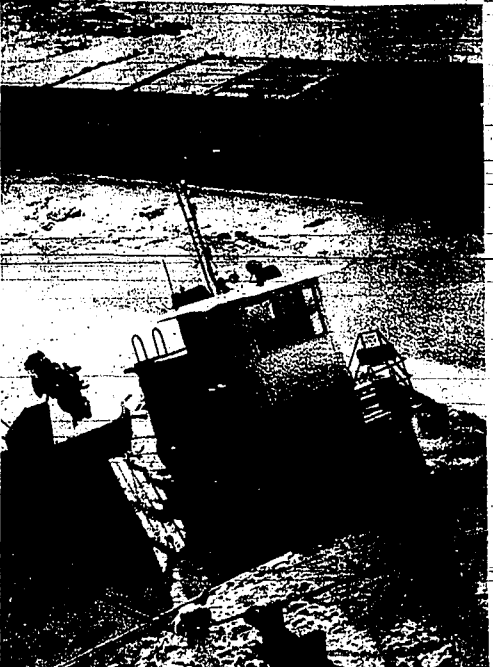

Consolidation of 3 Lincoln County Schools Is Proposed

SHOSHONE, Jan. 24.—Consolidation of Lincoln county schools was proposed as a means not only of saving tax money but of providing better education by superintendents of the three county schools at a PTA meeting here Monday night.

"The officials—John Severson, Shoshone; Ray Briggs, Richfield; and Neil Thomas, Dietrich, said they felt Lincoln county can work out its educational problems without further taxation, perhaps providing a challenge to other counties of the state," he said.

Consolidation, the educators maintained, could save money, give children a better education, yet not cost the taxpayer any more money. The panel was planned to bring out current proposed legislation on education and to help solve local school problems.

Severson said, in his opinion, this would "give the student the education you are presently paying for and not receiving."

Panel members pointed out the proposed state budget for education is adopted, cuts must be made in services or in teacher salaries in most school systems. They outlined as remedies adoption of a sales tax or raising the motor vehicle tax for bonding from 30 to 40 mills.

He noted Idaho is 40th among the 50 states in the amount spent per child for education—148th in teacher salary.

They also asserted Lincoln county is at the bottom of the state in teacher salaries.

If it were not for the "expensive" teachers "have" in our system, we would be in much more serious trouble," Briggs declared, adding he means teachers who reside in the area because of marriage and their husbands' employment.

Floyd O. Kisting, another panel member, who has served for many years on the education committee as a state representative, said he was confident that by consolidation Lincoln county could not only maintain its present standards but could offer even more opportunity to the students.

Mrs. Kisting, district PTA president, spoke strongly in favor of more appropriations to Idaho schools.

Mrs. F. J. Mabbitt was moderator for the panel, arranged by Mrs. Corwin Silva, legislative chairman.

Briggs said if there is not some change in the proposed budget, the cut for Richfield schools would no doubt result in eliminating both home economics and music from their system next year.

"He said, 'If all we can do is give cheap education, that is what we will do.' Grade school leaders are underpaid and high school teachers receive about average pay for the state."

"We, on a local level, have very little to say about our schools now. The state sets the rules. They give us 25 per cent of the funds we use. They have the power to close any school in the state if they so desire. We have no say in the matter."

Advocates listed THROUGH consideration of Lincoln county consolidation would include savings on about five teachers' salaries, as well as the elimination of one teacher with less teaching; better education through the consolidation of Lincoln county schools; and more efficiency in the use of funds.

Combining all three high schools would mean 200 students enrolled in the one school. They would not lose their identity.

"There would be fewer courses could make the ball teams, only one volleyball team instead of three, but is this more important to the student than a good education?" he asked.

Another advantage would be having a high school accredited by the Northwesters Accrediting Association.

Severson said, "One reason I am so convinced we could operate more economically and by that I mean more value per dollar rather than fewer dollars spent, is the fact that the per pupil expense is much less in Shoshone now than in Richfield and less in Richfield than in Dietrich."

There are more students in schools in the county in that exact order, Shoshone's expenditure per pupil is \$24.09; Dietrich \$20.78; and Richfield \$12.88 per pupil. The state average per pupil is \$20.78.

"Persons attending the meeting Monday night felt the next move toward working out educational problems for Lincoln county is up to the respective school boards."

They should appoint a committee to study or draw up plans, then the matter would have to be taken to the county commissioners who could call a vote in the matter, it was pointed out.

Superintendent Thomas volunteered to send written invitations to members of the school boards, inviting them to a meeting to discuss the matter.

BOISE, Jan. 24 (AP)—The Idaho State Employees Credit Union will hold its annual meeting here Jan. 24. Officers for the coming year were announced today. Election of directors and of members of the credit and supervisory committees is on the agenda. Grantees of the union, composed entirely of state employees, now has 1,577 members with deposits totaling \$492,000. That is an increase from \$374,000 a year earlier.

Children Die in Rash Of U. S. Fires

At least a dozen people were killed because of fires touched off in some of the Midwest's bitterest cold of the century.

Most of them were children, five in one family and three in another.

Wind Brings Freeze on "Mild Day"

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24 (AP)—If you think it is cold when the wind still, just think what it would be if the wind were blowing.

Or if the wind is blowing, think how much colder it would be if the wind were blowing harder.

The army has a "chill chart" from which these matters can be determined, exactly.

For example, if the temperature is 20 degrees and the wind is blowing at only one mile an hour, the effect on the exposed skin is the same as 11 degrees below zero.

If the wind is 10 miles an hour, it is equivalent to 36 below zero.

In a 45-mile an hour wind, a temperature of 30 degrees, just below freezing, has the same effect as exposed skin as 40 below zero in still air, according to the chart.

Fury below was described by the army as "the same as being in a deep freeze." It is the lowest temperature given on the chart.
