

Dockers Finish 34-Day Strike at East, Gulf Ports

NEW YORK, Jan. 26 (AP)—Longshoremen trooped back to the docks in East and Gulf coast ports Saturday at the end of a 34-day strike—the Atlantic's longest and costliest. A local dispute that had delayed the reopening of Norfolk, Va., was settled at noon and one that was holding up resumption of work at Mobile, Ala., was settled shortly thereafter. The docks were humming with thousands of longshoremen collecting time and a half overtime pay for working on a Saturday. The strike was settled on the basis of a formula proposed by employers and the International Longshoremen's Association by a special board appointed by President Kennedy and headed by Sen. Wayne Morse, D., Ore.

More than 16,000 longshoremen gathered on the New York waterfront work 177 docks clustered at 14 piers. Piersmen arriving about the liner *Italia* from Nassau, N. S. W., in the Bay, in more than a month who did not have to carry their luggage ashore. Ports where men were back on the job included Philadelphia, Baltimore, Portland, Me., Florida ports and New Orleans, the latter the longest strike. Those in Texas voted to return Sunday. Longshoremen in Baton Rouge, La., slated to work, were delayed by a heavy fog. The dispute in Mobile had centered on a "rain clause" whereby dock workers would be paid a full day's wages if the rain prevented a shift to work. This was not a factor in the settlement, however. No explanation was given. Cost of the strike, that immobilized almost 700 ships has been estimated unofficially at \$50-million dollars.

Cull Potatoes Used To Process Vodka

RUPERT, Jan. 26—Cull potatoes are being put to a new use at the Rocky Mountain Chemical corporation, L. M. Buhler, president, announced today. For the first time in American history, vodka is being processed from waste potatoes, making the Rupert plant the only potato-alcohol distillery in the United States, he said. The official term for the announcement a major economic breakthrough for the Gem state industry, opening the way for an entirely new industry in Idaho. Using potato culls for the new vodka, named Spudka, will solve one of the biggest problems facing potato processing industry today, he declared. 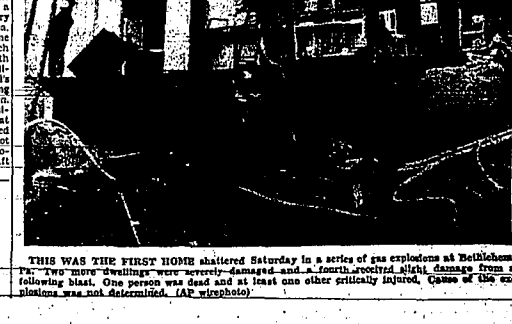

He is a specialist in distillation and fermentation, holding nine patents on these subjects. The U. S. Dept. of Agriculture has been using the U. S. since 1922. His PhD in chemical engineering is from the University of California.

The Rocky Mountain Chemical corporation purchased 35 million pounds of cull potatoes for its combined operation. All potatoes are from the Minnesota area and more than 200 persons are employed. Bulkier potatoes are sold.

"The potato alcohol industry continues to have a very bright future," said Dr. Placock, "it is estimated that the industry will reach a total production of \$450,000,000, according to the official. Some of the alcohol is used for medicinal purposes and with a number of distillation columns exceeding 41,100 feet in length, Rocky Mountain Chemical processes alcohol from the potatoes and fresh frozen whole potatoes.

Lincoln Prosecutor Raps Law on Negligent Homicide

BIOSHORE, Jan. 26 — The present state of Idaho laws governing "negligent homicide" are nothing more than "legalized nothing on our highways," believes Howard S. Adkins, prosecuting attorney of Lincoln county. The prosecutor made this statement in an attempt to awaken the people of the state to the seriousness of the situation and encourage them to talk to their legislators now in order to get new or revised legislation in the matter.

"Daily there is publicized the mounting toll traffic deaths on the roads of Idaho. The score is kept much the same as that of a game of golf, presumably with the wishful thinking that we may end our year with a low score," the prosecutor pointed out in a statement.

"As admirable as this may be for cautioning the public, it has done nothing by the way of arming our law enforcement officers with legislation which will permit the prosecution of one who by his act or acts of ordinary negligence on the highways kills another human being," the attorney continues.

"In 1949 the involuntary manslaughter statute, which carried a penalty of 10 years' imprisonment, was amended by adding to other provisions: . . . in the operation of a motor vehicle in a reckless, careless, or negligent manner which produces death . . ." he notes.

