Lawrence Winters, baritone, presented an exciting and widely varied program for the community concert audience at the high school auditorium Sunday afternoon.

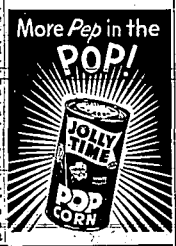
The accompanist, George L. Watis, must be accorded special recognition for his excellent work.

Applications will be taken by the U.S. civil service examiners at the air base. They must be by Feb. 6.

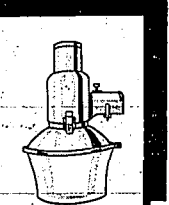

## Rickover Says Knowledge Lack Undermines Democracy

NEW YORK, Jan. 21 (AP)—The "development" of the atomic submarine said today democracy was being undermined because the average voter could not understand the complexities of technological advances.

"This appraisal was presented by Vice Adm. Hyman G. Rickover who has been called 'the father of the nuclear submarine,' in a speech before the Fund for the Republic.

Rickover called the situation "a crisis of intelligence."

In a subtle way democracy is undermined when an important aspect of the life of individuals and communities can no longer be judged by the voter but must be entrusted to experts who work in areas of science that the general public does not comprehend," he said.

As presently constituted, he said, democratic institutions through which the public expresses its will "are themselves not well equipped to control the proper use of technology."

"To illustrate his point, Rickover referred to a recent case in the U.S. court of appeals in Washington.

In the case, the city of New Britain, Conn., was trying to prevent a private firm from receiving and storing radioactive wastes in the city for disposal elsewhere.

In rejecting the case, the court according to Rickover, said in effect: "The atomic energy commission knows the facts and it knows that they will not harm the city."

In other words, Rickover said, the court was admitting it was not equipped to handle the technical aspects of the case but had to rely on the best scientific and engineering advice it could obtain.

"The wise use of technology calls for a higher order of thinking than we have so far accorded it," he said. "We have left it to the management of practical men."

"I submit that we now have scientific knowledge of such immensely dangerous potential that

we ought to bring a broader range of intellectual power to bear upon its use."

Practical men, Rickover said, are concerned with ways to put technological advances to use in the most economical and efficient manner. He said they give little thought to side effects and future consequences.

Rickover said there was impressed for the scholarly approach, which looks at the long range and public aspects of the advances.

**Local Responsibility**

Governor Smylie's budget message to the state legislature contained some good recommendations on the public schools. If the legislature follows the suggestions and finds workable solutions to knottier problems, it will be a great achievement. Although most of the complaints in the past have been directed at the state for failing to raise enough money, no one can deny that the support of local school districts is essential. The state would seem to be a more logical support of part of the school fiscal problem. Yet state law has shackled communities in what can be toward supporting their schools. Idaho imposes a 20-cent limit on the property tax of a district's general fund. As an example of the fiscal straightjacket, Twin Falls school district has been levying the maximum permitted by law for something like eight years. After you hit the top, where else is there to go? In his budget message, Governor Smylie recognized the problem and called on the legislature to relax the levy limitation. In that recommendation lies the key to the solution of the school fiscal problem. The state should specify that no school district could receive any state funds until it collected a certain tax levy. Just for the sake of developing the levy, the state should allow a 30-mill, the present maximum. From that point, state funds could be disbursed to school districts on an equitable, workable formula, one that could be adjusted as needed. Under the procedure followed in the past, a school district could collect its state funds even though it had no local levy. In effect, the practice has put an unfair and onerous tax burden on a district which levied the least amount of tax. Governor Smylie would tackle the problem from the other end, which would perpetuate inequities of taxation rather than solving them. We should move as rapidly as possible in the direction of raising 30 percent of the cost of education by direct state appropriation disbursed according to an equitable and predictable formula, the governor said. In doing this, you may be able to define a more adequate, better quantitatively and qualitatively. And when this is done there should be little reason to permit local citizens to do more in their local communities than the towns and cities. The state should do so as willing to pay for it, and can secure voter approval in a levy election. This is the reason for my recommendation that levy limits be loosened to permit local citizens to raise taxes to meet their own measurement of need," he explained. The permission for additional taxation is essential, but to prevent built-in discrimination, every school district should be required to meet a minimum levy before receiving state funds. State funds should be added to the local minimum to raise total school expenditure to a predetermined, acceptable level that is deemed adequate. Beyond that point, each community should be free to raise the rate to vote on whatever additional funds are thought desirable to improve education opportunities. State funds definitely should not be used to relieve local taxpayers of their own schools and educating their own children. PEBBLE BEACH, Calif., Jan. 21 (AP)—Bulky Billy Casper won the \$50,000 Bing Crosby golf tournament Sunday by firing a 74-over-par 74 over the Pebble Beach course for a 72-hole total of 286. Casper knocked a tremendous 76-yard approach shot to within a foot of the hole on the 18th for the par he needed and then watched on television as first Gary Player and then Jack Nicklaus missed the putts they needed to win and force a sudden death playoff.

Casper nearly took the \$50,000 first prize when a spectator moved near him as he hit his tee shot on the 18th and he sent the ball into a trap. His second shot on the 540-yard, par 5 finished landed 75 feet from the green. "I knew then I needed a par to win or I'd lose," Casper said, "I used a pitching wedge on the shot."

The ball landed toward the green, but landed and rolled to within a foot of the cup for an easy putt. "Then as Casper watched on television and a throng of about 35,000 lined the fairway, Player came onto the 18th. He needed a 12-foot putt to tie but missed by less than an inch. The ball was ground to lake a 74 for the day and 286 total.

Nicklaus missed even pairs on the final two holes to tie after starting the final round five strokes behind Casper and also behind the 64-hole leader, Bob Duden.

"Nicklaus missed the par-5 with 17 to go. He hit a 170-yard drive on the 18th. He hit his second shot off line but recovered and hit a 100-yard shot to 30 feet from the pin. His first putt went 6 feet past and he missed by less than an inch. He tried to card a 10, and to play and three others in second place and also at 286 were Bob Roeburg who had a 71-final round—Dwain Hill with 73, and Art Wall Jr. with 74.

Duden also could have tied Casper had he sunk a 30-foot putt on the last hole, but he three-putted the hole, finishing at 287.

Roeburg, the 31-year-old from Apple Valley, Calif., who won the Crosby in 1958 with 271, finished at 282. He had a 71 on the 18th, he scored a birdie when he hit a 100-yard shot to 15 feet short of the pin.

"I gave me a big lift when I missed that putt," Casper admitted. He parred the 16th and then hit into the trap on the 17th. Then came the 18th, the hole that spoiled victory for Billy and granted him the \$50,000.

Casper shot over par on three of his rounds but a 7-under-par 74 club championship in suburban Fox River, Ill.

Kotlarek, a 27-year-old who finished prominently in 12, 56 places for future international competition, topped 208 feet in his first hole-in-one. He was the first to better the 1953 meet record—208 feet set by Art Toike of Glenview, Ill.

Kotlarek piled up 23.2 points to finish ahead of favored Arne Gunnarsson of Stockholm, Sweden, who was after his first straight Norge title and 10th career year.
