## Area Financier Indicted in Fraud

A Provo, Utah, man, one of six persons named Tuesday in a federal mail fraud indictment, charged Wednesday the indictments are “a result of a bitter factional fight in the Democratic party.” In Maryland, D. Spencer Grow, the Provo man indicted, is head of the Prudential Savings and Loan association, and the Idaho Savings and Loan association, Twin Falls. The firms have a total of seven offices in Idaho.  
The six men are charged with fraudulently misrepresenting the protection provided by the Security Financial Insurance corporation, a now defunct firm which insured savings and loan association accounts.  
Among the defendants who were indicted was A. Gordon Boone, Democratic speaker of the Maryland House of Delegates. He is alleged as speaker later in the day but called the charges unfounded.  
Contacted at the Salt Lake City office on his return from a business trip to Washington, Boone said he was “amused” at the charge. He said that past several years he has been in Utah and Idaho and the national convention held recently in Las Vegas, Nev.  
The indictment was filed in the federal court in Provo, Utah, and was discussed by local service officials from the Humboldt national forest, Rex Nev., Bureau of Land Management officials speaking were Ed Becker, Boise, district manager, and David L. Daniels, Boise.

## Brazilians Sweep Aboard Seized Freighter, Proceed to Amazon

BELEM, Brazil, Feb. 20 (AP)—The hijacked Venezuelan freighter Amazon, flying a Brazilian flag and with Brazilian diplomats and military personnel aboard, reached the Amazon river port of Macapa Tuesday. The Brazilian navy prepared to transfer her pro-communist hijackers to a warship and bring them to Belem. The ship's arrival at the sleepy equatorial port on the northern delta of the Amazon was announced by the presidential plane in Belem.  
The Brazilian corvette Sylmar was ready to leave Macapa with the hijackers, who are expected to be interned at Belem until the Brazilian Foreign Ministry decides whether to grant them political asylum. Venezuela wants the hijackers extradited to the Amazon on Tuesday night and dropped anchor near Belem, about 20 miles west of Macapa. In Rio de Janeiro, the foreign ministry said it had asked the Venezuelan government to send representatives to take over the ship, seized last week by a band of Venezuelan terrorists.  
The Brazilian navy said the hijacked freighter was brought to the naval base in Belem and held incommunicado.  
The hijackers, who seized the freighter in a dramatic bid to discredit Venezuelan President Romulo Betancourt, anti-communist government, requested asylum in Brazil. The Venezuelan government demanded their return for trial as criminals.  
Brazilian authorities said the captors would be treated as political refugees until the Foreign Ministry decides their future. They indicated asylum will be granted the hijackers, and the Venezuelan government is considered political and no Brazilian life was taken.

## Fewer Test Inspections Indicated

GENEVA, Feb. 20 (AP)—The United States indicated today it would settle for fewer than eight on-site inspections a year within the Soviet Union if the Soviet Union accepted a completely foolproof inspection procedure.  
Chief U.S. delegate William C. Foster presented the idea in a meeting of the 17-nation disarmament conference. He stressed that any American willingness to compromise would depend, however, on the Soviet Union's factory number of inspectors, the areas where they could operate most comfortably, and whether they could be dispatched.  
Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valery V. Kuznetsov ignored Foster's suggestion. He tried to move the debate away from the test ban and into a discussion of an East-West nonaggression pact.  
The Soviet Union has advanced the pact idea frequently, but the West wanted it considered only in the general framework of disarmament treaty.

## House Told School Program Will Need 'Hardship' Dollars

BOISE, Feb. 20 (AP)—The Idaho house of representatives was told today that it will take more than 40 million dollars for public schools to realistically meet the needs of education and provide for “hardship areas” in the state. Rep. Frank Hirsch, R., Boise, said that is demonstrated by figures he handed the lawmakers on how much a revised version of the present school formula would give their districts with a 40 million dollar appropriation, and with \$41,450,000. He said the added \$1,450,000 is needed to provide for schools that have the students to fill more classrooms, but don't have the teachers or the classrooms to handle them.  
“These are the hardship areas which should have more money,” said Hirsch.  
He explained that the education department believes 32.3 million dollars is needed to maintain schools at about the present level.  
The legislators were also handed figures showing how much districts would receive under the formula which is described in a simplified formula prepared by two Canyon county superintendents. # News Around Idaho

**IDAHO FALLS, Feb. 20 (UP)—**Washington's birthday celebration will be observed jointly Friday by the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution, with a 5 p.m. dinner and program at the Bonaventure hotel. **BOISE, Feb. 20 (UP)—**Organizers of a new bank in Montpelier asked for dismissal of their case in third district court here Tuesday, stating as their reason "dilatory tactics" on the part of the state finance commissioner and the First Security Bank of Idaho. They said the tactics of State Finance Commissioner R. U. Spaulding and his successor, Joseph L. It has been announced, however, that \$100,000 was contributed here by the Red Cross. The flood emergency has hit the local budget hard, according to John Clawson, chairman of the local chapter.

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## School Aid Plans Viewed By Utahans

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 20 (AP) — Gov. George D. Clyde's basic school support program, as proposed to programs recommended by CAPS and other agencies, was explored in expected controversial debate today in the Utah senate.

Democrats last week won agreement from the Republicans majority to discuss all proposed education bills before passing them to the house.

