

Mental Health Talk Given at PTA Meeting

Dr. V. V. Tolson, Twin Falls physician, was featured speaker at the PTA meeting at the school last night. He spoke on mental health.

Dr. Tolson said it has been estimated that 25 per cent of our people who visit a doctor's office are there because of mental problems. He added that parents should encourage their children to grow into mature, responsible adults. They must give them responsibilities and expect them to add them in their growth.

He noted the measure of a person's success in life is not the amount of wealth he can accumulate, but how his children grow up.

"We as parents, today are in too much of a hurry to do our children the things they deserve," he said. "We need to give our children security and not on a child's insistence of a 'parade'."

"We also need discipline, but not discipline given in anger," Dr. Tolson said. "We need to be firm, but not to be harsh."

The important thing in mental health today, he added, is the prevention of mental illness and the early diagnosis. Good mental health should be practiced in the schools in cooperation with the home.

Area People Urged to Get Vaccinations

The director of the south central district health department issued a call for Magic Valley residents to purchase vaccinations for themselves and their families for smallpox, diphtheria and tetanus Tuesday.

Luther C. Thompson cautioned that smallpox vaccinations should be given every five to seven years for all ages and that a diphtheria and tetanus vaccine is good only for four years.

Citing instances of recent epidemics in Omaha, Neb., New York and Great Britain, Dr. Thompson warned that doctors should be consulted on the possibility of infection, and adults should periodically renew their immunization against the plague.

He said vaccinations may be obtained Tuesday and Thursday from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the health department, city hall, Twin Falls.

Coed Speaks On Japanese At Hagerman

HAGERMAN—Jan. 29—Myra Schiffer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Schiffer of Twin Falls, spoke to the Hagerman high school student body Friday about the history and culture of Japan as an exchange student to Japan.

Miss Schiffer is a senior at Lewis and Clark college, Portland, majoring in political science and history. Along with 22 other students of the college, she was sent to Japan by the college and an organization called Experiment in International Living, Putney, Vt.

During the four-months there, the student lived with Japanese families, learning their customs and ways of living.

As this was Miss Schiffer's first time abroad the transition to a new population was overwhelming. She stated the United States students noticed most was the mixture of the old and new.

The traditions, superstitions, and the respect paid the elders and family customs were a big contrast.

While in Japan, Miss Schiffer's home was with a family at Kanazawa, Japan. Here she learned to eat with chopsticks, sleep on the floor and bathe Japanese style.

SHE HAD TYPICAL Japanese breakfasts consisted of rice, bean soup, raw fish and miso soup.

In the educational field, the Japanese student works toward university education. This is of utmost importance for the individual to get a decent job, as an uneducated Japanese can't qualify for a good job.

She saw the Shiryamans shined in Tokyo, the money borrowed, loaned to the children killed in the atom-bombing of Hiroshima, and the atomic bombing in Hiroshima, where patients with atomic injuries receive treatment.

Miss Schiffer said the group of American students visited the Diet, or Japanese congress, and the House of representatives in Tokyo.

Success of "Tin-Ear" Idea May Bring New Video Eye

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 30 — Last Nov. 27 an electronic "ear" was surgically implanted in the skull of a 46-year-old woman who had been deaf from birth.

Today Mrs. X can hear. She can distinguish words and learning to associate them with speech sounds she long ago was unable to make but which she could not hear.

The success of the "ear" has encouraged the electronics specialist who made it to start planning artificial "eyes" like tiny television sets, and electronic circuitry to replace pain-damaged nerves.

The specialist is James Doyle, 25, president of General Data Corporation, of suburban Orange, which supplies electronics for missile and space research.

The neurosurgeon who implanted the electronic "ear" is his brother, Dr. John B. Doyle, of the University of Southern California medical school.

Dr. Doyle gave a report on the operation at a meeting of the American Medical Association. The device in Mrs. X's skull

measures 1 1/2 x 1 1/2 inches and weighs about two ounces. James Doyle said the next model would be much thinner and could be implanted under the skin. It would not have to be recessed into the skull.

Mrs. X's "ear" carries only one channel of signals from a tape microphone to her eighth or auditory nerve, but this enables her to telephone word from another. The next model, Doyle said, will have at least four channels, enabling the patient to hear a wider variety and volume of sounds with less distortion. Eventually, he hopes to perfect models with 16 to 30 channels and thus approximate normal sound reproduction.

The cost of the next model: about \$1,000, exclusive of medical fees.

"So far Mrs. X has had no infection, no pain and no headaches," Doyle said. "She can tell speech from music, even when it is mixed with the sound of a woman. And most important of all, she is very happy. In many cases of deafness,

Doyle said, the auditory nerve is undamaged and the auditory normal. Accident of illness had damaged the ear drum or the tiny bones that conduct vibrations to a fluid-filled organ called the cochlea. So long as the cochlea, or semicircular canal, is
