collections rose in 11 major sources of revenue. Not all the money went toward the budget, which is certain to show a deficit in this fiscal year for the first time since 1952.

In the last one, Social Security, for example, totaled almost \$1.7 billion dollars, which goes into a trust fund.

The \$10.5 billion dollars represent an increase of 7 billion dollars over the 1962 fiscal year. Collections rose 4 billion dollars to \$11.5 billion dollars. Employment taxes went up 200 million dollars to \$1.7 billion dollars. State and gift taxes increased \$200 million to \$2 billion dollars. Excise taxes jumped 700 million dollars to \$2.8 billion dollars.

Rep. H. C. Caplin predicted, even if taxpayer's return will be run through an automatic determining system.

Both new and old programs are being revised, and Congress will have to act on the new individual income tax law by the end of the fiscal year.

The new law will increase the top rate from 70 percent to 70 percent on income over \$200,000. Another 200,000 households will be affected by the new law. The average tax rate will be 14.5 percent.

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 15 (AP)—Gov. George D. Clyde told a Republican controlled legislature in his biennial message today "we must be bound by the strictest sense of fiscal responsibility at a time when the state is confronted with an unprecedented demand for state funds."

Gov. Clyde's lack of optimism in his 6,500-word message shaped interest on such controversial measures as bonding, school financing and new revenues.

He also promised detailed explanations in his budget message. The governor is expected to present the budget next week today, on Jan. 22.

Clyde requested quick action in the field of taxation.

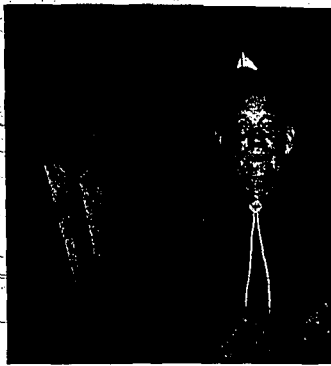

# U.N. Officer Will 'Study' Loan to Cuba

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Jan. 15 (AP)—Paul Hoffman, managing director of the United Nations special fund, disclosed today he had withheld approval of a \$12 million dollar agricultural project in Cuba to which the United States objects.

Hoffman told the opening session of the fund's governing council that 246 pre-investment projects totaling nearly \$80 million dollars had been approved. He added:

"In two other cases, there is a possibility that the pre-conditions for successful operation may not be present. In these cases it is my intention to send highly qualified consultants to the two countries concerned for the spot investigations."

In the light of their findings, I would expect either to proceed with implementation of the project or to report to the governing council if implementation needs to be delayed or seems not to be feasible.

Informed sources said Hoffman referred to the Cuban agricultural project and a military project in Viet Nam.

The United States opposes the Cuban project, contending that it does not qualify for the U.N. grant, of which Washington would pay 40 per cent under its program of contributions.

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# Kennedy's Non-Loophole Tax Plan May Strike You

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—Three yourself for a shock when President Kennedy spells out to Congress, later this month, the \$5 billion dollars worth of reforms he wants tied to tax reduction.

The loopholes he would close may be your own.

They may raise all the way from the stock options given to corporation heads right on down to the common income tax deductions long available to every middle-income householder.

At least a score of proposals to "broaden the tax base"—meaning to make more income subject to tax—and install or erase "unfair or unnecessary preferences"—have been under study at the treasury since Kennedy took office.

Just which ones the President will request, so effect in part the revenue lost by his three-year plan to reduce taxes by 13.5 billion dollars, remains a well-kept treasury secret. Kennedy gave no hints in his state of the union message to Congress Monday.

In any event, tax specialists at the Capitol predict that Congress won't give all or even nearly all that Kennedy wants. It would be much easier politically to give less tax cut and less reform governments.

Among the proposals known to be under study, are income tax deductions for medical outlays and casualty losses.

1. Deductions for medical outlays and casualty losses.
2. Deductions for sales and excise taxes paid to state and city governments.
3. The interest on mortgage payments.
4. The privilege enjoyed by married couples of filing joint returns which split their income and reduce their total tax. Single persons pay much more on the same income.

Kennedy's targets are very likely to include some other tax provisions at which reform advocates have been shouting for years—the capital gains rate, depletion allowances, stock options, tax-free "state" and municipal bonds, and the \$50 exclusion and 4 per cent tax credit on stock dividends.