"In 1953 the legislature then enacted the negligent homicide statute, the violation of which carries a penalty of not more than one year in the county jail or more than a fine of \$1,000. Thus was reduced the crime of unintentionally killing on the highway to what is known as indictable misdemeanor, the violation of which could not in any circumstances be sent to the state penitentiary for the offense."

"In an attempt was thereafter made to charge one with the old manslaughter law which remained on the books in Idaho despite the case of state vs. Cunningham in 1957 said to effect the legislature, who it enacted the negligent homicide law as a misdemeanor, by implication repealed the full offense of the crime of manslaughter by automobile," Adkins explains.

"Since that time prosecutors have been powerless to file a manslaughter charge in Idaho in case of involuntary death by automobile," Adkins points out.

"Not only was the penalty reduced, but the degree of negligence to constitute a violation was amended under the old manslaughter law all that was required by way of proof of violation was that some law had been broken and that as a result thereof someone was killed."

"In the negligent homicide statute the legislature required the proof of the operation of a motor vehicle in reckless disregard of the safety of others for which the supreme court demanded proof of gross negligence amounting to a reckless disregard of consequences and the intent of others of culpable negligence," explains the prosecutor.

"The layman has had little knowledge of these facts in expecting prosecutions to be made for the deaths caused on the highways by means of ordinary negligence such as would enable one to recover in civil suit for damages, namely, failure to conduct one's self as a reasonable prudent person would have conducted himself under the circumstances," he says.

"This situation of being unable to bring a prosecution for criminal homicide against one who has caused the death of others on the highway has now presented itself in most, if not all, of the counties of the state."

"Adkins feels this situation should be corrected by drawing more prominently to the attention of the public.

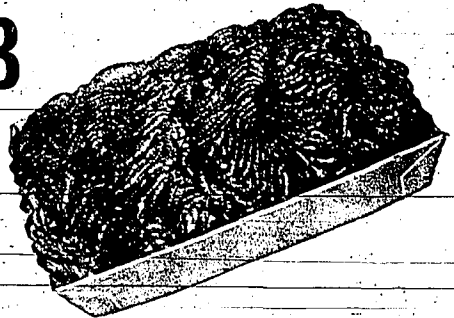

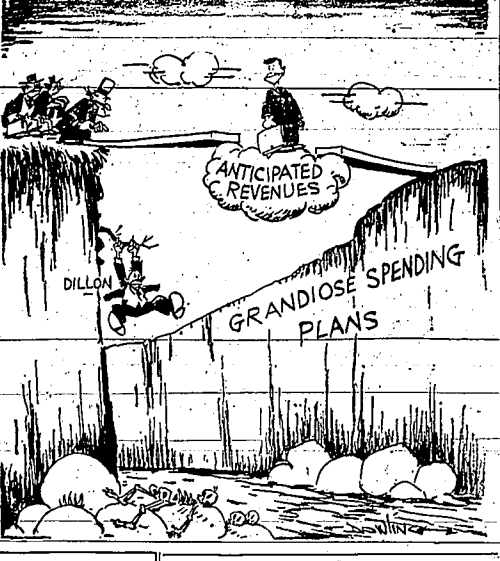

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26—Although the sugar price was supposed to have advanced in the past few weeks last year, it may come up for settlement again this year.
Presidential action on sugar law is being generated in two areas—housewives, who are finding foods made of sugar rising in price, and those prices will rise further.
Among wheat growers and other agricultural groups, they complain that the sugar act isn't doing all it could to promote the sale abroad of American farm products.



U.S. Tops Again

Down through the years Americans have developed some sort of phobias and complex obsessions—about having the best and biggest of everything in the world. There's even one field in which Americans generally are not aware they excel, yet this nation leads the world in it.

It's this little matter of public debt. The U. S. government debt is the heaviest per capita in the world. Figures have been compiled for the end of 1961, but by the end of 1961, each American shares of the federal debt was \$1,607.

The nearest competitor for the dubious honor was England with a paltry \$1,564 per capita debt. No other nation is even in the running for the distinction, although Canadians, Australians and New Zealanders each owed something like \$1,000.

Some of the per capita debts of other nations are much lighter than in the U.S. Each Frenchman owes \$372, Italian \$202 and West German \$128. The per capita public debt in some other nations includes Spain \$110, Yugoslavia \$63, India \$35, Iran \$37, Indonesia \$22, and Japan \$12.

It's also interesting to note American aid has been funneled into several of these nations in varying amounts, although each and every nation receiving U.S. aid is much better off in the public debt department. Of course, all Americans understand the primary object of foreign aid is to save the rest of the world from communism.