Governor Clyde has recommended an increase in the basic support program from \$4,000 to \$5,175 per distribution unit plus a 6-mill local levy that could raise the total to \$6,250. It is estimated his proposal would cost the state an additional 17.4 million dollars during the next biennium.

The CAPS' (cooperating agencies for public schools) plan would increase the cost per distribution unit to \$7,000, plus permitting a local levy of up to 28 mills and a \$500 board levy, for a total of \$9,500. It is estimated the CAPS' plan would cost 28 million dollars during the biennium.

Debate on the school aid bill followed passage Tuesday in the senate of a bill increasing the state's sales tax by one-half percent — earmarking the proceeds over a six-year period for construction at state institutions.

The bill, sponsored by Sen. Charles R. Hunter, R-Cedar City, passed on a strict party line split—13 Republicans for and 12 Democrats against.

## Volunteers Can Work on LDS Church

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Feb. 20 (AP)—Objections of organized labor will not keep volunteers from working on the new LDS church, Bishop T. J. Williams said Tuesday.

The Great Falls building council set up pickets in protest after attempts to negotiate the issue over a two-month period broke down. No further talks are scheduled.

"The union says flatly we do not have the right to donate labor. We say flatly we do," Williams said.

He said the LDS church is not anti-union and has many union members. But he added a precedent could be set by failing to go through with the volunteer program on the \$400,000 church.

"Many of our members can't afford to donate much money so they are donating labor as has always been done in our church," the bishop explained.

He said dedication of the church might be delayed from November until one year from this spring.

The church is about 25 per cent complete, with foundations finished and some walls up. No interior work has been done.

A union statement said organized labor feels members of the church should follow the practice of other area churches. It said the union had no objections to a carpenter donating carpenter's work but that this should not be reserved to a clerk, office worker, doctor, lawyer or housewife.

## Family Carries on After Drowning Loss of Girls

BABYLON, N.Y., Feb. 20 (AP)—A family that had lost four children in a day began to pick up the thread of its life. Ruth Coridan is doing it by eating for her four remaining children and by thinking of the future.

Lorraine Coridan, 31, who narrowly escaped the fate of her four sisters, returned Tuesday to the school classes and reported forward with some relief. "No one mentioned the accident,"

He plans to answer each of the letters of sympathy. "I don't care how long it takes," he said.

"As for Lorraine, the thread of her life is shorter, simpler, and perhaps a little easier to pick up."

"She has returned to school," Mrs. Kirby said. "But she'll miss her sisters. They all walked hand-in-hand back and forth to school."

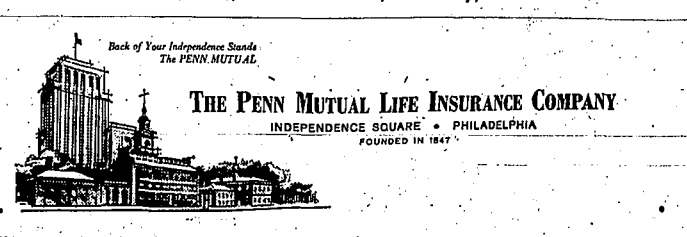

## Communists May Try Power Seize Soon in Tense Haiti

The lid may blow off this spring in the confused Caribbean Negro Republic of Haiti.

If an explosion comes, say reliable sources, U. S. military action may be needed to prevent a Castro-like regime from popping up on the island of Hispaniola, only 10 miles across the strategic Windward passage from Cuba.

Haiti, a turbulent dictatorship, has been the scene of a power struggle between the Trujillo dictatorship and the Duvalier dictatorship.

Sources in touch with Port au Prince, the Haitian capital, speculate that President Francois Duvalier, dictator of the French-speaking nation of 4 million, will leave the country suddenly, before May, with the explanation he is seeking medical treatment abroad. The 53-year-old dictator has been ill.

Informants add that if Dr. Duvalier decides to leave, he probably will turn the government over to his current interior minister, Luc P. Francois.

—Duvalier is a physician turned politician, known to Haitians as "Papa Doc." He has survived a dozen plots since taking office in 1957 after an election denounced by his foes as fraudulent.

Now he may seem despatcher. A reliable student strike against the regime is in the offing. Duvalier's secret police and militia are reported cracking down with a wave of arrests.

## Idaho's Tax Structure Is Discussed at T. F. Meeting

The Idaho tax structure was discussed Tuesday noon during the legislative luncheon meeting at the American Legion hall by William Grange, secretary-manager of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce.

Grange compared Idaho's tax system with those of two surrounding states. Grange said during the fiscal year ending in 1962 Idaho property taxes produced \$177 per cent of the total general fund and 35.28 per cent of general fund was from income taxes.

Oregon received 43 per cent of the general fund from income taxes, but has no property taxes, Grange said. Idaho income tax rates start at three per cent on

\$1,000 and by \$5,000, the rate is 9.5 per cent. Oregon's rate is one per cent on \$1,000 to 9.5 per cent at \$5,000.

In Utah the general fund received 8.5 per cent from property taxes and 14.6 per cent from income taxes. Utah's income tax rates start at one per cent on \$1,000 to the maximum of four per cent at \$4,000. One reason for this low tax rate is the sales tax, Grange said.

Grange said to get some relief from these burdensome taxes, Idaho has to have tax reform. A sales tax will help in this respect, he said.

Grange added that many businesses will not come to Idaho

due to the high property taxes Idaho now has.
