PULLMAN, Jan. 23 (AP)—Sgt. Joe Andrews, a former assistant Pullman police chief, says he stopped officers from cleaning up and hauling a Pullman laundry for 11 months.

The Cleveland newspaper carriers are in a group called the Officers Committee for Newspaper Unity. Mayor Ralph S. Locher attended the session as mediator.

He said wages, another issue in the guild dispute, were not discussed.

Several other members of the committee gave suggestions that might be used in future years.

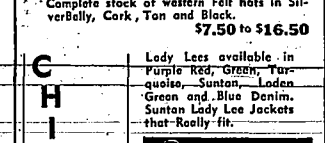