All that remains to be decided is just how much the U.S. can afford to spare the rest of the world. If the U.S. should go off the deep end in the process, all these recipients of aid down through the years undoubtedly will step forward to help the U.S. return.

ENFORCEMENT PROBLEM
Some three decades after the repeal of prohibition, there still is no answer to the liquor problem. Prohibition itself provided no solution, instead of contributing to the problem. There is an old saw that spanned a period of lawlessness such as the nation never witnessed, before or since.

For a good many years, Idaho—and other western states—banned sales of intoxicants to Indians. A survey of our experiences from frontier days. Idaho finally passed a law legalizing such sales and now the state legislature is being asked to cope with a resulting problem in now.

There is no indication intoxication among Indians is any worse or more widespread than among whites, although there are many claims Indians "can't hold their liquor." Instead, the problem is one of enforcement. Here is an old problem and one not confined to north Idaho reservations nor even to the matter of liquor.

HOW FACT WORKS—A capsule review of the present situation.
In 1949, congress enacted a quota system to limit concentration in importation to certain United States, and to guarantee a market for those already producing sugar. It gave them 10,000 tons of sugar per year and 100,000 tons of the rest of the domestic requirements were allocated foreign sugar producers with Cuba getting the largest share.

Paraphrasing, the foreign producers were guaranteed a price. To get the money to pay the price, the U.S. government had to sell sugar in addition to regular duties.
The guaranteed price served as a shelter for domestic producers. It could always get as much as foreign exporters could.

The ultimate financial result of this arrangement was the American Executive. For a number of years she has been paying 2 cents a pound extra for sugar. To provide good profits for American and foreign producers.

CARTO AND CHANGE—Why did congress in 1957—to keep the most important American sugar producers happy and to avoid the wrath of Caribbean nations, the Philippines and Cuba—let its allotment because of Castro, congress enacted a new law redistributing the quota system. It gave 10,000 tons and 100,000 tons and the same quota to 800,000 tons.

At the same world price for sugar was 2 3/4 cents a pound. Then the price started rising. Cuban sugar production, because of the nature of the crop, is very seasonal and population, fell off. At the same time, the rising population and the higher standards of living in the U.S. increased the demand for sugar.

Last month, the government called for offers of 750,000 tons of sugar. It was offered only 114,000 tons.
By this week the world price had risen to 5 1/2 cents a pound. Futures prices indicate it will go higher. The U.S. will be at the mercy of the world price.

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Talk on Iran Is Given at Rupert Meet

RUPERT, Jan. 20.—A description of conditions current in Iran, accompanied by color slides, was given by Tim W. Burley, at a Thursday noon meeting of the Rupert Chapter of Commerce.

Who spent four years in Iran, working with the foreign aid program in agriculture, and some of the many country faces in the efforts are being made toward improving the economic status of the country and of the individual citizens, he said. People of the country are making it doubly hard to assist them.

Oil, first produced in 1911, is the country's biggest single commodity. The by-product, gas, is being burned because of a lack of a market for it, Wood said.

One of the richest reserves of the country is in agriculture—the point making the introduction of modern methods will bring a "boom" in agricultural production and in the economy of the nation.

The speaker told of irrigating methods used in Iran which included water being drawn from wells by man power and in some cases by horses. The horse-operated method would irrigate about 10 acres a day, by using 12 hours per day.

Much of the country is badly eroded, Wood said, because of the great overgrazing and from clearing vegetation to provide charcoal.

Sheep and goats make it difficult for the grasses being planted as a means of soil conservation to get a good start, he said. Large amounts of obsolete farm machinery are being sent from the United States to provide a great help in the stepped-up farm program in Iran.

One great detriment to progress in Iran and other middle Eastern countries, Wood explained, is the lack of communications.

One-fourth of the inhabitants of Iran are nomads, still following the seasons with their flocks, much the same as Abraham did in his time, he said, living in tents made of reeds and goat hair, with the only modern touches to their lives being perhaps kerosene lanterns and a few tin cans.

Residents who stay in one place and farm, live for the most part in mud and straw houses with thatched roofs. Much of the housing, especially of the cheaper grades, such as straw for brick making, is done by camels and donkeys.

Road Project Begins Soon At Shoshone

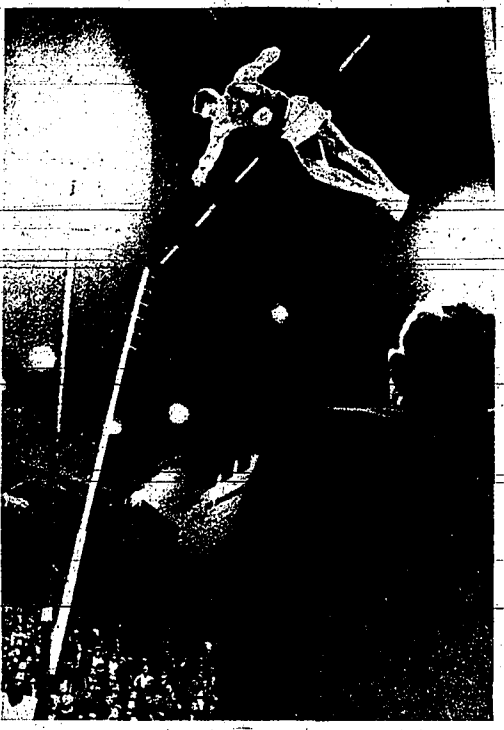

Baseball Committee Lengthens Strike Zone to Help Pitchers

NEW YORK, Jan. 26 (AP)—Baseball's rules committee in a decisive step to give some relief to the homerun plagued pitchers, voted unanimously today to widen the batter's strike zone by nearly 10 inches. This drastic action, recommended by virtually all 20 major league managers, is expected not only to enable the pitcher to better cope with the hitters but to reduce the vast number of bases on balls which lengthened and dragged out games in recent years.

The change in the strike zone will be in the area of the batter's knees and shoulders. Under the new rule, which goes into effect in 1963, the definition of the strike zone will read: "Space above home plate which is between the top of the batter's shoulders and his knees when he assumes his natural position."

The old rule, in effect since 1950, reads: "Space above home plate which is between the batter's armpits and the top of his knees when he assumes his natural stance."

This change could make a difference of from 10 to 12 inches," said Cal Hubbard, supervisor of the American League umpiring staff and a member of the all-league rules committee.

Charles Segar, secretary-treasurer of baseball and the rules committee, said the action was taken with the thought of giving some relief to the pitcher who has been on the receiving end of nearly all rules changes in recent years.

"Most of the rules changes in recent years have been made for the benefit of the batter," he said. "It was the feeling that some changes should be made which would help the pitcher more. Actually what we've done was to raise the old strike zone which was reduced in 1950."

Freddie Pleig, supervisor of National League umpires, said the new rule would make it easier for the umpires to judge called balls and strikes.

The top of the shoulder is a much "batter" line of demarcation," he said. "It was more readily observed by umpires, fans and the guys on the bench. The difference between the old rule and the top of the shoulders can be around 2 or 3 inches, and this in some cases was a big deal."

Pleig said the umpire will be instructed to operate under the new rule in the exhibition games during spring training.

"We expect to receive some complaints from the hitters during the exhibition games," he said, "but in a few weeks everything will be stabilized."

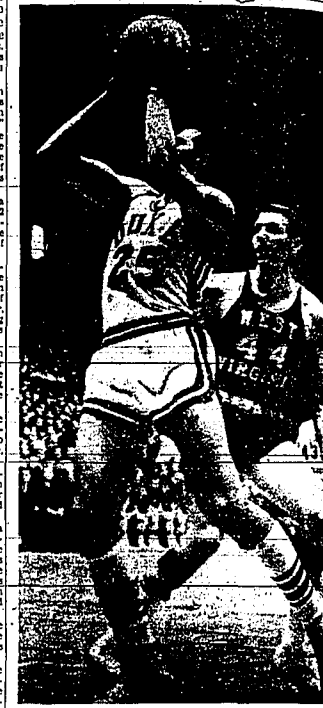

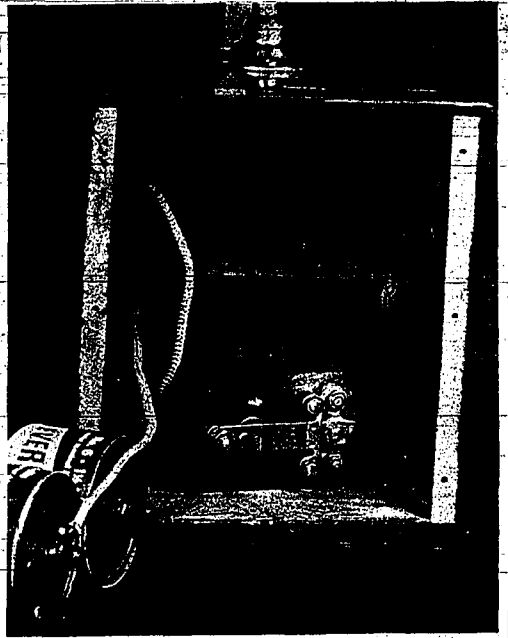

...celebrated tourist attractions.
The Empire State building stands well above such other renowned international structures as the Eiffel Tower 984 feet tall, the Washington monument (555 feet), the Pyramid of Cheops (480 feet) and the leaning tower of Pisa (117.5 feet).
Its vital statistics are approximately:
The skeleton alone contains 60,000 tons of steel, enough to build a double-track railroad from New York to Baltimore. Its telephone and telegraph wires would cover 3,500 miles. There are 6,300 windows—washed twice a month—and more than ten million kilowatt hours of electricity are used every month to furnish it with light and power.
The ground upon which it stands has a glittering history.
Following former Thompson modest prophesy and subsequent sale, the land passed into the hands of the famed-Astor family and by the end of the 19th century, two Astor mansions adorned the corners of 33rd and 34th streets on Fifth Avenue. Then, as now, one of the city's most elegant thoroughfares.
Shortly after the turn of the century, the Astor mansions were torn down to make room for the Waldorf Astoria hotel which attracted world fame for more than three decades.
When the Waldorf Astoria moved over to Park avenue, John J. Harkness' dream of "the world's most majestic building" became a reality.

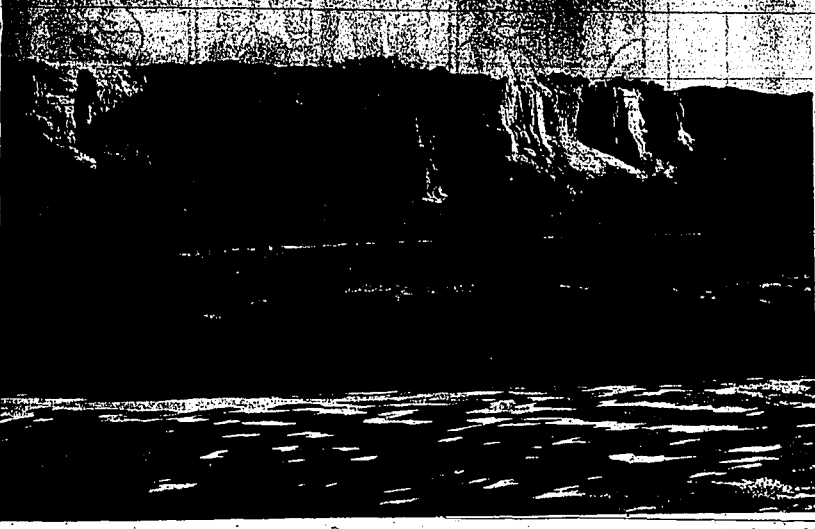

Ice Takes Over as Snow Lack Fails To Provide Outdoor Attractions

Lack of heavy snow in this area, although serious from a water point, is not causing a shortage of interesting attractions for those who like the outdoors this time of year. With snow lacking, ice is taking over and doing a good job as a substitute for viewers seeking the unique. Two such winter activities are located in the vicinity of Buhl. One is made while the other is planned by nature.

Most unique is the man-made one. North of Buhl on the Clear Lake road and at a point a short distance south of the steel bridge, a running sprinkler, two feet up an ice field that resembles a flow in the Arctic. A farmer there permitted a pipe irrigation system to run with the result the sprinklers have gradually permitted a formation of ice during the freezing weather. The unique ice field will reappear in a stiff opening and leading to the ice depth.

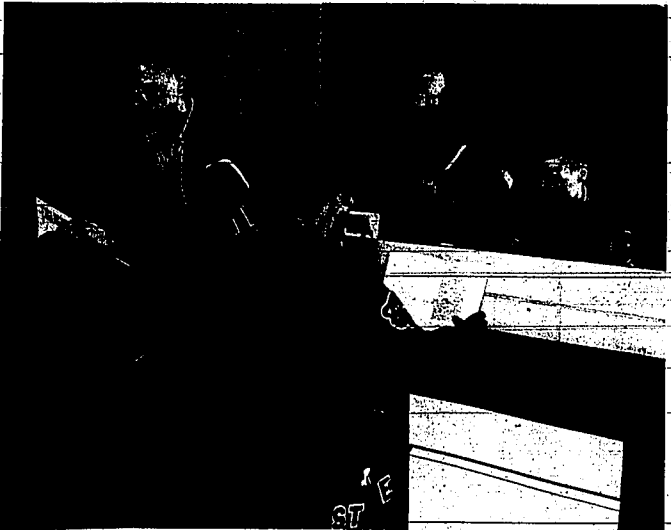
